### Telethon, Shindig Success

A total of \$9,010 was raised last Friday night and Saturday for the "Save the Garza" building fund through the telethon and Super Saturday Shindig.

Mayor Giles McCrary pledged to match \$10,000 to the fund when it reached \$10,000...which will set up a total of \$20,000 to begin renovation of the Garza Theater building.

"Although we're a little short," telethon chairman Jack King comments, "I feel certain that enough civic minded folks will donate the remaining \$900 to get us over the mark and be able to take advantage of the generosity of the Mayor."

The Friday night telethon netted \$4,067 in telephone pledges, other donations provided and additional \$1,700.

Tuesday morning Bob Palmer contributed another \$500 along with another citizen's \$25 donation.

Saturday's fund raising, including the dunking booth, raised \$2,717.92.

"We have a bid of \$22,000 to get the building into use," King adds, "and I feel fairly confident now that we can get started."

"I think overall you can say that the telethon and Super Saturday Shindig was a big success!" he adds.

King also says that there has been little response to the more than 650 letters the Caprock Community

Theater mailed recently to Garza County residents urging their help.

"Every five, ten or \$20 contribution is important," he continues, "we really are aiming for this to be a community-wide project... something everyone can say they had a part in... you don't have to be a big contributor to help... we'll take any amount."

And the generosity of Mayor Giles McCrary in matching the \$10,000 is a good example of the spirit of cooperation we enjoy in our community!

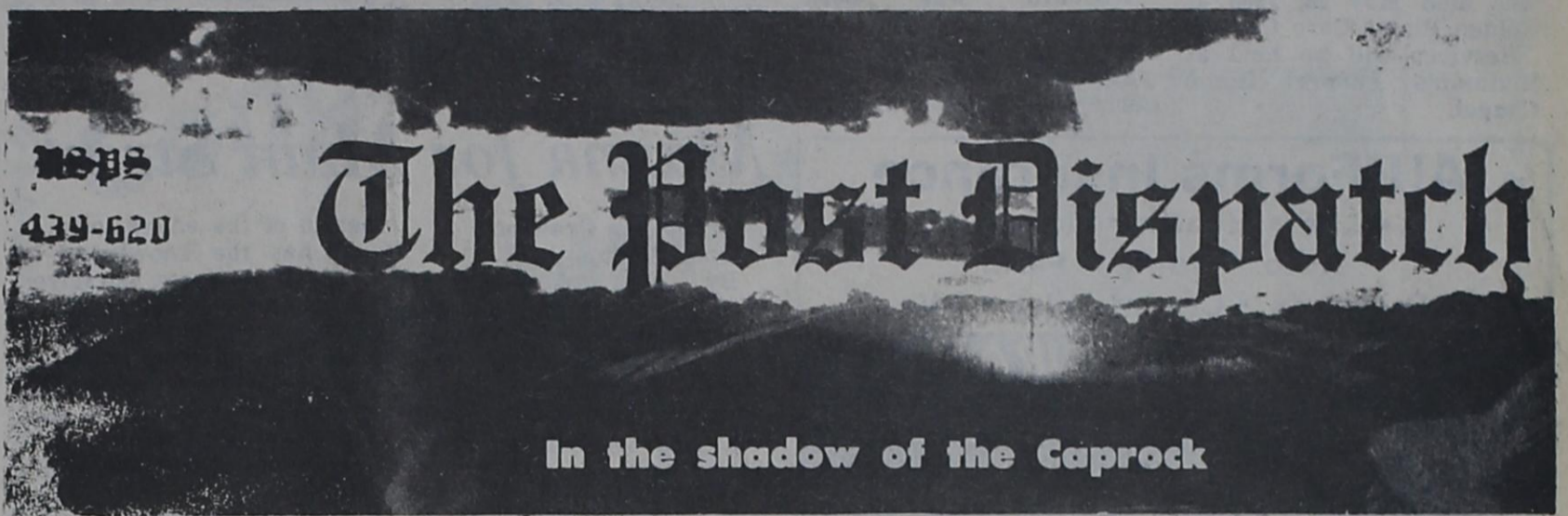
A little storm may be brewing, as residential property owners began receiving notices of their appraised values this week.

## Commissioners Get Good Report on Tax Appraisal Valuations

Estimated appraised values in Garza County this year will be approximately five percent below last year, according to a report from Central Appraisal District director Jean Westfall to the Garza County Commissioners' Court Tuesday morning.

Working with an estimate which pegs mineral evaluations at \$23 per barrel, the appraisal district estimate was higher than expected.

Westfall said part of the reason for the higher valuations is that \$1.1 million in new buildings have been added to the tax roll this past year.

"There have been 17 new houses built in the county," she told commissioners.

"I was also surprised that the total was not lower," she commented.

The report shows Garza County with \$657,377,309 in taxable values, compared to \$685,034,896 in 1985.

