Post School Board

Field House Off Ground

A progress report on the new fieldhouse highlighted the regular monthly meeting of the Post Independent School District board of trustees Tuesday, January 14.

Architect Bill Stracener told the board that construction is on target.

He explained to the board various options for correcting the shower and toilet area floor level, with the board voting to approve an additional \$3,500 for cutting the floor level four inches lower to avoid flooding problems later.

Stracener, whose firm is responsible for reviewing the contractor's drawings, also pointed out that the lockers originally drawn were to be replaced with stronger material.

The architect-engineer suggested venting fans in the walls for certain areas of the fieldhouse, and automatic damper type venting.

The board extended superintendent Bill Shiver's contract through the 1988-89 school year.

"Bill, as far as I'm concerned," board president Jack Kirkpatrick commented, "you can stay here as long as you want."

Royce Hart called for an executive session prior to the vote, no decisions were made during the executive

session.

Shiver informed the board about the new state required discipline management plan, which the board approved. The plan must be approved by the state before implementation.

Shiver also showed the board a new teaching plan which will be required of all teachers state wide.

"First, they tell us what to teach, then how to teach it and finally evaluate the results," Shiver added.

The mandated teaching methods are complicated and specific.

A summary report on the football playoff expenses and revenue showed a net revenue after expenses of \$1,073.06.

The lowest total was from the Fabens Bi-District contest at Pecos, "I don't think we want to go to Pecos again," Shiver commented.

"For one thing, they did not have people at the gates taking tickets," he added.

The board agreed at the suggestion of Tom Middleton to place the discussion of a new vocational training building on the agenda for next month's meeting.

Jimmy Bartlett asked Shiver about an assistant band director, "It's already approved and authorized

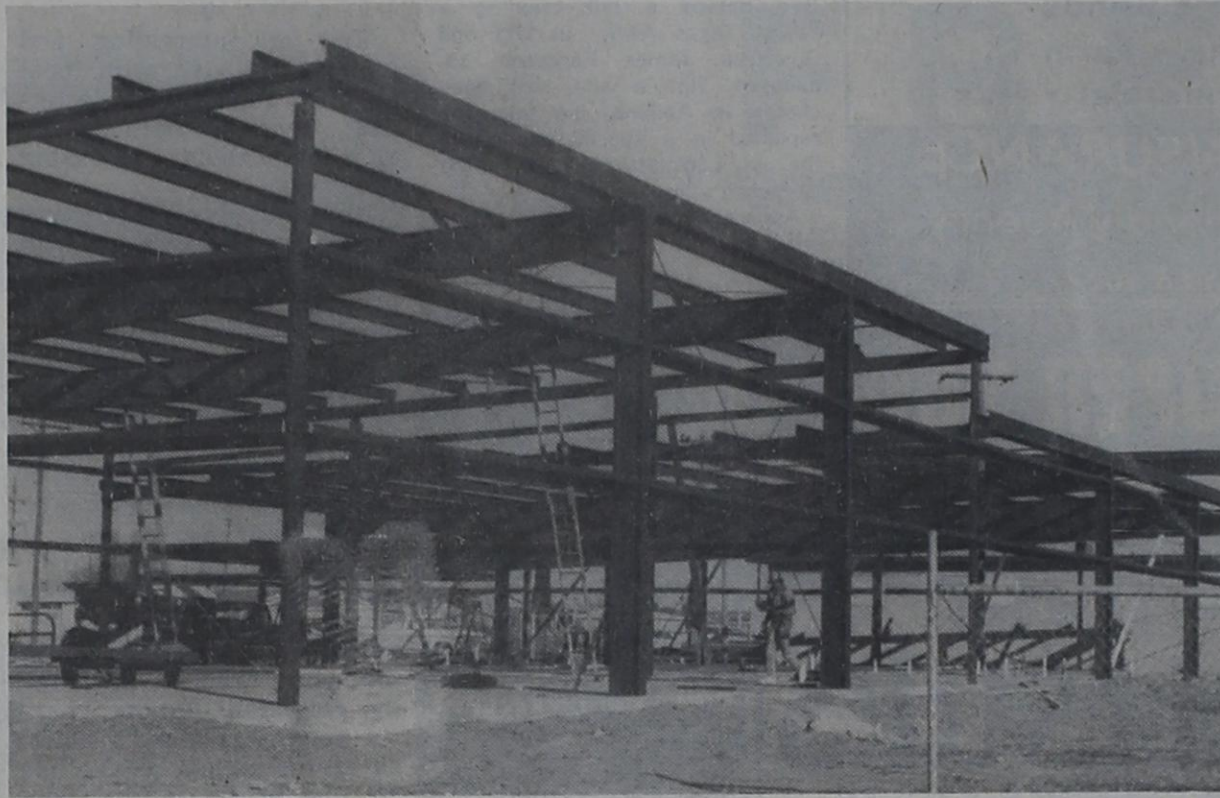
for next year," Shiver responded.

