Commissioners Set Tax Rate

The Garza County Commissioners' voted 3-2 to raise county taxes by 3 percent at their regular meeting, Monday, August 25.

Judge Giles Dalby, Tommy Young and T.D. Craft voted for the raise

while Ted Aten and Herbert Walls voted against.

"I hope the people will remember that we cut taxes last year because we could," stated Dalby.

But with the reduced price in oil the increase

seemed inevitable.

"Oil has the most pronounced effect on our budget," stated Dalby.

But Aten saw it from a different view.

"You go out in the country and down Main Street and you can see that people are not flourishing," cited Aten.

"The budget can be cut some more," Aten argued.

But seeing things rough in the future Craft added, "If we raise a little this year, maybe we won't have to increase as much next year."

A discussion of law enforcement's compensation pay was also discussed by the commissioners.

"How do we know?" stated Walls in discussing how much compensation time an officer has.

"I thought we told them to get their 48 hours in the week and go home," Walls continued.

Judge Dalby suggested that they let Donald

Windham, who is re-writing the Employ Policy, put in the policy for employees to take compensation time within the pay week.

County Agent Colleen England asked the commissioners about a babysitting problem when the Young Homemakers meet.

The situation arouse when only one mother that

needs a babysitter for her child, showed up at the meeting, and England could not ask that one mother to pay the \$10 babysitting fee by herself.

Usually more mothers that have young children attend the meeting and the fee is divided among them.

After apprehending Mrs Earl, Briley called the Garza County Sheriff's Department, and a deputy transported her to the sheriff's department for processing.

She was released on her own recognizance.

Justice of the Peace Melton explained that the fine was the same as was set for another person who had been apprehended earlier the same evening.

I want to share with you the good feeling of teamwork that went into the preparation and completion of this months-long project.

Actually, the idea of being a Texas Main Street City has been on the minds of many for the past four years, and many of us have attended Main Street meetings, dreaming of how we could get in on this great program.

But actual work toward making the application was sparked last March, following a Main Street session in Lubbock, sponsored by Texas Tech. Out of that meeting came the inspiration to press forward.

I would get in immediate trouble if I started trying to list all the names of all the people who have made this application possible. Sure as I tried, I'd leave somebody's name off the list, especially considering how many people have been involved.

Let me just say, those of you on the Post Merchants' Association Main Street Committee, and all the other people who have worked so hard to get the application completed, your efforts are prime examples of great teamwork.

During the rush to finish,

during the times of distress and in front of opposition, you supported one another and kept the main goal in mind at all times.

Now, the application, a professional job I will say without question, is in the hands of the staff at the Texas Historical Commission's Main Street office.

It will be reviewed by a committee later in September, and an announcement of the five 1987 cities will be made in

School. The groom is a 1984 graduate of Dunbar-Struggs High School.

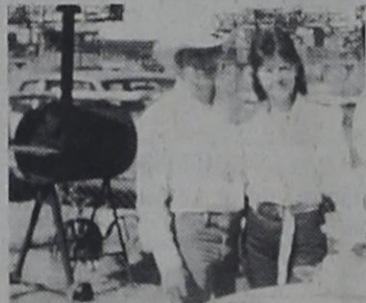

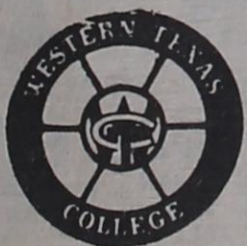



Granola Snacks or Cookies In The Lunch Box?

Granola snacks are often advertised as a "healthy" alternative to cookies for the kids' lunch boxes or after school snacks.

According to a report of the American Council on Science and Health, however, there isn't much difference between commercial granola snacks and store-bought cookies. Their analysis showed

that granola snacks contain 110 to 150 calories per serving, depending on added ingredients such as dried fruits, nuts and chocolate. Two oatmeal, chocolate chip or sugar cookies contain between 120 and 130 calories.

The granola snacks provide 2 grams of protein, 5 grams of fat and 20 grams of carbohydrate. The cookies have 1 gram of protein, 5 or 6 grams of fat and 16 to 18 grams of carbohydrate.

Both the granola snacks and the cookies are relatively

high in sugar, fat and calories. Both supply about equal amounts of vitamins and minerals.

When it comes to sodium, granola snacks vary widely, and some approach the amount of sodium in corn chips or potato chips. But the nuts, dried fruits and whole grains which are usually found in granola snacks, are a good source of dietary fiber.

Cookies usually contain both vegetable and animal fats, and have more cholesterol as a result. Granola

snacks are low in cholesterol because they are made with vegetable oils.

