## Track Resurfacing Gets Attention

Architect and engineer Bill Stracener reported to the Post ISD board of trustees last week at the regular meeting that the press box was completed in time for use at the first home game, with minor finishing work still to be done.

Stracener also reported to the board that work on the new vocational ag building, adjacent to the

new field house, is on schedule. He pointed out that recent heavy rains had delayed the installation, but the contractor is estimating a December or January completion date.

Jack Miller of Vibra-Whirl, presented a detailed report to the board considering the renovation of the track.

Miller pointed out that the current track was laid

in 1979, giving the school seven track seasons, which is beyond the normal wear.

He recommended to the board replacing the current asphalt with a resolute surface, which is less expensive than polyethylene but has the same estimated life span.

"It is durable, and economical and the most popular surface," Miller added.

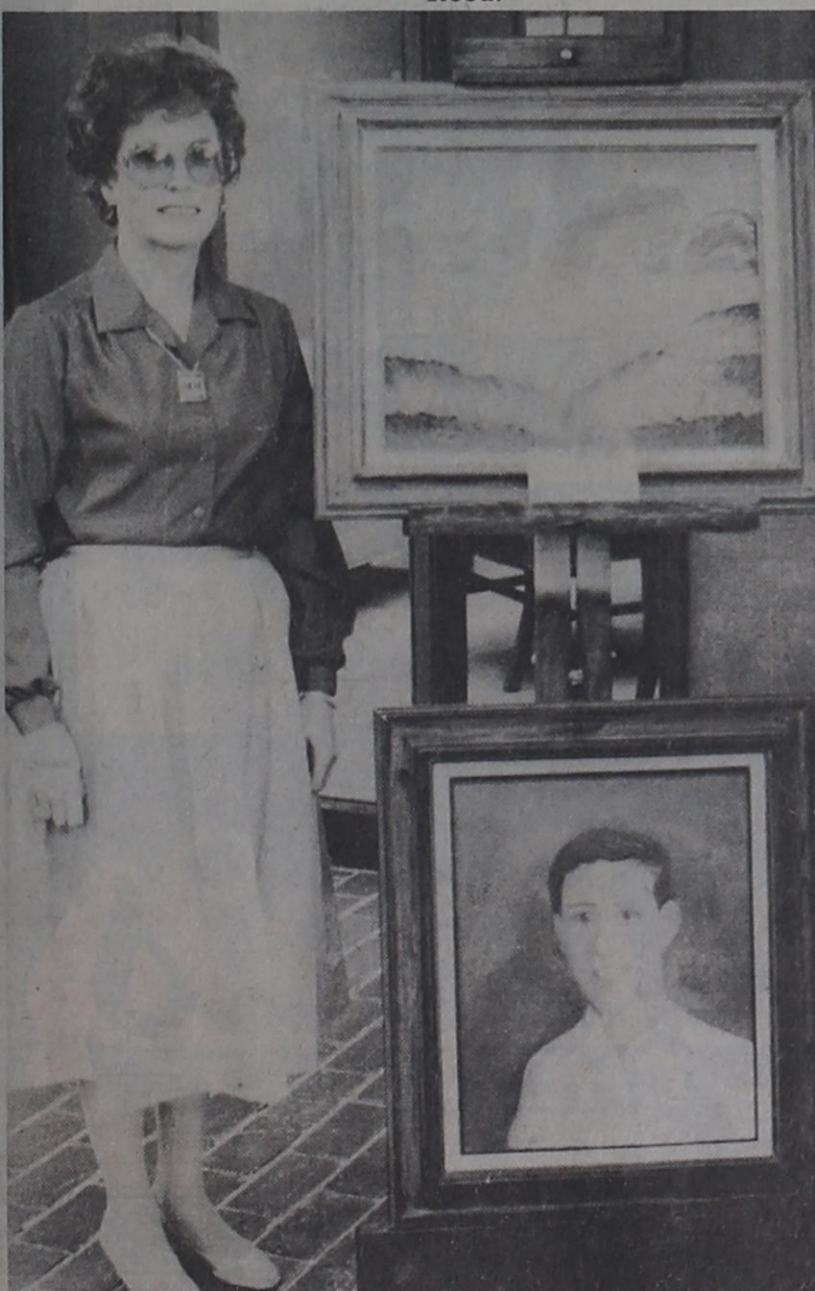
The estimated cost of

replacing the current worn track surface is \$50,000.