He told the board that band director Will Burks would be searching for an assistant.

Shiver also asked for help in identifying the

thieves of more than \$9,000 worth of band instruments from the band hall.

Attending the meeting were Kirkpatrick, Hart, Bartlett, Middleton, Don Payne and Jerry Osborn.

No Injuries In

Train-Car Wreck

Pete Aguilar and two passengers of his car escaped injury last Saturday evening when the Aguilar car was broadsided by a north-bound Santa Fe freight train smashed into the vehicle as it straddled the railroad tracks at a crossing at East 12th Street.

Aguilar said that his vehicle's muffler got caught in on the tracks, and he and his young son with another passenger tried to push the car off the tracks.

They saw the train coming and jumped away in time to see the train hit the car and carry it approximately 52 feet.

The 1978 Chevy Monza was declared a total loss.

No citations were issued in the incident.

Neighbors in the area told the Santa Fe conductor that on several occasions they have seen autos hung up at the same crossing.

The conductor said that he would notify Santa Fe so that a crew could be sent to repair the crossing.

In the meantime, motorists are cautioned about using the East 12th Street crossing.

Livestock Show Set Feb. 6-8

The 1986 annual Garza County Junior Livestock Show and Sale will be held February 6, 7 and 8 at the show barn.

Entry cards must be into the Vocational Ag instructors or the county extension agents office by Jan 29 with a large number of entries expected.

Show activities begin after school at 4 p.m. Wednesday with weigh-in and check-in of animals until 9 p.m.

The poultry and rabbit show will begin at 4:30 p.m. Thursday with Tommy Young as show superintendent of both events.

The Thursday evening swine show has been moved up one hour to 6:30 p.m. with Stanley Young, extension agent from Lynn County, judging. The show superintendent is Tony Conner.

Jana Terry is superintendent of the horse show which will begin at 4:30 p.m. Friday afternoon.

Judging the horse show will be Manuel Davis of Clairemont.

The number of entries will determine the division of classes.

Friday evening at 6:30 p.m., the lamb show will begin with Scott Doss, agriculture instructor at Friendship High School, doing the judging. Lamb show superintendent will be Ken Young.

The heifer show is scheduled for 9 a.m. Saturday morning followed by the steer show. Judge for these classes will be Corky Wise of Wichita Falls. Ronnie Hardin will serve as superintendent.

Other changes for 1986 include no top weight limit on the lambs, and raising the top limit on the hogs to 260 pounds.

Also, due to the school no pass, no show rule, the association rule stating that

an exhibitor must show his or her animal unless they have two in the same class, was changed to allow another FFA member to exhibit in the no pass, no show cases.

Also, some of the owners will be playing basketball on Friday night and will have to have someone else exhibit their animals.

The substitute exhibitor must be enrolled in a Garza County Public School and be a member of 4-H or FFA.

The awards show will precede the sale on Saturday afternoon beginning at 1 p.m.

Showmanship buckles will again be presented in the swine, lamb, horse and beef divisions to the top showman in each.

No buckle will be awarded in the poultry and rabbit divisions.

The overall sportsmanship buckle will be presented to the winner of this prestigious award.

A ham lunch will be served at noon prior to the sale by the Extension Homemakers of Garza County for \$4 per plate for adults and \$2.50 per plate for 12 and under.

The EH will operate a concession stand throughout the show and will be assisted by older 4-Hers.

