

Voters Follow State - Wide Trends

Garza County voters followed the state-wide trend in last Tuesday's general election, choosing Bill Clements

by a lopsided margin over incumbent Mark White for governor.

Clements got 788 votes to White's 322 as 1,252 voters

cast ballots, representing 46 percent of the 2,698 registered voters in the county.

Voters here also went with the tide in giving in-

cumbent Lt Gov Bill Hobby 618 votes to Republican candidate David Davidson's 368.

Council Continues Effort for Grant

Chamber of Commerce Manager Lewis Earl presented the City Council, at their regular meeting Monday, November 10, with a copy of a grant application to the TDCA for \$360,000 to make necessary adjustments at the mill to help suit the waterbed manufacturers who want to come and set up business.

If the grant is awarded the city would loan the money to the Post Economic Development Corporation (PEDC) and they would be in charge of disbursement of the money.

The council continued its approval in seeking this grant.

Jim Jackson presented the council members with a copy of a lawsuit that was filed by citizens living outside of the city limits in an unnamed Texas city concerning higher water rates.

Jackson implied that he and other property owners outside the city limits could file a similar law suit against Post claiming discrimination on water rates.

As is customary in Texas cities, water rates for users outside the city limits are higher than those charged to customers inside the city limits.

Mayor McCrary requested city attorney Harvey Morton to investigate the matter.

Don Glidewell, commenting on the same issue, discussed businesses planning to build outside the city limits and stated that the city cannot be expected to provide services for the same price as those in the city limits are charged.

"If they are outside the city limits they should not expect city services at the same rate that businesses inside the city limit receive," Glidewell added.

The council discussed the motel tax rate but decided to leave it at 7%.

The council reappointed Bo Jackson to the White River Board of Directors and elected Charles Hardin to replace Jack King who had moved.

City Manager Bill Pool, Jr., Post Chamber of Commerce and the PEDC were asked to enter Post in the Governor's Community Achievement Award Program known as KEEP AMERICA BEAUTIFUL.

The council looked at several houses in the city that needed to be condemned.

Morton suggested that a record be made on paper along with the photographs and put in a file to have if any questions were brought after the houses were destroyed.

Mayor Giles McCrary asked Morton to see if anything could be done about

businesses that have a home office outside the city but still collect sales tax from services offered in the city with the city getting nothing from them.

Star Cable was mentioned as one of several businesses that offer services and charge sales tax but the city does not receive any of the tax.

Present at the meeting

were Mayor McCrary, councilmen Charles Wallace Larry Waldrip, Jack Alexander and Larry Mills, Morton, Pool and City Secretary Wanda Wilkerson.

County Waiting on Relief Status

Judge Giles Dalby reported to Garza County commissioners Monday morning in the court's regular session that the detailed report for disaster relief was on its way to the state.

The report follows Dalby's earlier request to the governor to designate Garza County as a disaster county.

State coordinator of emergency management Robert Lansford had written Dalby requesting the report so that it could be reviewed before a decision could be made.

If the governor approves the request, the designation will then be decided by the USDA in Washington.

Lubbock County recently received designation for disaster relief for farmers and Dalby told commissioners that he believed Garza county also qualifies for the same designation.

Commissioners approved the advertising of bids for a new county vehicle and a road grader for Precinct Two.

They also authorized Donald Windham to attend the annual disaster planning seminar in Lubbock to maintain the county's emergency management plan.

Sheriff's deputy Leon Sadder was authorized by the commissioners to attend the special "breatherizer school" to provide training to administer the tests.

Newly elected constable Mike Harper was administered the oath of office by Judge Dalby. Harper fills the unexpired term in Precinct Four, and as other county constables, is paid \$1 per year.

County extension agent Colleen England invited the commissioners to attend a legislative information event in Roby November 17 with state representative Steve Carrier.

She also invited commissioners to the November 24 District Gold Star banquet in Lubbock where four Garza County 4-H members will be honored.

Commissioners also authorized the purchase of a telephone computer modem and subscription to the Texas Association of Counties' computer information network to be connected to Dalby's computer.

The computer hook-up provides up-to-date information to counties as to legislative actions and other matters of interest to county governments.

Attending the meeting were commissioners Herb Walls, Tommy Young, Ted Aten, T.D. Craft, county clerk L.E. (Sonny) Gossett and Judge Dalby.

Turkey isn't a hazardous food, but what the cook does or doesn't do--to the bird can literally make you sick.