The board made no decision on the proposal.

No action was taken on the proposed tax rate of .70 per hundred dollar evaluation, pending outcome of legislation in Austin.

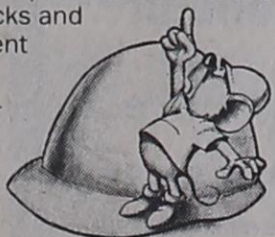

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION

NOVEMBER 4, 1986

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 15 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among the counties in which the property of the railroad is located for purposes of property taxation, and would delete the requirement that the Comptroller participate in making the allocation. To comply with both statutory and constitutional law, the apportionment currently is being made by the State Property Tax Board in conjunction with the Comptroller.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among counties for purposes of property taxation."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment that would replace the constitutional requirement that the subject of a bill be expressed in its title with a mandate that each house of the legislature adopt rules of procedure that would require the subject of each bill to be expressed in its title in a manner that gives the legislature and the public reasonable notice of that subject. Determining compliance with the rule would be the responsibility of the legislature. Cur-

rently, a law is invalidated if a court finds its caption is defective. The amendment would provide that past and future enactments may not be held void on the basis of an insufficient title.

The amendment also would eliminate the suggestion that the state's laws be revised every ten years, and instead would provide for continuing revision of state laws.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment requiring each house to include in its rules of procedure a rule that each bill contain a title expressing the bill's subject, and providing for the continuing revision of state laws."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the Legislature to authorize any county, city, town, or other political subdivision to use public funds or credit to pay insurance premiums on nonassessable life, health, or accident policies. Due to the prohibition in the constitution against the lending of credit and granting of public money, political subdivisions currently are prohibited from becoming shareholders in associations such as mutual-insurance companies, in which policyholders are shareholders. A nonassessable mutual insurance policy does not allow a company to raise capital by assessing the policyholder an extra amount on a pre-

mium. This amendment will allow mutual insurance companies and stock companies to bid for life and health group policies of political subdivisions. Public liability will be limited to the payment of premiums specified in the contract.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing political subdivisions the opportunity to engage in and transact business with authorized mutual insurance companies in the same manner as with other insurance companies."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would repeal the prohibition against branch banking by state banks and would allow state banks and national banks domiciled in this state to establish and operate banking facilities at locations within the county or city where they are domiciled. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to permit a state bank or a national bank domiciled in this state to engage in business at more than one place if it acquires a failed state bank or national bank domiciled in this state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that a bank may offer full service banking at more than one location within the city or county where its principal facility is located, subject to limitations and restrictions provided by law."

