Bad weather and the economy did not dampen the results of the 1986 Garza County Junior Livestock Show and Sale this past weekend.

Prize money, premiums and floor prices totaling \$71,523.56 were paid on 216 animals to 127 Garza County young 4-H and FFA exhibitors.

Exhibiting the 1986 Grand Champion Steer was Clay Cowdrey with his 1355 pound heavy weight black cross.

Buyers of the animal was the Double U and First National Bank for \$1450.00 premium.

Cowdrey was also named winner of the beef showmanship buckle.

Derick Dunn showed the Grand Champion lamb, a heavy weight medium wool, which sold to Patterson Drilling Company for \$800 premium.

The grand champion hog was exhibited by Mike Bartlett and sold to Palmer Well Service and Cat Continental for \$1200 premium.

Bartlett was awarded the swine showmanship buckle for his job with his heavy weight Hampshire.

Owner of the reserve champion steer was Russ Bird with his 1210 pound

medium light weight cross. Quail Pipe, Inc of Roaring Springs, paid \$1200 premium to Bird.

Lance Bland's heavy weight medium wool lamb was named reserve champion and sold to Lone Star, Bud, Coors & Miller Distributors and Caprock Vet Clinic for \$650.00.

Reserve champion hog was shown by Brad Byrd with Slaton Stock Show and Case Power and Equipment paying \$500 for the heavy weight Duroc.

Clay Cowdrey exhibited his registered Hereford heifer to the grand championship and Michael

Council Looks to Planning for Future

The Post City Council voted to approve the TEXCEL application, \$1,000 toward supporting an internship program for economic development and endorsed objective and goals of the TEXCEL application during a special called meeting last week.

The city joins the Garza County Commissioners' Court in the economic development effort, spearheaded by the Post Economic Corp (PEDC).

In a session described by Mayor Giles McCrary "as the best overall meeting I've experienced in the past 22 years," the council expressed its unanimous enthusiasm for the TEXCEL program.

Attending the meeting were Mayor Giles McCrary, council members Charles Wallace, Weaver McKamie, Maxine Earl, Lewis Holly and Larry Mills, city manager Bill Pool and city secretary Wanda Wilkerson.

Idalou Added to 3AAA

The 3AAA district alignment, announced last Thursday in Austin by the U.I.L., puts Idalou in the eight-team district, replacing Frenship.

As expected, Frenship moved up to 4A classification.

Other 3AAA district members are Denver City, Seminole, Brownfield, Cooper, Roosevelt, Slaton and Post.

Non district competition for Post next fall will open September 5 with Littlefield, followed by Seagraves and Colorado City.

Seagraves is a large 2A

school "with a traditionally strong football program," Post athletic director David Thompson comments.

Post Antelope football fans will be interested to note that Vernon has been moved up to 4A, but Daingerfield remains in 3A.

Class 4A enrollment minimum was set by the U.I.L. at 715, 3A at 285 and 2A at 135.

Post High School enrollment is currently 306.

Playing sites will be determined at a district meeting scheduled February 19.

Three Arrested for Saturday Burglaries

Three men were arrested this week in Daingerfield and are being

returned to Post to face burglary charges in connection with a break-in early Saturday morning of the Shamrock and Phillips 66 service stations here.

Arrested were Tracy Dean Frare, William Curtis Ellarton and Stephen Moore, charged with possession of a stolen vehicle in Daingerfield and found in possession of stolen merchandise taken in the two burglaries here.

The same suspects are reported to have left here and are accused of burglaries in Hermleigh and Colorado City.

Garza County sheriff's department deputies investigating the incident, dis-

covering that a cash register taken from the Phillips 66 station here was located in Hermleigh.

Drug Charges Filed Here

Larry Vandiver is being held in Garza County jail on a \$20,000 bond, charged in Justice of Peace Precinct One count with possession of a narcotic substance.

He was arrested by Garza County sheriff's deputies following an informant's call that Vandiver was in the city park

attempting to make a drug sale.

Additional investigation showed that the suspect had been accused of forging two checks and attempting to forge a third one at United Supermarket.

