


Some Christmas thoughts

America feels uneasy this Christmas with 50 hostages being held in Tehran by an Islam zealot. The country is frustrated by this world embarrassment, fearful of what may come next in the explosive Middle East, and raw angry too.

Inflation has shot the cost of Christmas trees up from an average of \$8.50 in the cities to something like \$24.25. The same economic disease will mean fewer gifts under the \$24.25 trees in many homes and a reduction in both the quantity and quality of the Christmas feast.

But that frustration won't come home to roost until January when the world turns immediately bleak and the tax man looms as big as Ayatollah Khomeli.

Then there's the energy fiasco. We do not wish to blacken these Christmas thoughts with comment on this subject other than to say it appears all our government leaders are being guided by "political considerations" instead of national stewardship on the issue.

There is of course little Americans can do with these problems at Christmas time. They cannot be entirely laid aside.

The hostages have taken over the front pages and the TV newscasts to the point we face them headon in confused frustration several times each day. Inflation figures in most decisions for Christmas preparations.

But Christmas has come and gone for centuries in a world troubled with all kinds of problems and smothered in deadly wars. And it is now coming again - and too soon will be gone.

Christmas is not a state of mind. It is more than a loving mood. It is a spirit which some grasp and become transformed for a few days or weeks into better persons. Some cannot find the Christmas spirit. To them the holiday is a bitter humbug because for them the holiday does not deliver on its promises.

Christmas is the No. 1 fund raising time of the year if you haven't noticed. All kinds of causes are espoused at yule time because most folks feel more loving and thus more giving. They want to help others. Interspersed with all those Christmas cards in the mail are a wide variety of printed appeals for funds. In some ways, we consider these appeals an intrusion into our Christmas world.

For the young, Christmas is all bright and shiny. Most of the gaily wrapped gifts under the tree are for them. And they will include so many surprises.

For the "getting old", Christmas is entirely different. It is a time of the gathering of the family around a single hearth, usually the only time of year they are all together except in times of terrible sickness or death. Every hour of happiness for the "getting old". is pure joy to be long remembered after homes have become empty and quiet again.

And those holiday memories stretching back through the years. The story of "Christmas past" lives in the hearts of each one of us. Remember when you were little and the Christmases you enjoyed so long ago, you can barely remember how old you were the first time.

Then the Christmases of the "growing up" period. The Christmases with your own growing family. And if there have been a whole lot of those Christmases, the memories deep inside of the loved ones who will not be here to enjoy next week's holiday.

These "Christmases past" were enjoyed in many settings and in many places. Often they were in many cities and even in foreign

lands during the "war years." Yes, Christmases past are treasures of the heart to be brought back out and "looked at" during the quiet times of this bustling

Christmas season. For some, like your downtown merchant, the Christmas season is really "his whole business year" wrapped up into a few "hit or

miss" weeks. He must plan for months ahead to fill his shelves at Christmas time and he is dependent upon good yule sales to make his real profit for the year. It's the time he works the longest hours, hopes for the best, and really feels the economic pressure.

Christmas keeps changing.

We can remember when just about everybody who could "adopted" a poor family at Christmas time. If a family couldn't afford its own "poor family" three or four families went together to

Churches also were the center of the giving to the poor.

Now it's difficult in America to define exactly who is poor and who isn't. Few have all they want. The government provides food stamps and guaranteed incomes for the "poor."

So the poor almost have been forgotten at Christmas. That's because the government doesn't provide "Christmas packages" with hand-me-down gifts for the kids and a couple of extra sacks of groceries.

All but forgotten too about Christmas is its real meaning.

It seems the birth of Jesus is almost overlooked in the family rush for holiday togetherness.

Christ brought the promise of God's forgiveness and love to a continually troubled world. He has brought us hope as we look to the future - hope of individual peace not only for the few remaining years of our lives but for all eternity.

Usually it's right after Christmas that we took stock of our own futures as we feel a new year. This is a mistake. We should look ahead at Christmas time, not just behind. We should renew our faith in Jesus as we celebrate again his birth.

And then life will become a Christmas parade, from one Christmas right on down the road which won't seem quite so hard to

In Waco, House Speaker Bill Clayton told a Democratic party meeting that Gov. Bill Clements could seriously jeopardize his "real good working relationship" with the Legislature if he tries to strong-arm pet issues through a special session promised for March or September. A few days later Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby echoed those sentiments.

Clements wants the special session to pass three issues: use of wiretaps in narcotics cases, initiative and referendum, and tax reform.

But Democrats also strongly suspect the Republican governor wants to use the special session to disrupt their reelection campaigns back home—and they don't take that thought lightly.

Nor have they taken kindly to two Republican legislators whom they believe to be traveling the state rounding up opponents for their Democrat colleagues.

Clements has never been one to back away from a political fight and his party delights in their new muscle. The next election, round two in the state's new two-party ring, may be a big one for the history books.

New Party Policy

The State Democratic Executive Committee balked again at arranging a presidential primary on May 3. Chairman Billy Goldberg said the committee will schedule a primary if the Democratic presidential race appears close by the March 10 SDEC meeting.

The Democrats also added a rule to permit removal of party officers who publicly support opposing candidates or parties, a gambit aimed at Dallas Democrats who backed Clements in 1978.

> He added that the Christmas count starts at 6 p.m. December 21 and continues until midnight December 25, while the New Year count starts at 6 p.m. December 28 and continues until midnight January 1.

Speir said that statewide traffic deaths are presently running about six per cent ahead of the record pace of a year ago. Last year there were 3,980 persons killed statewide in motor vehicle crashes.

At the end of preliminary holiday counts last year, 57 deaths were reported during the Christmas period and 39 during the New Year holidays.

Speir said all available DPS troopers would be on duty. State Troopers and local officers will be working together to keep traffic moving safely. "I have asked our officers to place special emphasis on removing drunks and reckless drivers from the streets and highways," he added.

"We will continue to work with the news media to keep motorists posted on unusual traffic conditions and to advise them where and why serious holiday wrecks are occurring," Speir said.





Tenants should realize, however, that this new law does not allow a tenant to withhold rent when a landlord fails to make repairs, Ms. Kerbel notes.

As long as the tenant lives on the premises, he must pay the full rental rate.

Also, if the damage or defect is insured, the landlord has no duty to start repairs until the insurance money arrives.

In addition, if damage or defect is the tenant's fault, his family's or guest's fault, the landlord has no duty to

Landlords only have a duty to repair a condition caused by normal wear and tear - and which materially affects the tenants' physical health or safety. Tenants must file a

lawsuit in a county or district court - not a justice of the peace court.

So most tenants will need an attorney to represent
