Bailey County Still In Path Of Proposed Missile Site

Sites are still being considered for the MX missile system, and the West Texas-Eastern New Mexico areas are still very much in the picture, including a site that would cover Bailey County, although Bailey County itself has been possibly ruled out as a site for the system.

Bailey County Judge Glen Williams said he has heard nothing further from military officials since they drilled around 10 test sites in south-western Bailey County two years ago.

Air Force Undersecretary Antonia Chaves told the House Appropriations Committee on military construction that population density and land costs are likely to knock the West Texas-New Mexico areas out of contention, but that further study is needed.

Current sites include an area which starts at Fort Summer and runs easterly, into Texas, just north of Clovis.

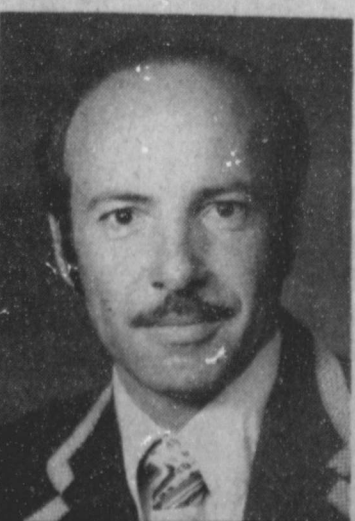

Tom Freeman Announces For County Commissioner

Thomas S. 'Tom' Freeman, 44, has officially announced his candidacy for Bailey County Commissioner, Precinct One, subject to the Republican Primary in May, 1980.

He is a self-employed commercial pilot, flying agricultural aircraft during the growing season and charter aircraft in the winter months. Freeman retired from the United States Air Force with the rank of Major after twenty years of dedicated service.

During his military career, Freeman was a fighter pilot, instrument instructor pilot, chief of Quality Control and Chief test pilot for the Tactical Air Defense Command units. He also



served with the Tactical Air Command as reconnaissance aircraft pilot with over 100 missions and as Air Force advisor on reconnaissance to an Army General Staff during the Vietnam War.

Freeman was presented with the Distinguished Flying Cross and three air medals for his role during the conflict. He also has earned eleven other awards during his career.

After his return to the United States, he was assigned Assistant Air Field Manager duties. During this time, he was directly responsible for organizing two highly successful "open house" projects attracting 50,000 people each. Freeman received commendations from the Air Force Thunderbirds, the Navy Blue Angels, American Cancer Society and the State of Carolina for these civic projects.

His last assignment brought him to Cannon Air Force Base where he flew the F-111D for several years, and again was selected to work on a General's staff. Freeman completed his final two years as Chief of Airfield Man-

aging the 200-missile MX program, she said.

In 1978, when the Air Force announced that the four Texas counties, including Bailey, Deaf Smith, Dallam and Lipscomb, were under study for location of MX missile sites, feelings were divided.

Many felt that the missile sites would be a tremendous boon to the economy, while expressing the underlying feeling that becoming a possible nuclear target was not the most desirable thing in the world.

In the most recent narrowing of sites, which places the towns of Muleshoe Farwell and Texico and Clovis, N.M. in the vicinity of the 'second choice' locations, little conversation is being conducted concerning the very remote possibility of location near here.

SBA Deadline Approaching In Agriculture

The last day for filing loan applications for SBA Disaster Declaration #1708 is April 10, 1980, on loans for physical damage and the last day for filing on economic injury losses under the declaration is July 10, 1980.

Interest rates for loans under Declaration #1708 are 5 percent and 7-3/8 percent for Physical Damage and 8-1/4 percent on Economic Injury loans. The 7-3/8 percent rate is determined by availability of financing from other sources at comparable terms.

Declaration #1708 covers Deaf Smith, Farmer, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Lamb, Hale, Floyd, Cockran, Hockley, Yoakum, Gaines, Dawson, Martin and Upton Counties and the counties adjacent to them.

Applications received after these deadlines will not be accepted.