Like all protein foods, turkey can harbor food poisoning bacteria, such as salmonella.

Because it's a large, dense food that requires several steps in preparation, bacteria have even more opportunity to grow if proper precautions aren't taken.

While food-borne illnesses are rarely fatal, they can cause unpleasant symptoms that can last for several hours or even days.

Medical experts estimate that a high percentage of symptoms attributed to over-eating or flu are actually food-borne illness.

Follow precautions in preparing a stuffed turkey:

- Thaw the turkey in the refrigerator as recommended on the package directions. Thawing the bird in a microwave oven or by putting it in a watertight package under cold running water are also safe thawing methods. But don't thaw the turkey by letting it sit on the kitchen counter, since room temperatures allow bacteria to grow.

- Wash the defrosted turkey thoroughly, running water over its inside and outside areas. Drain the body cavity and wipe the turkey fairly dry.

- Stuff the turkey right before you cook it. Warm, moist dressing is an ideal medium in which bacteria can grow.

- You can prepare the dry stuffing ingredients the day before, cover them tightly and leave at room temperature.

- But keep the perishable ingredients, such as butter, mushrooms, oysters, cooked celery, onions and broth in the refrigerator. Then combine ingredients just before stuffing the turkey.

- Cook the turkey in a 325 degree oven. Cooking in a very slow oven at 200 to 250 degrees is not recommended. Because of the low temperature, the turkey and stuffing could take more than 4 hours to reach a high enough temperature to destroy bacteria.

- Make sure the turkey is fully cooked. Insert a meat thermometer into the thickest part of the thigh muscle without touching the bone. Then cook the bird until it reaches

