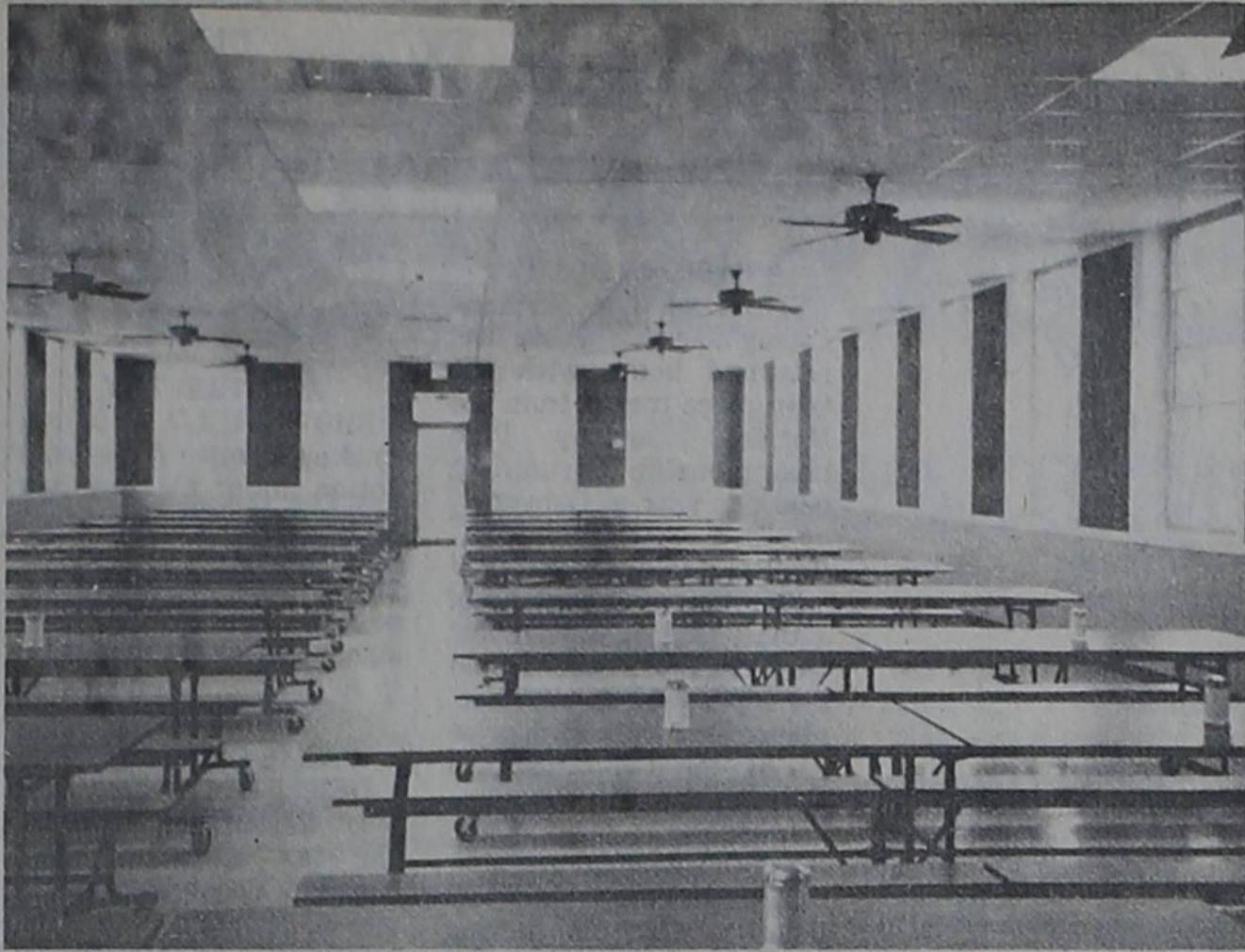

Postex moves to control inventory

In a move to control inventory in response to a downturn in business, sewing operations at Postex Plant here have been on a four-day week for the past couple of weeks.

