40,563 bales are ginned

Garza County's 1979 cotton crop should go down in history as the biggest ever for this county, a Dispatch gin check Tuesday disclosed.


Garza area gins already have ginned an estimated 40,563 bales of Garza cotton and have an estimated 3,056 bales still to go with "two more weeks of good'weather" needed to finish it all up.

That would place the 1979 Garza crop at 43,779 bales, which would be 5,276 bales over the previous record crop of 38,503 bales harvested in 1973.

The Dispatch's gin check is based on estimates of how much of the cotton ginned at three of the area gins is Garza cotton. Half the cotton at Hackberry is counted as Garza cotton, and one third of the bales ginned at both Grassland Coop and Producers Coop on the far western edge of

Three of the eight gins are either through or down to green boles - Hackberry, Southland, and Producers Coop.




