The hometown newspaper has often been called the "consumers trade journal."

A trade journal is a specialized publication which carries advertising limited to certain businesses or professions. Some six thousand trade journals are pointed for people in every conceivable type of trade. It is a booming form of journalism because it provides advertisers with a medium in which specialized goods may be sold with a minimum of waste circulation.

The manufacturer of barber's supplies would find it inexpensive to advertise in a barber's trade journal because all of his readers would be potential customers. Or, the livestock breeder finds it most efficient to advertise in one of the many trade journals slanted to people in the same line of livestock production.

In the same sense, the local retailer, selling goods used by the general public, finds the local newspaper the most economical method to reach the potential customer. There is no waste circulation in local newspaper advertising for retail goods and services consumed by the local family.

Every local newspaper reader is a potential customer of groceries, clothing, hardware, gifts, drugs, gasoline, and a great variety of services from banking to dry cleaning.

Only the local newspaper provides assurance of no waste circulation to the retailer. Other media, including metropolitan newspapers, general magazines, and broadcast media circulate over large areas which cover publics which cannot buy at a particular store.

The advertiser pays for waste circulation regardless of the benefits. And, for this reason, the local newspaper remains the basic retail advertising outlet.

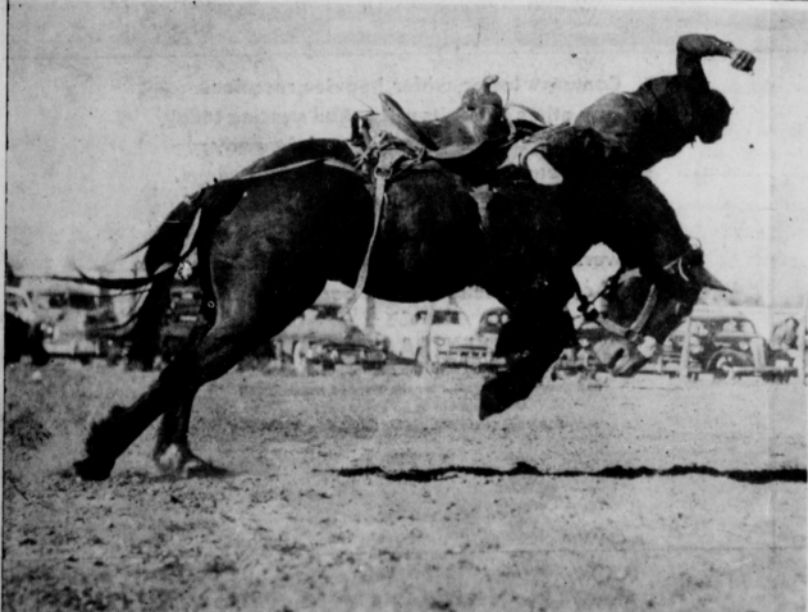

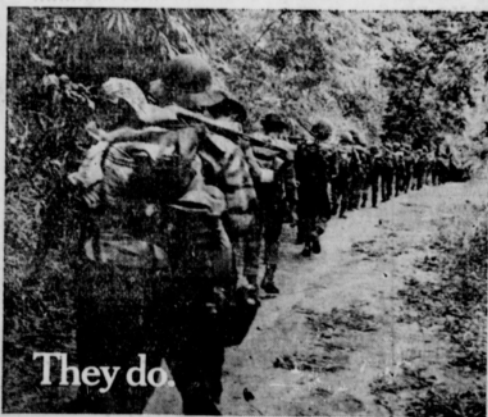

### Cotton Accepts Scholarship at UH

Ed Cotton, High School Principal and math teacher, has accepted a scholarship and will attend a Summer Institute for High School Math Teachers at the University of Houston, June 5 through July 14.

This Institute is supported by the National Science Foundation and offers courses in Modern Concepts in Geometry; Introduction to Probabilities and Statistics; Fundamental Concepts of Calculus; and Topics in Abstract Algebra.

Courses Mr. Cotton will take are Introduction to Probability and Statistics and Topics in Algebra.

In the Introduction to Probability and Statistics course, he will study the development of basic concepts in probability and statistics, using the language and notation of sets. Topics included in the sets: probability in a finite sample space, permutations, combinations, random variables, joint and continuous distributions, the binomial distribution, statistical applications of probability and theory of sampling.

Materials for Topics in Algebra have been selected so as to introduce those participating to the structure of mathematics. Topics included are groups, rings, integral domains, fields, vector spaces, linear transformations, matrices and systems of linear equations.