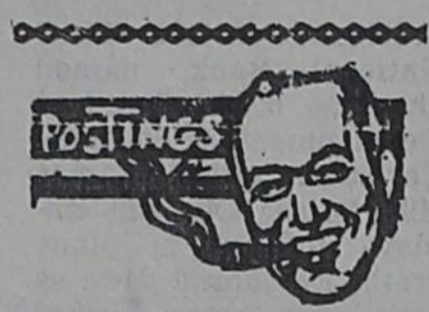
Plant Manager Don Smith said the greige mill will be shut down next week only for the same reason. This actually only means a four-day shutdown as Labor Day on Monday is a paid holiday for Postex workers. Smith said the sewing and finishing operations will be continued next week.

He added that finishing operations remain on regu-

lar schedule and that the greige mill has been on regular schedule and after next week will return to normal operations.

Traditionally the September quarter is one of our weaker quarters, Smith pointed out. He added that sewing operations are scheduled from week to week and that the schedule for that portion of the plant is not known in advance.

"We expect some improvement in business in the December quarter," Smith told The Dispatch. (See Postex, Page 12)

\$10,500,000 Garza drought loss seen

Garza County has suffered an estimated \$10,500,000 loss in the current drought, the county's ASCS committee says in its disaster assessment report which has led to the county being one of the many West Texas counties which have been declared eligible for disaster loans.

The committee estimated a \$7,000,000 cotton loss and \$3,500,000 in damages to Garza range lands.

The committee estimated a yield loss of 65 percent below normal in Garza's cotton crop.

With 54,073 acres planted this year and the average cotton yield of 456 pounds to the acre, a yield 65 percent below normal would result in a 17,980 bale 1980 cotton crop, as compared to the 43,320 bale harvest of 1979.

The committee estimated the county's rangelands as 75 percent below normal due to the drought.

Joe Barnes, county ASCS executive director, also told The Dispatch that to date an estimated 1,500 acres of land planted to cotton have been plowed up.

Some 401 Garza farms have planted cotton this year.

Gain in first day school enrollment

First day enrollment in the Post schools Monday was up 21 students from the opening day in 1979.

Enrollment totals were up in the elementary and middle schools and down in the primary school and high school.

Total first day enrollment this year was 1,052 students, as compared to 1,031 in 1979, 1,067 in 1978 and about 1,058 in 1977.

Primary school enrollment was 328 students this year, kindergarten through third grade, as compared to 341 in 1979. The elementary school enrollment, fourth and fifth grades, increased from 156 last year to 178 for 1980.

The middle school enrollment jumped 17 from 223 students last year to 240 this year.

The high school enrollment dropped seven from 313 in 1979 to 306 this year. If it hadn't been for the incoming freshman class, which at 103 students is the largest class in the Post school system, high school enrollment would have dropped substantially. Sophomore, junior and

senior classes all suffered first day enrollment losses and they were substantial for both sophomore and

senior classes. The senior class this year numbered only 65 students (See First day, Page 12)

Lubbock Highway at the edge of Post.

