

'Boat people' land in Post

A family of five of the "Vietnam boat people" have arrived in Post to make a new start in life.

The resettlement of the Truongs (pronounced "Chong") by the First Christian Church here was done in cooperation with Church World Service and the U.S. government, Dr. Frank Pickett, church pastor, told The Dispatch. The Truongs are com-

posed of Quoc Vi Truong, his wife Em, five-year-old daughter Linh, and his brother and sister, Quoc Taun and So Ten. The four adults range in age from 22 to 27.

Although Vietnamese nationals, the Truongs are ethnic Chinese and speak both Chinese as well as the language of Vietnam.

The Truongs are living in an apartment at 112 West

Sixth. Present plans are for the three members of the family to go to work at Postex Plant. They have had previous experience in textile work.

In recent weeks, the story of Vietnam's "boat people" who fled their homeland in overcrowded boats has become familiar to most Americans, including the island of Pulau Bidong

where thousands of them were forced to exist as best they could for months while efforts were made to find them new homes.

The Truongs lived seven months as refugees on Pulau Bidong where they had to sell rings, watches and other items of value to purchase rice. Many months they survived on as little as six pounds of rice per month.

'Best July rain in 14 years'-----

Boosts Garza cotton

What some have called "the best July rains in the last 14 years" gave Garza's late cotton crop a welcome boost last week. A total of from two to five inches fell over the county's cotton acreage and rangelands.

County Agent Syd Conner hesitated to call it "a million dollar rain", but said it "would make a world of difference in the cotton crop, put several more pounds on each of the calves which will come off pasturelands this

fall, and give late feeds a boost."

Officially Post received a total of 4.63 inches. It fell straight down without wind and generally was slow falling.

It rained virtually all

night last Wednesday night and 3.18 inches was recorded at the 8 a.m. Thursday reading. That went with the 1.15 inches which had fallen Tuesday and the .30 of an inch which was to follow Thursday morning.

County Agent Conner said practically all areas in the county above the Caprock got four inches or better. Over five inches was reported in the Justiceburg area. The least rain was recorded in the northeast edge of the county where not quite two inches was measured.

Conner termed the rainfall "great" and said all of it was good except for flooding in some lowland areas which had been planted to cotton.

He reminded, however, that this is a late crop and an open autumn will be needed to make a good crop.

The only damage reported from last week's rainfall came from Bill Fowler, construction superintendent of Grayston Construction Co. for the new \$540,000 H.H. Huntley nursing home being built at Seventh and South Avenue O.

Fowler said his firm "lost about two weeks work" in preparing for the pouring of the foundation for the 75-bed nursing home and that the firm was filing an insurance claim for the loss.