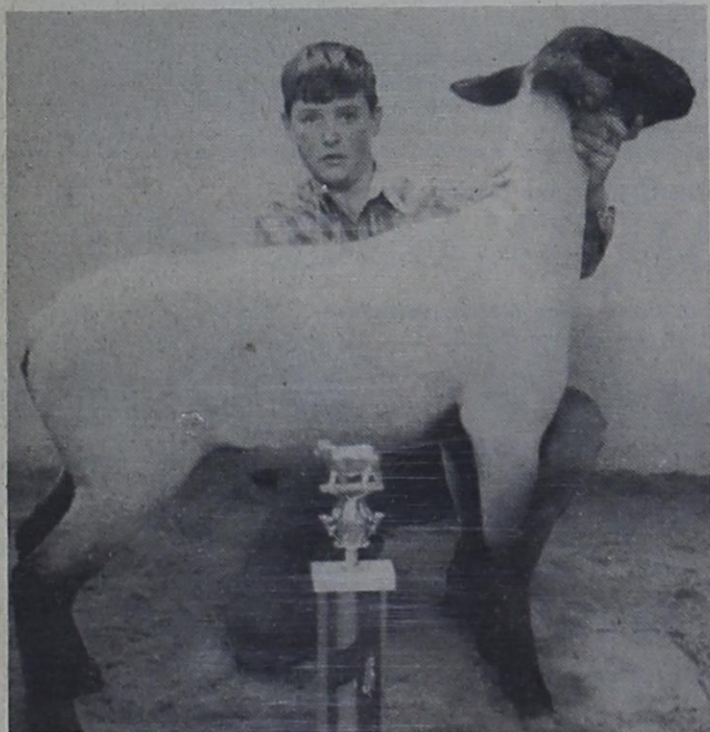

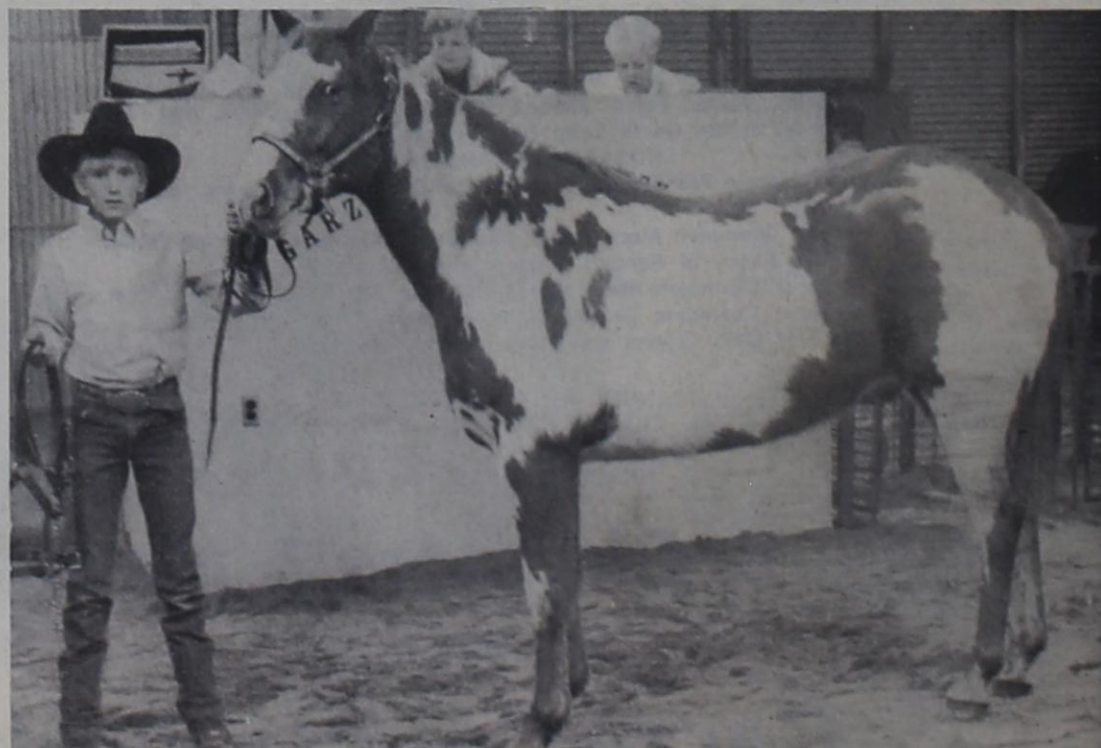

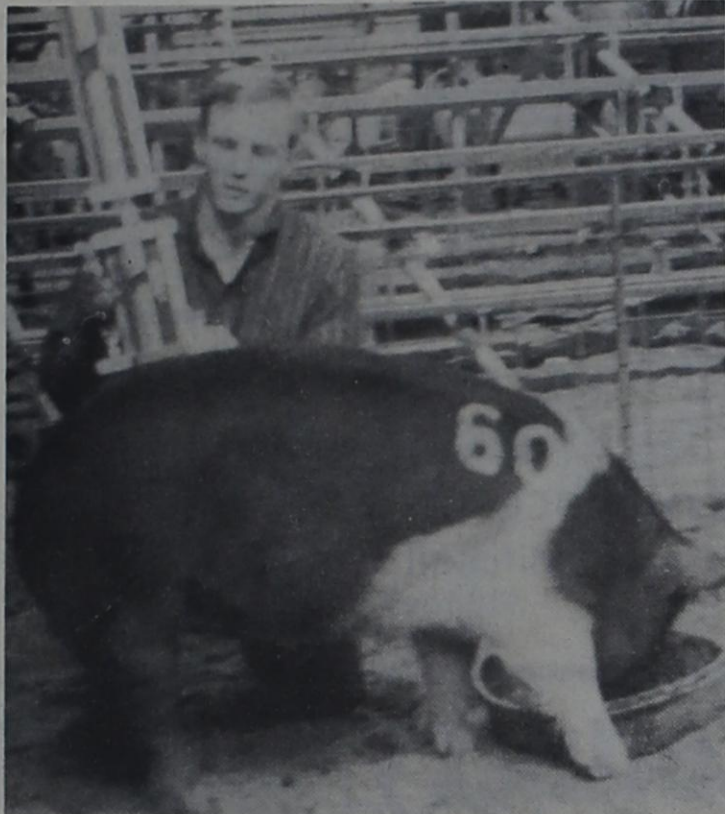

