Pippin, Cisneros are runoff winners

Sheriff Jim Pippin and Precinct 3 County Commissioner Mike Cisneros won Democratic renomination to second four-year terms in Garza's runoff primary Saturday.

Although Cisneros' margion was only 20 votes in his race with Cecil Foster, Sr., 167 to 147, the margin was twice as big as the 10 vote margin by which he defeated the same opponent four years ago.

Pippin had a far easier time than many predicted in winning seven out of the nine voting boxes and the absentee count to post a 544 to 369 vote win over O. G.

Picnic set for elderly

Forty persons are volunteering food and playing host Saturday afternoon for a picnic in city-county park for approximately 60 of the community's elderly.

There was a large enough response from a Dispatch appeal last week to get everything in order, the originator of the picnic told The Dispatch.

The event is scheduled to begin at 3 p.m.

(Junior) Shepherd. This tally gave Pippin 59.9 percent of the vote to only 40.1 for Shepherd.

The only box Shepherd won was the No. 7 box in the high school library. It was by an eight-vote margin, 51 to 43. The two candidates split the rural Graham box (No. 6) 24 to 24.

Except for Graham's standoff, Pippin swept the county's rural voting boxes by hugh margins, 39 to 2 at Southland, 21 to 5 at Justiceburg, and 29 to 4 at Close City.

The sheriff surprisingly came within five votes of tallying as much support as he did in the May 3 primary when he received 549 votes, although the voter turnout in the runoff primary was only 918, or 285 voters less than the May 3 turnout of

1,203 . Equally surprising is that when Pippin won his first four-year term in 1976 by defeating then sheriff Gene Gandy, he also won seven of the nine voting boxes.

While Cisneros did not pile up any sizable victory margin over Foster he did win in both precinct 3 voting boxes - No. 3 (bank

community room) 98 to 95, and No. 9 (Lorenzo Alexander center) 57 to 44, as well as taking the absentee vote 12 to 8.

Cisneros' campaigning had been severly limited by a long stay in the hospital recovering from a broken leg suffered in a tractor accident. Since he got home in May,

he has had to employ crutches to get around although he told The Dispatch last week his leg is getting stronger.

County Commissioner Cisneros' victory assures him of a second four-year term as he faces no Republican opposition in November's general election.

Sheriff Pippin will face Republican Max Chaffin on the November ballot but has been established as a strong (See Primary, Page 14)

O.V. McMahon rites today





WASHINGTON, D.C. -Congressman Charles W. Stenholm this week led the opposition to increases in the low micronaire (mike) discounts for the 1980 Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) cotton loan schedule, asking Agriculture Secretary Bergland for a reversal in the formula which Stenholm said could cost the Texas cotton industry "millions of dollars in penalties."

Stenholm, a member of the House Agriculture Cotton Subcommittee, contacted Bergland in behalf of several other Texas delegation members, including Senators Lloyd Bentsen and John Tower and Congressmen Jack Hightower, E. (Kika) de la Garza and Kent Hance.

The micronaire reading of

cotton denotes the fineness of the lint, which many cotton mills believe effects the fiber's spinning char-acteristics. "A low mike reading means the farmer receives a penalty both on the spot market price of cotton, as well as the CCC loan schedule, "Stenholm explained. "It is the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) responsibility to come up with the most equitable formula to keep the loan schedule in line with anticipated spot mar-

ket prices. "It is our understanding that the loan discount differentials were figured on a 2 to 1 weighting procedure this year," Stenholm said, "a dramatic departure from previous years. In fact, my information shows that since 1972

the weighting formula has always been at least 5 to 1 and has ranged as high as 10 to 1." A 2 to 1 weighting factor

gives only twice the emp-hasis to last year's mike loan discount as it does to last year's spot market discount, he explained, Hosie Wynn rites are held Saturday

thereby increasing the downward effect upon this year's low mike loan discount. If a 5 to 1 factor were used, the increase in the discount would not be as great.