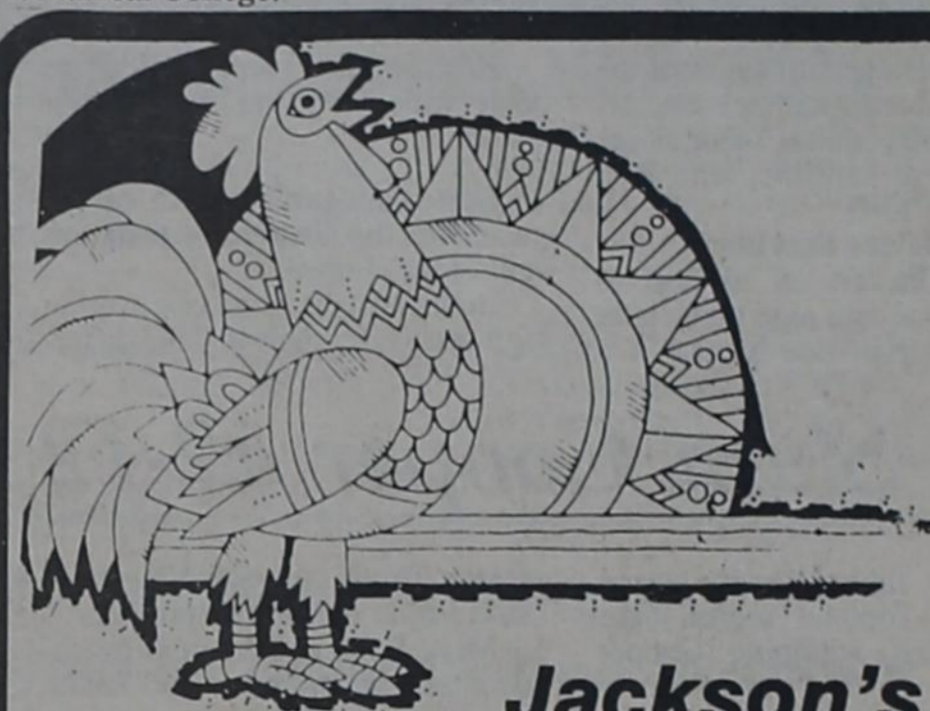

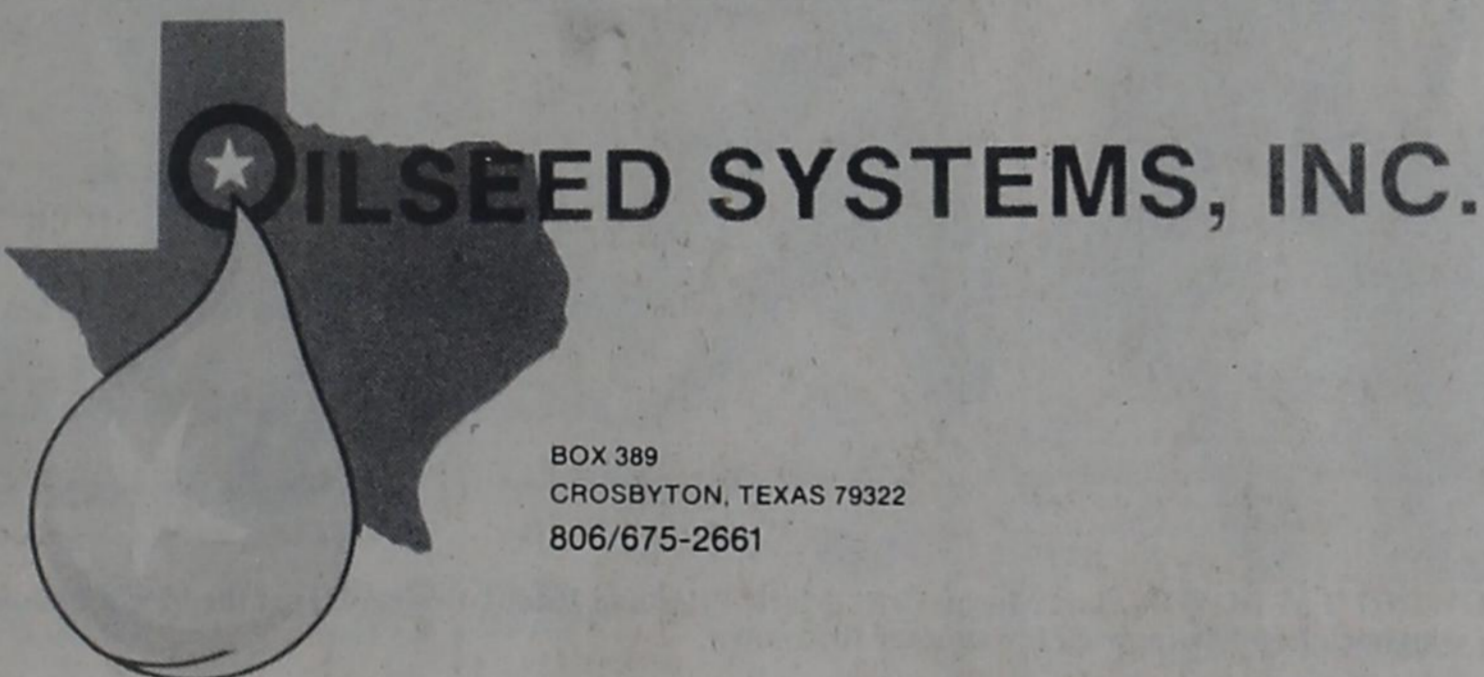

Fans, Players Enjoy 40-0 Romp

The Post Antelopes closed out the 1986 football season with a convincing 40-0 romp over Cooper last Friday night, putting the cap on a 7-3 record.

Having lost earlier to Roosevelt and Denver City, the Antelopes take to the basketball court and off-season workouts this week.

The win at Cooper was anti-climatic, but fans and players enjoyed the outing, particularly the second half.

Two Antelope turnovers in the first half and a surprising Pirate offense made the contest seem closer than reality at halftime, with Post leading only 13-0.

Antelope Scoring

Cooper kicked off to Post to open the game and nine plays later split end Marvin Lee hauled in a

quarterback Jay McCook pass for a 34 yard pass and run combination touchdown.

The drive opened at the Post 30 following the kickoff and featured running by Mike Bartlett, Ben Kirkpatrick, Randy Lewis and McCook on the option.

The touchdown play came on first down at the 34 and McCook rolled out to his left and threw the ball to Lee at the one yard line from where he sailed into the end zone.

Kirkpatrick kicked the extra point with 8:06 left in the first quarter.

One remarkable aspect of the game was the absence of penalties against the 'Lopes.

In the past 10 years of covering high school football in four differ-

ent Texas communities, I can not recall any game with no penalties for one team.

The Antelopes went the entire contest penalty free.

The defense held Cooper on its first series, forcing a punt but four plays later McCook fumbled the ball at the Post 46 and the Pirates got it back.

After eight plays, with the Pirates knocking at the end zone door, Richard Curtis recovered a Robert Ramos fumble at the nine yard line.