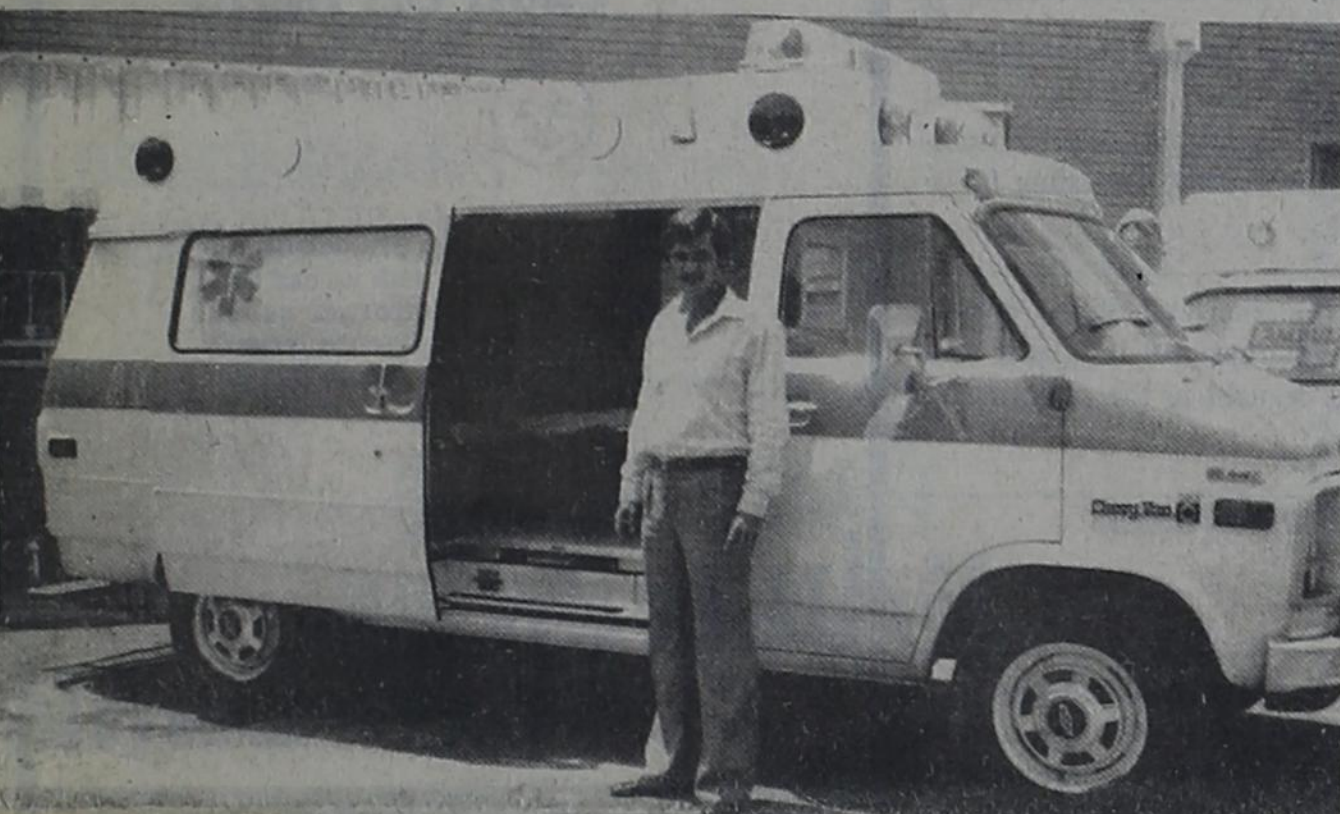
Mrs. Odom died Thursday, July 19 in M.D. Anderson Hospital in Houston following a lengthy illness. She had been at the hospital the past three months.

New step for lake

Another step toward building Post Lake was taken this week when Lubbock's Water Resources Board instructed Lubbock city officials to begin negotiations with the White River Municipal Water District for the development of Post Lake.

Al O'Brien, White River

water district manager, told The Dispatch Tuesday he has yet to hear from Lubbock city water supt. Sam Wahl for beginning such talks.

According to what The Dispatch could learn, the Lubbock water resources board is under the Lubbock

city council for its water system.

The story of the board's Monday meeting as contained in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal covered various discussions of the projects, none of which are new here.

Lubbock is now preparing to proceed on water development scheduled to be carried out before taking any Post Lake water.

The Post and Justiceburg water reservoir projects must await the voting of the bond issue to finance construction and pipelines before any concrete steps can be taken toward actual lake construction.

So Dispatch readers will not be confused by what they may be reading in the Lubbock papers, the Post lake or reservoir will be built and controlled by White River and financed by contract sales of the lake's water to Lubbock.

Post posse wins first 5th time

Post's Sheriff Posse won its fifth straight first place trophy last week at Snyder in the annual Scurry County Rodeo Parade over five other posses.

