Kay Brooks, state president of the Ladies Auxiliary to the VFW, is also attending the convention.

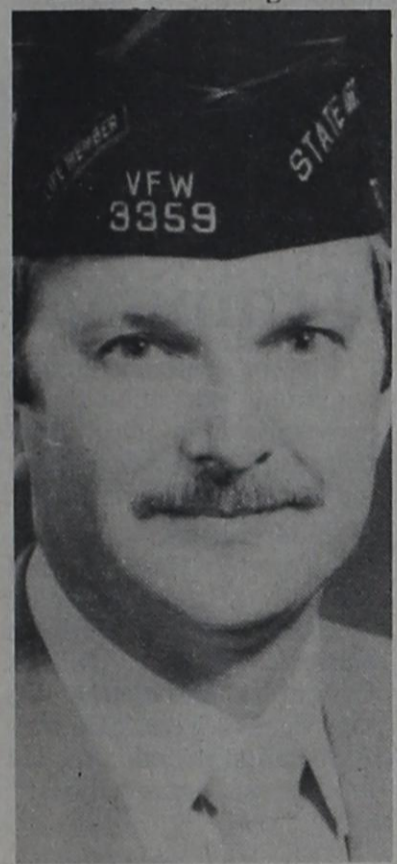
Activities open Saturday with registration from 4-7 p.m., followed by a social hour from 5 to 7 p.m.

Entries are to be picked up between 6 p.m. and 9 p.m. November 9.

Entry receipt must be presented to pick up the entry.

All sales made through the show are subject to a 15% sales commission.

The Caprock Photographers will not be responsible for any lost, damaged, or unclaimed entries.

Photographs must be original works of the exhibitor and must be in good taste.

The Caprock Photographers will not accept photographs considered to be in poor taste, contain nudity or are not original in concept or execution.

Minimum size of photograph is 7"x10" and maximum is 24"x36" except for miniatures which are 5"x7" and below.

Photographs must be mounted, matted or framed

suitably for hanging, with the hanger 2" below the top.

Name, title, address and price or NFS must be on the back of each entry.

The judges decisions are final and the judge reserved the right not to give awards in a category if no entries are deemed worth.

People are asked to donate any kinds of toys, bicycles or riding toys that can be refurbished and material so that doll clothes can be made.

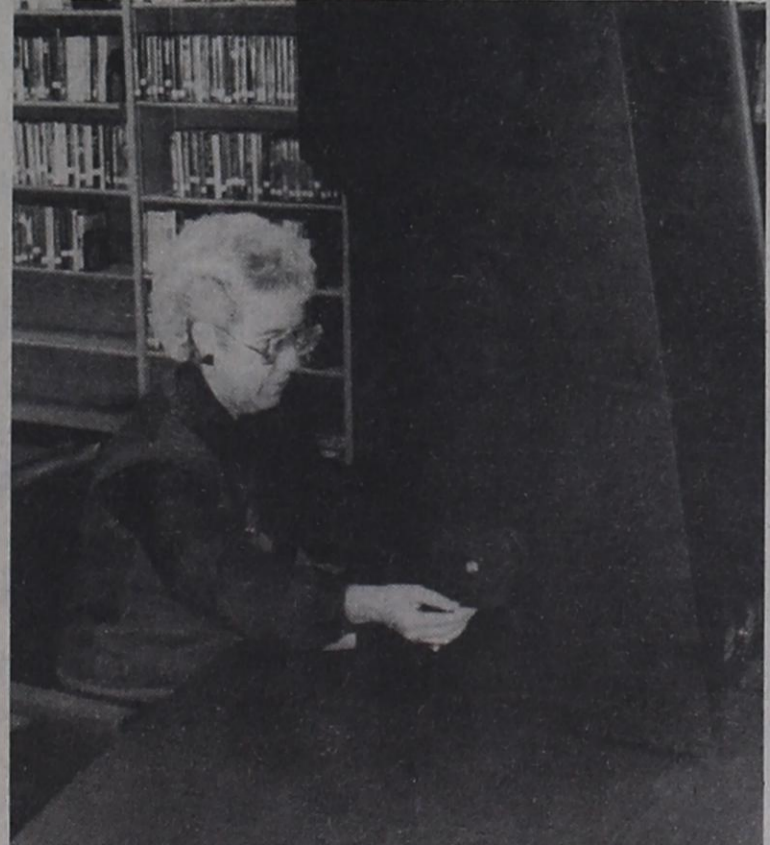
If you have items to give to the Lion's Club you can contact Jack Chambliss at 495-2166 or Leon Clary at 495-2291.

