

As soon as he awakens in the morning, his mother says, Cyril puckers up his lips and starts to whistle, high and shrill. He continues to whistle throughout the day and upon occasion has awakened at night and started to whistle for want of something better to do, Mrs. Dickson relates.

Physicians and child experts who have examined him are of the opinion that Cyril, Jr., is perhaps the youngest whistler on record. They expressed amazement that a child so young could control the comparatively difficult muscular coordination necessary to produce a whistle.

### Ambulance Planes Widen Their Scope

Miami, Fla.—The recent expansion of international flying has been accompanied by several international flights by physicians answering the call of duty and, in at least two instances, airplanes have been used as ambulances.

The first case occurred during the inauguration of air service for mail and passengers to San Juan, Porto Rico, when a newspaper correspondent was brought to Miami from Santiago, Cuba, after he had become ill in the Cuban city.

The second recorded case was when an air liner flew to Bimini to return with Howard Scott, chief engineer of the yacht Arcadia. Scott was suffering from a steel splinter in his eye and was brought to Miami by plane for medical treatment.

### Size of Hen's Eggs Fixed by Heredity

New York.—When a young pullet goes into the egg-producing business her first efforts are always small. According to Dr. Frank A. Hays of the Massachusetts Agricultural college, these first little eggs are worth checking up closely, because they will give an index of the size of the eggs to be expected when the main season comes on, and it is desired to have hens of the best capacity as mothers of the future flock.

If a hen can't turn out two-ounce eggs regularly, she should be marked for the block rather than for the breeding pen, for egg size is one of the things that "runs in families," and a hen's tendency to produce stingy eggs will be passed on to her daughters, and even through her sons to her granddaughters.

### Find Arab Who Claims

He Is 153 Years Old

Cairo.—An Arab who claims to be one hundred and fifty-three years old has been visited by a deputation including the provincial police commandant and the director of education for Cairo. They found him living in a tiny room six feet square in Fayum, near Cairo, and he appeared to be little more than a living skeleton, although he was in complete possession of his senses.

Questioned, he said that he was born in 1776, the year of the American Revolution, he remembered Mahommed Ali, who massacred the Mamelukes in 1811; that when he was forty he became a soldier. The ancient Arab retains an interest in politics and declares that the Arabs of today enjoy more rights than they did a century ago.

### Would Remove 293 Year "Blot" From Williams

Boston.—The "blot" which was placed on the name of Roger Williams 293 years ago, when the Massachusetts General court ordered him banished for conduct unbecoming a colonist, may be erased shortly by that same legislative body.

Convinced after extensive research that Williams was unjustly treated when he was banished from this state for disputing the right of the king of England to convey land titles of colonists, Lewis S. Gray of Swansen has announced he will seek revocation of the banishment order.

Williams, after leaving Massachusetts in 1636, went to Rhode Island and founded Providence, the first white settlement in that territory.

### Slave Sale Record

Found by Workmen

Danville, Ala—Spotted with mold and dust of over a half century's accumulation, the record of the sale of a woman slave was found when workers razed an old business house here. The record, in the form of a note,

"On the 25th day of December, 1863, we promise to pay to G. W. Key the sum of \$1,000 for a negro woman named Rachel, to be paid on the above date in Confederate money, when delivered, and if said woman is not delivered, then this note shall be null and void, this the 13th day of

May, 1863."

The note was made by L. W. Falk and P. M. Falk.

"CHEEP, CHEEP" OF THE BABY CHICKS

The cheerful "cheep, cheep," of millions of baby chicks is being heard in post offices and mail trains through out the country, as farmers and poultry raisers receive their annual consignments of future egg layers. The hatching season is now in full blast, and will continue through the next four months, to satisfy the demand which arises with the spring of every

Growth of the hatchery industry has been amazing. Twenty years age. 100,000 chicks were sold annually. In 1928, more than 500,000,000 chicks went to American farmers and oultry raisers according to figures of the International Baby Chich Association. Chicks from reliable hatcheries have been proved to be far more profitable than the usual type of homehatched variety, due to better breeding, and poultry raisers have come to a realization of this fact. Early reports to headquarters indicate that this year's sales will greatly exceed the 500,000,000 mark.—Farm Information Bureau, Dayton, Ohio.

## CLASSES FOR 30 CHILDREN

Nine-Year-Old Schoolmaster Gives Instruction Outside of Regular School Hours.

Sheffield, England.—This old steel town now boasts a nine-year-old schoolmaster. He is Austin Egley, who conducts an open air academy during the summer months known as "Austin school." He is getting ready now for the next term.

Thirty children, pupils in this "academy" in which the young schoolmaster gives educational instruction out of ordinary school hours, have been entertained by the lord mayor of Sheffield.

