

# Trustees consider all-weather track

School trustees have called a special meeting for next Tuesday night at 7:30 to consider possible action on a proposed new all-weather

400 meter track, which carries a \$58,800 price tag providing the track's present base is used. Decision to call the extra

session came at the board's long May meeting Monday night after an hour's discussion of the proposal with Marvin Sparks, head of

Vibra-Whirl & Co. of Panhandle, Tex., that submitted the all-weather track bid.

New athletic director David Thompson submitted an overall plan which besides the track would include a protective fence, seating for 650 spectators, and lights for the track.

The total package would run in the estimated \$90,000 range, but Thompson told trustees he "would be satisfied" with the all-weather track and the protective fence to keep motorcycles, horses and cars piloted by vandals from damaging the track surface.

Trustees appeared unwilling to bring the matter to a vote without further study.

The cost would have to be written into the new year's budget and Supt. Bill Shiver said legislative action on school financing measures at Austin, which probably won't come until late May, will have a vital effect on the Post school district budget.

Some trustees appeared fearful that the present track base might not hold up and require expensive repairs later, so Thompson was requested to have the base tested and analyzed prior to next week's special meeting.

Sparks told trustees his company has built over 200 all-weather tracks for schools in the last 11 years in the Texas and New Mexico area, the bulk of them in Texas, and every one within a 200-mile radius of Post.

The all-weather track would be Reslite construction.

The present caliche track is a quarter mile or 440 yard oval. It would be shortened to 400 meters as Texas schools are now converting to the metric distances in track events.

The track would be shortened by rebuilding one of the two curving ends. Existing curbs would be utilized as well as the base.

The proposed new track would be of six-lane width. Sparks said a "turnkey job" for a brand new 400-meter track including curbs, field event areas, striped and ready to run would be \$79,800. The school district would save \$21,000 by utilizing present curbs and track base.

As to life expectancy of an all-weather track, Sparks said it could be up to ten years or more with the need for resurfacing. He cited the Monahans all-weather track which was resurfaced after eight years.

## City will replace all traffic signs

The city council Monday night authorized the city signing of a traffic sign replacement contract with the state.

It also discussed a new ordinance to prohibit parking of heavy trucks on residential streets due to damage caused by the light pavement, and authorized putting an amount equal to five percent of city employees' salaries this year into the new employees' retirement fund.

The council also approved the request of White River Water District directors that Post agree not to service any additional water customers outside the city limits. It also briefly discussed the purchase of a new electronic billing machine for the water department which could be bought on a lease-purchase arrangement extending over five years.

The traffic sign replacement contract is with the Texas Office of Highway Safety of the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The state would provide a new set of traffic signs for the city with the city agreeing to install them and to maintain a sign inventory.

There will be free balloons for the youngsters.

