Garza County's 1978 cotton crop totaled only 20,200 bales, according to figures just released by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Thus production was well

under a half bale to the acre aveage. Garza planted 52,200 acres a year ago and harvested 47,000 for a yield per harvested acre aveage of 206 pounds, one of the seven lowest county averages for the 25-counties on the High Plains.

Lubbock County with 228,-000 bales and a 359 pound per acre average was the biggest county producer although Parmer led in yields with 414 pounds and Lubbock ranked but fourth.

Motley County had the poorest crop - 20,000 bales on 50,500 acres harvested for a low 161 pounds per acre yield average.

Sales tax up 7.5 percent