Jim Jackson, president of the posse organization, told

Chamber signs 1980 speaker

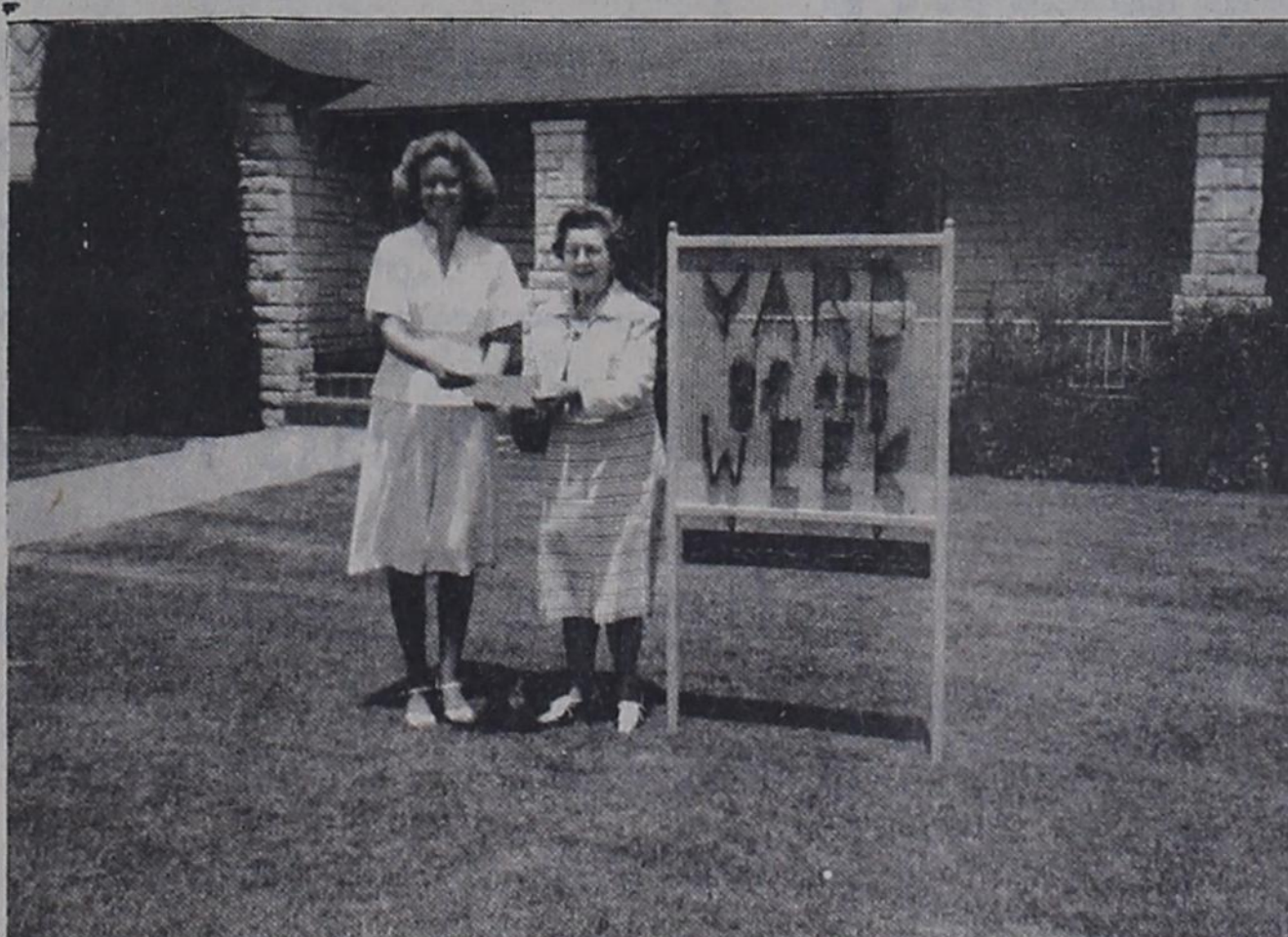
Texas Commissioner of Agriculture Reagan Brown will be the speaker for Post's 1980 Chamber of Commerce banquet.

City plans pay boost

The Post City Council in a two and one-half hour work session on the city's 1979-80 budget Monday night tentatively agreed on a eight percent salary increase for all city employees.

The increase also was figured into the budget for the city's share of law enforcement salaries.

No controversial items

will be necessary.

The \$1.50 tax rate is expected to raise \$183,000 in property taxes.

Other major sources of income to meet the half million general fund budget are \$115,000 from utility taxes, \$99,000 in city sales taxes, \$44,000 in sanitation fees, and \$15,000 transferred into the general fund from the water and sewer fund.

A public budget hearing will be scheduled for the council's September meeting at which time final approval will be given to the budget.

'Taking off' time

What became apparent for all to see at the Saturday morning open house at the Garza Historical Museum is that the development of the museum is now ready "to take off."

For a number of years, it seemed, the group of pioneer residents who organized and got the museum going simply had too big a job to handle.

A younger group probably would have considered the proposition in a businesslike way, concluded there simply was no chance to succeed, thrown up their hands and gone their separate ways.

Not this group. It did seem simply insurmountable. They had a historic old hulk of a building on their hands badly in need of thousands of dollars worth of repairs. When they asked for donations to the museum they were asked if their museum would be a safe place.

Well, obviously it wasn't. Vandals broke in the back door any night they wanted. Rain leaked through the battered old roof and pigeons somehow managed to fly around inside. Even a bunch of bats called it home.

