## Two Arrested in School Burglary

Garza County sheriff's deputies along with a Lubbock County Sheriff's Department undercover agent completed a search warrant last Friday in Lubbock, arresting a Post man and woman in connection with the recent theft of computer equipment from the Post elementary school.

Arrested and charged with possession of stolen property were Gerald Seals and Bertha McDougale.

McDougale is being held without bond and Seals is on a \$50,000 bond. Both were in the Lubbock County Jail Tuesday morning, expected to be transferred to Post.

According to investigating officers, information received earlier last week provided enough evidence to secure a search warrant from Lubbock County Justice of the Peace L.J. Blalack at the 2105 14th St. residence in Lubbock.

Officers found the two suspects with three computers and a 25 inch color television set that had been stolen from the school December 3.

Seals has also been charged with burglary in the incident.

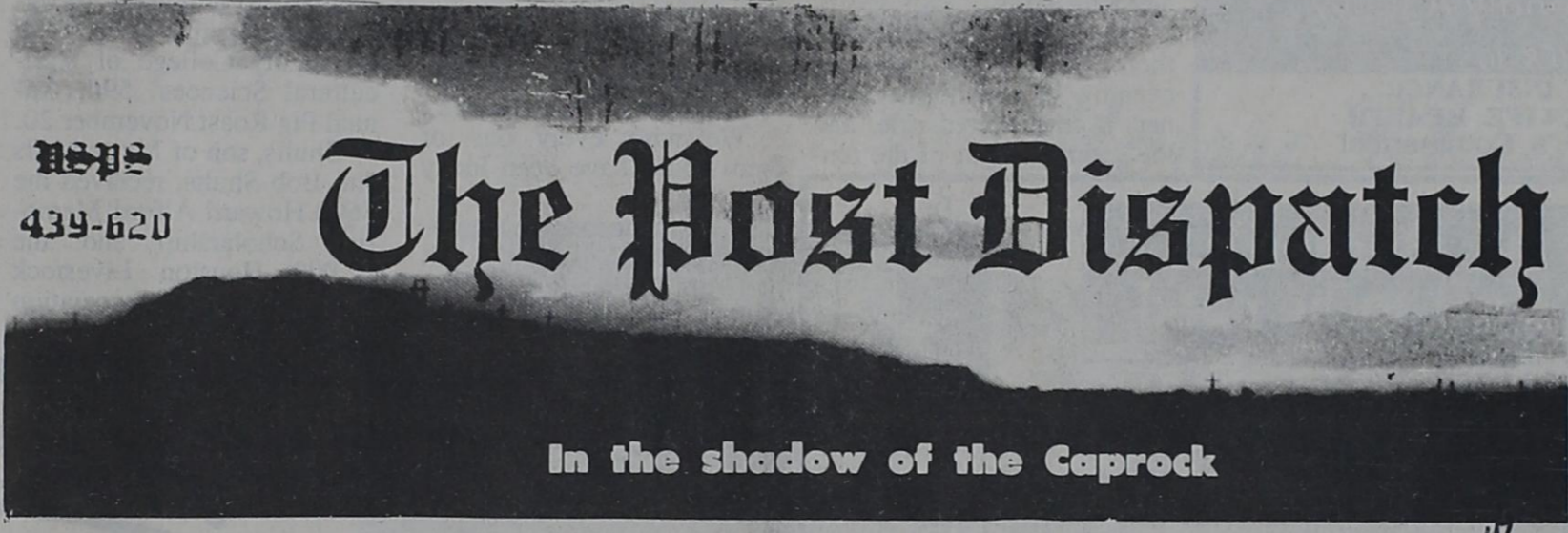
All charges have been filed in 106th District Court in Post.

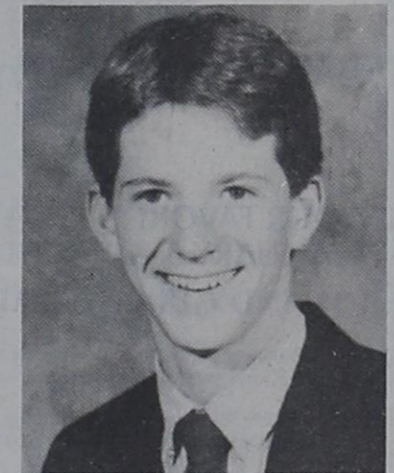

Derick plans to attend Texas A&M University, majoring in agriculture. He is a nine year Garza County 4-H member.

He said that two years ago he selected a piglet from a litter that he wanted to show in the Houston Livestock Show.

A man who came to the family farm to buy barrows offered to buy his show animal.

"I declined his offer, but he kept raising it from his previous offer," Derick said.

"The hospital here is in a little better position than other hospitals in the area having a situation with a little more solid cash," said Anderson.

No action was taken since it was not on the agenda for this meeting.

