Community Calendar Is Being Sponsored By Band Booster Club

At a called meeting of the Baird Band Boosters Club held Thursday night, members decided to sponsor a birthday calendar for the community and work on the project is scheduled to begin possibly this week.

The community calendar will have a picture of the Bear band on the top section which will contain merchants advertising. Each month will be on a separate sheet and the birthdays of Baird residents will be printed on the dates corresponding with the date of their birth.

Birthday listings on the calendar will cost 25 cents per name. Plans also call for approaching clubs for listings of their meeting dates throughout the year. Those listings, like the birthday listings, will be sold for 25c each. Anniversary dates can also be listed on the community calendar.

The Calendars will be sold to the public for \$1 each. They are of a personal nature in that they contain names of Baird people only. Business firms can use the calendars if they desire to remember customers on their birthdays.

The town has been divided into sections and band members will make a house to house campaign to solicit names for the calendar. A man and wife with three children can have all their names listed on the calendar and purchase a calendar for a total of \$2.25, and for 25 cents additional can have their wedding anniversary date inserted.

Money derived from the project will be used in the purchase of additional uniforms for the growing band, Director Max Harper said.

He ran the store until he sold it in 1949 to begin working with the newly organized co-op. At the present time, he is living in Clyde.

Lewis Simmons, who once was mill foreman at the plant, has rejoined the staff as plant foreman. Mel Green will continue as manager of the Clyde operations of the organization.

Charles Hounshell and Earl Hughes have also resigned their posts with the Co-op.

Mr. Loper led the round table discussion of mutual problems of interest to the county bankers.

Mack Eplens of Abilene catered the occasion. Next meeting will be in Coleman in January.

Bears to Meet Clyde Saturday Night; Win Over Cross Plains Buffaloes

The Baird Bears put on a scoring spurt in the first half of their game with the Cross Plains Buffs at Cross Plains Friday night, then took it easy in the second half to win their second conference game 35-6.

The Bears so blanketed the Buffs that they made only three first downs and 17 yards net on the ground during the entire 48 minutes of play. They fared little better in the air as the Bear defenders held them to two completions in eight tries for 26 yards. They also intercepted one of the Cross Plains heaves to blunt the passing attack.

In the same playing time, the Bears ran up 204 yards on the ground with 16 first downs. They completed one of four passes for 45 yards.

The Cross Plains fans had only two instances where they could register enthusiasm. The first time was on a 20 yard scamper by McMillan which gave them their only first down in the first half, and the second was on a beautiful 93 yard return of the second half kick off by Reggie Stover. The kick by Tally Windham bounced over the head of Stover at the 20 and he ran back to the seven to retrieve the ball. He found a little running room and carried the ball for the 93 yards and a score.

The Bears scored early in the game when Windham bulled his way for 22 yards and the TD. The Bears took the opening kick off and worked it to the Buff two where they lost it on downs. Cross Plains netted one yard in three tries and kicked out to the Bear 37. Wally Harris took the ball to the 22 and on the first

play, Windham carried across. Richie Crow kicked the extra point and the tally stood at 7-0 with less than half the period gone.

The second Baird touchdown came early in the second quarter on a 45 yard pass play from Harris to Steve Stanley. The Bears had taken possession of the ball on their own 35 on a punt and had worked it to the 45. Harris hit Stanley at about the 35 and he weaved his way on a beautiful bit of running to cross the goal line untouched. The try for point was no good.

Baird made it 21-0 a short time later when Fullback Freddie Alexander carried over into the promised land from seven yards out and then plunged over for two extra points.

They lost little time in scoring again. Late in the second quarter, Tally Windham intercepted a Buff pass at mid field and returned it to the Cross Plains eight. From that point Steve Stanley crow footed in for the score. Crow failed to convert and the half ended 27-0.