The annual sale of the top 82 animals will be auctioned by Monty Paxton of Lovington, N.M.

Jerry Thuett, a director of the association will be the announcer for each event.

Hospital Board Calls For Joint Meeting

The Garza Memorial Hospital board of directors voted to schedule a meeting with the staff doctors to discuss responding to emergency calls.

A previous meeting had been set, but was cancelled due to a conflict in scheduling for one of the doctors.

Also expected to be discussed at the meeting is a continuing problem of patient care completions.

Hospital administrator Maritta Reed reminded the board that some charts are three months late, and the incompleting charts restrict the hospital's cash flow.

"We can't file for insurance or Medicaid until the charts are finished," Mrs Reed added, "and this problem needs to be rectified."

The board approved an

indigent application by a Garza County resident for surgery.

Merit pay raises were also approved for four employees.

A change in the retirement plan was approved, which allows vested employees who leave or retire before the annual policy renewal date to collect that portion of the fund invested up to the date of termination.

Currently employees in the program who leave before the renewal date are not eligible for the funds during their final year.

The board also approved the transfer of delinquent accounts to the attorney for collection.

Had an interesting and informative visit with local attorney Pat Walker yesterday, who explained the question about releasing prisoners.

He pointed out that my article last week concerning the early release of a prisoner by the sheriff was partly in error.

The judge sentenced the prisoner to "not less than 30 days and not more than one year," and with strict interpretation of the law, that means a prisoner may be released after 30 days at the discretion of the sheriff.

District Attorney Ricky Smith sees it otherwise, saying that the intent of the court was to sentence the defendant for one year.

I can see Walker's point, as he explained, Texas has an indeterminate jail sentence, in order to provide leeway for prison officials and county sheriffs to relieve overcrowding...

The problem I have with

the way this prisoner release was handled continues to be the fact that the prisoner was working part time for the sheriff.

This prisoner was considered a jail trustee, allowed to be out of jail during the day...and I question the good sense of a sheriff who puts a trustee to work on his private project.

I do not believe that is proper behavior for a sheriff or any other elected official.

On this subject, it is amazing how many rumors are floating around town... some really are simple-minded.

If it weren't so serious it'd be funny.

Rebate Check Up 33%

The city sales and use tax allocation from the state comptroller for the period ending January 3, 1986 shows a whopping 33.17 percent increase for Post over the same period last year.

The city received a check for \$10,875.31 from the comptroller, up from the

1985 payment of \$8,166.46.

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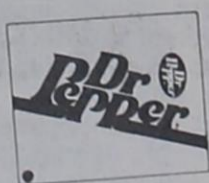

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The Extension Way

All pecan growers can now purchase an outstanding book on pecan varieties.

Dr. Tommy Thompson and Dr. Fountain Young of the U.S.D.A. Pecan Breeding Program at Brownwood, Texas prepared this 265 page book over the last three years as a reference guide for pecan growers, teachers and researchers.

If you have ever tried to identify an old variety, than this book is for you.

It has photographs of 284 varieties including both sides of the nut and kernel. ALL of the new and most of the old timers are included.

In total the book documents 1,012 named pecan varieties.

For these varieties the authors list the year the pecan was named, the pollination type, the parents, the breeder or selector, the pecan size, the percent kernel, maturity date, shell thickness, shelling characteristics, pecan scab resistance, and other important information such

as freeze susceptibility.

This information is presented in a very concise and easy to understand manner.

Additional information is presented on the origin of varieties by county, state and country, the times varieties are used as parents, patented varieties, native distribution, variety synonyms.

The authors have presented the specific refer-

ence sources for each variety from 567 publications.

This is by far the greatest effort published on pecan varieties and will remain so for a long period of time.

The book is dedicated to Mr. L.D. Romberg the father of the USDA pecan breeding programs which has given the pecan industry the outstanding "Indian Varieties."

Fortunately for all of us the book was sponsored by Jim Anthony of Forth Worth, Texas and Walter Williams of Houston, Texas.

The Texas Pecan Growers Association published the book and it is now available through their office for \$12.00 at Texas Pecan Growers Association, Drawer CC, College Station, Texas 77840.