The historical survey committee remained undaunted. They started some little money raising projects, they set \$5 a year dues, they asked for donations, including modern cash, and they put what they got in the bank.

When they first initiated a repair project, it fell flat because nobody would even bid the job.

Along came the start of federal funds into Texas for restoration of historical places.

Maybe the local group didn't have much money but they did have perseverance, lots of it. They began writing letters. First the state of Texas put the old Post Sanitarium on its list for historical places. Finally, came the great news to the group that the sanitarium, which was the museum's home, had been listed on the National Registry of Historical Places.

That opened the door a crack toward getting some of that federal restoration money the state was spreading around as far as it could go. Many more letters were written. Despite the many restrictions and all the bureaucratic difficulties involved, the group stuck with it and finally succeeded in getting some \$6,000 in federal funds.

When they added this to everything they had saved for years, and the results of an all-out donation campaign to the public, the group had \$18,000 to spend.

So the project for a new roof for the old building and exterior renovation to make it finally, once and for all, secure was drawn up and put up for bids.

There was one bidder this time and his price was \$30,000.

The group remained undaunted. First they tried to negotiate \$18,000 worth and then finally decided to go ahead when one interested donar pledged to pay whatever couldn't be raised from other sources.

So last fall the contract was made and the

work begun.

Now it is completed. The old sanitarium is now a secure home, all the project bills have been paid, and there was some \$132 in the museum organization's treasury Saturday when officers and directors met for the first time since the special meeting to let the construction bid last fall.

So what's new now, you ask. Well, for one thing when it was reported to directors that three display cases were for sale here which the museum certainly needed there were three quick donations made to finance their purchase.

A report was given explaining a layout for first floor development with such things as a C.W. Post room, a pre-historic room, a geology room, and so on.

It was reported that through the Green Thumb program the museum now had an employee who could keep the museum open several hours each day. The Indian head display, which had to be taken home because of the leaky roof, could now be returned.

A plan was reported to catalog every item in the museum now and to be given to the museum in the future with regular forms other museums use. A tour was made of nearby community museums. The report from that came back that Garza had as much as any and a whole lot better museum home.

Now people can give or lend valuable old items to the museum and they will be secure and looked after.

That's what we meant in the first paragraph of this editorial when we said it is now apparent the Garza Historical Museum is ready "to take off."

It is and it can use the help of any and all who have historic old things to give or loan, or who would like to "build" one of the rooms as a should-we-say hobby, as well as a community contribution.

More federal funds will be sought—which were promised a few years back in 1979—to remodel the upstairs.

The museum plans to have available space for traveling museum exhibits.

What impresses this newspaper is that the museum association "hung in there" when it seemed impossible to convert a historic but rundown building into an ideal museum home. They did it.

And on their success, Post and Garza County has the significant opportunity to truly build a local museum richly worthy of its place in today's community.

We have not only so much history upon which to build displays, but we have so many achieving people in this town who can help.

The small group of pioneer folks who persevered together as the Garza Museum Association now deserve the wholehearted support, aid, and encouragement of the entire community.

Let's start giving it.

Tahoka is 'picked' to win district grid title

Seminole rated 5AA runner-up

Texas Football, just out this week picks the Tahoka Bulldogs to win the 1979 district 5AA football crown and go on to finish No. 10 in state class AA rankings.

With 17 lettermen back, including seven offensive and eight defensive starters, the Bulldogs will be bidding for their third straight district title.

The Bulldogs won it outright in 1977 and shared it with three other clubs last year.

Texas Football picks Seminole and Denver City as the top contenders with Slaton, Frenship, Cooper, Roosevelt and Post strung out behind in that order.

New Antelope head coach David Thompson obviously has his work cut out for him with the Lopes drawing their lowest pre-season berth in a decade.

"Post posted a mere 2-8 record last season," Texas Football writes, "but four offensive and four defensive starters return for better things. Tackles Chuck Black (6-2,21) and Deb Palmer and end Jackie Stelzer pave the way offensively with veteran QB Rance Adkins directing the attack.

"Mike Macy, Larry Rodriguez, Noel Pena and Jeff Lott are defensive returnees and Lynn Simpson, Kelly Mason, Barry Wyatt, Alonso Luna, Charles Curtis and Drew Kirkpatrick are solid reserves."