The Buffs got a shot in the arm at the intermission and for a while the Bear attack was stopped. They went scoreless in the third quarter and for most of the final quarter. Windham made the final tally on a 5 yard burst through the line and Eddie Childers made points after to bring the score to 35-6. The score was set up on a 25 yard punt return by Harris. He took the punt on the 50 and ran it back to the 25. A Cross Plains personal foul moved the ball to the 10, and it took Windham two plays to score.

Windham, Alexander, Harris, Stanley, Childers and Crow were offensive standouts and the defensive standouts were numerous. Ed Ault, Mac McIntosh, Bruce Bell, Danny Ross, Bobby Black, Thomas Robbins, Douglas Jagers and Pat McKinnon were stalwarts in the line while the defensive backs did outstanding jobs.

This week the Bears are going to Clyde to try to spoil the Clyde Homecoming. They are preparing for a tough encounter and are looking for the Bulldogs to be on the rebound from two successive set backs in conference play.

The Bears and the Bulldogs are both licking a few wounds from last weeks games. The Bulldogs lost to Ranger, but should be ready physically and mentally for the Bears. The Bears are limping a little and some of the players are nursing severe bruises. They should be in good shape come Saturday night.

Probably the largest crowd of the season will jam Bulldog Stadium Saturday night as a large number of Baird fans will join the Clyde Homecoming crowd at the contest.

**QUICKIE
LESSONS IN GRAMMAR**
By Lloyd D. Huff

Today we look at the third member of the family of verbals — infinitives.

Participles, you remember, are half-verb, half-adjective, or verb forms used as adjectives; gerunds are half-verb, half-noun, or are verbs used in whatever way in which nouns can be used. Infinitives are verb forms used as nouns, adjectives, or adverbs; and they generally carry the sign "to", although not always. In example "I want to paint the house," to paint is the direct object of the verb want and therefore would be a noun (house is the object of the infinitive). In the example "His desire to paint the house was accomplished," to paint modifies desire and tells what kind of desire it is; and since desire is a noun anything modifying it will have to be an adjective. In the example "He ran to catch the train," to catch tells the condition under which he ran and since the only thing that modifies verbs are adverbs, "to catch the train" is an infinitive phrase used adverbially. In the example "Please let me go with you," go is an infinitive appearing without the regular infinitive sign "to", and it is a part of the infinitive clause acting as the direct object (noun) of the verb let. Interestingly enough, if we change the verb to allow, the infinitive sign comes back in and we say "Please allow me to go with you."

Finally with the infinitive, the best and most careful writers and speakers do not "split" it; that is, other words are not allowed entry between the infinitive sign to and the verb form itself. For example "They try to

always help their neighbors," should be changed to "They always try to help their neighbors." Verbals are tricky but lots of fun.

PASTURE SHORT COURSE

A pasture short course for adult farmers will be held, November 4-7, under the sponsorship of the Moran High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. Robert Hunt, Superintendent, and Mr. Tim Stone of Vocational Agriculture.

Mr. Tom Bowers, pasture specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Soil and Crop Sciences at Texas A&M College, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M College.

Mr. Bowers holds a B.S. Degree in Agricultural Education from Texas Tech, and has completed work at A&M towards a M.S. Degree in Agronomy. He has had 9 years of field experience as a county agricultural agent, where much of the emphasis was on pasture production.

The short course at Moran is scheduled to begin, November 4, at 7:30 p.m. in the Vocational Agriculture building. Other meetings will be held November 5-7 at 7:30 p.m. and the same place. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Bowers will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on the farm instruction, according to Tim Stone.

Farmers and ranchers interested in attending the short course should write or call the Superintendent of schools, Mr. Hunt, or the teacher of Vocational Agriculture, Mr. Tim Stone. An entry fee of \$2.00 will be charged. Pasture short course certificates are to be presented to each enrollee who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Bowers states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects as adopted grasses and legumes, fertilization, grazing management, and grazing systems. The primary purpose of the course is in helping farmers and ranchers to make the most profit from their pastures.