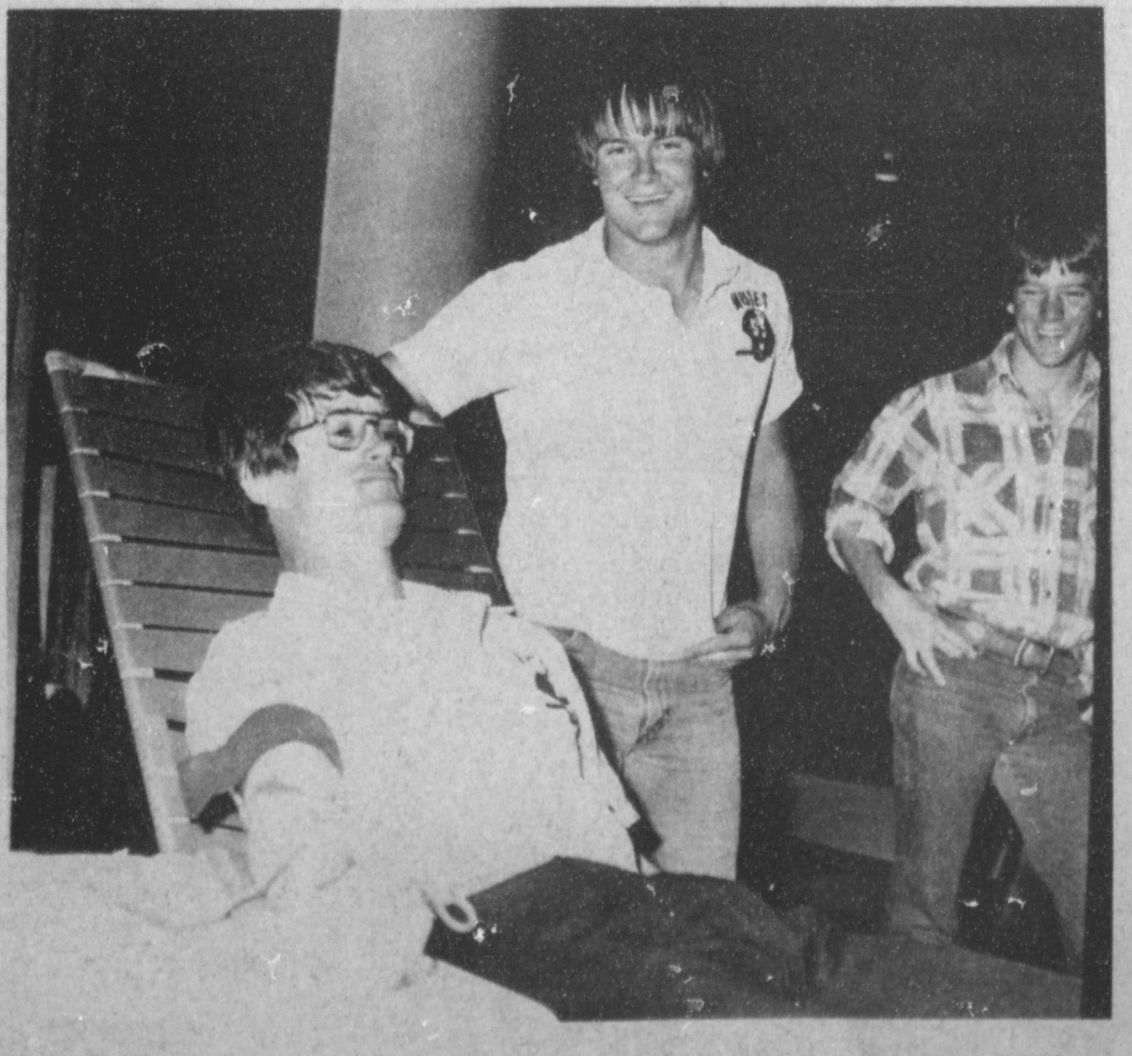
All persons are encouraged to attend the special week of services, and are reminded to 'come as you are.'

Terry Bouchelle will be the Thursday worship leader and Louis Crenshaw will speak on "Indifference." Song leader will be Cont. on page 6 Col 2



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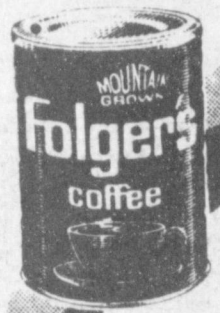