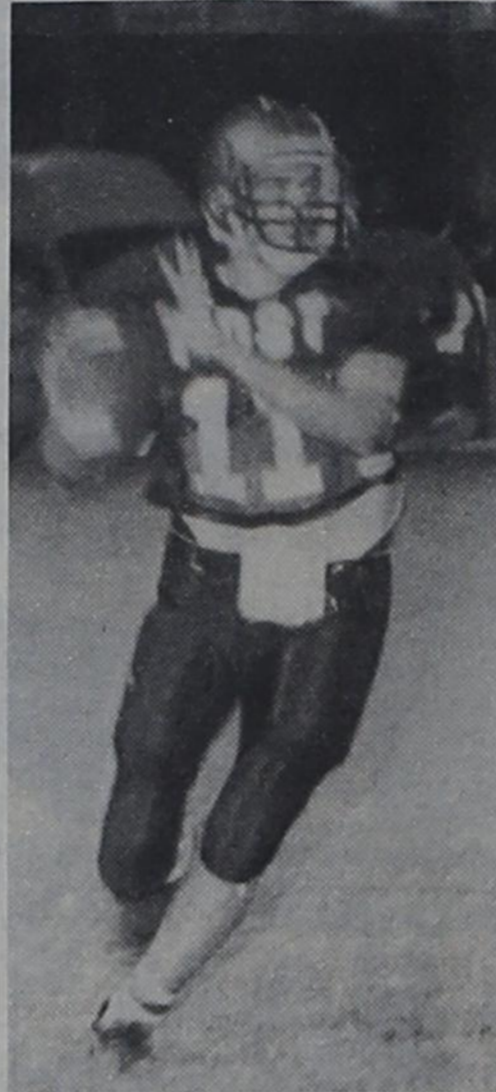

'Lopes Control Indians 37-6

Neither team will make the playoffs this year, but that didn't dampen the enthusiasm here last Friday night when the Post Antelopes whipped the Seminole Indians 37-6.

The Indians, using a straight T formation, put together a strong showing and early in the third quarter closed to within six points of the Antelopes.

Post found its offense and the defense figured out the T formation, taking control of the game in the third quarter.

The Antelopes ripped off a 64 yard touchdown drive from the opening kickoff to set the pace.

Randy Lewis fell on the squib kick at the Post 36 and on first down quarterback Jay McCook rolled to his left and completed a "picture perfect" pass to tight end Steve Price at the 45, who took the ball to the Seminole 43.

Tailback Mike Bartlett zipped past defenders for another first down to the 23.

McCook connected with Price for another first down at the nine.

Lewis went over left guard to the seven, a penalty put the fall at the 3, Bartlett went to the one and on third down McCook pulled the option around right end to the end zone.

With 9:34 on the clock, the 'Lopes led 6-0 and as was the case after all but the final touchdown, were unable to pick up the two point conversion.

The Indians mounted a 13 play drive that finally fizzled on fourth down from the Post 25.

Defensive efforts by Reynolds Camacho, Clay Cowdrey, Michael Ayala and Anthony Perez contributed in the 'Lope stand.

The 'Lopes punted after three downs and on second down from the Seminole 42, quarterback Dale Roberts fumbled the snap and Cowdrey came up with the ball at the Indian 45.

With 1:30 left in the first quarter, Post opened up a seven play drive to paydirt, capped by Bartlett's six yard scamper with 11:05 left in the first half.

The drive featured running by Lewis, Ben Kirkpatrick, Bartlett and a pass reception by Price.

A defensive struggle continued through the remainder of the first half, highlighted by Marvin Lee's pass interception in the end zone.

Seminole's 15 play drive got to the Post nine yard line and on first down Roberts lofted a pass to Jeff Aldridge in the left end zone corner as Lee stepped in front to stop the Indians.

Unable to get a first down, the 'Lopes punted on fourth down and the defense again backed up the wall.

Seminole controlled the ball for 12 plays, getting a key first down on fourth down from the 16 as Roberts scrambled out of the grasp of 'Lopes, going out of bounds at the Post 16 yard line with 34 seconds left in the half.

The next three plays were stopped by the 'Lope defense with Ayala and Bobby Gonzales getting Jaime Nave on second down at the 11.

Roberts couldn't get by defenders on third down, going out at the nine.

On fourth down he rolled to his right and under pressure from Kirkpatrick, threw an incomplete pass to give the ball back to the Antelopes with seven seconds left in the half.

Second Half Action

Seminole came roaring back following the second half opening kickoff, scoring with 7:59 left in the third quarter.

The nine play drive was sealed by Nave going over left tackle to the end zone.

The extra point attempt was muffed on the snap.