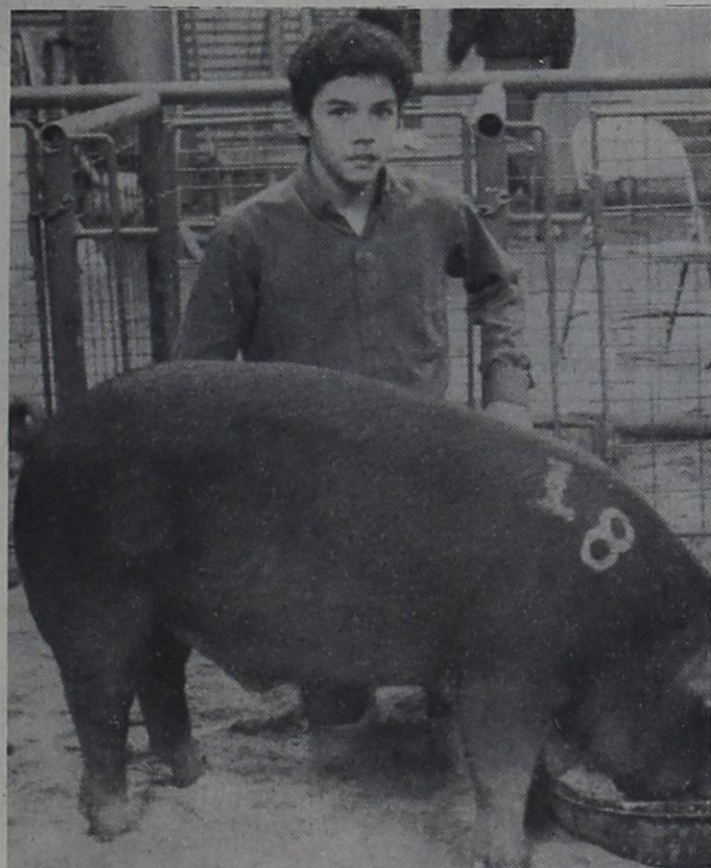

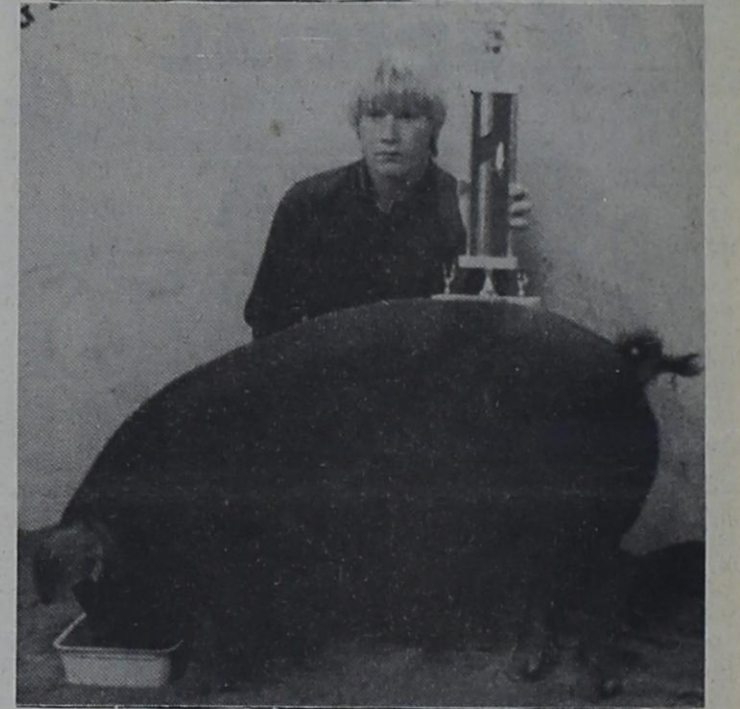

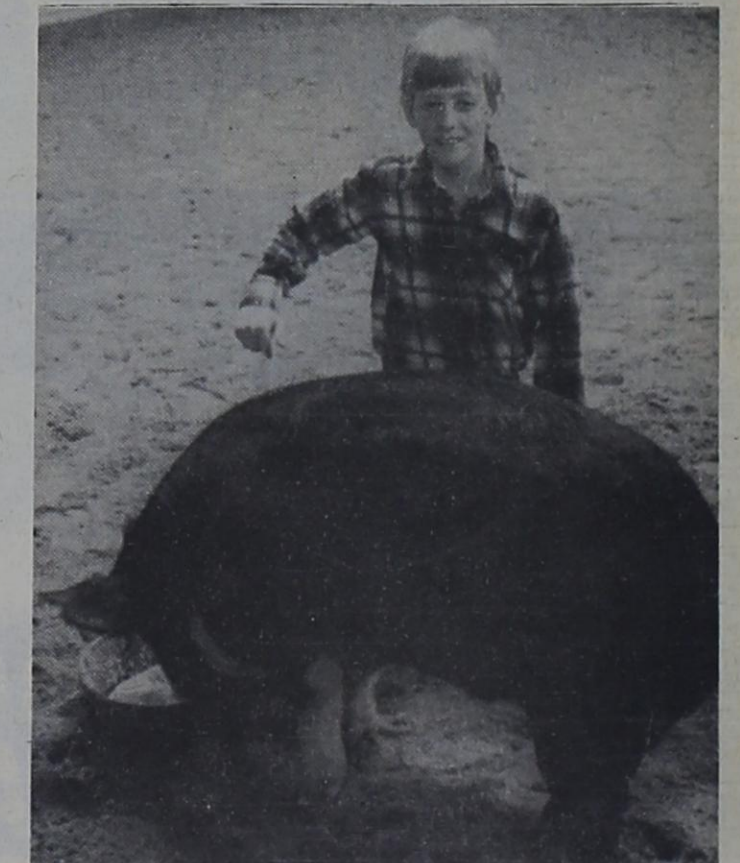