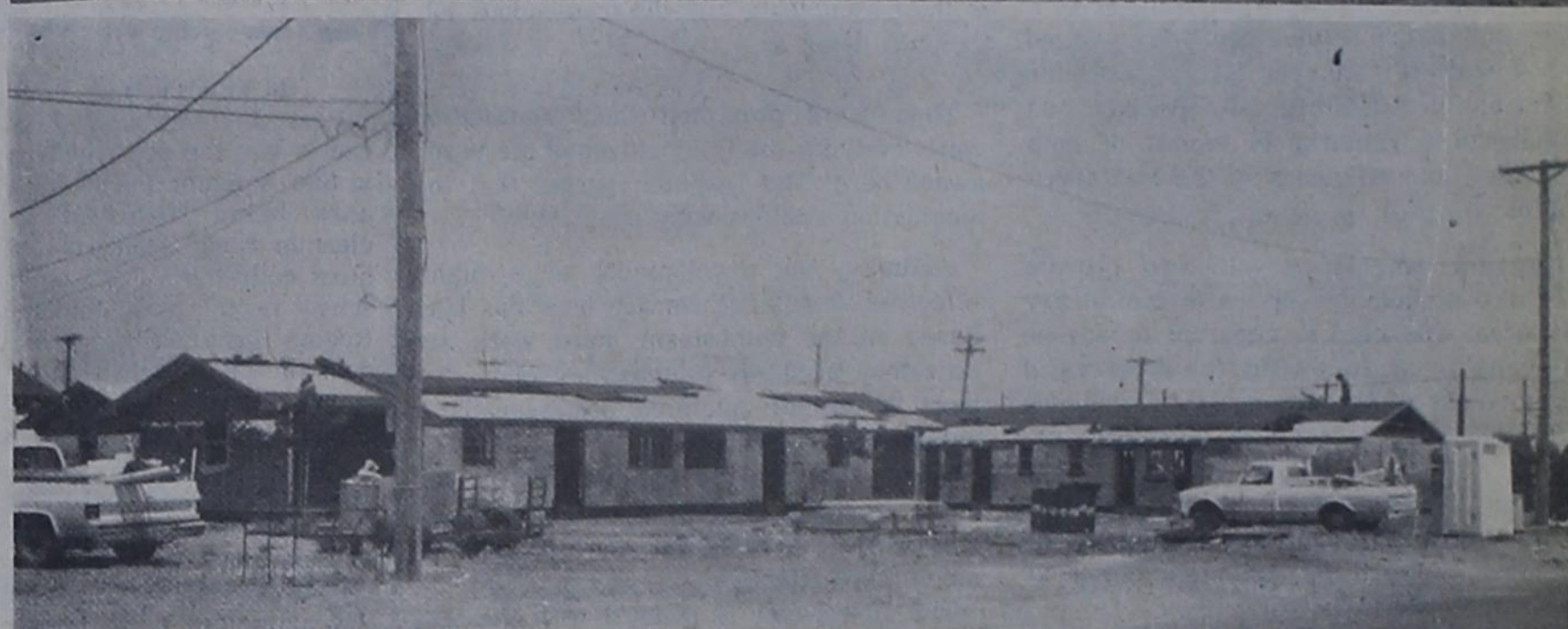
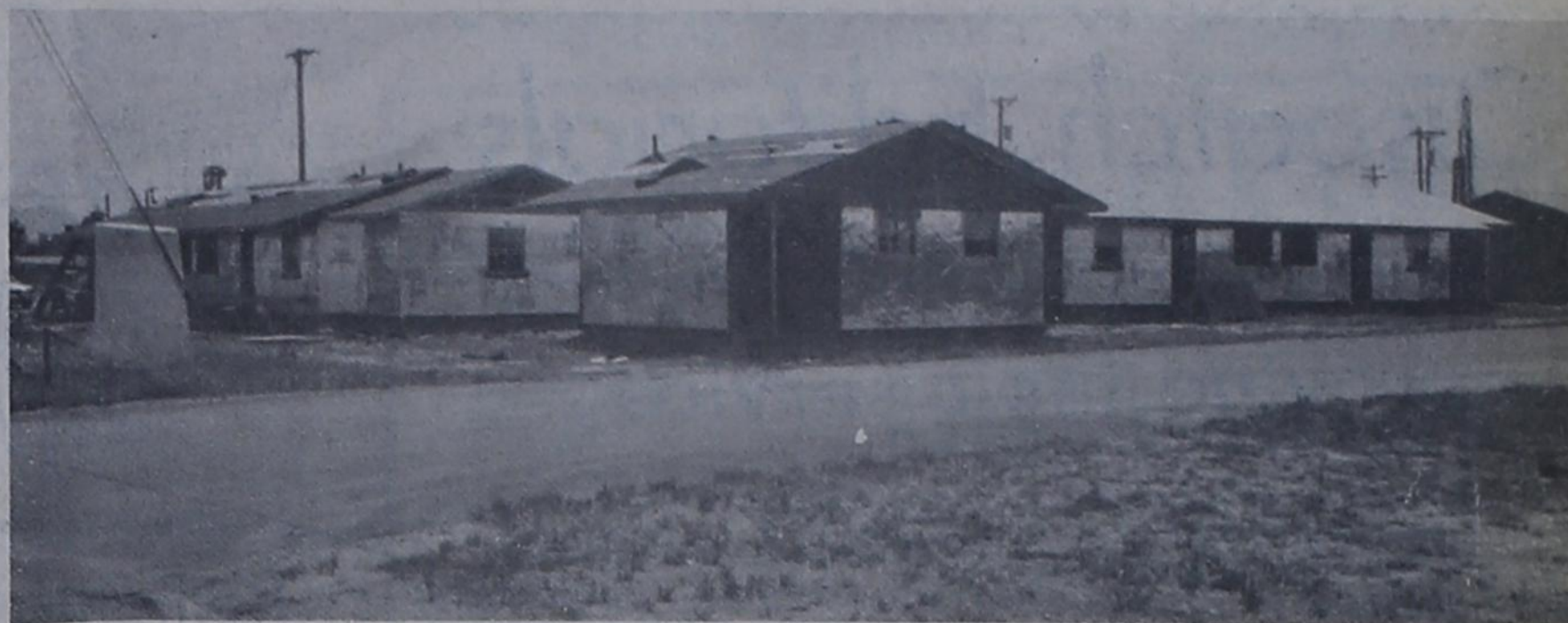
The shoe store, which has operated in Slaton for the last three years, has been moved to Post.