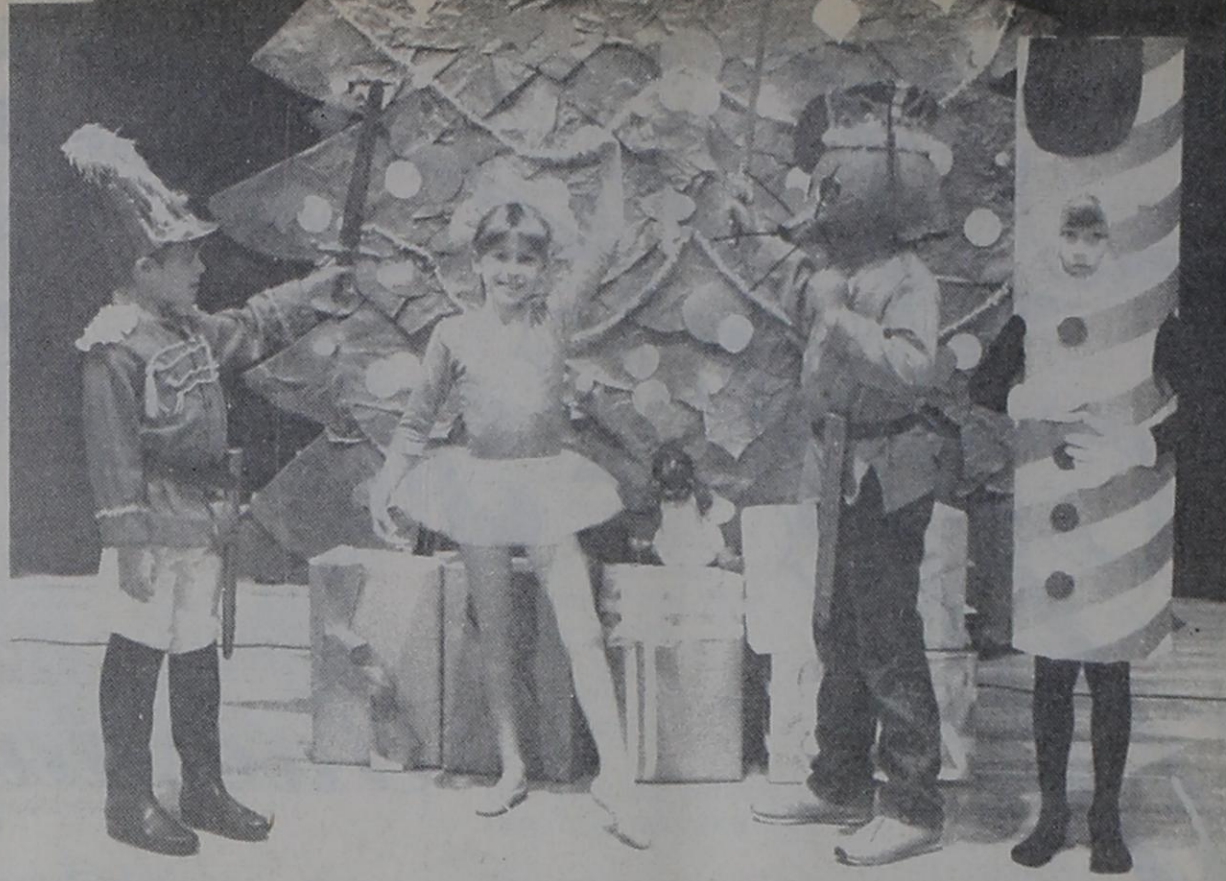

### Post Oil and Gas

Fred G. Yates Inc. of Roswell, New Mex., has completed a work-over operation at the No. 1 Greenkirk.

The wildcat well is located four miles southeast of Post. Drillsite is in the GH&H Survey.

The well flowed 145 barrels of oil per day from perforations in the Strawn Formation, 7,937 1/2 to 7,942 1/2 feet into the wellbore. Production tests were run on a 15/64-in. choke.

The same operator previously completed the well in April of this year, and it flowed 322 barrels of oil per day from perforations in the Ellenburger Formation at 8,303 to 8,334 feet into the hole.

Total drilling depth was not revealed.

The well is located about one-half mile southeast of production in the Kirkpatrick Field.

Two, 3,700-ft. developmental wells are planned by Jim & Carolyn Matthews of Lubbock at drillsites two miles northeast of Post.

The locations are in a 160-acre lease in Garza county's K. Aycock Survey.