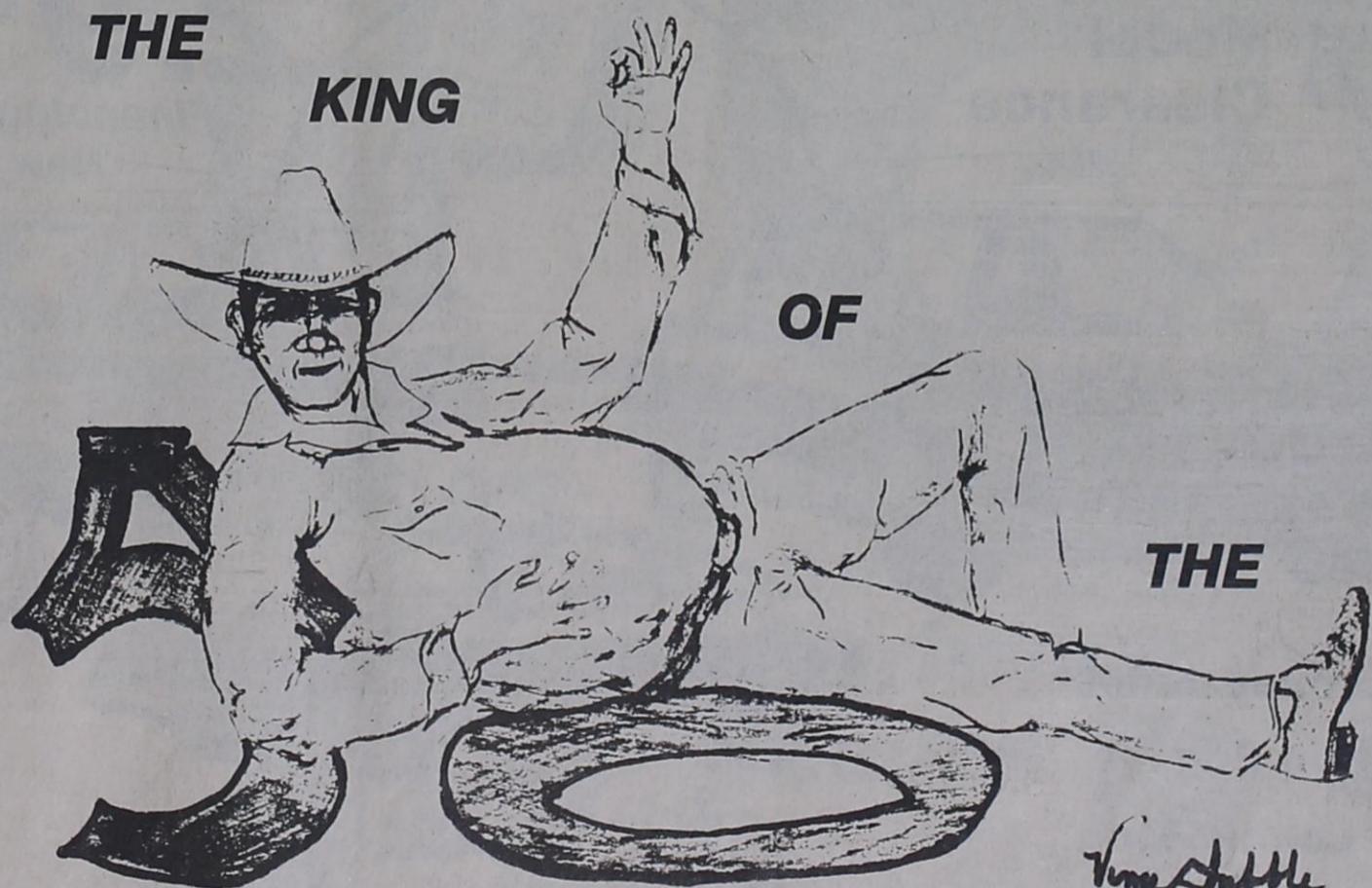

# Antelopes Demolish Eagles 55-0

 The first miscalculation the Seagraves Eagles made last Friday night there was the decision after winning the toss to allow the Post Antelopes to receive the kickoff. It was downhill for the Eagles after that, as a rejuvenated Bold Gold football team took five plays to hit paydirt in less than two minutes and went on to win 55-0. The shut out was the sort of performance Post fans expected from the Antelopes, who rebounded from a 34-0 loss the previous week to Littlefield. At Seagraves the Antelopes operated on all cylinders as the offensive line dominated and the backfield ripped off big chunks of

yardage. Starting quarterback Jay McCook was on target with his passing, hitting Marvin Lee on a 60 yard touchdown pass and run to put the Antelopes on the scoreboard with 9:51 left in the first quarter. The defense took charge, with Tyge Payne, Tony Angerer, Brian Gibbs, Bobby Gonzales and Steve Price leading the charge at the line. A fourth down attempt by the Eagles on their first possession, with less than a foot to go, signaled the determination of the Antelope defense. The defense met Eagle quarterback Vince Sines at the line of scrimmage, denying him the first down.

With 6:46 left in the first quarter, the 'Lopes opened up their second touchdown drive at the Post 23 yard line. Again, McCook rolled to his right, hit Lee at the Post 45 yard line, and the speedy receiver broke a tackle and was finally dragged down at the 16 yard line. Mike Bartlett took it to the 11, and then Eddie Moat ripped through right tackle, ramming through two would-be tacklers and into the end zone. McCook's keeper around left end gave the 'Lopes the two point conversion, making up for the missed extra point earlier. Seagraves punted again after three downs, setting up the Antelopes at their own 19.