Teachers at the council school in Sheffleld where Austin is a pupil declare that the children have benefited by his teaching.

Austin is a curly-headed boy, with twinkling brown eyes and a merry face. His schoolmistress says that he possesses a marvelous brain.

It was about three years ago that he conceived the idea of forming a school of his own. He first assembled his younger brother and two sisters, teaching them after school in the yard at the back of his house in Dun Fields, Shalesmoor, a poor part of Sheffield.

"Methodical from the beginning, he kept a register of his pupils, giving their names, addresses and ages. Gradually his school grew.

The boy used the wall in the backyard as a blackboard. On one occasion he thought it was time that his school was presented a certificate, and he asked to see a certificate which had been presented to the school which he attends.

At the foot of this was the signature of Percival Sharp, local director of education, but Austin said that he did not know him and would substitute his own name at the foot of the certificate for his own school.

Now his pupils compete for their own school certificate.

Austin confessed to a reporter that he could only hold his school during the summer months, as it was held out of doors. At present he is compiling a new register in readiness for the summer term.

Strangely enough, Austin has no inclination to follow a scholastic career. His ambition is to become a railroad engineer.

### Takes a Rail Trip, Pays 31 Years Later

Ontario, Calif.—A railroad passenger fare from Iowa to California, 31 years overdue, has been paid at last.

An aged man stepped into a ticket office here recently, and in a trembling voice announced that he wished to make amends for a wrong he perpetrated against the company early in 1898.

His was the story of a father with a large family, who heeded the call of the West. But when final arrangements had been made he lacked fare for one member of his flock. So he devised a special packing box which was sent with the household goods, in which his son made the trip.

"The ride must have turned the boy's ambition toward a railroad career." the man beamed as he paid the fare, "because today he is a conductor."

### DARE ART FOUND IN MURAL PAPER OF KENTUCKY HOUSE

Famous Caparton Mansion Yields French Block Prints of Napoleonic Era.

Lexington, Ky .- French block wall paper of a rare design, which has adorned the walls of a room at Woodlawn, the colonial home of the late Col. James W. Caperton, near Richmond, Ky., 26 miles south of this city, for more than 100 years, or since 1822, has been sold to J. A. Lloyd Hyde, a dealer of New York city, on the recommendation of the Metropolitan Art museum, and the pulfistaking work of removing the paper has been begun by C. T. Wall, a New York decorator.

This wall paper was printed prior to 1810, during the Napoleonic reign in France, according to Mr. Wall, who stated that none of that design was produced after that date. It is very rare, he said, though the Metropolitan museum is in possession of several specimens, one an exact duplicate, now displayed in the American wing of the art museum in New York. As much as \$15,000 has been paid for enough of the paper to cover a small room, he declared.

panorama of a hunting scene, from the beginning to the close of the chase, exquisitely portrayed. Mr. Wall explained that great care must be exercised in removing the wall paper. When one block is taken off it is mounted on canvas. After being mounted it will be shipped in sheets County Judge, Callahan County, Texas. to New York, where any worn places will be retouched by a skillful hand.

The Caperton home, which is one of the historic manor houses of that section of Kentucky, is no longer occupied, although still owned by Mrs. Caperton, widow of the former distinguished master, who was for years one of the leading lawyers of the Richmond bar. Commenting on the sale, she declared that she disliked to dispose of the wall paper, but the facts that she no longer occupied the old mansion and that this beautiful paper should be preserved to posterity combined to bring her to a decision to dispose of it.

Woodlawn was the scene of John Fox's famous novel, "The Kentuckians." The house, built in 1822, is of a purely colonial type of architecture. It was erected by Col. William Rodes. a noted Kentucky pioneer and large land owner, and his wife, Mrs. Pauline Clay Rodes, daughter of Gen. Green Clay and a sister of the noted abolitionist leader, Gen. Cassius Marcellus Clay, whose historic estate. Whitehall, is only a few miles away

### U. S. Hunts for a Place That Never Had Flu

Washington.-Wanted: A locality that has not been touched by the influenza epidemic, where absolutely no cases of flu have occurred. If such a place can be found it could be used by the United States public health service for studies on the disease.

A serious difficulty encountered in previous influenza research has been the impossibility of securing absolute control conditions. Only where there are persons who have not had or been exposed to influenza is it possible to judge accurately the results of experiments on transmission of the disease, immunity, etc.

Meanwhile, preparations are under way at the hygienic laboratory here for other studies of the disease. Statistical studies will also begin soon. As soon as the epidemic is over, house-to-house canvasses will be made in various cities to determine the proportion of people affected.