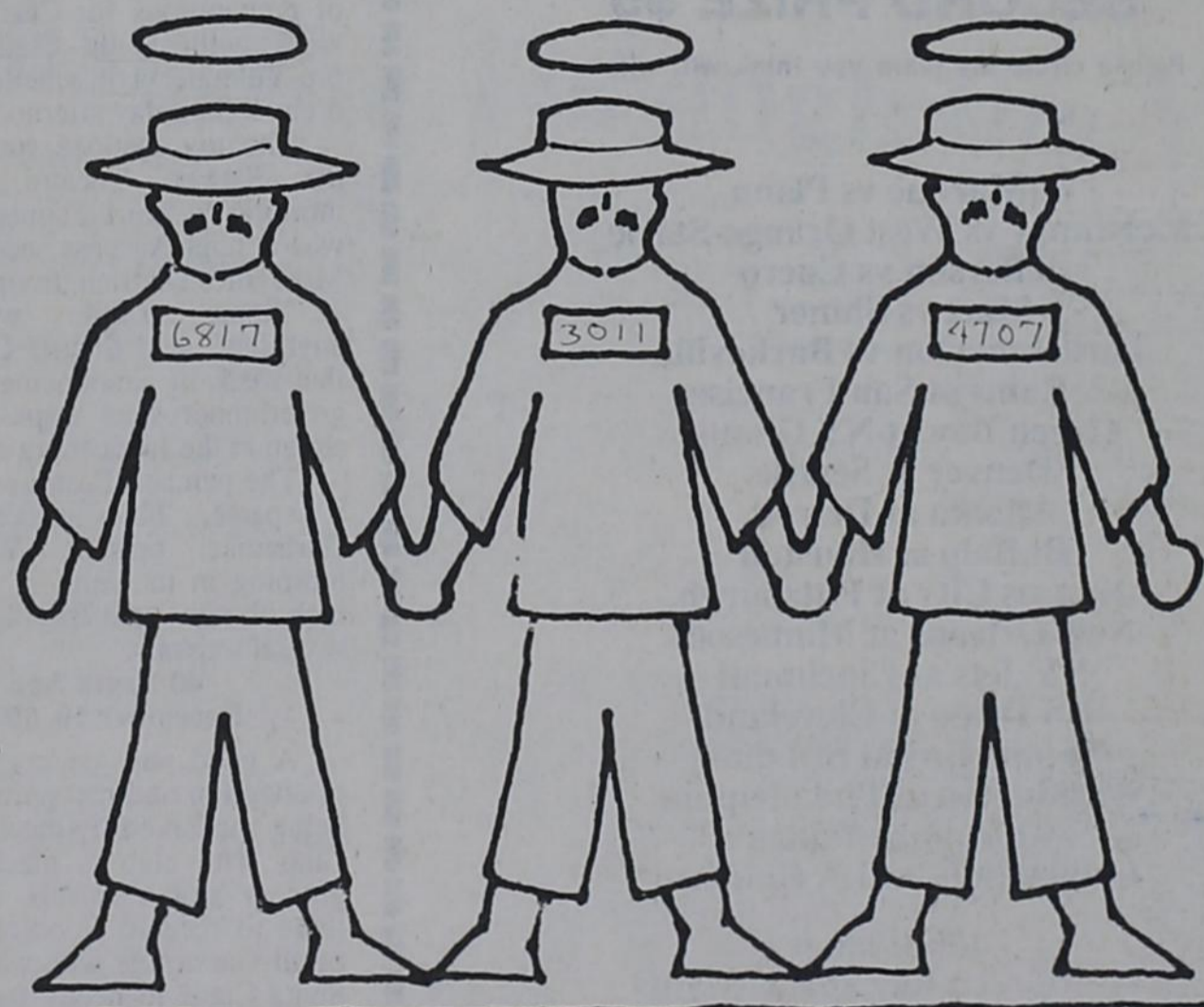

**Don't Overlook Gift Expenses**  
When it comes time to draw up a family budget, gift and card ex-

penses are often overlooked.

Yet these items may be taking up more of the family's spending money than you realize.

Think back on family gift expenses for the past six months. The anticipate your gift-givings for the next six months:

How much money is available to spend for gifts and cards?

What other costs, such as wrapping paper, postage or decorations are also a part of gift-giving expenses?

How many friends and relatives should we remember, and how?

With the answers to these questions in mind, you can plan ahead to keep gift-giving in line with other expenses and within

your family budget.

Here are some money-saving suggestions to take gift budgeting further.

Buy gifts judiciously. You can take advantage of sales and specials.

Use your imagination, creativity and resources. Set several smaller gifts than one large one; to combine made gifts with those you buy to find a new and unique item.

Make gift if sew, bake, paint or have other skills.

Change cooking methods to reduce fat. Start by staying away from fried foods. Steam, bake, boil or broil instead of frying. Use low-calorie, no-stick aerosols or no-stick pans that require no fat for cooking. If you're making gravy for a holiday feast, skim off the fat.

Eat more fiber. Fiber will satisfy your appetite without adding a lot of calories. Eat plenty of fresh fruits and vegetables, whole grains and cereals so you won't fill up on rich desserts and other high calorie dishes.

Eat slowly and reduce the size of your portions. Since it takes about 20 minutes before your stomach feels satisfied, take at least that much time to eat your first helping. Then, perhaps you won't feel the need for seconds or thirds.

Do some "calorie banking". If you anticipate a big splurge at one meal or party, save up some extra calories by eating nutritious, low-calorie meals for several days in advance. Then treat yourself to the special occasion without worrying about the extra calories.

These practices are appropriate year-round and when coupled with regular exercise, can help you stay within a healthful weight range.
