## Cash Prizes And Ribbons Offered Boys



### C. Of C. To Sponsor 4-H Exhibition

Judging of animals entered in the Garza County 4-H Club Fat Stock Show will begin at 10 o'clock, Robert H. Gibson, agricultural agent and Alvin G. Davis, County 4-H president, announced this week.

The judge for calves will be D. W. Sherrill, Lubbock County agricultural agent, and the judge for hogs will be W. B. Griffin of Tahoka, Lynn County agent.

The show, which is sponsored by the Post Chamber of Commerce, will be held on the vacant lots east of the court house, if the weather permits. The animals will be on exhibit until 4 p. m.

Calves to be entered were produced by ranchers in Garza and surrounding counties and raised and fattened by Garza 4-H boys. Most of the hogs to be entered were produced and fattened by the exhibitors.

Cash prizes will be awarded to first, second and third place winners in each of three classes: Heavy calves, light calves and fat hogs. Ribbons will be presented to winners of the first six places in each class. In addition there will be a cash prize and ribbon for each the Grand Champion calves and Reserve Champions.

All of the animals will be eligible to enter the District 4-H (Continued On Back Page, Col. 3)

### Near Complete Returns Filed On Dimes March

A total of \$794.25 has been turned in to date to Judge J. Lee Bowen, director of the March of Dimes campaign in Garza County. There are still a few coin collectors and other sources of donations yet to be turned in, he said yesterday.

The money was contributed by the following: School, \$246.83; churches, \$170.24; coin collectors, \$313.07; service clubs, \$29.11, and individual gifts, \$35.

From the total, \$46.43 was deducted to defray expenses of coin collectors and express costs, leaving \$747.82 for the infantile paralysis fund. Half of the money will be sent to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis to be used in research and in areas where there are polio epidemics, and the other half or (Continued On Back Page, Col. 3)

### Duckworth To Head Greater Gifts Unit

Ira Lee Duckworth was announced this week as chairman of the Greater Gifts Committee for the 1948 American Red Cross Drive in Garza County. Lewis Nance, county director of the drive, also announced that Judge J. Lee Bowen will be chairman of the City Residential Division of the drive and Mrs. S. D. Strasser will be chairman of the General Rural Committee.

Members of the Greater Gift Committee, besides the chairman, will be Dr. D. C. Williams, Ted Hibbs, T. L. Jones, T. R. Greenfield and J. A. Stallings.

The drive, which will last a month over the nation, will open on March 1. Nance recalled that Garza County was the fifth county in the state to reach its quota in 1947. He is hoping that the quota can be met even quicker this year and is urging the speedy cooperation of all persons who plan to contribute to the Red Cross.

### Alvin Davis To Earn Candidacy For 4-H Prexy

Alvin G. Davis, district boys' 4-H Club president, is engaged in a planned program of leadership in his 4-H work this year, Robert H. Gibson, Garza County agricultural agent, said yesterday.

He recently spoke to the Senior and Junior Clubs at New Home on the subject of record keeping. He plans to give the same talk to each of the 4-H clubs in the county during April.

At the invitation of W. N. Williamson of Lubbock, district agent, Alvin will be master of ceremonies at a tractor maintenance school at Texas Technological College March 10 and 11.

Other planned activities will take him to nearly every county in the 18-county district of which he is president before the state 4-H Round-Up in College Station this summer.

J. W. Potts, Extension 4-H club specialist, has assured him that the state election (which was called off last summer) will be held this year. Davis was to have been a candidate for the state presidency in 1947.

## Postal Intake Shows Substantial Increase

The growth of Post, as reflected in money orders and postal receipts, was somewhat phenomenal in 1947.

Money order receipts last year totaled \$208,380.87, as compared with \$134,923.05 for 1946 and \$140,636.57 for 1937. Acting Postmaster Harold Voss told the Post Rotary Club in a talk Tuesday at the American Legion Hall.

Postal receipts last year totaled \$20,042.50, as compared with \$18,703.27 in 1946 and \$15,031 in 1937, Voss said.

He told the Rotarians that the local postoffice had a total of 257 depositors and a postal savings total of \$231,955, as of January 1, 1948. Additional deposits brought the total to about \$240,000 by this week, he said.

It was interesting to note that while money order receipts for 1946 totaled \$63,457.82 less than they did last year they fell more than \$5,000 short of the 1937 total.