Mr. Cotton was also offered a scholarship to attend Lawrence University in Appleton, Wis., which he turned down in favor of the University of Houston.

Mrs. Cotton, Remedial Reading instructors, also plans to attend summer classes at the University.

## DRIVING TESTS CONDUCTED AT BAIRD PUBLIC SCHOOL

Safe driving must be made a personal habit of every motorist if the slaughter on America's highways is to be curbed, Ben Bullard, Assistant Safety Director, Texas Farm Bureau, declared as he spoke prior to conducting driving tests at Baird High School.

"Excessive speed is the greatest single cause of automobile accidents," Bullard said. In the demonstration which followed, he pointed out where even 20, 30 or 40 miles per hour is excessive under certain conditions.

Taking part in the special traffic safety program were Tommy Bearden and Cathy Townsend, each driving a specially equipped car at 20 mph; Ed Cotton, high school principal, driving 30 mph; and Highway Patrolman Bob Favor, driving 40 mph.

Stopping distances for the participants were: Tommy Bearden, 31 ft. 6 inches; Cathy Townsend, 33 feet; Ed Cotton, 37 ft. 4 inches; and Bob Favor, 98 feet.

Also assisting in the program were Dickie Hass, Bobby Jack Sims, Bobby Voigts, J. D. Faircloth, Robert Green and Kenyan Townsend. Also present were Jimmy West and Haden Payne, Farm Bureau representatives.

The test driver was signaled to stop by an electrically con-

trolled detonator. As the shell was fired, the street was marked with yellow paint. A second bullet was fired as brakes were applied and a third after the car came to a complete stop. Distance between the spots were carefully measured to determine in feet and inches, how far the car traveled before the driver applied the brakes, or the reaction distance, and how far it traveled after the brakes were applied, or the braking distance.

Bullard emphasized the fact that a driver who observes the speed laws carefully is not a safe driver if he neglects many other items, such as proper signaling for turns, approaching intersections in the proper lane for a turn, the proper way to turn around, and many other things which are essential for safe driving.

The demonstration was sponsored by Callahan County Farm Bureau and is part of a long range traffic safety program conducted since 1957 by the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department.

## Treasury Offers "Bonus" To Savings Bond Buyers

The nation's millions of regular Savings Bond buyers are being offered a "bonus" by the Treasury Department in the form of Freedom Shares, which will go on sale May 1, according to Howard E. Farmer, Chairman of the Callahan County Savings Bonds Committee.

The new security will yield an annual average of 4.74 per cent when held to maturity of 4½ years, Mr. Farmer said. Offered in denominations of \$25, \$50, \$75 and \$100, the notes can be bought only in conjunction with Series E Bonds, and only to the extent that bonds are purchased on a regular plan.

"This means that for every \$25 E Bond you buy on a regular plan, you can also buy a \$25 Freedom Share up to a limit of \$1,350 in one calendar year, based on the face values of the shares. You can buy more bonds than Freedom Shares, of course, but not the other way around."

The cost of the new security is \$20.25 for each \$25 face value. This compares with the \$18.75 cost of a Series E Bond. The difference is due to the fact that the Freedom Shares mature in 4½ years, while E Bonds must be held 7 years to reach their \$25 face value.

Two basic plans are available for the combined purchase of Series E Bonds and Freedom Shares. One is through the Payroll Savings Plan offered by business firms to employees. The other is the Bond A Month Plan available at many banks, whereby the cost is deducted monthly from a checking account.

Mr. Farmer said the following County banks will offer the Bond A Month plan to their checking account customer: The First National Bank, Baird; The Citizens State Bank, Cross Plains; and The Peoples State Bank, Clyde.

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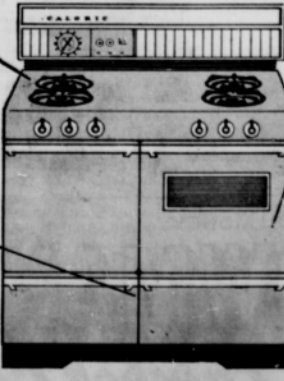

Perhaps the greatest responsibility of an American is accepting and living by the American way of life. This would be, especially hard for an immigrant to the United States. Every citizen of the United States, young and old alike, should be thankful to live in a country so beautiful and free as our America.

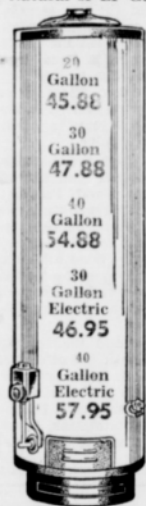
