Girl Scouts Help United Way

The 1987 Garza County United Way campaign will continue through this month, with a goal of \$14,750 set to fill the needs of 10 participating agencies.

One of the most important of these, the Girl Scouts, serves approximately 120 young people in Garza County.

The budget this year for Girl Scouts is \$3,500.

Last year Post had nine troops with 114 girls and 37 adults.

Troops included Daisy Girl Scouts, kindergarten; Brownie Girl Scouts, first to third grades; Junior Girl Scouts, fourth to sixth grades and Cadette and Senior Girl Scouts, junior and senior high grades.

Eleven of the troop members joined 58 Cadettes for the Heritage trip to Austin and San Antonio in June.

Pat Cruse of Post was one of five trip leaders with the girls.

Cadettes were from Denver City, Dimmitt, Friona, Levelland, Littlefield, Lubbock, Morton and Slaton.

Three Brownie troops attended the Brownie Play Day at Camp Rio Blanco and in November the Post Cadette troops will host a style show in Post for Cadettes and Seniors throughout the Caprock Girl Scout Council.

Last year 40 training events were held with 25 leaders from Post participating.



England reported on the banquet.


The court agreed to pay for the carpeted area of the Community Center which will be used by England for an adult educational program at Christmas time.

Norm Cash

Local Great Drowns

Norm Cash died Sunday, October 12, of an apparent drowning in northern Lake Michigan.

Cash was born in Justiceburg and attended high school in Post.

After high school he attended San Angelo Junior College where he played football.

Cash then transferred to Sul Ross College in Alpine where he played both football and baseball.

He earned All-Lone Star Conference running back while at Sul Ross.

After college Cash turned down the Chicago Bears and elected to play baseball signing a contract with the Chicago White Sox.

He was traded to the Detroit Tigers.

In 1961 Cash won the American League batting

title averaging .361.

He also lead the league with 193 hits and 41 home runs, a record for a left-handed Detroit batter.

Cash hit a total of 377 career home runs and was the first Tiger to hit a home run over the roof at Tiger Stadium, a feat he performed three other times.

He played for the 1968 World Series Champions in Detroit and also played for the White Sox in 1959 World Series.

He is survived by his wife Dorothy, one son, Jay, of Austin and a daughter, Julie Day, of San Angelo.

He is also survived by his parents, Bandy and Mildred Cash of Justiceburg, one brother, Clyde, of Post and one grandson, Justin, of San Angelo.



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Antelopes Whip Idalou 26-7 to Stay in District Race

The defense set the stage early in last Friday's 26-7 win at Idalou as the Post Antelopes set up a showdown this Friday with Denver City for the district race.

Getting a slow start offensively, the Antelope defense held its ground, finding Idalou running back Paul Wayne Jones' number.

Quarterback Jay McCook threw three touchdown passes, connecting twice to Marvin Lee and once to Ben Kirkpatrick.

After exchanging punts twice, the 'Lopes got on the board first late in the first quarter.

The one play touchdown drive followed a stiff 'Lope defensive effort.

The defense, led by key plays by Kirkpatrick, Blair Didway, Greg Windham, Clay Cowdrey and Bobby Gonzales, forced Idalou to punt on fourth down from their own 12 yard line.

Idalou's Wesley Dawson shanked the punt into a strong

southerly breeze and watched the ball go out of bounds at his own 24 yard line.

With 4:05 left in the first quarter, McCook rolled to his left and lofted the ball to Lee who made a great catch in the end zone for the touchdown.

The point after kick was wide right and the 'Lopes led 6-0 with 3:59 on the clock.

Idalou took a page out of the Post kickoff return book and almost lost the ball.

Randy Lewis broke up the "star burst" when he popped Idalou's Adrian Hernandez before the ball could be handed off.

Idalou recovered the loose football, but the fierce tackle slowed down the Wildcats.

The 'Lope defense continued to dominate and when a field goal attempt by the Wildcats failed on fourth down from the Post 26, McCook went to work again.

With 3:57 left in the first half, the Antelope offense finally got

on track, unleashing an 11 play drive with five first downs.

The running attack featured Kirkpatrick, Anthony Perez, McCook and Lewis getting the touchdown from four yards out.

He crossed the goal line with 37 seconds left in the first half.

First downs came on a sweep by Perez around right end to the Post 44, a key third down conversion with Perez going over left tackle to the Idalou 39, a pass to Kirkpatrick to the 29, a sprint draw to Perez over left guard to the 16 and a quarterback keeper around right end to the four.

The two point conversion attempt failed and the defense held the Wildcats as time ran out in the first half.

Second Half Action

Idalou mounted a serious threat at the opening of the second half, the big play coming on second down from the Wildcat 37 as Steven Gill broke into the secondary carrying the ball to the Post 32.

Jones was stopped three times and on third down Post's Robert Gill brought Jones down at the 23.

Quarterback Tracy Saul pulled the option around his left end to the 17, but he play was called back on a holding penalty to the 33.

The fourth down situation forced a pass, and with Kirkpatrick in his face, Saul threw downfield as Gonzales broke up the pass play.

An exchange of punts followed and with 3:26 left in the third quarter, the 'Lopes started their third touchdown drive from their own 29.

The big defensive play came on third down as Kirkpatrick slammed Saul to the ground at the Post 49, setting up the punt.

Perez blasted over right guard on first down to the 43, took a pitch out around left end to the 46 and Kirkpatrick slammed over right guard to the 49.

On third down McCook rolled to his right, threw the ball to Lee at the Idalou 35 who was headed across the field to his right.

The speedy split end reversed his field, leaving defenders on the ground, as he headed to the left toward the end zone, giving the 'Lopes an 18-0 lead with 1:49 left in the third quarter.

Perez went over left tackle for the two point conversion.

On the next possession Idalou was forced to punt and Lee took the ball in at the Post 25, returning it down the left sideline to the 39, and as he came down the ball was stripped to the ground, giving the Wildcats

possession as the fourth quarter opened.

Six plays later Jones went over right guard from the 11 to get Idalou's lone score.

The point after cut the 'Lope lead to 20-7.

Post scored again with 3:40 remaining in the game on a drive that started with 4:42 following a fumble recovery by Richard Curtis at the Idalou 36 yard line.

The fumble was set up on a bad pitchout to Bucky Hernandez.

A swarm of Antelopes jumped on the ball as Curtis finally found the slippery prize.

Four plays later McCook and Kirkpatrick left no doubt as to the outcome of the contest.


McCook took the option around his right end and with extra effort got a first down at the 19.

Then he rolled to his left and with good pass protection rifled the ball to Kirkpatrick who got a clearing block from Lee and bulled his way down the left sideline to the end zone.

The two point conversion attempt by McCook on an option around right end failed.

Fullback Eric Falkenberg (32) is used primarily as a blocker but has good speed also.


The Mustangs operate from an I Pro Right offensive alignment.