"Big, mobile linemen give Tahoka a district edge, according to Texas Football. "Stronger, quicker and more experienced up front," reads the Bulldogs forecast.

"Nose guard Doug Barham (6-0, 225), Defense back Clifford Oages (6-0, 175) and Brad White (6-6, 210) comprise the heart of the defense where eight starters converge from a year ago. All have exceptional speed for big men, as do partners Brad Hammonds (end) and Jackey Jolly, a 6-2, 200-pound tackle.

"On offense Todd Brown returns to quarterback the Bulldogs joining seven offensive starters—mostly hefty offensive linemen. Further enhancing the cast are linemen Larry Thomas, R.D. House, Kelly Gass, Johnny McKibbens and Ronald Lusk and backs Johnny Alvarado, Rickey Chapa, and Mark Hudlin."

"At Seminole," says Texas Football, "where the Indians compiled a 5-5 record last season, this year appears to be something special for a team which returns six starters each way.

"Led by Quarterback Mike Grass (6-1,160,4.7 speed), running back Rickey Greene (175,4.5 speed) and Fullback-linebacker Jim Hill, 6-2, 195, Seminole sports a combinations of size and speed comparable to any. Hill also heads up the defensive unit at linebacker where he teams with nose guard Mike Crow, tackle Gary Rumans, 6-1,220, linebacker David Kelly and Calvin Stewart."

The magazine cites a strong senior class and a "winning attitude" as other strong assets.

"Denver City could still fall a bit short of top contending status although seven offensive starters return to help lead the team. The Mustangs show extraordinary balance on both sides of the line, however, so it is not surprising to find the team's leader, Mark Ivie, excels on both offense and defense. At 6-3 and 185 pounds, Ivie starts at defensive end and tight end.

Slaton has only seven starters returning from an 8-4 team but these veterans all seniors, are good ones,

according to Texas Football. The magazine cites offensive guard and defense end Craig Maberry, 6-1, 205, as one of the finest linemen in the district with center-defensive end Greg Johnson, 200, adding plenty of strength.

The Frenship Tigers are the shortest of all in experience with only five starters back. Most of Frenship's offensive punch will center around the passing game, says Texas Football, where junior quarterback Pat Gaston will be aiming at all-state candidate Victor Bugg (5-10, 165,4.4 speed) he outside.

Cooper co off a 1-9 year with six two-way starters as a nucleus. Roosevelt will rely on an improved defense as it tries to move up in the balanced district. Junior Basquez, 5-11,190, whom Antelopes will well remember, gives the Eagles a triple threat.

Texas Football picks Coahoma to win district 6AA with Colorado City, which will be after its third district crown in three years, Coahoma's chief contender.

In district 4AA, Abernathy is rated the team to beat with Floydada ranked third behind Idalou.

The Whirlwinds, co-champs at 8-2 last season, figures to be stronger this year because of an improved line and more backfield balance. Most impressive of the 14 returning lettermen is Mac Collins, 6-0, 205-pound full-back whom Coach L.G. Wilson terms "one of the best I've had in years." He's not only big and strong but fast as well, doing a 4.7 in the 40 yard dash.

Lockney, Post's other pre-season foe, is rated at the bottom of the 4AA lineup and classed as long on offense and punting, but short on defense where only three starters return. Punter Arnold Alaniz should help though as he punted for a 43-yard average last year as a junior. Steve Warren is back at quarterback and Curtis Ford at halfback.

Lope fans might also note that Littlefield, with whom the Lopes will scrimmage a week prior to their season opener, is picked to win its district and finish No. 5 in state rankings. Littlefield has 20 lettermen, including 8 and 9 starters back from a 6-4 team.

In Texas Football's list of blue chip seniors only Bugg of Frenship as a split end is listed from district 5AA and only four others from the entire South Plains.

They are Bobby Brown, 6-1,180 of Lorenzo at quarterback; L.K. Bradley, 6-3, 220, New Deal, Tony Acosta, 5-11,205, O'Donnell, and John Pieper, 6-3,198, Roscoe, among the running backs

More ducks due in fall

LUBBOCK — A recent aerial count of the waterfowl breeding populations of ducks in the prairie "Pothole" country in the Dakotas, Montana and Canada by personnel of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service indicate an overall increase this summer.

A 10-to-15 percent increase over last year has been observed with much improved habitat conditions. Many of the ducks are finding ponds with good food supplies and residual nesting cover.