The third touchdown drive went 10 plays and into the second quarter, highlighted by excellent running from Bartlett and Moat. A fourth down lunge by McCook at the 27 kept the drive alive. On first down, Bartlett got the call over left tackle and the high-stepping tailback left Eagle defenders sprawled on the ground as he took the ball the distance. With 10:51 left in the first half, the 'Lopes led 21-0. Later in the same period, the 'Lopes opened up another touchdown drive with 5:04 left in the first half. The four play drive featured running by Brent Jones, Bartlett and was capped by Moat's 13 yard dash to the end zone, breaking two tackles on the

way. Derrick Dunn's extra point put the 'Lopes out front 28-0. The Antelope defense put the pressure on the Eagles, as Gibbs pressured the punter, forcing a fumble which was recovered at the 15 yard line. With 1:28 left in the first half, the 'Lopes put on a three play scoring drive. Bartlett carried three times, finishing off the effort with a four yard spurt behind good blocking over right guard. Dunn's kick made it 35-0. **Second Half Action** Seagraves got a first down at the opening of the second half, before the Antelope defense stopped the drive and set up a punt at the 50 yard line. Lee grabbed it deep in Antelope territory, broke two tackles and raced down the right sideline to the Seagraves 25. The play was called back to the Post 24 for clipping. The drive fizzled, setting up a punt and the defense held again, as Seagraves punted from their own end zone. Again, Lee hauled in the punt, this time racing down the left sideline to the five yard line...the play was called back to the Seagraves 44 for an illegal block. McCook didn't waste any time, rolling right and passing deep to

Steve Price, who caught the pass at the 15 and rambled to the five. Bartlett went over right guard to the four and then over right tackle behind Moat to the end zone. Another Dunn kick made it 42-0 with 2:21 left in the third quarter. Early in the fourth quarter Post made it 48-0 as the reserves showed their muscle. Randy Lewis blasted over left tackle from the 17 to the four, then Anthony Perez took it over right tackle to the end zone...but a penalty brought the ball back to the nine. Perez went around left end to the two and on the second call went over right tackle to the end zone behind blocking by Mark Tyler, Matt Pennell, Steve Price and Robert Gill. The final touchdown came at 1:32 left in the game, beginning with 7:43 on the clock. Quarterback Eric Reece guided the 'Lopes on a 14 play 67 yard effort. Perez and Lewis carried the load, with Lewis getting the final call from the three yard line. The drive was highlighted by five first downs. Dunn put the final point on the scoreboard and the 1986 Post Antelopes celebrated at midfield. The team hosts Colorado City this Friday for Homecoming, kick-off is set for 8 p.m.

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# Colorado City Wolves Visit Antelope Stadium Friday

The Post Antelopes, coming off a 55-0 convincing win over Seagraves, will host the Colorado City Wolves Friday for the 1986 homecoming contest.

"They are really big," Antelope coach David Thompson says, "and we're just going to get out on the field and get better at what we do."

"I'll be their big against our quick," he adds. The Wolves are primarily a passing team, "and it's going to be difficult getting to the quarterback," Thompson says.

The Wolves use a Veer option style offense, running 44 times last week off the right two split. Senior Marty Cleckler (11) is the favorite receiver with good speed and good hands. Junior quarterback Cary Ritchey (10) has good speed and is a good passer.

Ritchey, a 160 pounder, likes to throw the ball to senior split end Reggie Gardner (44), a 190 pounder listed as a good receiver with good speed. The offensive line protects the

passer well and is big with average quickness. All juniors, the line is anchored by 242 pound Corey Flanagan (75), 232 pound Mike Morales (65), 188 pound Derrick Taylor, 148 pound Steve Smith (62) and 205 pound Edward Melendez (51). Split end Paul Arellano (93), a 257 pound senior, splits time with Gardner. The defense is quick and reacts well to pass or run situations. Danny Salazar (55), a 191 pound senior, is the best end. Kickoff at Antelope Stadium is 8 p.m.

## Much Improved Team Effort

"We played real well, got after it both offensively and defensively," Post Antelope coach David Thompson says about last Friday's 55-0 win at Seagraves. "We played like we thought we could...it was a great effort," the coach adds.

He praised the running backs and offensive linemen Ron Graves and Robert Gill at center, Mark Tyler and Greg Benham at guard, Bart Mason and Matt Pennell at tackle, and Steve Price and Marvin Lee at end.

"These guys did a great job of adjusting to Seagraves' defense moving around a lot," Thompson emphasizes. He also praised quarterback Jay

McCook for his passing and the entire defensive squad. "They had 13 gang tackles," Thompson reports, "issuing compliments to Brian Gibbs, Mike Ayala, Tyge Payne, Eddie Moat, Tony Angerer and the secondary players Anthony Perez, Marvin Lee, Richard Curtis and Reynolds Camacho.

Bobby Gonzales and Payne were leading tacklers, credited with 17 assists each. "Every player, with the exception of our two injured, were in the ball game," the coach adds. "Our kicking game was much improved, we handled the punts well and got some good returns," he continued.