Leading 12-6, with the Indians smelling upset, the 'Lope offense came out smokin'.

Lewis again recovered the squib kick for the 'Lopes at the Post 36.

Bartlett took the pitchout around left end to the 45.

On second down Bartlett went over right guard to the 49.

On first down McCook pitched the ball back to Kirkpatrick, who looked downfield and threw the ball to Lee who had gotten past his defender.

Lee slowed down long enough to catch the ball at the 10 yard line, then raced into the end zone for the touchdown.

With 6:54 left in the third quarter the 'Lopes led 18-6.

An unsportsmanlike conduct call after the play put the ball at the Post 25 for the following kickoff.

Three plays later Richard Curtis intercepted a Roberts pass at the Post 17 yard line to set up the next Antelope touchdown drive.

Bartlett went to the 23, Lewis to the 30 and Bartlett to the 40.

On first down Bartlett took the sprint draw over right guard to the Seminole 32.

A pass was deflected and on second down Kirkpatrick blasted through the line of scrimmage, broke two tackles and turned on the acceleration going the distance for the touchdown.

With 3:41 left in the third quarter the Antelope offense had given the defense breathing room with a 24-6 lead.

The next touchdown drive followed Indian quarterback Jeff Condit's fumble on a handoff exchange to Ty Bryson, which was recovered by Tony Angerer at the Seminole 47.

With 11:14 left in the game, the 'Lopes began a six play scoring drive featuring a pass and run combination to Lee setting up a first down at the 31.

Bartlett went to the 24, Lewis ripped through to the eight, Bartlett went to the six, Lewis carried to the four and on third down Bartlett took the pitchout over right tackle to the end zone.

Again, the two point conversion failed, the 'Lopes led 30-6.

Seminole's next drive was snuffed on a third down pass play deep in Antelope territory when Lee got his second interception at the Post 25 and brought it back to the 49.

An 11 play drive put the final touchdown on the scoreboard.

The 51 yard drive featured running by Kirkpatrick, Anthony Perez, Lewis, Bartlett and a key fourth down pass reception by Lee at the 10 yard line, going out of bounds at the seven.

Bartlett got the touchdown call over left guard from the one yard line on fourth down with 11 seconds left in the game.

Kirkpatrick kicked the extra point.

The Indians had one more play with nine seconds, ending with quarterback Condit stumbling to the ground at the Seminole 24 yard line.

The 'Lopes close out the 1986 season this Friday at Cooper.

"We just couldn't get any type of offense going in the second half," he says about the 16-8 loss.

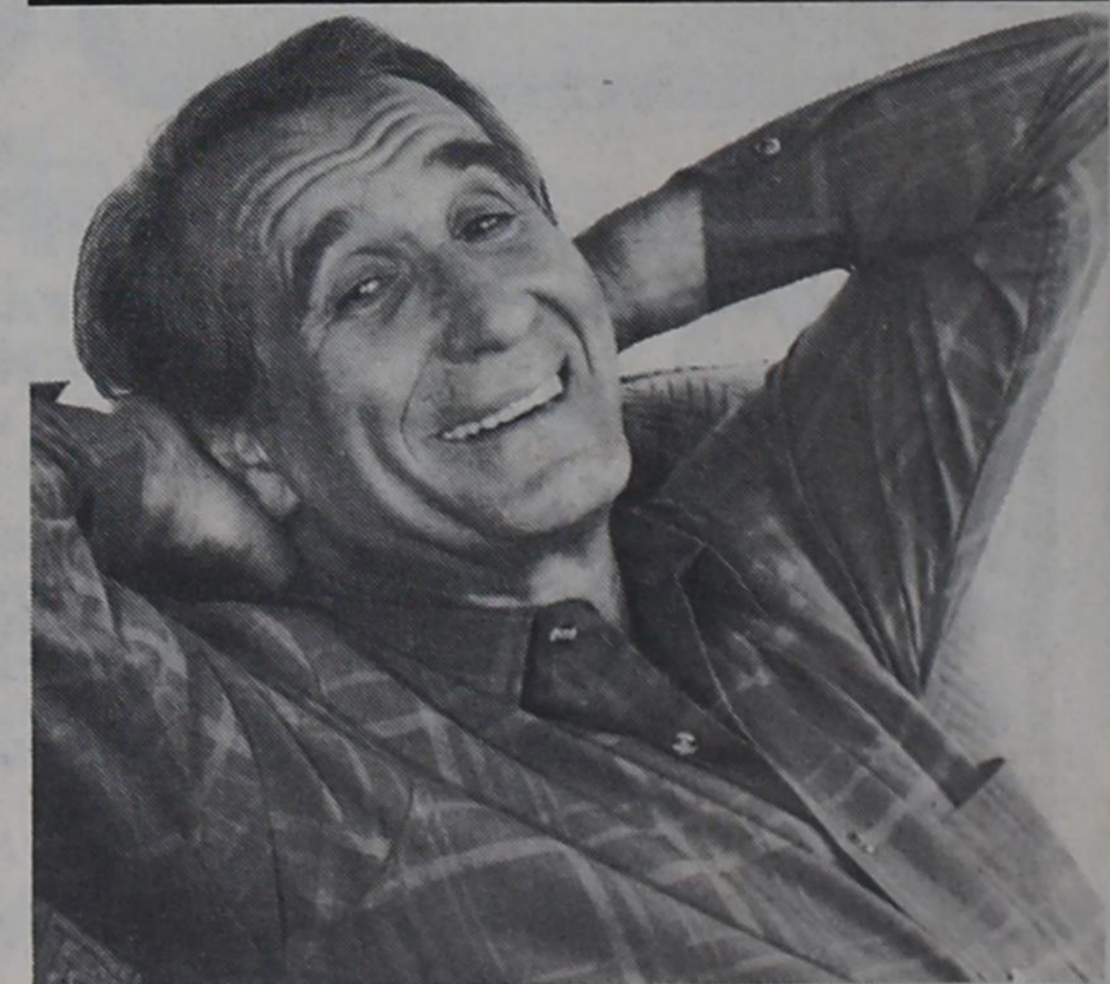
The touchdown came on an 11 yard run by Derrick Oden, with quarterback Trevor Thuet hitting Richard Hudman for a two-point conversion pass completion.

