## Special Calendar Helps Museum

The early years of Post City, Texas - as seen through records of the old Double U Company - are depicted in a 1987 fundraising calendar published for the Garza County Historical Commission.

Twelve architectural drafts of Post City, including a 1909 map, a rendering of the old stone gateway to Post City, town houses and a model view of a Plains' farm accompany a daily listing of significant Post City dates from the 1906 to 1915 period.

It is during this time that the Double U Company built the infrastructure of Post City as part of C.W. Post's land colonization effort. Double U Company records - now housed at the Southwest Collection, Texas Tech University - provide the information and drawings contained in the calendar.

The calendar, *Post Texas: The Gateway to the Plains*, sells for \$4.95 and may be obtained at the Post Chamber of Commerce, First National Bank, the Garza County Museum, the Post Public Library, Post Art Guild, or Fort Justice with proceeds benefitting the Garza County Historical Commission.

Post City was different from most land colonization projects in that it was a totally planned settlement. Under the vigilant eyes of C.W. Post, the Double U Company constructed a community representative of urban American styles in the early 20th Century.

Electricity, telephone service and running water were conveniences that made Post City a modern town.

Wide city streets were divided by parklets where poplar and locust trees shaded plantings of verbena.

A nursery west of town supplied apple trees for the three-acre orchards on each Plains farm. Grapes and watermelon flourished in the sandy soil below the Caprock while experiments in raising hogs on sorghum feed - a rough precursor to the modern feedlot industry - took place on the Plains.

C.W. Post bought 333 square miles of ranchland on or near the Caprock in Garza County in 1906.

By the summer of 1907, Double U Company employees were breaking sod on the Plains and rapidly constructing houses in town.

A local sandstone quarry provided stone for the downtown business district which consisted of mercantile outlets originally owned and operated by the Double U Company.

At first, Post City was a company town.

C.W. Post intended to control development, prevent the haphazard, unsightly patterns common to most western communities, and avoid problems associated with land speculators.

C.W. Post - inventor, Fort Worth real estate developer and cereal foods manufacturer - restricted lot sales to those who intended to build and stay.

In return, he invested in the infrastructure - the water mains, store buildings, houses and other facsimiles of a modern town.

The centerpiece of the colonization effort were the C.W. Post Home Farms.

These were built above the Caprock and consisted of a four room house, sheds, water supply, orchard, truck patch, pasture and broken land.

The farms were worked for several years before Double U Company salesmen canvassed the state of Texas seeking purchasers, providing emigrants a proven method for earning a living and making the land pay-

ments that would win them West Texas land.

In 1911, outside investors built a cotton gin and a cotton mill.

Plans called for a meat-packing plant - which failed to materialize - and a brick factory.

Through the financial support of C.W. Post, the Double U Company participated in rainmaking experiments between 1910 to 1914.

Indeed, the calendar contains a diagram of the second shooting location which was established 10 miles south of Post in 1912.

Water was supplied to town by an engineering feat that drew groundwater from windmills on the Plains and piped it to a reservoir beneath the lip of the Caprock.

From here, it flowed under natural pressure into town.

A rendering of the first reservoir, meticulously as-

sembled in 1909 by stonemasons, is included in the calendar.

The reservoir roof later leaked and a second reservoir replaced the first in 1910 although both were considered marvels of engineering in their time.

When land sales began in 1914, Post City had evolved from a company town into a community of independent entrepreneurs.

The drawings have their own history.

Post Mayor Giles McCrary found the original renderings in the basement of the old Double U Company building in 1984 and donated them to Texas Tech.

City councilwoman Maxine Earl subsequently sought ways to bring them to the attention of Garza County citizens.

The result is contained in the calendar: *Post City: The Gateway to the Plains*.

"I have worked with him only a short time but he is a tremendously hard worker and very dedicated to his singing," Jones stated.

