Some have asked me this past week about my response to President Reagan's speech concerning the Iranian mess.

Also, from my own experiences in government, I watched and realized that his message had the same ring of double speak the government is so good at throwing to the masses.

Having told the world for years that the Iranians are instigators of terror and the prime culprits in the hostages now being held...the speech writers now position the commander to be able to say just about the opposite...all with tremendous believability.

If it wasn't such a serious situation it would be downright humorous.

Now, before you attack me for comparing President Reagan

to Hitler, let me emphasize that it is the propaganda that I am comparing.

Only polished propagandists could turn such a dramatic turnaround in public policy and make it sound like everything is okay.

Had this same secret activity been blamed on former President Carter, the howling of the conservatives and Reaganites would be deafening.

Manipulating the media, particularly television, is a major emphasis of professional public relations consultants and particularly those who get their pay from the government.

Keeping the facts from the people is of primary importance...you only have to look at the Vietnam era to realize the truth of that reality.

I confess, I was one of the best at this ploy as an Air Force officer.

I believed that what I did in the line of duty was in the best interest of the country and the Air Force.

Otherwise, I would have quit long before I did.

I am sure that the president and his advisors also believe they are doing what is best for the nation.

It is not their motives I question.

It is their withholding of important information to the people which I feel is wrong.

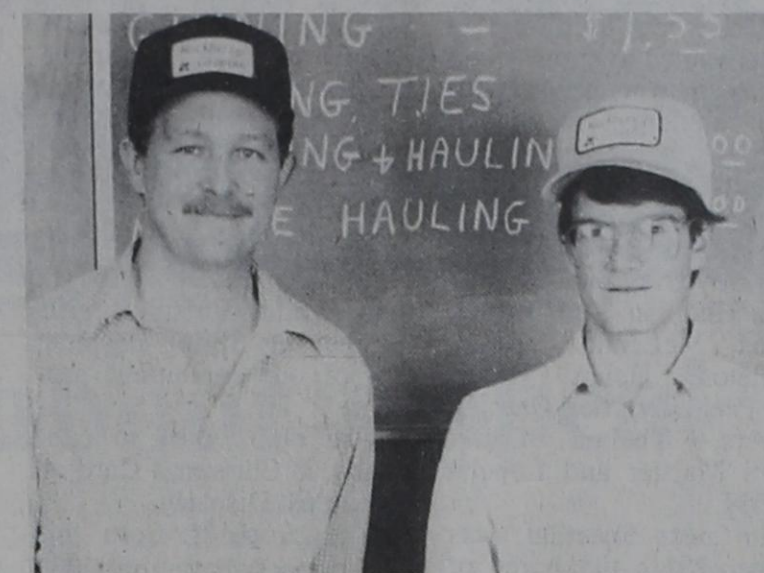

She believed in Black Draught and castor oil and soaking hurt places in kerosene.

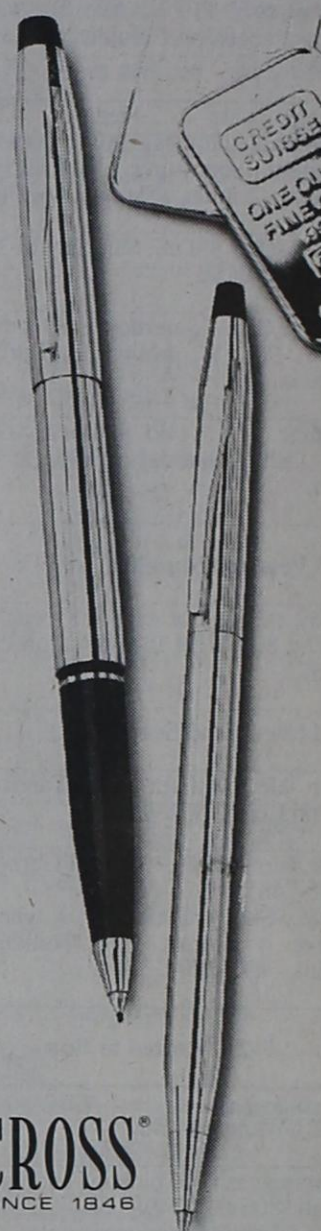
To the children of today this way of life would seem as fiction, no electricity, no car, no indoor plumbing.

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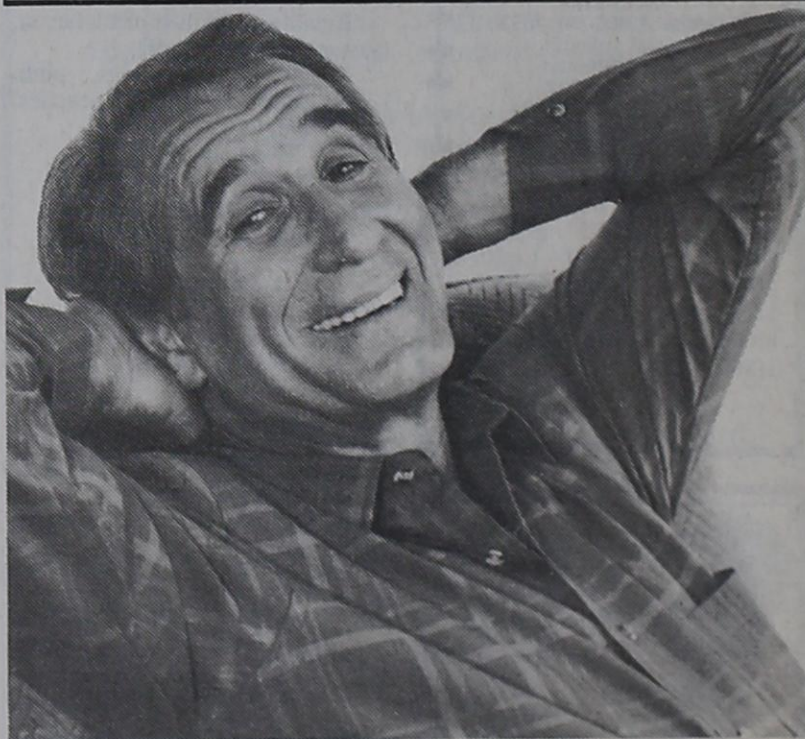