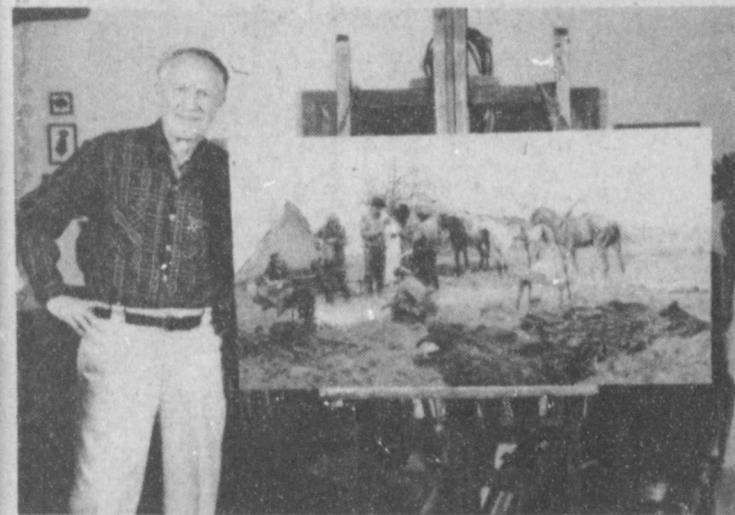

Extension Agent Announces Plan For Seminar Here

Bailey County Extension Agent Spencer Tanksley said an Artificial Insemination and Pregnancy Determination Clinic will be held in Muleshoe on April 14-17 at the Bailey County Civic Center, beginning at 8:30 a.m. each day.

In addition to the field training in artificial insemination and pregnancy determination, participants will devote half of their time on instruction on cow management, added Tanksley.

Topic covered in the classroom will be:

- Anatomy and physiology of reproduction
- Semen handling and thawing techniques
- Management applications and techniques of pregnancy testing
- Principles and techniques of A I
- Successful feeding and mineral program for the breeding herd
- Genetic selection and record programs
- Programs for developing heifers

--Techniques used in handling calving problems

--Effective herd health programs.

"Time is devoted to other subjects and students are provided a comprehensive manual on A I and an information folder containing numerous Extensions publications and papers relating to A I and breeding herd management," added the county agent.

"This clinic will be conducted by COBA breeding company and Extension Specialist Whitney Rounds," he added. "The price for this training is as follows: Artificial Insemination, \$125 and Pregnancy Determination, \$100.

"The registration fees are necessary to defray the high expenses of technical training. The procurement of cows creates a large investment, and the companies must absorb large deficits, particularly due to shrinkage and death loss of cows," emphasized the

local county agent.

"Coordinators will have additional information concerning various discounts on semen and for equipment purchased during the A I clinic.

"It is imperative that producers contact the clinic coordinator one week in advance since clinics not having the minimum number of participants may be cancelled," concluded the county agent.

Once considered, but ruled out for a location are the Mojave Desert in California, the Sonoran Desert in Arizona and the Highlands of Arizona and New Mexico. All were eliminated because they are within 200 miles of the coast, an international border, or another major strategic target.

The Northern High Plains of Colorado, Kansas and Nebraska were eliminated because of the lack of suitable operational corridors in the area for airborne command aircraft explained Mrs. Chayes.

Mrs. Chayes also questioned whether the government would be willing to spend the \$1 billion or so it would take to buy private land for the base in the Texas-New Mexico area, rather than using the government land of Nevada and Utah.

So, the issue is still in limbo, as officials in Nevada muster forces to protest the possible location of the MX missile system in their state.

Quirino said the census is most important "because the censuses and surveys conducted by the Bureau of Census are the broadest and most fundamental source of facts about the Nation. They form the foundation for nearly all other types of information on the status of the population and its activities.

"Census data are indispensable in identifying and responding to the Nation's human needs, in the performance of government at the Federal, State and local levels, and in private enterprise," he continued. "Without the census, proper planning and management would not be possible in such areas as economics, military manpower potential, school requirements, employment, national and international finance, Social Security, business cycles, highway use, and the needs for health services, parks, water and energy.

"By law, your answers to census questions are confidential," he said.

"This assurance of confidentiality has been the law for many years. The Census Bureau is proud of the fact that not once has a census employee ever formally charged with releasing anyone's census answers. Also, No other government agency has access to your answers, whatever the purpose."