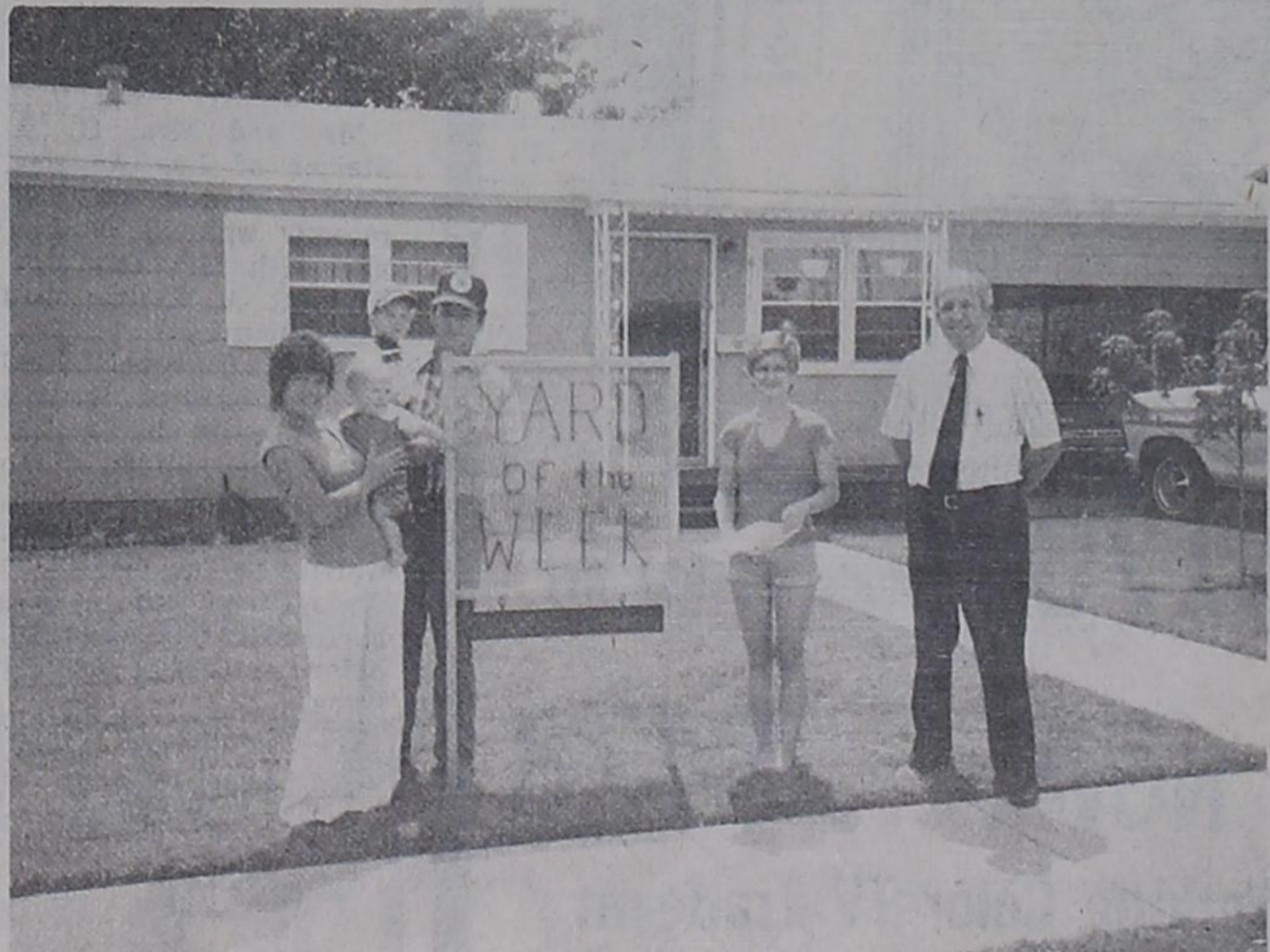

Perry said everyone is invited to attend the entire meeting or any portion they wish. Anyone wishing to speak or present written testimony about the proposed regulations are invited to do so. Copies of the proposed regulations are available at the Farmers Home Administration office at the Federal Building, 1205 Texas, Lubbock.

Farmers Home Administration, a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, will carry out part of the energy security

act of 1980. That part is Section 2 of the bill designed to produce 920 million gallons of biomass fuel annually by end of next year.

The proposed plan calls for Farmers Home Administration to provide direct loans on the farm production of biomass fuels of "alcohol, ethane, and methane" and provide guaranteed loans to medium scale commercial facilities.

Reducing America's dependence on foreign oil is a high national priority. Farmers Home Administration has been designated to

help farmers and others to get into production of alcohol and other biomass fuels. The public hearing is an important part of that effort.