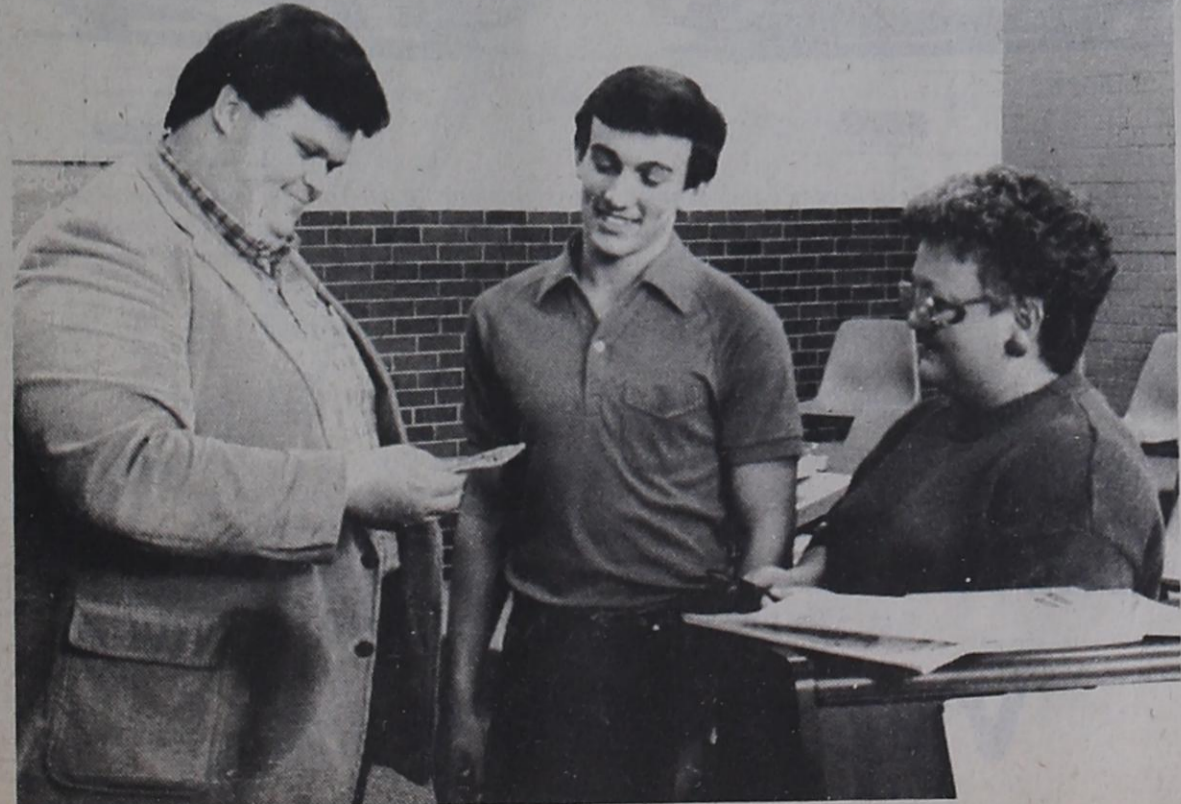
Jones pointed out Reece's work on the languages (German, Latin, etc.) saying that his "diction is impeccable" and has probably been a big reason for his success so far.

Altering Holiday Foods for Health  
 You don't need to give up favorite holiday foods to follow today's dietary guidelines.

Dietary guidelines from the U.S. Departments of Agriculture and Health and Human Services, and those from major health organizations, recommend consumption of fat, sugar and salt while increasing the amount of fiber in our diets.

Making an effort to eat nutritiously doesn't have to put a damper on your holiday season since relatively simple modifications can reduce the fat and total calories in many favorite foods, without significantly affecting their taste.

Sugar can be reduced by a third in many holiday desserts.

If a recipe calls for 1 cup sugar, for example, use 2/3 cup.

This works best in fruit-based recipes and in making puddings and custards.

The sugar in cookies and cakes can also be reduced, but requires some experimenting to find an appropriate level.

Likewise, fat can be reduced by a third in gravies,

sauses, puddings and quick breads.

Omit salt or reduce it by half and add more spices and herbs to increase flavor.

To increase fiber intake, substitute whole grain flour for 1/4 to 1/2 of the refined flour in holiday baking.

If a recipe calls for 3 cups all-purpose flour, use 3/4 whole grain flour and 2 1/4 cups all-purpose flour.

Yogurt or cottage cheese may be substituted for sour cream in some recipes for sauces, dips, dressings and main dishes.

Use skim rather than whole milk and in some recipes calling for whipped cream, substitute evaporated milk.

Take the time to modify favorite holiday recipes this year and you'll have a healthier alternative to hand down as part of your family tradition.