It is difficult to say which is the better choice. Both snacks provide comparable amounts of carbohydrate, fat and energy. The granola snack has a little less cholesterol and a little more fiber, but it may also be high in salt. So the small differences between the two snacks may be nutritionally insignificant.

If you are paying premium prices for granola products labeled as health snacks, when your children would just as soon have a cookie, be aware that you are not buying extra nutrition.

Making home-made cookies, where you can use vegetable fats or preparing your own granola with less salt is probably a more nutritious alternative than the store-bought version of either snack.

The key thing is that children eat any type of snack food in moderation as part of a balanced diet that gives them the nutrients they need.

Oil Drilling

Bright & Co. of Dallas has revealed plans to drill a 9,200-ft. wildcat well in Garza County. The venture will be known as the No. 1 John Lott.

Drillsite will be 15 miles southwest of Post in a 641-acre lease in the W.J. Saunders Survey.

Majestic Enterprises has abandoned an undrilled location in the Dorward Field, Garza County. The well had been designated at the No. 5 W.L. Cantrell. Drillsite was to have been three miles northeast of Justiceburg. The well had carried permit for 2,700-ft. total depth.

Westland Oil Development of Montgomery has revealed plans to drill an 8,600-ft. wildcat well in Garza County. The No. 1 Connell Estate "29" will be located in a 667-acre lease in the GH&H Survey. Drillsite is five miles southeast of Post.

An undrilled location has been abandoned by Majestic Enterprises in the Dorward Field, Garza County.

The well in question had been designated as the No. 1 Fuller, with drillsite seven miles southeast of Justiceburg. The operation had been projected to 3,000-ft. total depth.

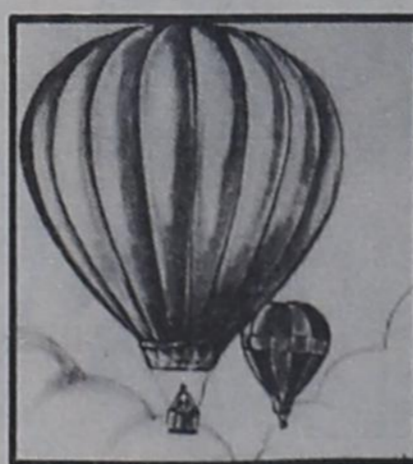

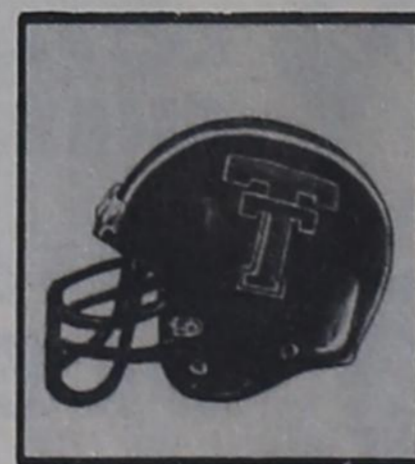

Last Friday the junior varsity penetrated the end zone twice and held Floydada to no penetrations.

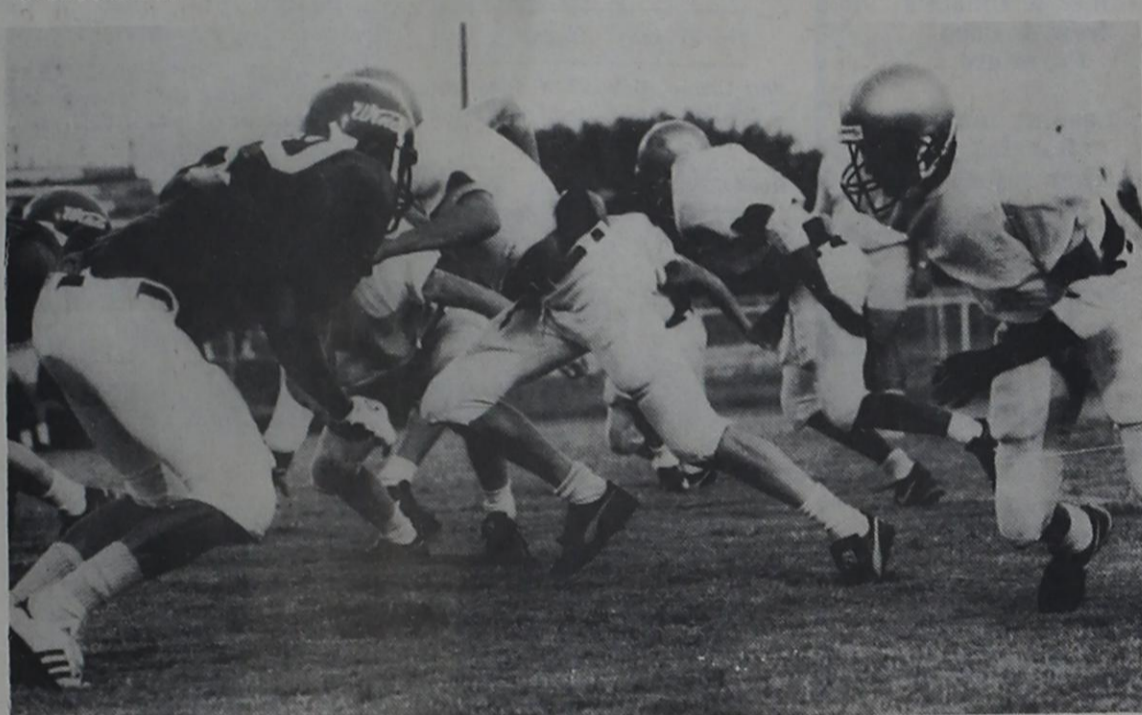
The freshmen, who scrimmage Lamesa here at the practice field Thursday at 5 p.m., blanked Floydada there last Thursday 5-0.