The total intake on money orders and postal receipts in the 1947 was \$74,797.05 more than the total intake in 1946.

## Bang's Disease, Tuberculosis Tests Available

Dr. A. J. Lewis, district veterinarian of the Texas State Sanitary Commission, has advised Robert H. Gibson, Garza County agricultural agent, that he will come to this county and make tests for Bang's Disease and tuberculosis in cattle whenever there are enough cows to warrant the trip.

Gibson states there will be a charge of \$1 per cow for each test, that is \$1 for the Bang's Disease test and an additional dollar for the tuberculosis test.

In order to get as many cows as possible at one time, Gibson is asking everyone who wants cows tested to contact him either personally or by mail, giving the number of animals for which each test is to be made. All interested persons are asked to make their requests by March 1.

Both diseases are communicable and can be transmitted through milk to human beings. Bang's Disease (Continued On Back Page, Col. 3)

They have bought a wholesale and retail Firestone store in Floydada. It will be called the Robinson-Davis Firestone Store.

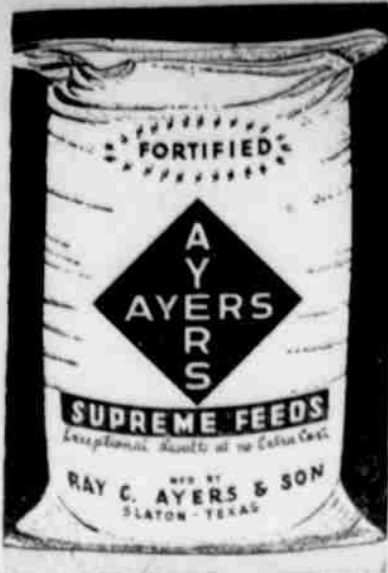
The men are in Floydada this week, completing arrangements for their opening, and their wives will leave here early next week.

### SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

#### Sells Grass Seeds

The first sale of perennial grass seed, grown, harvested, and sold by a cooperator of the Duck Creek Soil Conservation District was made this week.

Last summer E. Henderson harvested weeping lovegrass seed from a two-acre planting made in the spring. This week he sold some of the seed to C. R. Baldwin who plans on planting it to control erosion.

Although the fertile soil of this country was formed from grass, most of the land is still in grass, and much of the country income is derived from grass, and as far as soil technicians know this is the first time grass seed has ever been sold.

#### Needs Are Great

This first step in grass seed production is in the direction of meeting the needs for thousands of pounds of grass seed. The portion of the Duck Creek Soil Conservation District served by the Post Work Unit needs grass seed to plant some 31,000 acres. If the average cost of seed per acre is \$3, this alone is a business proposition of \$93,000.00 worth of seed. Soil decline and erosion figures gathered by the Soil Conservation Service show throughout the United States a need in the near future for grass seed to replant 184,000 acres of abandoned or seriously eroded land.

Soil Conservation Service technicians are urging farmers and business men who own land, to look into grass seed production. Acre for acre grass seed returns and will provide a source of seed to bring back unproductive acres. Interested persons are urged to contact the Soil Conservation Service office.

#### To Apply Phosphate

Who wouldn't give a pretty nickel to have green alfalfa pasture for cattle to graze? J. C. Eubanks in Canyon Valley is pasturing his alfalfa that is planted

on deep sandy sub-irrigated land. This week Eubanks made plans to apply about 200 pounds of super-phosphate per acre to the old stand of alfalfa. Alfalfa, hairy vetch, and other legumes are heavy feeders on calcium and phosphates in the soil. The use of phosphate fertilizer on sandy soils to replenish this mineral is a new practice here and will be watched with interest. The fertilizer will be applied with a special built rubber tired fertilizer spreader.

Eubanks plans to increase his alfalfa to 100 acres.

#### Soil Erosion Witnessed By Air

"Wait 'Til You Get Them Up In The Air Boys" might be a good soil conservation theme song. Jess Wright, local equipment dealer, says you can really see soil erosion from up in an airplane. Wright says he has flown from Mississippi to West Texas. From the air you can see fingers of erosion eating into fields. You can see gullies in the fields back east and on the plains too, Wright continues.

Aerial photographs taken two miles high are furnished by the Soil Conservation Service for soil technicians to use in assisting farmers to develop conservation plans for their farms.