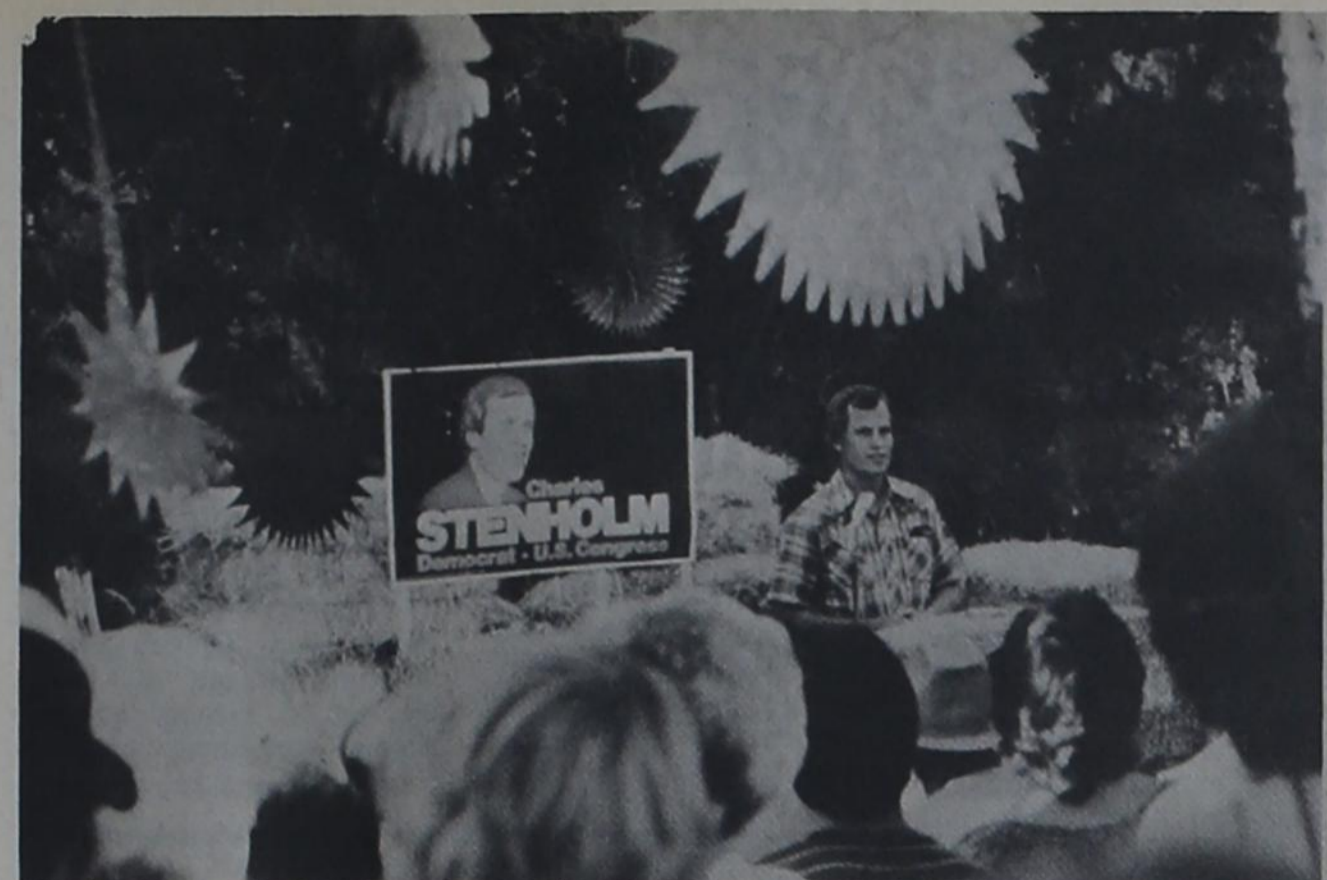

Disaster loans available to 178 Texas counties

LUBBOCK — One hundred seventy-eight Texas counties are now eligible for disaster recovery assistance because of drought and other extreme weather conditions, the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) announced this week.

"SBA disaster recovery loans are available to agricultural producers in the affected counties who have suffered crop and livestock losses," said SBA regional administrator Mercurio Martinez, Jr. "The loans are low-interest and may compensate losses not already covered by insurance or other disaster or deficiency payments."

The administrative limit restricts business disaster loans to the actual amount of the damage or loss, up to a maximum of \$500,000. Larger loans may be considered in some cases and must be approved by the regional SBA office. The interest rate on the loan is either 5 percent or 8 1/4 percent depending on whether SBA determines that the producer could receive credit elsewhere for commercial or non-federal sources. Martinez noted that it is not necessary for a producer to be turned down by a bank before applying for SBA assistance. Loan maturity is based on individual needs and repayment ability and has a maximum of thirty years.