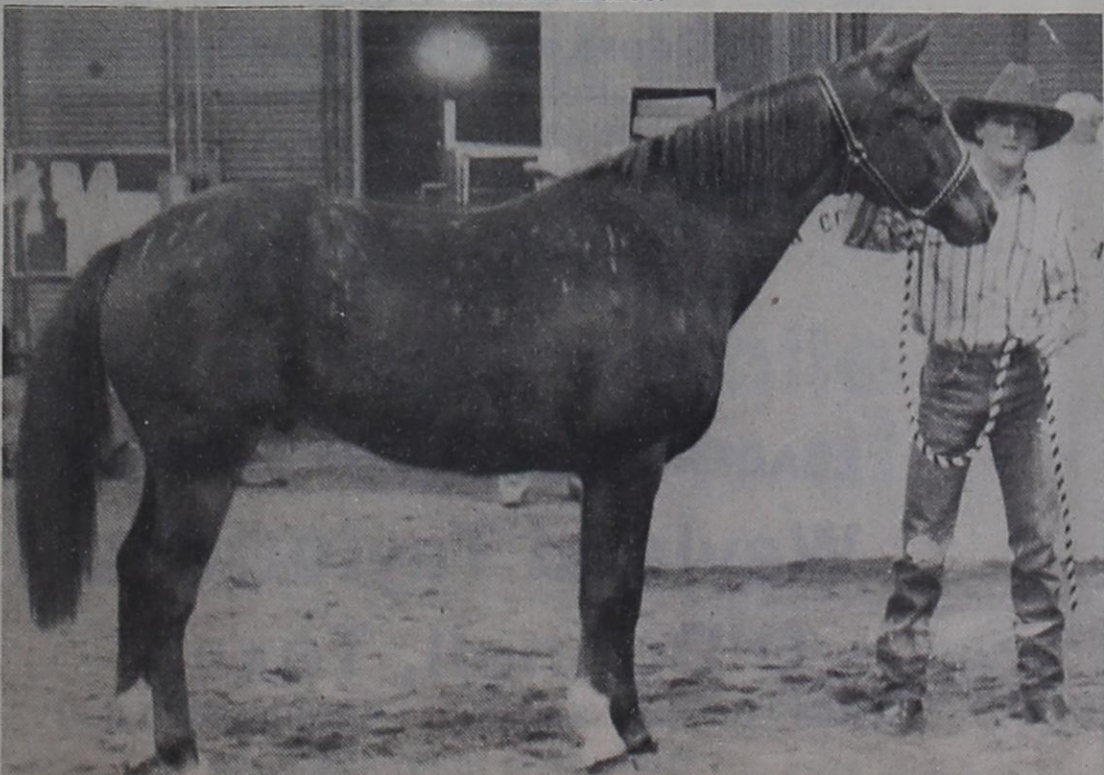

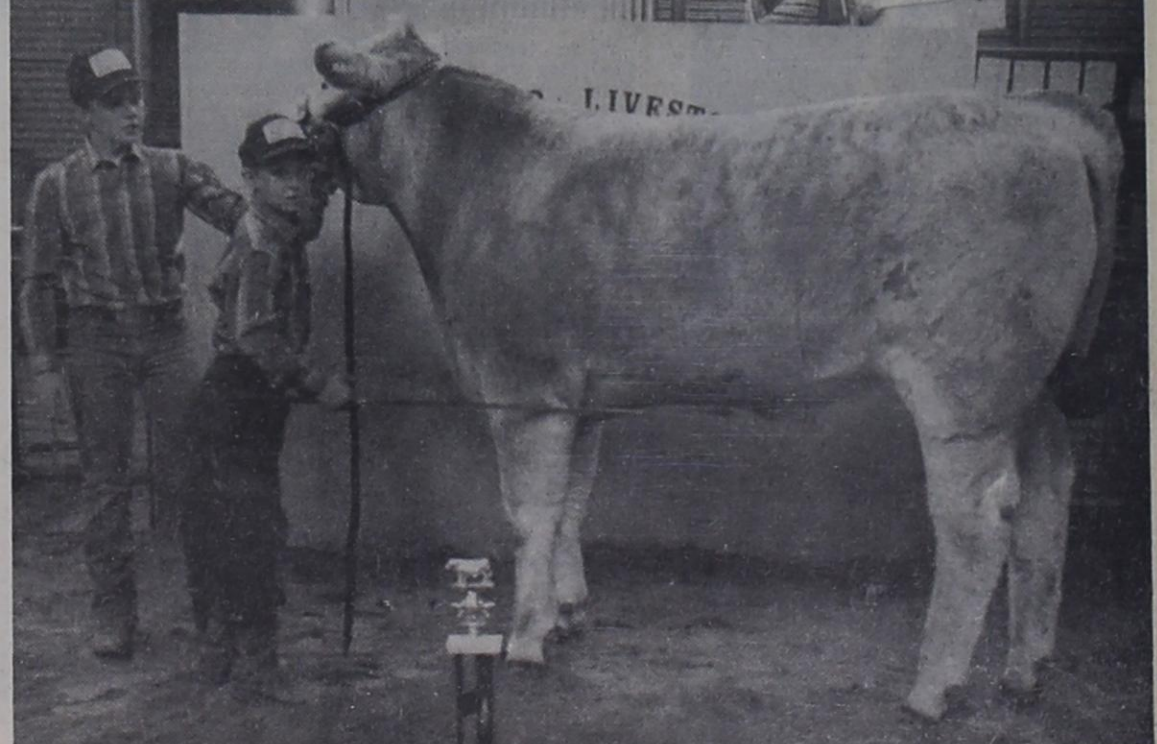

Letter to the Editor

As director of the City
 County Drug and Alcohol
 Abuse Program, may I
 express my feelings, hopes
 and aspirations for the
 future of our community.

