## Constable Election Invalid

After canvassing the Constable votes in precincts 2 and 4, it was brought to the Garza County Commissioners Court that the two declared constables, Deb Palmer and Bruce Ledbetter should not be recognized as constables due to Article 6.06A of the Election Code.

The code, titled Write-in votes when office title is not on ballot: reads that

Whenever at any general election there is no candidate whose name is to be printed in the ballot for an office subject to being filled

at that election and the officer making up the official ballot fails to list the title of the office thereon, no person shall be declared elected to the office by virtue of write-in votes cast by writing in the title of the office and the name of the candidate unless the total number of votes cast for all write-in candidates for that office exceeds fifty percent of the total number of voters participating in the election who are eligible to vote for the office.

Palmer was running for the constable position in Precinct 4 while Ledbetter

was a write-in candidate in Precinct 2.

Palmer received 45 write-in votes while Ledbetter had 11.

In other action, Kevin Marks with Western Marketing Inc., spoke to the commissioners about the benefits of using the new, soon to be opened, West-Go Gas Station located at West 10th and Broadway.

Tabled bids for the anti-slip safety walk until further work could be done on the front steps of the courthouse;

Appointed Dr. Stephen

Chun as county health officer, subject to his approval;

Canceled the Lein Chemical Service agreement performed in the courthouse;

Discussed the possibility of presenting service awards on a yearly basis;

Accepted the bids on a new Mineolta copy machine for a two year period;

Approved the cemetery plot for Kay Beach to be located on her ranch;

And before adjourning, approved the paying of Charla Tatum following her six week leave of absence for maternity leave.

## Post Recognized by Texas Art Group

The Texas Municipal League Committee on the Arts announced the recipients of certificates of special recognition for cities with exemplary arts programs.

At the annual T.M.L. meeting in Dallas, cities receiving the 1984 award were Fort Worth, Corpus Christi, Richardson, Lubbock, Wichita Falls, Mesquite, Huntsville, Bellaire, Seminole, Denton and Post.

Established in 1981, the arts recognition program is designed to showcase cities which have made significant contributions to support the arts.

Creative use of the city's resources on behalf of the arts, use of city facilities for arts activities, city-supported arts programs such as art festivals and arts for the handicapped, municipal policy support for the arts through resolutions and ordinances and city funding for the arts are considered by the committee in their

selection of cities which receive the award of special recognition.

The Post exhibit at the T.M.L. annual conference was prepared for the Chamber of Commerce by Ed and Marie Neff. The poster carried photographs of the Algerita Hotel, the remodeled City Hall, the Community Center and the Garza County Museum as structures making contributions to arts development and appreciation.

Contributions from the

city and the county to the Caprock Cultural Association for the development of a long range arts plan and promotion of the arts played a major role in achieving the recognition for Post. The city-county contribution has been matched by a \$5,000 grant from the Texas Commission for the Arts.

A representative from the Texas Commission will be in Post on December 6 to review the program and grant and to discuss the

Challenge Program of TCA. Under this program Texas will receive up to \$125,000 annually for the next three

years to help develop networks of local arts agencies for education and arts promotion work.

office at 495-3461.



# Facts for Teenagers About Drinking

Play It Smart, Facts for Teenagers About Drinking.

"Oh no, not another article about drinking? Why should I read this stuff?" you ask yourself.

Well guys and gals, the more you ignore the facts about drinking, the greater the risk for future trouble in a society where alcohol is used and abused daily.

Only you can be responsible for your actions, regardless of circumstances. Therefore, it is up to you to learn the facts about alcohol, then decide the manner in which you choose to use or not use alcohol in your life.

Fact: Drinking is illegal in Texas under 19 years of age. Play it smart, if you are under 19, you can't run the risk of getting caught if you just don't drink.

Fact: Alcohol may seem like an "upper", but is actually a "downer." It can alter your moods, cause changes in the body, and it can be habit forming. Since alcohol goes to work first on the part of the brain that controls inhibitions, you may become more talkative or rowdy after a couple of

drinks. Hence the upper feeling. If you continue drinking past this point, gradually all of your body's functions are slowed down. In other words you get drunk.

Fact: There is the same amount of alcohol in a 12 ounce can of beer, a five ounce glass of wine or a mixed drink containing 1½ ounces of liquor.

Fact: There is no quick way to sober up. If you weigh 150 pounds it takes two hours for each drink to leave your system. Nothing can speed up the process.

Fact: Drinking and driving accidents are the number one cause of death among teenagers. Even a very small amount of alcohol seriously interferes with judgement, muscle coordination, vision and reaction time.

Fact: A person is considered to be legally drunk in Texas with a blood alcohol level of 10 percent. Example, a person weighing 140 pounds would register a .11 percent blood alcohol level after four drinks.

Fact: If you choose to drink, do so in a responsible manner. Don't drink faster than your body can

burn up the alcohol, sip your drinks, eat high protein foods before and during drinking, know your limit, don't drink to escape your problems and don't drink if you are driving.

Play it smart and know that you, not alcohol, controls your actions, happiness and future.

The City of Post is planning to file an application with the Texas Department of Community Affairs (TDCA) for a Planning Grant. The application will be submitted to TDCA on or before December 15, 1984.

TCDP funds may also be used to support economic development activities and public services including manpower training crime prevention, health care, drug abuse and child care programs.

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

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
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# 41 Honored at 4-H Banquet in Lubbock

Members of the Womans Culture Club enjoyed its traditional Thanksgiving dinner Wednesday, Nov. 14 at the Club House.



### Avoid Holiday Cooking Rush

Christmas cooking should be fun, but last-minute preparation can be hectic. If you can spare a little freezer space, cook and bake now and freeze holiday foods.

"Every hour family members spend cooking now will be an extra hour of free time to be with friends and relatives during the holidays."