Breeding populations of mallards and pintails are up about 10 percent over last year, and blue-winged teal are up 20 percent according to the report.

This region of central North America furnishes most of the ducks that

migrate through Texas each fall.

The U.S. Post offices in Texas now have the federal Migratory Bird Hunting and

Conservation stamp required of all persons 16 years of age and older who participate in a duck or goose hunt.

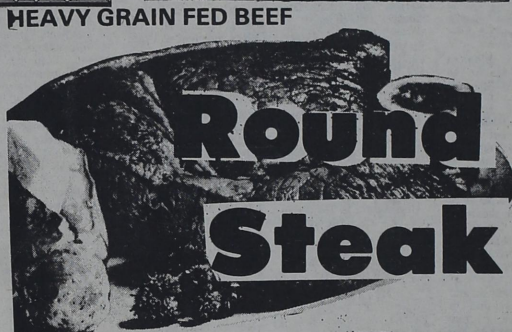

City budget-

Income from the city's oil production tax will go into reserve funds looking forward to the day when the federal revenue sharing program ends, which could be next year.

Some major new items in the new budget include \$45,000 for new paving (not seal coating) with \$15,000 of this coming from the water and sewer funds which are in strong financial shape as the city has no bonded indebtedness.

Twenty-five thousand also is being budgeted toward the future purchase of a new fire truck.

The council budgeted \$10,000 for airport renovation with the hope that the county will match it. The council realizes that without repairs the city-county airport will soon have some real maintenance problems.

Twenty-seven thousand is budgeted for seal coating city streets next year and \$40,000 included for purchase of a new rubber-tired loader.

Both the seal coating and loader purchase will come from revenue sharing funds.

The city anticipates receiving \$50,105 in its new revenue sharing grant and with interest and cash balance this will boost the revenue sharing fund to \$71,432.

The city's law enforcement budget was boosted from \$76,810 to \$82,958. Included is \$3,500 for "half a new law enforcement car." This was inserted should the city and county decide to begin buying law enforcement cars jointly next year, as has been proposed this year.

The city budgeted the \$635 the Garza Museum Association requested for interior renovation of the museum building, which has just had an over \$30,000 exterior renovation. The modest amount would be used for painting, lighting, and locks.

The council increased its contribution to Meals on Wheels from \$1,600 this year to \$2,000 next year. The library was granted a \$200 increase in general expenses to \$1,800 with a \$442 increase overall in the library budget, which includes half the librarian's salary.

out of politics and have no problems at all with the government," he said.

"You'll need to come and live there for a while to judge it," he added.

He explained that efforts have been made to locate the nine tribes in individual homelands and to develop factories and irrigated lands for them.

"We pay more taxes here than you pay here in America and with the tax money they finance various irrigation projects," he said.

Rogers termed the economy of South Africa very good when he left there a year ago, but pointed out gasoline was priced at \$1.25 a gallon then and its \$2.77 a gallon today.

He said that country already has one refinery which makes gasoline out of coal, is completing another, and planning a third.

"Business there is about 50 years behind America's," he said, "but it is coming along."

He said the temperature "about like Waco's" and there is no heat in any of the homes.

At one point, he commented, "Americans have so much they don't really need."

Rogers and his family will be returning soon to South Africa where he will begin his 16th year as a missionary. The Rogers are here visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Earl Rogers.

LEARN TO READ YOUR ELECTRIC METER AND SAVE!!!

It will let you determine how many kilowatt hours you use in a given period of time... an hour, a day, a month or a year. That's how electricity is measured — by kilowatt hours (kwh) used.

Your residential electric meter will have either 4 or 5 dials

Electric meters are easily read from right to left as you look at the meter. If the pointer on a dial is between two numbers, write down the smaller number. When the pointer is directly on a number such as one (1) (see center dial above) then read it as 1 if the pointer on the next dial immediately to the right has passed zero (0). However, read it as zero (0) if the pointer on that dial to the right has not reached zero.

The dials above read (from left to right): 9-3-1-1-5. If, however, the pointer on the second dial from the right above was between 9 and zero then the center dial would read as a zero.

Now let's read the same meter 24 hours later

The later reading is 9-3-1-3-8. Subtracting the first reading, 93115, from the new reading of 93138 — the answer is 23. Thus you would have used 23 kilowatt hours in the 24 hour period. Each kwh costs approximately five cents.