## Bids being asked on new, \$16,702 van ambulance

Advertising for bids in The Dispatch for purchase of a new van-type ambulance for the city-county ambulance service was approved by the

city council Monday night at its May session.

In a companion action, the council approved a boost in ambulance charges after

earing Hospital Administrator Ed Zintgraff report the increase would keep the local service in line with similar ambulance opera-

tions in this area.

The county commissioners court must also approve the purchase of a new ambulance and he boost in ambulance rates before final action can be completed.

Zintgraff will appear before the court next Monday with the requests. He is in charge of the ambulance operation and had been asked by the joint city-county ambulance committee to make the presentations to council and court.

The van-type ambulance will cost \$16,702 and is considerably less expensive than the modula-type ambulance which have been priced at from \$25,000 to \$32,000.

The new ambulance the local service wants is a 1979 van-type on a longbed Chevrolet chassis with a 350 V-8 engine. It will carry four passengers in the back together with two EMTs and two more up front. It includes a voice intercom between front and back.

Zintgraff said such a van-type ambulance will get 10 miles to the gallon of gas and is more maneuverable than the service's present ambulance.

Volunteer EMTs already have donated \$3,000 from their salaries for ambulance runs toward the purchase of the new ambulance and the service's "green ambulance" can be traded in for another \$1,000 after all useful equipment is removed, Zintgraff told councilmen.

This would reduce the overall cost of the unit to the city and county to \$12,702 or \$6,351 apiece.

Mayor pro-tem Bill Pool, who presided at the Monday night session in the absence of Mayor Giles McCrary, took a look into the current city budget and said the city has approximately \$7,000 of unspent funds in the budget for the ambulance operation.

He pointed out that if the ambulance service could virtually pay its way for the last six months of the year, the city could afford its share of the ambulance purchase cost.