We can take pride in
 our elected officials as
 they strive to see that
 human services are avail-
 able to every person and
 segment in Garza County.

The drug-alcohol pro-
 gram, due to the very
 nature and complexities of
 the disease of alcoholism
 and drug addition, is often
 misunderstood.

We are grateful that
 during the past 15 months,
 38 people in our com-
 munity suffering from
 severe problems with alco-
 hol and drugs have entered
 treatment facilities.

Not all have been able
 to remain alcohol, drug or
 trouble free, however
 many have been able to
 re-establish themselves in
 their home, jobs and
 society.

Everybit as important as
 the ones entering treat-
 ment are those coming to
 us for help before they

encounter major legal,
 family and job problems.

There are also the
 spouses, parents and child-
 ren of alcoholics seeking
 help for themselves and
 their loved ones.

Helping people find help
 is the number one priority
 of the program.

There is, however, an-
 other very important as-
 pect of the alcohol-drug
 abuse program.

That is to provide educa-
 tion as a means of
 prevention for our youth.

There is no way to
 determine if a prevention
 program works.

I, myself, am curious to
 know how many students
 changed their ideas and
 attitudes about drinking
 and drugging following the
 Drug Day programs pre-
 sented in the past at Post
 schools, or from the Fam-
 ily Living Committee's al-
 cohol-drug awareness as-
 sembly and programs we
 presented in Post Middle
 schools last spring.

It is my understanding
 that due to the rigorous
 schedule of academics set
 forth by the State of

Texas in our schools, there
 is no time allotted for
 alcohol-drug programs this
 year.

Programs are available
 for school assemblies, and
 classroom programs in all
 grade levels.

We can only provide
 them if parents insist that
 their children be provided
 with education and know-
 ledge of the extreme
 dangers of alcohol and
 drug use and abuse.

The January 29 issue of
 the Post Dispatch drove
 home a very real feeling I
 have for the new drinking
 age limit and DWI laws.

THANK GOD the cita-
 tion was written for driv-
 ing while intoxicated, not
 D.O.A. at Garza Memorial
 Hospital.

Judge Dalby Discusses Problems with Governor

Governor Mark White
 today met with Garza
 County Judge Giles Dalby
 and 13 other county judges
 and commissioners from
 across the state to discuss
 a variety of issues directly
 affecting county govern-
 ment.

"County government is
 the foundation upon which
 the rest of the state is
 built," Governor White
 said.

"Federal budget cut-
 backs compounded by
 additional county responsi-
 bility have created a tremen-
 dous challenge for our
 officials at the county
 level."

"I'm pleased to report
 today that, despite many
 problems, our county offi-
 cials are meeting the
 challenge and helping to
 ensure that Texas moves
 boldly and securely into
 the 21st century."

Among the issues of
 special concern to the
 commissioners and judges
 is county responsibility for
 implementation of health
 care for the indigent.

Governor White explained
 that the newly enacted
 indigent health care
 legislation for the first
 time defines the counties'
 responsibilities for indigent
 health care and places
 reasonable limits on each
 county's obligation.

Without the legislation,
 counties were vulnerable
 to the escalating number
 of court cases which were
 giving large judgements to
 residents.

"The limits on county
 responsibilities are very
 conservative," Governor
 White said.

"This legislation not only
 provides health care for
 those who could not other-
 wise afford it, but it also
 protects the counties from
 federal court rulings such
 as those affecting our
 prisons and MHMR ser-
 vices."

Governor White noted
 that counties are increas-
 ingly having difficulty
 meeting liability insurance
 rates.

In response to the pro-
 blem, Governor White re-
 ported that a Joint Com-
 mittee on Liability and
 Tort Law and Procedure
 has been appointed and will
 study tort law reform and
 how other states are deal-
 ing with this important
 matter.

The committee is ex-
 pected to report its find-
 ings to the 70th Legisla-
 ture in January 1987.