This week the Post Work Unit office received an aerial map of the Percy Jones ranch that covers 70 sections. It will be used by range technicians to develop a pasture management plan of this ranch.

#### DEPUTY COLLECTOR TO HELP WITH TAX FORMS

Deputy Collector of Internal Revenue Ray W. 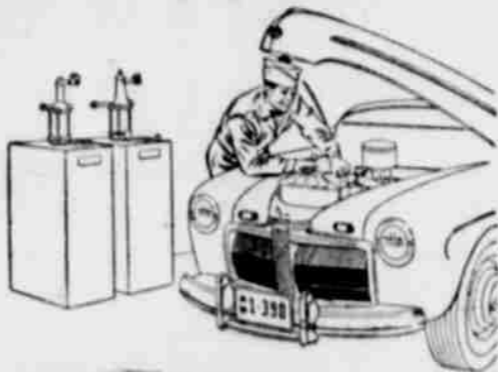

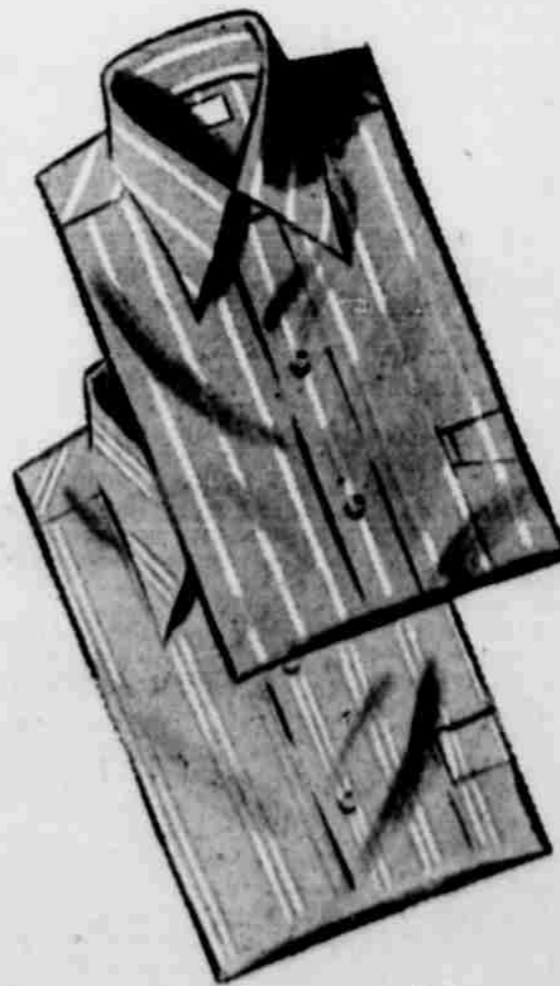

### Home Demonstration Activities Include Health And Recreation

An amazing variety of activities was covered in the scope of the home demonstration work in Garza County in 1947. Many of them have been summarized in preceding articles of this series. Still others are listed in the following paragraphs, taken from the annual report of Mrs. Jewell H. Strasner, agent:

Health and safety work included stressing mainly good nutrition for better health along with demonstrations, stressing the use of pasteurized milk as a guard against undulant fever; encouraging milk producers to have cows tested for Bangs Disease and tuberculosis and to disinfect milk utensils with chlorine water.

In safety work, removing fire and accident hazards were stressed. One hundred thirty-eight families checked these hazards and removed over 500 by placing matches in metal containers, having better lighted stairs, using good step-ladders and not using makeshifts, burning rubbish and trash, being more careful when using kerosene for starting fires, etc.

The agent worked 14 days with the people of Garza County on Home Management and Family Economics. The program was presented to a total of 122 women. As a result, two families assembled and used household kits, 31 families helped with income taxes, outlook information and buying problems, 61 families helped with time management problems, 72 engaged in financial planning of home accounts, 60 planned the use of credit for family living expenses.

The agent stressed saving energy by planning the work schedule, advising the women to do as many jobs as possible sitting down thereby "using the head to save the heels." Ironing, for instance can be done just as well sitting down. It will save time and energy for personal grooming and relaxation.

**Family Life and Recreation**  
In working with people on family life and recreation, the clubs and agent have stressed home care of the sick. Eight hundred sixty-two families have been contacted with the program with the result that 12 children and 15 adults took health examinations, 61 families made provisions for adequate places for the family to play, 25 families improved types of home recreation, 11 communities were assisted in plan-

ning better community entertainment, and all seven home demonstration clubs had entertainments for their families including recreation for the children as well as grown ups.