Stenholm said the 2 to 1 ratio was "particularly objectionable since the 1979 crop year in Texas was one of abnormally large supplies of low-mike cotton which drove down the spot price differentials an inordinate amount over what would normally have been expected.

"It is not like all of this cotton went to the loan or even that CCC will end up with large amounts of low mike cotton in their stocks", Stenholm said in comments to Bergland. "In fact, I expect that all of this cotton will be utilized by the

He said the first park improvement to be sought will be to obtain new playground equipment.

The council set the Tuesday date for the public hearing as it conincides with the next meeting of the park board.

The new cemetery ordinance will apply some restrictions to a new development area of the cemetery, forbidding trees, shrubs or bushes to be planted in the area and limiting the highth of grave stones to 18 inches.

A fine of up to \$200 is provided in the ordinance for violations.

City Clerk Wanda Wilkerson told the council she would have a preliminary budget in members' hands within a few days for the study prior to a council

The city wants to tear down the older of the two theaters in the 200 block East Main as a fire trap and has considered condemning it for that purpose. Chamber president Larry

Willard proposed last year that the city purchase the Tower Theater next to the Post Public Library and city hall and possibly restore it to use rather than let it completely deteriorate and also become a fire hazzard.

Council members in a brief discussion said they would want to know how expensive repair costs on the Tower might be before considering its purchase. They agreed they would have to budget the money for purchase and repair, so their decision becomes a

possible budget item. The council also agreed with a request by Library board chairman Jim Cornish to adjust Librarian Peewee Pierce's salary for the next fiscal year.

In another action, the council approved an agreement with the state highway department and adopted an ordinance on an emergency basis to give the state the right to install, operate, and maintain highway traffic signals past three Post schools on West Eighth street which is US-380.

The city plans to file charges against five local mobile home owners for non-compliance with the city's mobile home ordinance as a result of a recent "compliance inspection" of all mobile homes within the city.

The council also agreed to distribute to surrounding counties a proposed agreement to limit the legal liability of volunteer fire departments which go to the aid of their neighbors in fighting major fires.

The agreement was drawn by Morton.

The "dog problem" came to the fore again when Chief Sheriff Deputy Donnie Walker appeared at the start of the meeting to discuss any law enforcement matters the council wanted to take up.

He told the council that the city-county dog catcher had not responded to three recent calls by the sheriff's department to pick up strays.

Maddox replied that neither had the sheriff's department responded recently either when the city called for an officer to shoot dangerous dogs within the city limits.

Deputy Walker said the sheriff's department didn't have a rifle needed to shoot dogs. He said discharging a shotgun inside the city limits was too dangerous.

Council members suggested the sheriff's department purchase such "a dog gun" and the city would pay half of it. Maddox also agreed to check with the dog catcher on answering calls.

The dog catcher has a tranqualizing gun to help catch dogs, but Maddox said its pellets required two to three minutes to take effect on the dog and by that time it may have gotten away from the dog catcher. He added that the tranquilizer gun is not effective to bring down skunks which also are a local problem.







Phillips, 356 to 307, and Incumbent judge Tom Davis a 405 to 246 margin over Edith Roberts, who was seeking to become the first woman ever elected to the same

high court. McCormick, who will not reach the minimum age of 35 until October, piled up a 53.29 percent of the vote statewide to 46.71 'for Phillips, who at 67 is the oldest member of the

criminal appeals court. Davis completely outdistanced Mrs. Roberts, gaining 62.6 percent of the statewide vote to Mrs. Roberts' 37.4 percent. Mrs. Roberts, who is 47, has been a defense attorney for the past 15 years.

Garza voters favored John C. Phillips over James (Jim) Wallace, 349 to 344, but statewide Democrats handed Wallace the nomination with 55.7 percent of the

vote to 44.1 percent for Phillips. Wallace, a Houston attorney and physical fitness advocate who proposed accelerated handling of
