# Is Club Speaker

Ray Hedges, manager of the Brownwood Chamber of Commerce, spoke to the Callahan County Club at luncheon in the of the Methodist Church Wednesday on the subject of "What Does Industry Expect of a Community." The industrial development committee invited Mr. Hedres to speak as a phase of the c.ub's study of attracting industry to Baird. Randall C. Jackson, chairman of the speakers on the subject of bringing industry to this area.

Mr. Hedges spoke from experience gained during the past three years with the Brownwood Chamber of Commerce, and pointed out many hidden advantages and disadvantages. In answering the question "What must a town have to attract in-dustry?" Mr. Hedges stated that "Plenty of water, power and gas is not enough. First the town must set its house in order, then go out and invite industries to locate in the town." He pointed out the advantages of having raw materials near at hand, convenient markets, availability of labor, transportation facilities, low tax rate, and many other things of this kind. Available plant sites are a real advantage in getting industry, he pointed out. The attitude of the townspeople can either make or break any plan you might devise to attract industry because indus-trial employes must have recreation, churches and schools. Banking facilities are very important and can assist greatly in the development of any in-dustry that might come.

On the other hand, Mr. Hedges said, it would be wise to investigate the industry before you invited them to come to your town. Never subsidize them. The better class of industrialists prefer a pay their own way, but will not be mistreated. The local government must assist in giving municipal services. Above all, be honest with them and tell them all about your town before they move in, he explained.

#### YOUTHS MUST REPORT WEDDINGS TO BOARD

Men who marry after being classified 1-A must notify their selective service board imme-diately if they expect considera-tion for deferment, Georgia Singletary, clerk of the Taylor-Callahan County board announced Wednesday.

State Director of Selective Service Paul L. Wakefield informed the local board yesterday that Texas' quota of 2,513 men for September is being jeopardized by failure of men classified 1-A to report marriages or other status changes. "If we fail to furnish the num-

ber of men desired from this state, this failure on the part of many men will be the chief factor in that failure," Brigadier General Wakefield stated.

"Such men who fail to report a change of status such as marriage of a change of address legally are eligible to be declared delinquent for falling to comply with the law. A delinquent can be inducted immediately ahead of all others under this law and of all others under this law and in the standard limits chlorof all others under this law, and if we are forced to do so in order to meet our calls, we will comply with the law to the let-ter," General Wakefield continued.

It is within the discretion of the board as to whether a man will receive deferment when he has failed to notify his board of a status change. Wakefield pointed out that it is not man-datory under the law that married men be reclassified into IIII-A under such cimcumstan-

Miss Singletary said the Taylor-Callahan County board will not be inclined to defer a man if he fails to notify the board of circumstance changes.

Wakefield said local draft boards all over the state are reporting that wher they issue orders to report for physical examination, many registrants come in with evidence of marriages that took place "many months before." Wakefield pointed out that if these men had notified boards immediately after the marriage took place they would never have received an order to report for examination in the first place.

Farmers and ranchers in the wind erosion areas of Oklahoma their fight against soil blowing next fall and winter.

Field men of the Soil Conservation Service in 51 soil conservation districts in Texas and 28 of the districts in Oklahoma have reported to Regional Director Louis P. Merrill of SCS that plantings of grain sorghums and sudans in wind erosion areas will be 3,239,000 acres more than the acreage in these crops

The total plantings to grain sorghums and sudans in the wind erosion portions of the states are 7,611,000 acres, the Soil Conservation men estimate. In Texas the plantings have totaled 5,703,000 acres, in Oklahoma, 1,907,000 acres. The 1949 plantings in these in the wind erosion areas of the two states were: Texas 3,045,000 acres, Oklahoma 1,325,000 acres.

The American Poultry Association, oldest livestock organization in the country, has called the anti-trust suit against the Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company "not only a threat to A & P in particular but a threat to the poultry industry and free

enterprise generally At its 77th annual convention in Simcoe, Ontario, Canada, the Association cited the "vital aid" given the poultry industry by A & P for many years, by "promoting valuable research in the nutritional field, encouraging poultry education . . and by education . . . and by direct financial aid through the establishment of excellent marketing techniques

and sales promotional activities." The A. P. A., with members throughout the United States, voiced the protest in a resolution, calling the A & P suit contrary to its interests in "the welfare and improvement of all phases of the poultry industry." Joining hundreds of other ag-

riculture, consumer and labor organizations, in opposition to the suit, the Association has notified the Department of Justice of its position on "this important matter.'


