agenda crowded Monday night kept the Post City Council busy until midnight, with the decision to make application to the state for certification in the TEXCEL program highlighting the meeting.

The council accepted Lewis Earl's offer to prepare the application, and passed a resolution supporting the concept.

"It has to be a community-wide effort," Earl added, "and everyone has to be working together to accomplish the goals."

The council also voted to approve the contract with Garza County to provide services for alcohol and chemical abuse treatment through the City County Alcohol Chemical Abuse Program.

Council member Weaver McKamie, continuing her objection to funding of the program with city taxes, cast the dissenting vote.

called was born July 25, 1907 in Langtry, Texas in a little house just steps away from "Hanging" Judge Roy Bean's saloon.

He started his life with a colorful legend around him and he lived it the rest of his days.

He was born to be a cowboy!

At the age of 2 years the team ran away with the wagon, throwing Mr B out - under - and then over him - breaking both ankles.

I used to tell him he was an accident looking for a place to happen. He had had just about every bone

in his body broken at some time or other -- including his neck.

He was riding night herd when his horse ran off a cliff and end over end -broke Mr B's neck.

He served as doctor, lawyer and translator for many of his South of the Border friends.

He could well have been called one of Texas's "Rough Riders" for I am told that if the law needed help retreiving someone from Mexico, they sent Mr

He always came back didn't build a fence or known them both. with his man.

Mr Babb only had a seventh grade education but was so adept that during his young years he acquired five languages and spoke them fluently.

He spoke English,

He spoke English, Spanish, Bosque, French and German. I asked him where he learned all these. It was simple.

When his family moved into a settlement that only spoke these languages he learned them -- and never forgot them.

He married and had four children; three daughters: Jeanne Marie Kesler of Elephant Butte, New Mexico, Betty Jo Lewis of Albuqurque, New Mexico, Elizabeth Ann (Carol, as he lovingly called her) of Carona, New Mexico and one son: Charles Lewis Babb of Houston.

He had 12 grandchildren and four great grandchildren; one sister: Mildred Adams Marathon and one brother: Benny Babb of Fort Davis.

Mr Babb was not only a cowboy, he was a "Jack of all Trades" (and a master of many).

He built his family a home in Carlsbad, New Mexico entirely by himself.

He rode border for the State of Arizona as well as having a hand in setting up many of their State laws.

While riding border his mount fell on him leaving him severely injuried. He carried a steel bone

in his leg from the hip to the knee the rest of his life. He was declared disabled by the state of Arizona and honorably released from

the border patrol.
Mr Babb's love of the outdoors did not stop.

He returned to his home state of Texas and some how found his spot in and around Justiceburg some 32 years ago.

I dare say there isn't a ranch in Garza and neighboring counties that he 'Cowboy" for.

In the winters he was a trapper too. As long as his health let him, every winter was trapping time and he was good at it.

He not only knew about the animals he trapped but all the others in this area.

Mr Babb and I go back quite away, considering I am a relatively "newcomer" here.

My husband guaged in the Justiceburg area and would drop me off at the little store and I would visit until he returned.

I eventually bought the store in 1979. Mr B didn't have a home

so we made him one in the back of the store. We loved him dearly.

Mr B knew everyone in the area, so it wasn't hard for us to get him to go to church with us. He went to church with

his mother as a boy but as many of us, strayed away - with moving from place to place. I'll never forget him

asking me to walk with him to the front of the church the day he was saved at the age of 73.

In March of 1981 I was having to go into Ft Worth for blood exchanges.

When we returned, there wasn't a light in the store -- I knew something was

There was a note on the door to call Charlene Ainsworth.

Mr Babb had become very ill that day and was in the hospital in Lubbock.

By the time we arrived there he was out of surgery and in intensive care.

The doctors didn't give us any hope but when I went in to see him, he smiled at Mac and I through all his tubes and said, "I knew you would be here."

Mr B had a will to live and he did.

Two more surgeries took its toll and Mr B had to give up his outdoor life and became a resident of Golden Plains Care Center. He didn't complain.

As soom as he could manage he was doing things for other residents and keeping the flower beds in the summers.

All he ever wanted was to be loved and needed.

Helping the others, even though he wasn't able. gave him happiness he could not otherwise have.

Mr B was also a great reader and loved Western novels -- Zane Gray and Louis L'Amour being his favorites since he had