The council decided to advertise for bids for the new ambulance immediately as a "time saver" while (See City Council, Page 12)

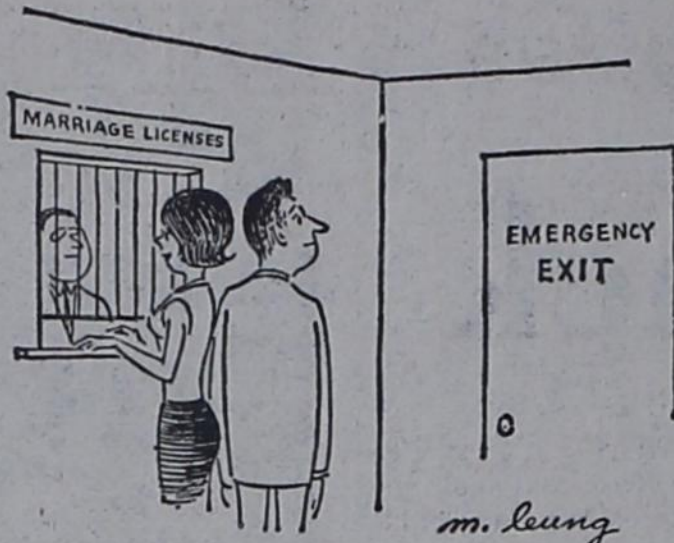
Experts have been right in the middle of our TV screen all week trying to explain things. The best we could get is that the United States is going to be short about nine percent of the supply it needs this summer.

### Library Corner

Many books have been listed in the past and maybe you have been intending to come in and pick up a certain book to read or study. Come in and look around, you might find a book in addition to the one you came after.

Ladies, we do have several good cookbooks. Cookbooks for dieters and for good eats. There are diets for diabetics, bland diets, low cholesterol, low sodium and low-calorie.

Have you ever studied a good cookbook? Often we see a recipe that appeals to us and we use that recipe but do not look further. Most good cookbooks give instruction in the art of baking, casseroles, and many others. Just to name a few, a beginner in baking a cake might not know that to cream and sugar and shortening by beating rigorously (between 6 and 7 on a mix master on medium or an electric hand beater). After the batter is smooth, add eggs if the recipe calls for it. This method will usually result in a moist fine

grained cake, then fold in flour sifted with baking powder or soda alternately with milk, or stirring very little.

There are hints given throughout the books such as butter is used with cookies that you want to be crisp and shortening is better for cakes.

The significant segments and numbers to be served are as follows: 16-19 years old, 108; 20-21 years old, 3; Black, 43; and Hispanic, 55.

The intent of the modification for Title IV SYEP is to add \$504,267 to the original planning grant of \$70,843.

The purpose of these fund will be to provide work experience, career orientation and job opportunities for economically disadvantaged youth (14-21 year olds). Special emphasis will be given to those youth who are potential dropouts and/or who need assistance in overcoming barriers to employment and in making a transition from school into the labor force.

Cost categories and their dollar allocations are as follows: Administration, 86,267; Wages and Fringe, 373,821; Services, 115, 022; Total 575,110.

now being done certain streets by heavy trucks being parked on residential streets near residences of the drivers overnight.

Such a new ordinance which attorney Harvey Morton can work up would permit the driving of heavy oil field equipment to well sites over the city when needed for oil work and for

moving vans bringing in or taking out furniture.

The action to begin funding the new employees' retirement fund came after several years of work to set up a retirement fund to meet governmental requirements and local needs.

The city will put an amount equal to five percent of each employee's salary into the fund with the employee having the option to putting in up to another five percent toward his or her individual retirement.

Mrs. Yvonne Kennedy who handles the city's water billings appeared before the council to discuss plans to purchase an expensive new billing machine.

The present mechanical-type billing machine has broken down several times recently and taken up to two weeks to get repaired, which almost caused delays in getting out the city's water bills.

Two new machines are being installed in neighboring cities and Mrs. Kennedy said she would like to check out the efficiency of their operation before a final decision is made here on what make of machine is most desirable for local water billing needs.

As to the repair of airport runways here, City Manager Pete Maddox reported that Julian Smith, state residential highway engineer who also is a pilot, thinks the city can successfully patch the runways this year by itself to prevent further deterioration while state aid is being sought for a possible resurfacing project.