The key to recognizing a teen under extreme stress is to observe any changes in his or her feelings and behavior.

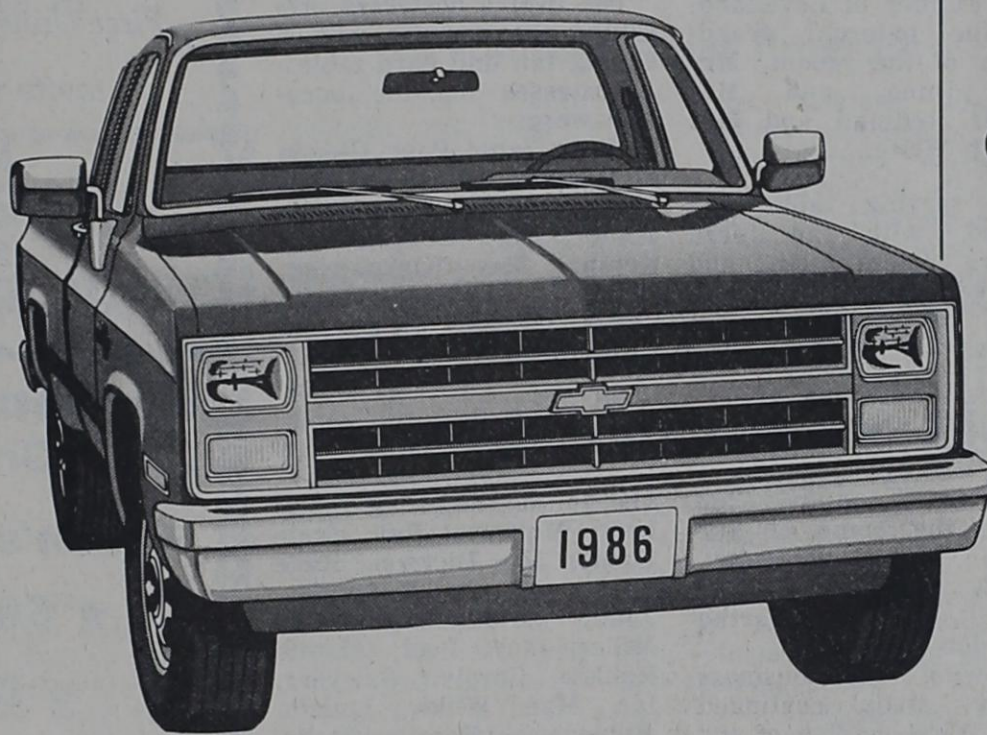
An adolescent under stress may show one or more of the following symptoms:

- Disorganization - cannot follow instruction or has trouble completing assignments.
- Lack of interest in self and others - withdrawn, cannot find happiness.
- Preoccupied - stares into space, distracted.
- Emotional - cries easily, emotions out of his control.
- Behavior changes - acts differently than he or she used to.
- Violent outbursts - hostile, destructive, verbally abusive.
- Regression - becomes "babyish" and has immature behavior.
- Weight change - sudden weight loss or gain.
- Fear - takes fewer risks, hesitant about trying new things.

Caring teachers, parents and group leaders who are alert to the symptoms of teenage stress may be able to prevent tragedies such as drug and alcohol abuse, or even teenage suicide.

Dalkon Shield Users May File Claims Until April 30

A.H. Robins Company tomorrow will launch a comprehensive three-week notification program citing April 30, 1986 as the deadline for filing claims relating to use of the Dalkon Shield, an intra-

uterine birth control device formerly marketed by the company.

Robins, which marketed the Dalkon Shield in the early 1970's, currently is developing a plan of reor-

ganization under Chapter II of the United States Bankruptcy Code.

The company filed for reorganization August 21, 1985 after the burden of litigation relating to the Dalkon Shield had reached a monthly level in excess of \$15 million.

Under an order of the United States District Court in Richmond, Robins will run paid advertising on television and in newspapers and magazines across the country through January 25.

The advertisements state that if you (a) may have been injured because you used the Dalkon Shield or (b) may have used the Dalkon Shield but have not as yet experienced an injury or (c) may have been injured because of another person's use of the Dalkon Shield, you will lose your right to make a claim if the claim is not received by the court on or before April 30, 1986.