The 'Lopes blasted the ball out to the 33, in two plays, and then McCook was sacked and fumbled with Cooper getting the ball at the Post 29.

The Pirates took advantage of the turnover and using the Wishbone offense executed over left and right, getting as close as the two yard line before the Post defense found the key.

Taking a time out with 6:58 left in the first half, and facing fourth down the two, quarterback David Starch fumbled the snap as the Antelope defense stuffed the center and took over at the two.

The second Antelope drive went 98 yards in 13 plays, capped by Bartlett going over right guard the final one-half yard to the end zone with 1:56 left in the half.

The drive included nine first downs with running by Bartlett, Kirkpatrick, Lewis, McCook and Anthony Perez.

Second Half Scoring

Cooper got the second half kickoff and after four plays punted the ball dead at their own 35 yard line.

In three plays the Antelopes established the pattern for the final two periods as Lewis blasted over right guard to the 14, Bartlett ripped over right tackle to the nine and then took the pitch out around left end to the end zone with 9:24 left in the third period.

Bartlett got the call for the two point conversion, taking the pitch out around right end.

Cooper couldn't get a sustained drive and punted on the next series, and when the ball hit the ground it bounced off an Antelope player and was recovered by the Pirates at the Cooper 36.

The Pirates held onto the ball with a 14 play drive, getting three first downs and one on fourth down at the Post 40.

The 'Lope defense finally dug in when on third down at the 27, Clay Cowdrey, Brian Gibbs and Roger Martinez trapped Ramos behind the line, forcing a fourth down field goal attempt which went wide to the left.

The offense trotted onto the field and promptly went the 71 yards in nine plays.

The Eagles will travel to Three Way Friday night, November 14, to battle for the district title.



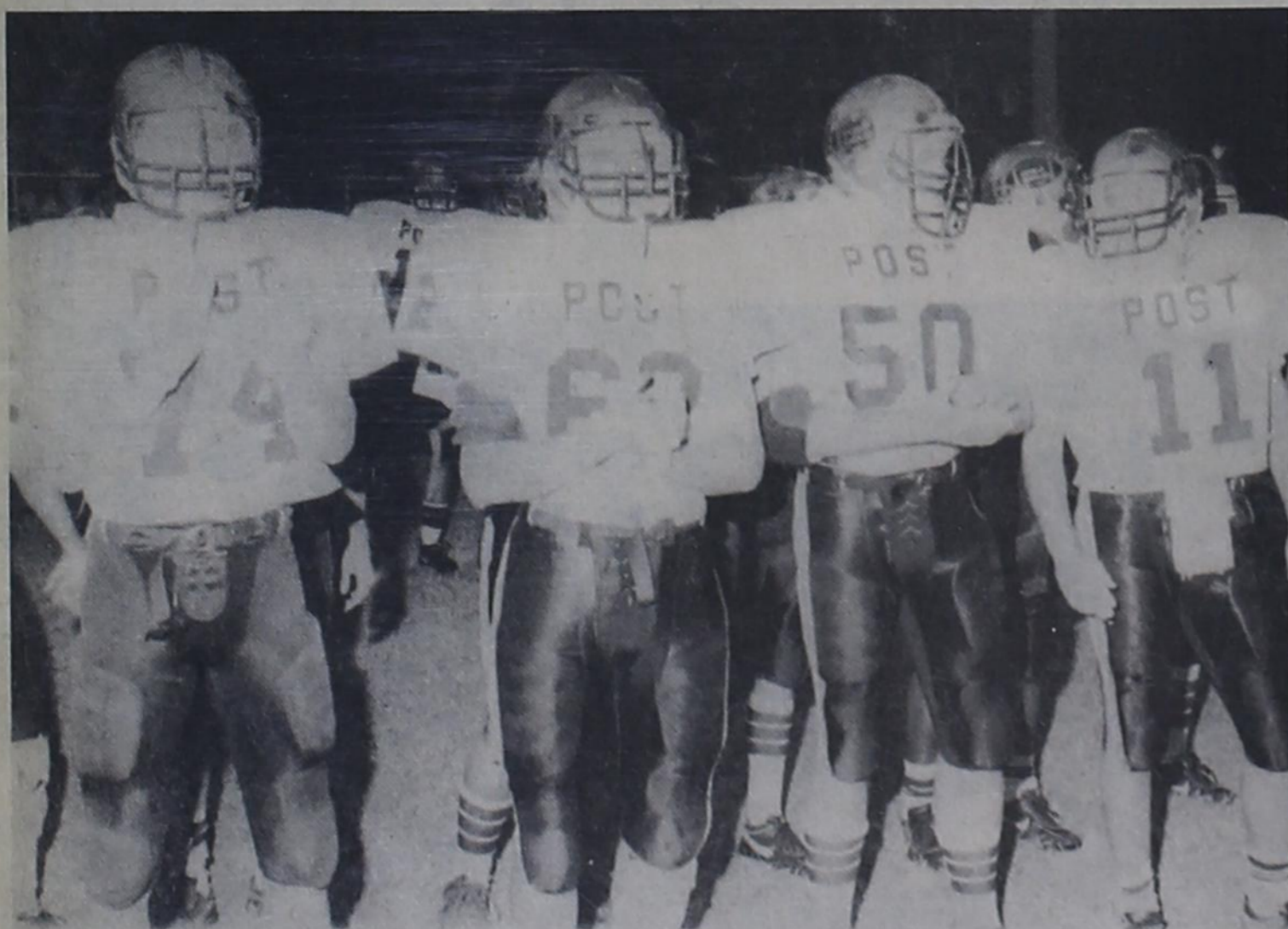
Marvin Lee takes off for the end zone following a pass completion from quarterback Jay McCook.



