United Way Campaign Continues

The 1987 Garza County United Way campaign continues through this month, with a goal of \$14,750.

One of the agencies which benefits from contributions to the United Way is the Garza County Child Welfare Board.

This agency has been budgeted to receive \$500 to support its efforts next year.

The Garza County Child Welfare Board receives no governmental financial aid at all, depending entirely on

private donations and contributions.

Last year was the first time this agency was supported by the United Way.

The funds are reserved for various contingencies, including:

* Birthday and Christmas presents for foster children in the care of the Child Welfare Board.

* Medical expenses for foster children, or other children whose parents are unable to pay for required

medical attention.

* Educational programs, such as parenting education, drug and alcohol abuse prevention, physical and sexual abuse prevention.

* Emergency needs identified by the Child Protection Worker.

* Special events for foster children, such as the annual picnic in Lubbock for hundreds of foster children and parents on the South Plains.

* Meeting expenses on rare occasions for delegates to the state training events.

Thompson is the Educational Diagnostician and Counselor for the district and will explain the statistical results of the Competency Test of Basic Skills and the TEAMS test.

Attending the meeting were Shiver and board members Pru Basquez, Tom Middleton, Jimmie Bartlett and Jack Kirkpatrick.

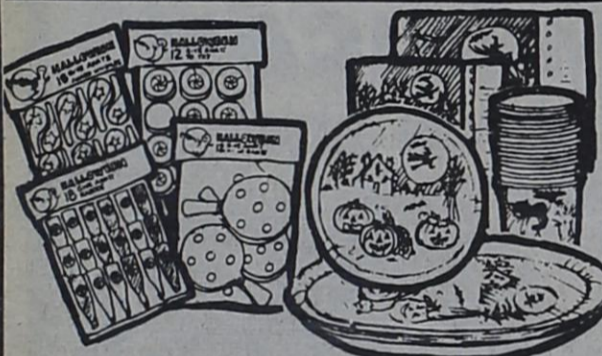

In 1983 Hardin was promoted to President at Idalou State Bank.

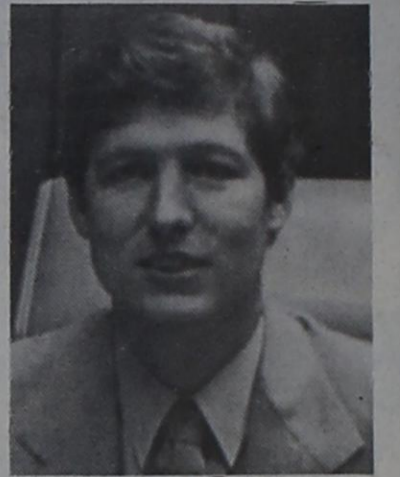
Hardin then moved to Denning, New Mexico in 1985 to be president of United New Mexico at Mimberes Valley bank.