Most prepared foods will keep for a month in the freezer, so cook as your present time schedule allows. If you have enough time today to make cookies, make them and pop them into the freezer. If your time is more limited, whip up a dip or a sandwich spread.

During the next few weeks, prepare double recipes of main dishes. Eat one now and freeze the other to be reheated during the holidays.

Frozen sandwiches are a good choice for lunches and

simple suppers. They will keep well for two weeks. But don't use lettuce, tomatoes or cucumbers for frozen sandwiches. They will lose their texture and make the sandwich soggy. Salad dressing is a better choice than mayonnaise, pickles better than celery, and use egg yolk instead of egg white for best results freezing sandwiches.

Many candies and cookies will keep at room temperature for several weeks, she points out. Store crisp candies or cookies separately in tightly covered containers and they will keep for two or three weeks.

Try making a meatball mixture using three to five pounds of lean ground beef. Make the meatballs in a cocktail or main dish size. Bake at 375 degrees F in a shallow pan for 20 minutes.

Shake the pan several times to turn the meatballs. Remove them from the oven and cool. Package the meatballs in serving size containers and freeze them.

When you are ready to serve them, simply thaw and heat in any sauce and they will be ready for holiday entertaining.





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

# Wildcats Edge 'Lopes 14 - 6 in Area

The Post Bold Gold Antelopes capped off the third straight Bi-District Championship football season last Friday night, losing the Area Championship to Littlefield 14-6 at Brownfield.

Striking first early in the game, the Antelopes demonstrated the toughest defense this year against the number two ranked AAA team in the state.

"We are really proud of our players," coach David Thompson comments, "they played as hard and as tough as I've ever seen."

"We had a chance to win that one," the coach adds, "and anyone who was at the game could see that our players were giving it everything they had and more . . . they really showed character."

The coach specifically referred to the fourth quarter defensive stand, when the Wildcats got to the two yard line but were pushed back to the five and turned the ball over on downs.

Trailing 14-6, with less than a minute in the game, the Antelope defense played as if the clock didn't matter.

"This rivalry with Littlefield is one of the best there is," Thompson adds, "and the respect each team has for each other really showed up after the game as the players congratulated each other."

Littlefield advances to the Regional Championship Friday at Lamesa to play Colorado City.

Antelopes Score

Littlefield took the opening kickoff and after getting two first downs and reaching the Post 30 yard line, the 'Lope defense held and took over on downs.

With 8:07 left in the first quarter, the Bi-District Champs began a 10 play, 70 yard march to the end zone.

Tracy Price took a hand-off over left guard to the 34, then a pitchout around right tackle to the 35, which was nullified by an offside penalty back to the 30.

On third down, quarterback Joel Kirkpatrick rolled to his left and tossed a completed pass to Rodney George at the 46 for a first down.

Then Kirkpatrick rolled to his right and found Price for another completed pass to the Littlefield 47.

Price took the second down handoff over left tackle to the 42 for a first down.

He picked up one yard to the 41 and on second down Kirkpatrick rolled to his left and threw the football to Curt Greer who made it to the 17.

On first down Price blasted over left guard on a sprint draw to the four yard line, then on first down and goal he went over left guard to the one and slammed over right guard to the end zone for the touchdown.

Chuck Morris' kick was blocked and the 'Lopes led 6-0.

The Wildcats ran off 11 plays, picking up three first downs, before punting on fourth down. Key plays in the series included a quarterback sack under heavy pressure from Todd Angerer.

Both defenses took charge of the contest, and late in

the first quarter the 'Lopes were stung with a 44 yard touchdown pass play, and with 54 seconds left in the half, the Wildcats led 7-6.

In the second half the 'Lopes mounted a 10 play drive, getting to the Littlefield 30 yard line before running out of steam.

The defense held, the Antelopes got the ball back at their own 25 following a punt and moved to the 40 before punting to the Wildcat 29.

A one-play Steve Green blast over right guard sealed the game for Littlefield. The Wildcat running back hit right guard, slipped out of a tackle, cut to his left and went untouched to the end zone.

The point after kick ended the scoring.

The fourth quarter was a defensive battle, with the 'Lopes giving up one last opportunity on an intercepted pass with 5:18 left in the game.







Above the Jezreel valley of Northeast Israel, Mount Gilboa towers some 1630 feet above sea level. Today just opposite the narrow fertile valley, some eight miles northwest, is the Hill of Moreh. The fields dividing these prominent landmarks are very productive. Treed terraces line the lower slopes of Gilboa, yielding to the luxuriant acreage of grain. Flood irrigation supplies the lower levels with water for the abundant crops.

It was in this very setting Gideon was to battle a vast Midianite army. This conquest of some 3,000 years ago began below the slopes of Gilboa. Gideon reduced his fighting men of 32,000 to a force of only 10,000. As the Lord had instructed, those fearful of the battle were allowed to return home. A further lessening of the Israelite troops came as they rippled the stillness of the spring Harod to get water to drink. Only 300

men brought the water to their mouth in a cautious manner while standing upright. They were to enter battle with Gideon. The other 9,700 who knelt to drink were left behind.

A paltry 300 men, insignificant in view of the vast and experienced foe, armed for battle. Strange armament equipped God's fighting-force. Each carried only a torch concealed within an empty pitcher and a ram's horn trumpet. On cue from Gideon, the great host of the enemy became confused, panicked and fled in disarray.

Using real people and places, God was to stress His message. Mere numbers themselves are no guarantee of success. Only the Lord's presence ensures victory. He is pleased and able to work through a handful of dedicated followers.

That night in the valley below the hill of Moreh the victory was to be manifestly the Lord's. True triumph today is that which still brings glory to the Lord and not man.



## Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright



- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.