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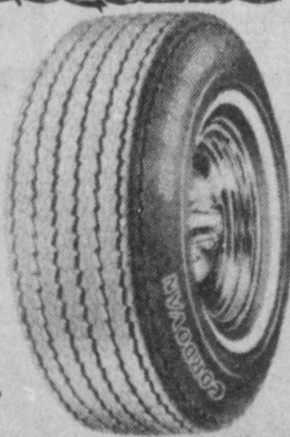

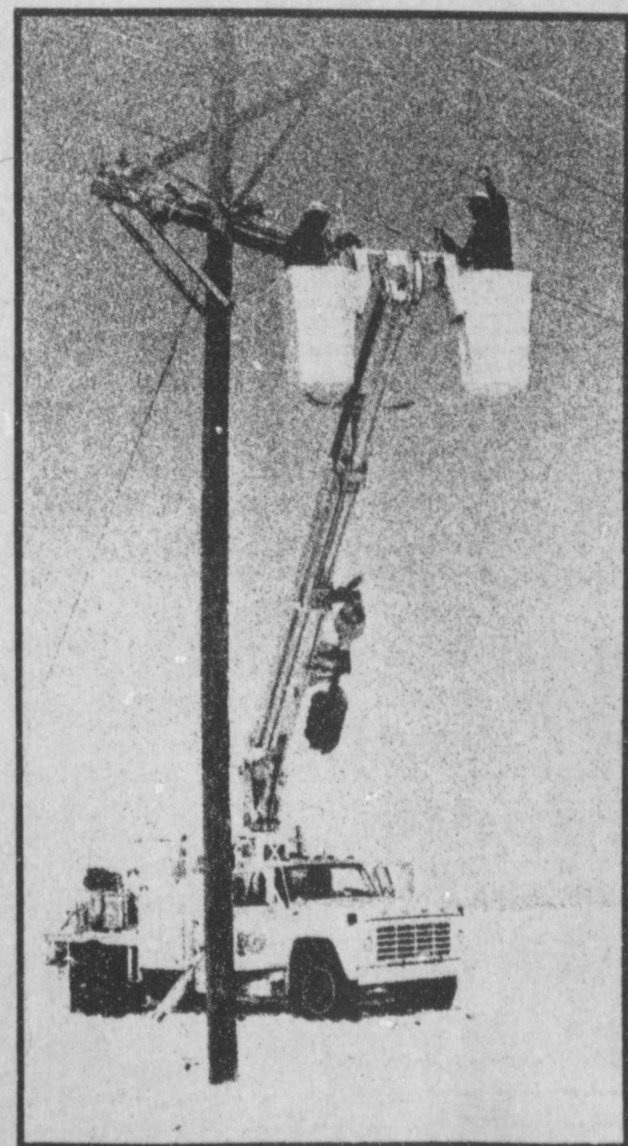

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Texas House Speaker Bill Clayton spent a day-and-a-half last week answering questions to a federal grand jury in Houston about allegations he accepted a \$5,000 bribe last November.

Clayton told reporters afterwards he answered all questions, did not take the Fifth Amendment and discussed several subjects during the questioning. He is alleged to have taken the bribe in exchange for his help in obtaining a multi-million dollar state insurance contract for an undercover FBI informant.

Clayton maintains he took the money to avoid embarrassing the donor, but he planned to give it back and never spent the money. His lawyers handed over the stack of \$100 bills to federal prosecutors last week and received a receipt listing the serial numbers of the bills.

Authorities say it may take several weeks for the grand jury to return an indictment or a "no bill" decision on the Speaker.

In the meantime, business in the House has slowed down until Clayton resolves his troubles. Many of the Speaker's friends are predicting that if he is indicted, he will abandon plans to seek an unprecedented fourth term as speaker.

Recruiting Clayton Foe
The only announced candidate to unseat Clayton, Rep. John Bryant of Dallas, admitted last week he tried unsuccessfully to recruit an opponent to run against Clayton for re-election to the House.

Bryant said he made an 11th-hour trip to Hereford before the filing deadline to offer support to Sheriff Travis McPherson and four other men if they would run against Clayton.

Bryant told reporters Clayton worked for four months to find him an opponent, and he was merely returning quid for quo.

He also flatly denied having any advance knowledge of the Brilab probe which touched Clayton's office, contrary to Rep. Buck Florence's allegation two weeks ago.

Scuttling the Primary
Texas Democrats were to meet last week to discuss cancelling the non-binding presidential primary they voted for last week.

Neither Carter nor Kennedy Democrats seem to want the primary, saying it would be pointless and a waste of campaign funds, said Ms. Billie Carr, leader of the party liberals.

She also theorized that if Kennedy dropped out of the race before May 3, (Texas primary date) liberals could vote uncommitted and beat the president.