Governor White added
 that in the face of growing
 demands for services and
 fewer federal revenue dol-
 lars flowing to the states,
 the state and counties will
 increasingly have to work
 together to ensure that
 service needs are met

with available budgets.

Governor White said he
 will be working closely
 with the counties during
 the next session of the
 Legislature in an attempt
 to resolve special problems
 encountered by county
 government.

"The advice and counsel
 I have received from the
 county judges and com-
 missioners today is invalua-
 ble and helps us in state
 government better under-
 stand the special needs of
 the citizens across Texas,"
 Governor White said.

"I intend to schedule
 these one-on-one meetings
 with county officials on
 regular basis so that we
 can coordinate our efforts
 to serve all Texans effi-
 ciently and economically."

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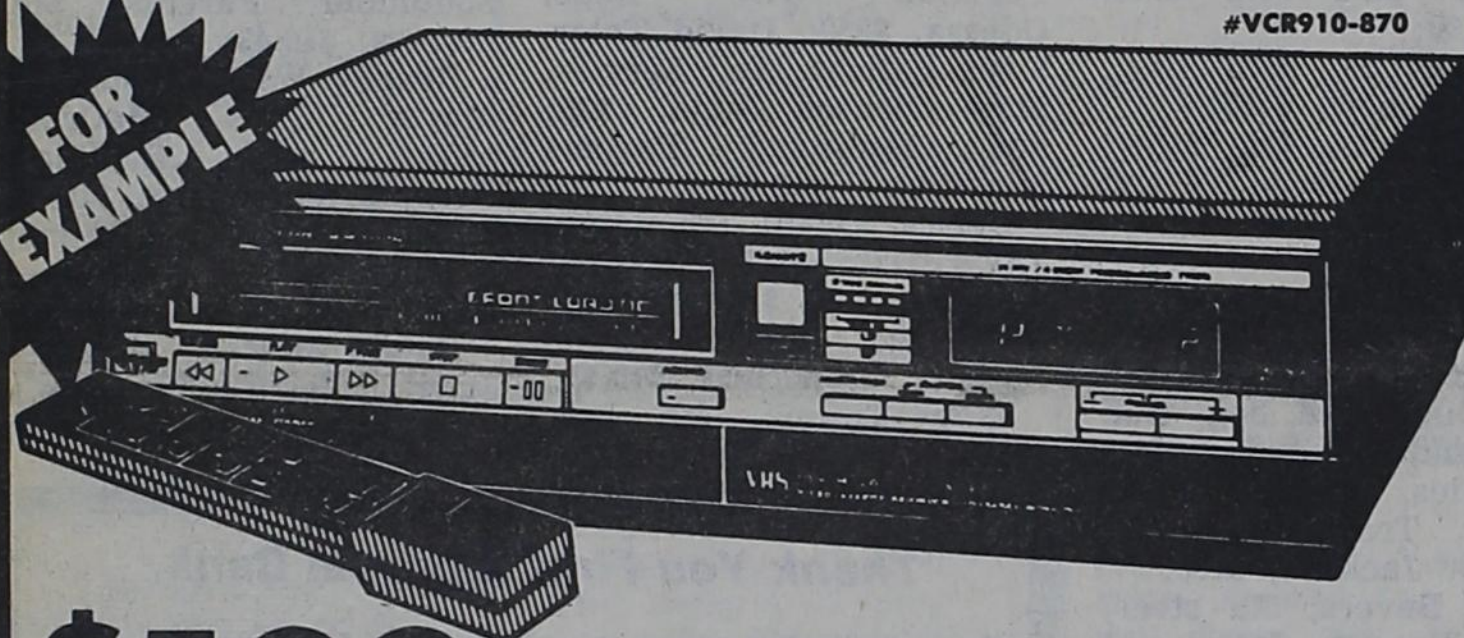