Tony Hubbard ended the scoring with a five yard run. The PAT was missed leaving the score 35-8.

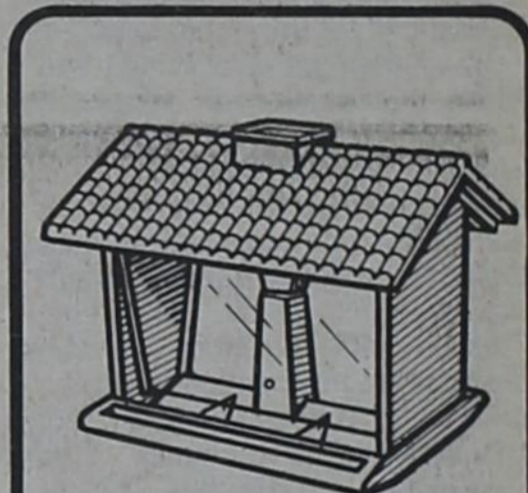
Whitharral scored late in the fourth quarter but it proved to little to late with Southland winning 35-16.

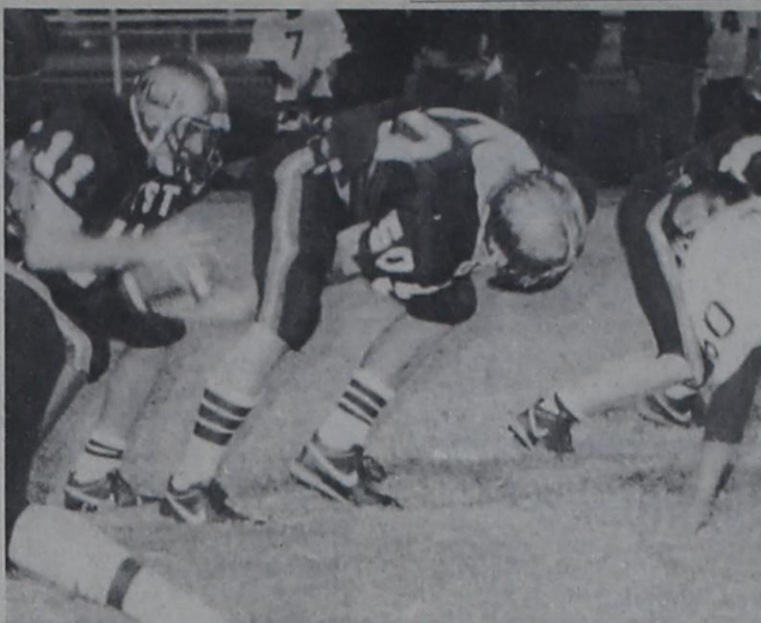

This year's team, its coaches, parents and fans, all of course are disappointed that the season will end this Friday.

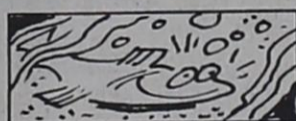
We have enjoyed being in the post season playoffs the past four years, and now we will have to be content to