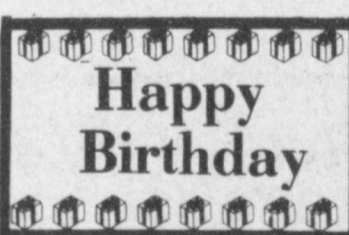

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) - Giant strides have been made at The University of Texas at Austin in the number of National Merit Scholars it has attracted.

For 1979-80, UT enrolled 190 such scholars - an increase of 57 per cent over the previous year. The increase moved UT Austin from 26th to 15th place nationally.

UT ranks third in Texas (behind Rice and Texas A&M) in the number of Merit Scholars. UT has been an institutional sponsor (that is, providing financial support) for National Merit Scholars only since 1978.

In addition, UT ranks first in Texas in the National Achievement Scholarship Program for Outstanding Negro Students.

If as many as 14 take a course it will be taught. Otherwise the course will be discarded for the year and those students who registered for the course will have to take something else. This is the reason students are to list an alternate course when they register.

We will be returning to the semester system next year. This means that instead of three 12 week quarters, we will have two 18 week semesters. Credits required for graduation will be reduced from 60 to 20. Credit granted for each course will be reduced from 3 to 1.

Every student must at all times be enrolled in at least 4 solid subjects. These include everthing except Band, P.E., Athletics, Driver Ed., and Office Aide.

Work programs count as 2 solids; auto mechanics counts as 3.

No student may register as an office aide unless he has prior written approval from the teacher whose aide he is to be. No student may have more than one office and no teacher more than one aide.

Students wishing to be in a work program must have prior approval from the program supervisor. On approval, the student will be given a card signed by the teacher. This card must be attached to the students pre-registration sheet.

The Consumer Alert

BAD CREDIT

Learn the credit game, bad, slow or weak credit. Establish AAA-1 Credit Pass credit investigation, get credit cards and loans. Garrett Financial System, 2100 Alexander Ave., Austin, Texas 78722. 512-472-2865

Have you ever seen an advertisement like this which implies there is a quick and easy solution to consumer credit problems? This advertisement appeared in newspapers in Dallas, San Antonio and Houston this year until it was stopped by the Consumer Protection and Antitrust Division.

When consumers answered the advertisement the seller sent them a letter introducing a booklet called "THE CREDIT GAME" which he was selling. The introductory letter claimed that "the information contained in this publication offers various ways of establishing a AAA-1 Credit Rating in as little as 45 days, & Get any Credit Card you want, and it works no matter what shape your credit is in now."

On reviewing "THE CREDIT GAME" the Division discovered that the material described how to change bad credit to "AAA-1 credit" through a step-by-step process of engaging in unlawful conduct. For example, page 2 of "THE CREDIT GAME" detailed a plan "for creating a \$50,000 bank account balance and produce the illusion that you have money in the bank." The complex plan described what is commonly known as a "check kiting scheme" and is accomplished by floating worthless checks between several checking accounts. Check-kiting is unlawful both under federal and state law.

Under a section entitled "HOW TO PASS CREDIT INVESTIGATIONS" the booklet makes the following

representations: "First you will have to change your name, such as dropping or adding an initial to or from your name, alter your social security number, use a different address or former addresses, telephone numbers, and your birth date. Anything that was listed when your credit went sour must not be used on any of your new credit applications. . . . What the booklet fails to state is that anyone who follows this advice on a credit application is also in jeopardy of violating both criminal and civil laws.

Consumers with credit problems cannot expect to remedy their situation overnight. There are, however, several places consumers can go to get legitimate counseling on how to improve their credit rating. For example, in several

Texas communities the business community and other concerned citizens have formed, non-profit consumer credit counseling services which are offered free of charge.

Consumers with credit problems can also contact local credit bureaus with questions on how to improve credit standing. Finally, consumers with credit questions can consult the Office of the Consumer Credit Commissioner, P.O. Box 2107, Austin, Texas 78768, 512-475-2111, which is charged with promoting credit education in Texas.

The Consumer Protection and Antitrust Division is trying to locate every consumer who answered the advertisement which appears above to inform them, that following the advice in "THE CREDIT GAME" could result in unlawful activity and to refund their money. If you are such a consumer contact Assistant Attorney General Debra Ravel at 512-475-3288. Further, if you ever read an advertisement which makes fantastic claims on how to improve your credit be sure to contact the Consumer Protection and Antitrust Division Office nearest you.
