Civil Defense Siren Installed

A new civil defense siren Morton explained that in his Vukad concerning his con- the same treatment as will be installed in the near future in Post as a result of action Monday night by the Post City Council.

The site of the installation is yet to be determined, with testing to be conducted to select the most effective position.

The cost of the project is approximately \$4,000 including installation. Although council had approved four new sirens more than two years ago, city manager Bill Pool explained that installing four would cost between \$25,000 to \$30,000.

The siren selected by the council is similar to ones used by Snyder.

In other action, the council heard from a disgruntled citizen's group concerning law enforcement and the operation of the city municipal court.

Jerry Riedel, spokesman for the group, told the council that a large number of citizens are unhappy with the "harrassment tactics" of the sheriff's department.

He also pointed out that citizens believe Mrs Louise Greene, city judge, is unfair and that she is biased against people when they come to her court.

"She told me that she has to maintain a good working relationship with sheriff," Riedel emphasized, "and to me that sounds like any of us who get a ticket

don't have a prayer." attorney Harvey

opinion the city judge was following the same procedures for everyone...and that the judge must use state law as the guidelines for the court.

Mayor Giles McCrary also added that the council is not in position to set policies in the court, that the city court is under rules and regulations of the state.

Other citizens at the meeting complained that sheriff's deputies give tickets for such minor infractions as a broken headlight, with no warning.

"We're just asking that our citizens be treated fairly and with respectful courtesy," Riedel added.

"Many of my people live in fear," another citizen commented, "and most are afraid to voice their opinion because of fear of reprisal."

Riedel called for the council to remove Mrs Greene from office because of what he believes is her biased attitude.

Mayor McCrary suggested that the council meet informally with the citizens group later this month, along with law enforcement and the judge, to air the complaints and look for ways to improve the relations.

"What we want is to get to know these officers...let peace return," a citizen expressed.

In another matter, the council heard from Nick struction of a carport at his residence.

He had received a letter from the city about the construction as a result of his failure to secure a

permit for building. Vukad was informed that his structure is in violation of the deed restrictions on Mohawk. He told the council that there were a number of similar violations in that neighborhood and questioned why he was not allowed

Morton told the council that Vukad's attorney had requested no action be taken on the matter until after Vukad's attorney could study the matter.

Drilling Report

Good production potential has been logged at the No. 1 Kirk Green, a successful Garza County wildcat located 5.1 miles southeast of Post.

On a 12-64 choke, it flowed 322 barrels of 41-gravity oil daily. Flowing tubing pressure stood at 220 PSI.

With Fred G. Yates as the operator, the well probed to total depth of 8,334 feet and will produce from perforations in the Ellenburger Formation, 8,303 to 8,334 feet into the wellbore.

A total of four new producers have been brought on line in the Garza Field by independent opera-tor Ray J. Diekemper Jr. from two to three miles northwest of Post.

The wells include the Nos. 413, 610, 612 and 711 Northwest Garza Unit. They potentialed at 61, 43, 39 and 80 barrels of oil per day, respectively. Production intervals ranged from

3,106 to 3,460 feet into the hole. All four wells will produce "open hole" with no perforations.

The wells showed they will be from 231 to 296 barrels of waste water daily.

An undrilled location in the Garza Field has been abandoned by Permian Exploration Inc about three miles northeast of Post. The well had been designated as the No. 3 Stoker.

My feeling is that there is






