"Second, the newspaper pro-vides the prospect with assur-ance that the advertising is re-liable. He feels that he can de-pend upon a promise that is made in black and white in the family newspaper.

Because of the competitive situation, the value of the newspaper as a medium for selling used cars is much more readily recognized in large cities than in smaller trade centers. The large city dealer knows when his business goes elsewhere—and why.

Unfortunately, the dealer in the smaller city often does not realize that a large percentage of his potential business goes to metropolitan centers because he has failed to use his own local newspaper. He leaves an information vacuum which the local prospect often fills by studying metropolitan newspapers, and by traveling to Metropolis to buy his used car.