The following formula is used in computing the amount of eligible loss on crops: Acres planted x established normal yield x percentage of loss x market price — recovery equals eligible loss.

Up to 50 percent of the eligible loan amount may be used to pay outstanding obligations such as accounts payable, notes payable and operating expenses including reasonable living expenses. At least 50 percent of the loan must be held for planting and operating expenses in the new crop year.

The filing deadline for physical disaster loans is February 12, 1981. Economic injury disaster loan applications must be filed by May 12, 1981.

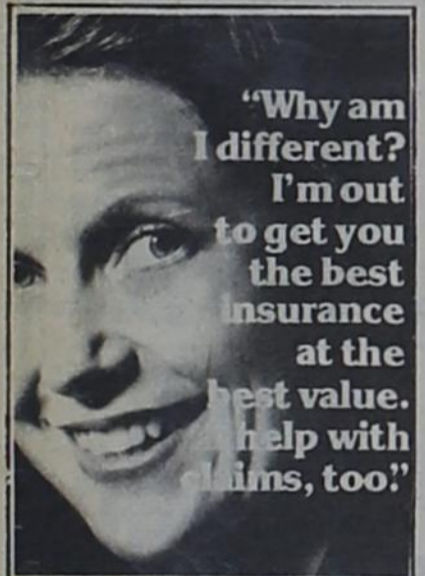

AUSTIN — Pretrial hearings in the Texas Brilab investigation opened in Houston last week, a rough-and-tumble judicial football game played in a political windstorm.

While House Speaker Bill Clayton's lawyers fight for his political life, the campaign season winds are beginning to build from a whistle to loud hum.

Clayton, along with others, faces charges of extortion, racketeering, fraud and conspiracy in connection with an alleged scheme to award a lucrative state insurance contract in exchange for campaign contributions.

Clayton's lawyers sought to have the case thrown out of federal court into a state court on jurisdictional grounds last week, and several of the "Brilab tapes" of conversations with Clayton and other key figures were played in the courtroom.

The federal judge, upon ending the pretrial hearings Friday, was expected to rule with little delay on whether the case should be dismissed on the grounds of entrapment, federal government misconduct, or artificially created federal jurisdiction.

Skeletons, Closed Doors

The Brilab tapestry may become a background for more charges of misconduct by state officials, whether founded or not, as opposing political forces try to discredit one another. It is a season when rivals begin to fire their best shots.

One of the men running for Clayton's seat, should Clayton be forced to step down, is Rep. Gib Lewis of Fort Worth, who last week answered to charges he took \$500 from a lobbyist to buy

gift watches for a legislative committee.

The lobbyist produced a \$500 check, which Lewis discredited, saying he paid for the watches in 1977 with his own personal check. Unable to find his personal check, Lewis later admitted the lobbyist check was probably raised by the horse-betting lobby to help raise money for the expenses of the traditional, end-of-session committee dinner.

The horse-race gambling bill in 1977 was referred by committee chairman Lewis to a subcommittee where it died.

Bullock Subpoenaed State Comptroller Bob Bullock was subpoenaed last week to testify Sept. 3 before a Travis County grand jury probing charges his former chief deputy used state employees and equipment to conduct private business.

Bullock himself is not a target in the investigation into the activities of former Bullock top aide Ralph Wayne.

Two grand juries have already probed the allegations within the past two years, and Bullock has labeled the action a political witchhunt. He and District Attorney Ronald Earle, both former state legislators, have waged colorful, verbal media exchanges since the first investigation.

Medicaid Insurance

A New York insurance firm may launch a lawsuit if a Texas state agency reneges, as expected, on its award of the lucrative state Medicaid insurance contract.

The three-member state Human Resources Board was to have met Monday to reconsider previous action giving the contract to Bradford National Corp. of New York, and award it, instead, to a company owned by Dallas millionaire H. Ross Perot.

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
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