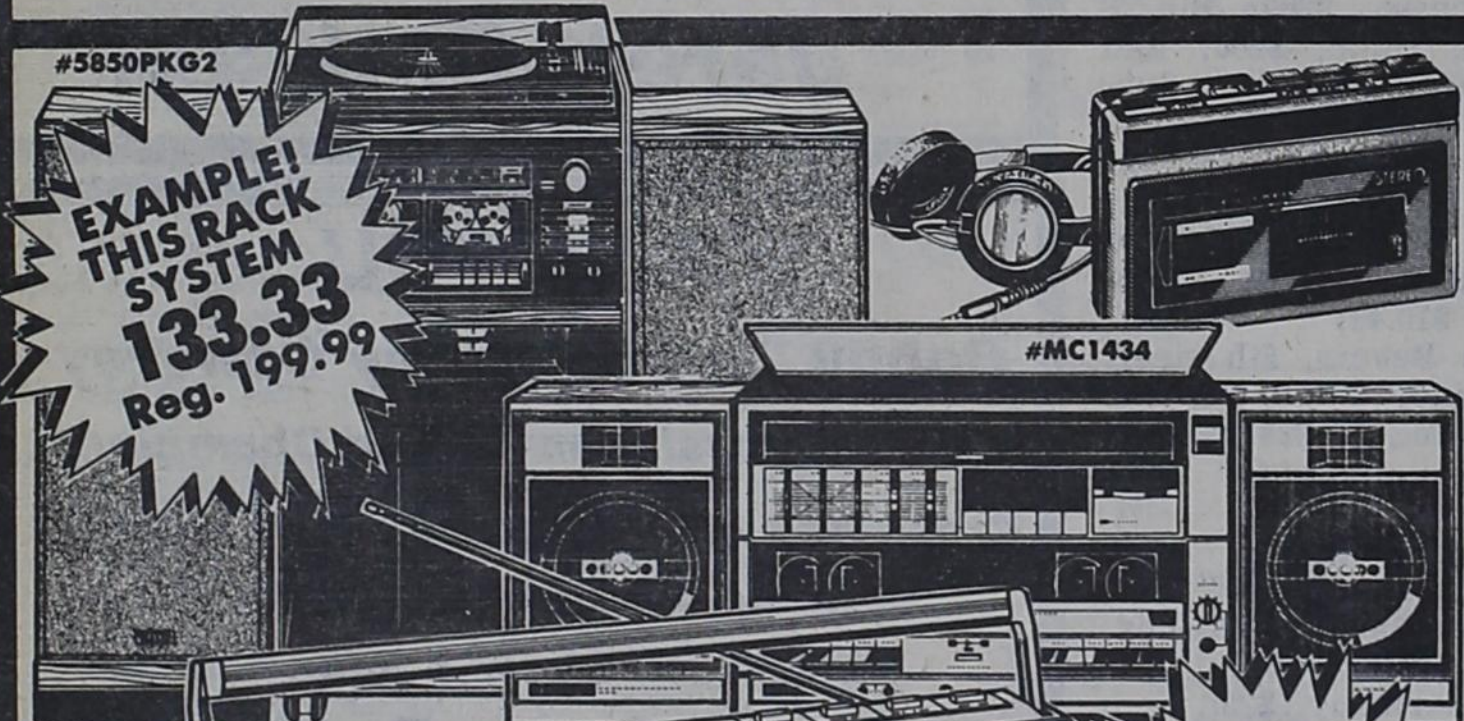
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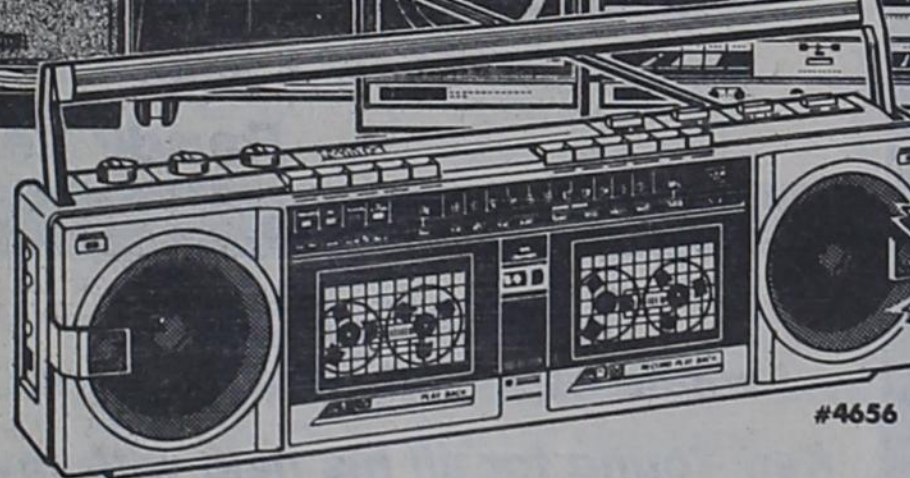