After allowing for deductions on oil rig value, suspense and unknowns, the totals drop to \$598,521,529 this year compared to \$609,583,434 last year.

Other taxing entities also show similar overall valuations.

"Well, it just doesn't seem that we would have that much new building going on," Judge Giles Dalby observed, "but its good to see that there is activity like that."

Commissioners took no action on the budget, awaiting the final certified tax appraisal.

Garza County Lake Planning Committee members Wes Burnett and Voda Gradine reported on the public meeting to be held in Granbury in August.

Commissioners had instructed the committee to arrange an exchange of ideas with Granbury officials on a broad range of subjects.

"The big problem we're

having is getting enough motel rooms," Burnett explained, "but we have set late August for the dates... August 21-22 or August 28-29."

He said that an exact date would be announced soon, and that Hood County officials were eager to help.

"The single most recurring theme at our meeting," Burnett added, "was the importance of getting zoning and ordinance controls in the lake development areas before development starts."

Judge Dalby told commissioners that the request for legislation to provide ordinance capability for the county will be introduced in Austin at the next state legislature session.

"All kinds of problems have surfaced in Hood County as a result of not having zoning," Gradine added, "like size of water lines, septic tanks, roads and so forth."

"We want to encourage all elected county, city, school and hospital officials to make plans for this trip," Burnett said, "so much can be learned and help us avoid potential problems as our lakes are developed."

Tax assessor collector Ruth Reno reported to commissioners about the annual conference, where state officials talked about the future use of computers at county level.

She told commissioners

that the state projects 18 million registered vehicles in Texas by the year 2000.

Commissioners approved the hiring of Barry Joplin, a recent SPAC Police Academy graduate, to the position of new jailer.

The certified officer is from Slaton and will be moving to Garza County.

Attending the meeting were Judge Dalby, commissioners Herbert Walls, Tommy Young and Ted Aten and treasurer Voda Gradine.

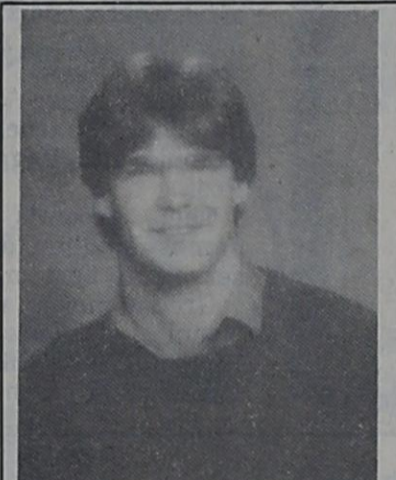

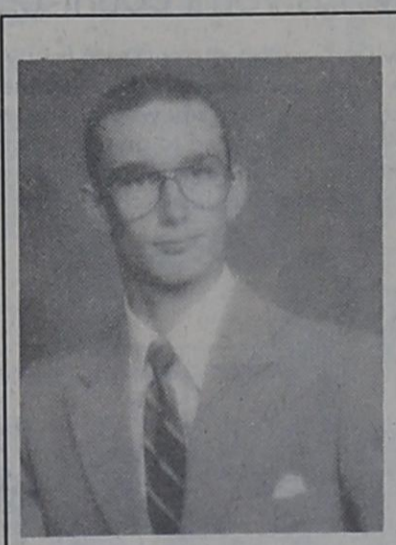

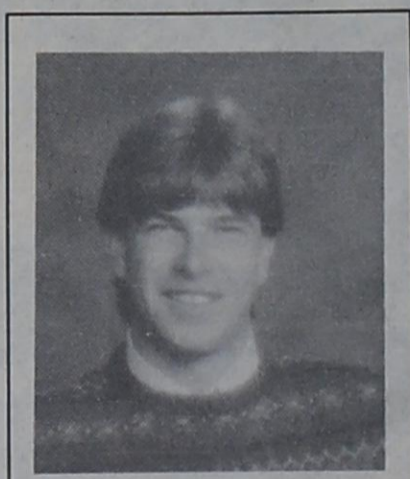

The study of 22 healthy postmenopausal women indicated that bone renewal was enhanced more with milk than carbonate.  
In addition, milk is a less expensive way for older people to get their calcium.  
**'Convenience' Key To New Egg Products**  
New products will likely guide the destiny of the egg industry in Texas and the United States, and a key factor has to be "convenience".  
New egg products and new uses of eggs in foods are being developed to boost the industry, and

convenience seems to be the name of the game.  
Food products made of eggs are being manufactured and frozen and sold for the retail market.  
Fast food operators are asking for ready-to-use egg products.  
Super chilled, pasteurized liquid eggs are being delivered to restaurants in small refrigerated containers.  
These and other practices make eggs more convenient.  
Convenience may exert a greater influence on the decline in egg consumption than health considerations.  
A big trend in foods is to "be fresh, wholesome and natural".  
The shell egg fills this bill, but it is not convenient for the user.  
Egg producers can no longer consider the shell egg as their final market.