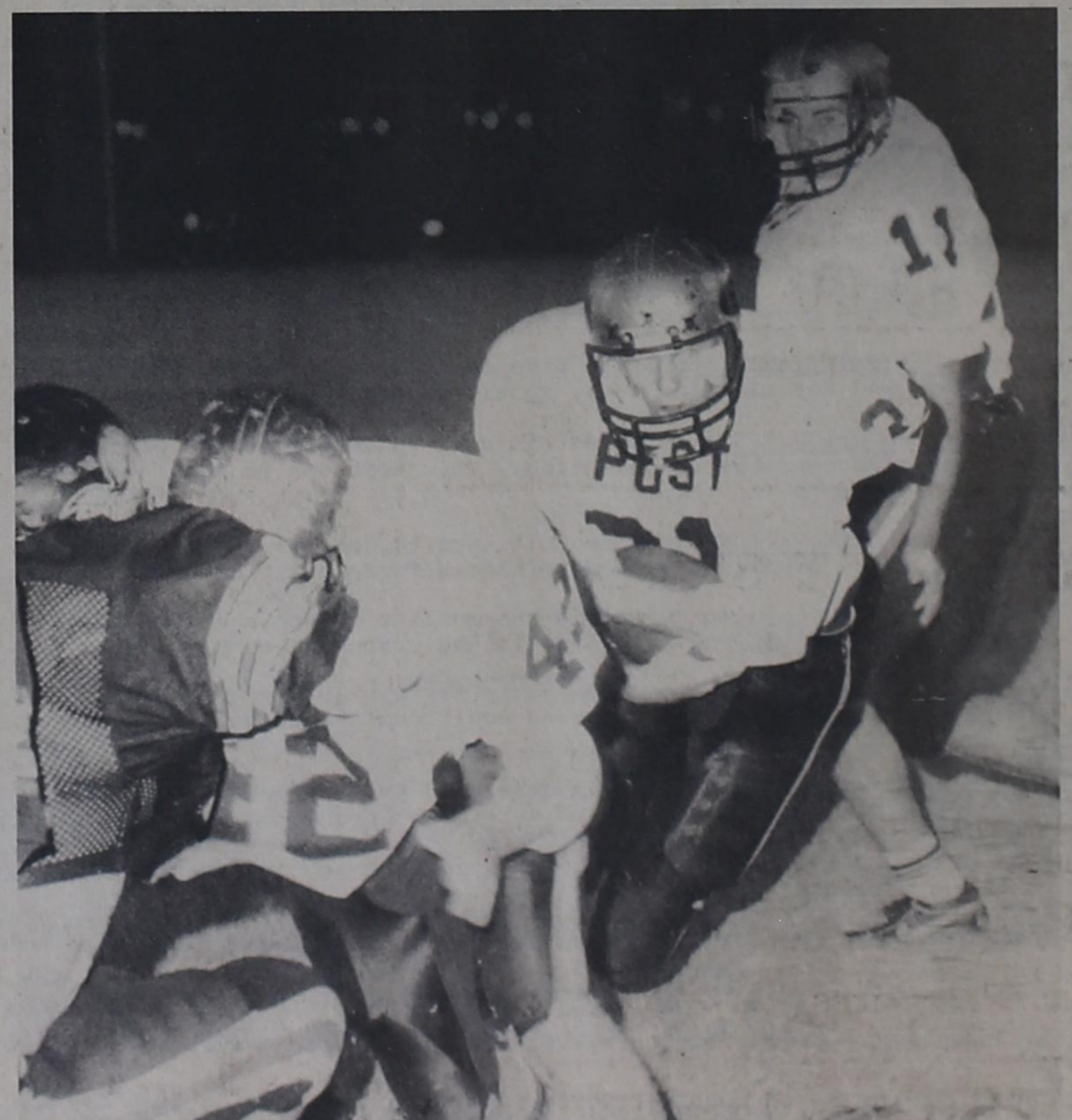

Garza SWCD Annual Report

Garza SWCD

Accomplishments

During 1986 the Soil Conservation Service furnished three man years to the Garza Soil and Water Conservation District.

Soil Conservation Service personnel of the Post Field Office provided services to 307 of the 491 farms and ranches in the District. 170 landowners and operators applied one or more conservation practices resulting in reduction of soil erosion.

New conservation plans were developed on 4,086 acres and conservation plans were revised on 34,498 acres.

The following practices were carried out in the District during the 1986 program year:

Of the agricultural land in the district over 70 percent has or is receiving assistance through the Great Plains Program. To date 135 contracts have been developed on 394,579 acres in the district. To date 7 Long Term Agreements have been developed on 6,019 acres in the district. The first two signups of the new Conservation Reserve Program have resulted in 10 contracts on 2,560 acres.

Annual Report - Activities 1986

The Board of Directors held 12 meetings with 80 percent attendance.

Two Directors attended the State SWCD Meeting held in San Antonio in October.

Three Directors attended the South Plains Association of SWCD's Meeting in Lubbock in February.

Three Directors attended the South Plains Association of SWCD's Meeting in Lubbock in August.

An Annual Conservation Farmer and Rancher Awards Banquet was held in April 1986.

The District furnished Soil Stewardship material to local churches and participated in Soil Stewardship activities.

One Director attended the Texas Conservation Awards Banquet.

The District assisted with two Conservation Program signups resulting in 10 contracts for 2,560 acres.

The District sponsors timely radio programs and public service announcements on KPOS in Post to provide information to all members.

Food Security Act of 1985

The Food Security Act of 1985 (farm bill) disqualifies you for certain USDA farm programs if:

- * You produce crops on highly erodible land without following a conservation plan approved by the local conservation district, or