During 1948, the family life program will be woven in with each demonstration during the year.

**Radio Activities**  
The agent prepared and sent two radio programs to a Lubbock broadcasting station in 1947.

She also discussed with the Garza County H.D. Council, "the listening program," designed to train the women to be good radio listeners and to listen to a better variety of programs.

**Work With Other Agencies**  
The agent has cooperated with the Texas Home Demonstration Association with two election meetings and helped the county T.H.D.A. chairman plan a T.H.D.A. program.

The agent held meetings for the G. I. Vocational School students' wives, covering testing of pressure cookers, water bath canning, picture making, pressure canning of chicken, making sequin pins and making toys. She attended three recreation meetings in the G.I. schools, with the result that one students' auxiliary was organized with plans for becoming a home demonstration club.

Mrs. Strasner helped plan and decorate the room for the high school Junior-Senior Banquet, using a Spanish theme. She also appeared as guest speaker for the Post Lions Club on one occasion, and on another occasion she presented some 4-H girls in a program pertaining to their trip to the State Roundup at College Station. The agent discussed "The Home Demonstration Agent" at a meeting of the Post Rotary Club.

For the Junior Culture Club, the agent discussed consumer buying, illustrating the talk with a style revue.

The home demonstration and 4-H clubs of the county raised nearly \$700 for the Food for Friendship Train.

Mrs. Strasner made 215 farm and home visits in the interest of the Extension Service. In the light of all the contacts made in 1948, cooperation from the people of Post and the rural population should be exceedingly good in 1948, the agent believes.

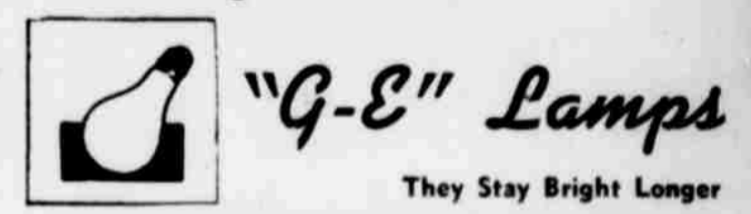

For a year and a half, since my return from foreign ports, all I've heard is "HIGH PRICES." People in every walk of life have yelped to high heaven.

It's election year and the people in Washington had to do something about it. The rumor got out that there would be a small planned recession to put a curb on inflation.

They learned their lesson then and there. They let the subject drop for a few months, until the squawks about inflation began to be leading news again.

I don't get it. We don't like high prices and the strikes and other miseries that go with them. We force our meddling politicians to do something about them.

Right here in Post last weekend I heard folks bemoaning the fact that the lush postwar way of life is slipping from our fingers.

But the recession that is sure to come in time is a long way off, if the people will remain calm. As long as we are behind on production of steel and other commodities necessary for the return to normal times, as long as we have to raise food and other commodities for other parts of the world, as long as hundreds of thousands of our employable young men are in college, as long as demand for many products is above the supply, and as long as the gray markets are flourishing, there is no danger of a serious depression.

There will be a stabilization of many prices. This is necessary, if we are to enjoy the record prosperity we have been building up since the war.

So I'm for the President's Economic program. It will grow to 12 or 14 inches and sometimes larger. I guess Gertrude was just trying to catch up with that big tank in growing.

Al noticed something else about Gertrude while he had her in the house. Instead of being the dull grey color that she was when he had her in the horse trough, she had turned a sort of salmon pink. 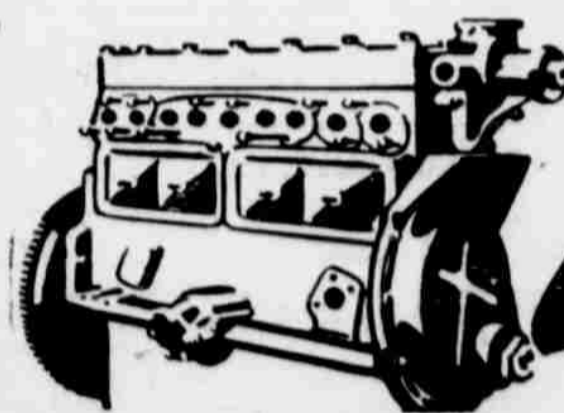