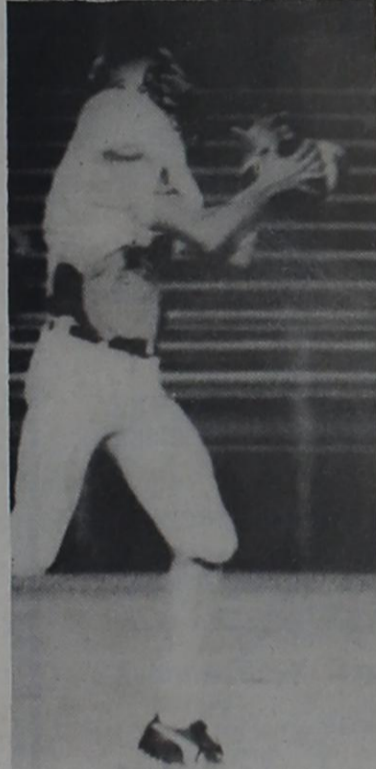

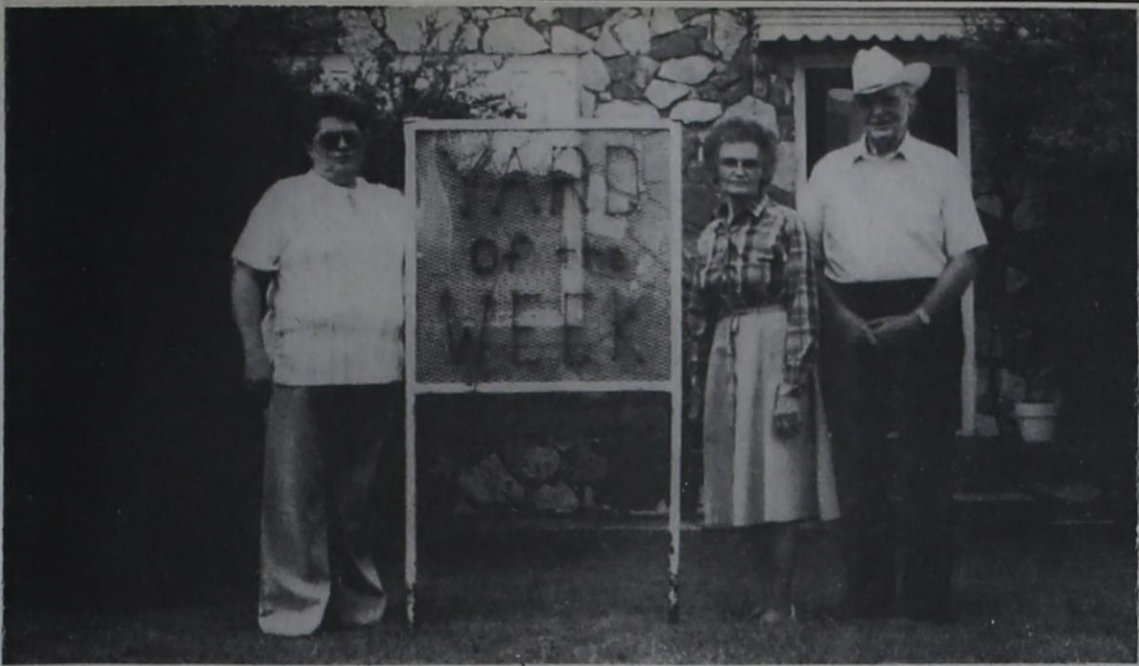
Smith Receives Award