- * you produce crops on newly converted wetlands. The provisions that apply are commonly known as swampbuster, sodbuster, and conservation compliance.

These are the USDA farm programs for which your eligibility may be in jeopardy:

- * price and income supports;

- * disaster payments;

- * crop insurance;

- * Farmers Home Administration loans;

- * Commodity Credit Corporation storage payments;

- * farm storage facility loans;

- * other programs under which USDA makes commodity-related payments, including annual payments made under the Conservation Reserve Program.

Swampbuster applies to you if you converted naturally occurring wetlands since December 23, 1985, in order to produce crops. If so, with a few exceptions you are ineligible for the USDA farm programs listed above as long as you continue crop production in the converted wetland area.

Sodbuster applies if you plant crops on highly erodible fields that were not used for crops during the period 1981-85. To retain eligibility for the USDA programs listed above, the highly erodible land you break out must be protected by a conservation system approved by the local conservation district.

Conservation compliance applies if you continue planting crops on highly erodible cropland. To remain eligible for the USDA farm programs listed above, you must develop and be actively applying a conservation plan for those highly erodible fields by January 1, 1990. You must have the plan fully implemented by January 1, 1995.

These are your options:

- * You can produce crops on highly erodible fields without using a locally approved conservation plan and lose eligibility for the USDA programs;

- * You can produce crops on newly converted wetlands and lose eligibility;

- * You can develop and apply a conservation plan that will reduce soil erosion to a tolerable rate even though you continue producing crops, and retain eligibility.

- * You can bid to enroll highly erodible land in the Conservation Reserve Program.

For more information about the compliance issues, contact the local office of any USDA agency, the agricultural Extension Service or your local conservation district.