The advertisements note that claims may be made by simply mailing a postcard or letter containing the claimant's full name and complete address and a statement that she or he is making a Dalkon Shield claim.

The postcard or letter must be mailed to Dalkon Shield, P.O. Box 44, Richmond, VA 23203.

Claimants then will be sent a questionnaire and further instructions for validating their claims.

The questionnaire must be completed and returned to the court by June 30, 1986.

The advertisements also note that claimants do not need a lawyer to file a claim.

The television advertisement will consist of a 30-second announcement that will be shown 41 times on network television during both daytime and primetime viewing hours.

The announcement also will be shown on three cable television superstations (WTBS, WGN and WOR) and on the Spanish Information Network a total of 171 times.

It will be shown 45 times in Puerto Rico.

Quarter-page print advertisements will be placed once in 225 newspapers, including 13 minority newspapers and USA Today, in the top 75 markets in the country.

In addition, full page advertisements will be run once in six national weekly magazines--Time, Newsweek, People, U.S. News & World Report, Jet and TV Guide--and once in the National Enquirer and The Star.

Under the court order, notification outside the U.S. will consist of a public affairs program that will include news releases, news conferences, public service announcements and letters to health ministers and medical associations.

The program in each of

the more than 80 countries in which the Dalkon Shield was distributed will be tailored to the specific conditions of the mass media in the respective countries.

As in the U.S., claims made by individuals in foreign countries must be received by the court in Richmond by April 30, 1986.

However, July 30, 1986 is the deadline for receipt of questionnaires completed by claimants residing in foreign countries.

Burson-Marsteller, the largest public relations agency in the world with

more than 40 offices in 22 countries, has been engaged to carry out the international portion of the notification program.

The cost of the entire program is expected to be \$5 million.

Robins sold more than 2.8 million Dalkon Shields in the U.S. and 1.7 million of the devices were distributed in other countries.

It is estimated that 2.2 million Dalkon Shields were actually used in the U.S. and less than 1.4 million outside the U.S..

On August 21, 1985, when proceedings in pending cases and claims were stopped by its filing for reorganization under Chapter II, approximately 6,000 cases and claims alleging injuries associated with the use of the Dalkon Shield were pending against Robins.

Through September 30, 1985, the company and its insurer had paid approximately \$520 million in disposing of approximately 9,450 cases and claims.

Virtually all of the litigation has been centered in the U.S., with fewer than 50 cases and claims filed and disposed of in foreign countries.

Robins has approximately 6,000 employees.

About 1,500 of these are located in Richmond, 1,800 elsewhere in the U.S., and approximately 2,700 in other countries.

Land Owners Could Save On Taxes . . .Seminar Offered

Uncle Sam can get a huge chunk of an individual's farm and ranch holdings when estates are settled or transferred, so it's important to do some planning to keep estate taxes to a minimum.

That's the purpose of four special seminars being conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in the coming weeks.

Seminars are scheduled as follows: Feb 4-5, Sheraton Hotel, Harlingen; Feb 18-19, Holiday Inn (Crowne Plaza at Park 10), Houston; March 11-13, Holiday Inn-Civic Center, Lubbock; and March 18-19, County Extension Office, Robstown.

Each day's program will be from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

"Estate tax rates are from 34 to 60 percent for estates of \$50,000 and up," points out Dr Wayne Hayenga, Extension Service economist who is coordinating the seminars.

"An estate of \$750,000 today will have an estimated tax of \$90,000, and rates will likely increase in the coming years."

Faced with these heavy estate tax burdens, individuals need to plan for the future, emphasizes the economist.

The seminars are aimed at helping individuals reduce taxable farm and ranch estates and at presenting new methods for passing businesses to the next generation.

"New estate tax rules will be explained at these seminars, and we will be focusing on such basic

planning devices as by-pass trusts, estate tax deferrals, gifts, disclaimers and property titles," Hayenga points out.

Other discussions will deal with fair treatment of beneficiaries, use of corporations and partnerships, partial sales to heirs, oil and gas interests, and special estate tax rules for agriculture, including land valuation and deferred estate tax payments.