In the final action of the evening the council went on record as opposing House Bill 585 in the Texas Legislature which would allow the Texas Public Utility Commission to remove jurisdiction for setting electric rates from local governing bodies.

The council decided to send a letter to State Senator E.L. Short voicing their opposition to the bill now favored by the public utility firms.

survey had been conducted which showed that 810 Post students, from second through 12th grades, would use the new track either in physical education or athletics, as compared to only 60 now using it.

Sparks said an all-weather track is "the most inexpensive thing the school district could build for its students." He said an all-weather track would also attract much wider community use.

If ordered, Sparks said he would have the track ready for the 1980 spring track season and would hope to finish it by Dec. 15 after which winter weather is very unpredictable for construction work.

Trustee Mike Flanigan said he wanted time to determine if the same amount of money could be better spent elsewhere in the school system before coming to a decision on the track.

Trustees said they expected to be given "taxpayer input" before next Tuesday night's meeting.

Thompson said the track is the present major sports need. It has been in the talking stage for several years with the cost jumping over \$12,000 over the last two years.

School principals were invited to the session along with Thompson to discuss the track and coaching situation.

In another action, trustees voted to allow Thompson to add an eleventh coach to his staff. Post has had 11 coaches in the past but is now only operating with 10.

Thompson said he would assign the extra coach to junior high, putting three of the 11 in the junior high boys program.

The new athletic director is hopeful of completing his staff in the next two weeks and submitting the new coaches to school trustees for contract approval.

Jack Lott was reelected president of the school board as new officers were elected for the new board year, following the canvassing of the vote in Saturday's runoff trustee election and the swearing in of Mrs. Juanella Hays for position two.

John Boren was named the board's vice president and Mrs. Hays the new secretary.

Post insurance man Tom Power appeared before the trustees to request the board permit him to submit a bid on the six insurance floater policies which will expire June 1. He submitted written copies to each board member which he said would have permitted the board to save \$1,472 of the \$6,267 paid in premiums for the six policies for the current year.

After an hour's decision, Lott advised Power to send any insurance bids he planned to make on the policies to Bryan J. Williams, the board's agent of record. Under present board policy, Williams is the agent of record and is required to submit the best possible insurance proposal to the

awaiting any action the county takes on the project next week.

Zintgraff told the council that "the green ambulance", which was purchased from the Hudman Funeral Home after the city-county service was set up, is "in critical condition and no longer operative at the EMT level." He also pointed to several deficiencies in the service's other ambulance, including the four-wheel drive which makes for an uncomfortable ride for patients and high cost of operation.

Ambulance fees approved by the council call for \$30 plus \$1 per mile one-way in runs outside the city limits. Present charges are \$25 for in-county runs and \$55 for out-of-county runs.

Zintgraff told the council that a survey of the service's last six months of operation shows about half the runs are made within the county and half out of the county to Lubbock hospitals.

He said a run to Lubbock Methodist Hospital is 37 miles outside the city limits which would make the new rate \$67 for such a run as compared to \$55 under the present rate.

He explained that on many ambulance runs two EMTs are needed in the back of the ambulance with the patient, depending on the patient's condition, with the third EMT driving up front. The rate increase would permit the third EMT to be added when necessary without a direct loss to city and county in cost of operation.

He presented a statistical analysis of the ambulance service's six month operation from last October through March which shows an average of 22 ambulance trips per month at a \$5.06 ambulance maintenance cost per run not figuring \$25 salaries for two EMTs or depreciation on the vehicles.

The figures also show an average of 82 percent collection of charges over that half year with \$4,992 of the \$6,076 billed collected. This is considered an excellent collection percentage in comparison with other ambulance services.

Pool pointed out the council had budgeted toward

the possible purchase of a new ambulance during the current fiscal year as the council has long agreed on the growing need for a new vehicle.

Council action to advertise for bids for the vehicle and to boost ambulance charges were both by unanimous vote of the four council members present.
