Have to say something this week about the economy here and a growing feeling of uncertainty.

Most of this feeling is coming from continuing decline in the price of oil and what that means to our friends who earn their living in the petroleum business.

I have been asking around the past few weeks, and it seems to me that the oil patch is still fairly busy. We may have seen a downturn, and perhaps the real problem is the uncertainty of the future.

Who knows what the price will be tomorrow?

Will \$12 per barrel oil become the norm?

If so, what will that mean for us? Will we be able to sell our

oil for \$12-15 a barrel and still keep folks here employed?

Yes and no.

That really depends on the cost of production...and as folks in the oil business know, that varies a lot from well to well.

Yes, I too am concerned... but I believe that Texas oil and specifically Garza County oil will continue to be produced and sold in volumes not much different than in the past.

One reason I have faith in the future here, is the fact that a dependable source of oil is always important to

major oil suppliers. The potential of war in the middle east is always a threat to the purchasers of oil in that area...and Texas is a sure thing ... even if the price may be a little higher.

With lower oil prices, we will have to learn how to be more productive and look for ways to trim fat.

And that applies not only to people in oil production, but to the rest of us in business in this area.



## 4-H Program Cut

Budgeting austerity at the federal level will have a major impact on the U.S. Department of Agriculture's vice and consequently the Texas Agricultural Exten-Texas Agricultural Extension Service, a partner in the nationwide system.

"President Reagan's proposed budget for fiscal year 1987 would reduce federal funds to Cooperative Extension by 59 percent and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service's federal budget would be reduced over \$10 million," points out Dr Zerle L. Carpenter, Extension Service director.

"If this proposal should be approved by Congress, it would result in the loss of a number of staff positions and a reduction in specific programs."

Yet we want to continue to do the best job possible in providing quality educa-tional programs to the citizens of Texas.

"If President Reagan's budget is adopted by Congress, special funded programs will be eliminated."

For Texas, these include expanded nutrition programs, urban gardening, integrated pest management, renewable resources, farm safety, and a portion of the 4-H program.

The Extension Service has a long track record of service to Texans dating back to 1915 when the state legislature approved the formation of the agency.


Since that time a wide range of educational programs have been carried out for the well-being of all Texans, in particular for farmers, ranchers, home-makers and youth, notes Carpenter.

Through Extension Service programs the state's crop and livestock base now annually boasts cash re-ceipts of more than \$10 billion, with a total impact on the state's economy of some \$35 billion.

"However, agriculture, one of the state's leading industries, has fallen on hard times in recent years due to a wide range of factors, and income to farmers and ranchers is down drastically," points out Carpenter. "That makes it all the

more important that we have a strong Extension Service to work with our agricultural producers in improving their decision making, managerial skills and increasing production efficiency so as to give them every opportunity to increase their income."

Educational programs for the family, with particular emphasis on fitness and health, nutrition and family financial planning, also have led the way in improving the quality of life for many Texans, says Carpenter.
