Sales Tax Rebate

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday sent \$42.1 million to 973 Texas cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for December including \$8,806.53 to Post.

Sales were down compared to this time last year when Post received \$12,167.45 but payments to date \$191,124.34 are up over 1981 payments which were \$170,916.70.

Post is second to Slaton in the area for payments in December with Slaton receiving \$10,703.50 for the month but Post is over Slaton for the year to date with Slaton's revenue being \$165,478.76.

Tahoka, to the west, is far behind Post and Slaton with \$2,802.40 received for the month and a total of \$56,999.88 for the year.

The city sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

For multi-line telephones and systems, used mostly by businesses, including those existing customers who change their service, customers will have the options of either leasing or purchasing their equipment from a third party through the telephone company, or leasing or purchasing their equipment from other suppliers.

Maintenance of telephones and telephone systems will not change to any major degree. Existing company-owned telephones and telephone systems leased under regulated rates will continue to be maintained without charge as long as parts are available. Once the equipment cannot be repaired, and the supply of useable regulated equipment is exhausted, the customer msut obtain the replacement under the deregulated procedures.

For telephones and other equipment purchased by customers, the warranties are with the company manufacturing the phones or phone systems. As with other products, the company selling or leasing the equipment may serve as the local repair center or warranty exchange, or the customer may have to deal directly with the manufacturer. General Telephones Phone Marts and local service facilities will serve as repair centers for products sold by the company to meet both company and manufacturers warranties, as well as offer on-site repairs for most products being sold. In most cases there will be charges for repair work done after the warranty has expired.

Business system customers will have the option of obtaining maintenance agreements for equipment leased or purchased with a third party through General Telephone.

Single-line phones will be of the plug-in type, such as those now using GTE Phone Mart jacks. Customers with the old style wall wiring block will be able to purchase do-it-yourself kits that allow phones to be plugged in the new jack, or pay the appropriate charges to have the telephone company or other party make the change for



of the Justiceburg proposed lake site. The Post Lake, to be built by the White River Water District, would be used to supply future water needs for all district users,

including cities not now offered service. The permit to build the dam allows for the water district to plan its long-range improvements.

The proposed dam site is located approximately four miles east of Post just north of Hwy 380 in the North Fork of the Brazos River.

Why the Permit Extension was Rejected

At the hearing for a permit extension last month, Texas Water Commissioners accepted the application for an extension of two years from the water district, and also received a field examiner's report, which recommended the extension be for four years.

Sandra M. Fitzpatrick, water commission hearings examiner, commented in her report to the commission, "the executive director recommends approval of a four-year extension. The Examiner is in agreement."

The examiner also explained to the commission that the opponents to the permit admit that they hold no land or livestock on the North Fork watershed.

"They contend that they have a justiciable interest in this project since the Post Reservoir and the Justiceburg Reservoir are joint projects," the Examiner explained

The examiner continued, "it is the position of the Examiner that even if the projects are joint, landowners have no justiciable interest in the Post Reservoir. since, standing alone, the Post Reservoir will not adversely impact their property and or water rights. It is in view of the foregoing, landowners were not admitted as parties to this proceeding."

The Texas Water Commission, in denying the permit extension, claimed that the water district had not been diligent in its plans for building the dam.

The water commission examiner disagrees....

"It is the position of the executive director that the applicant has been diligent in pursuing commencement of construction of this project. The executive director recommends approval of the applicant's extension request."

It appears that the Texas Water Commission members did not believe their own examiner's report ... or perhaps didn't study the report closely enough...or they ignored the recommendations.

IRS Gives Warning

Persons posing as employees of the Internal Revenue Service occasionally attempt to harass taxpayers or to collect money for what the imposter claims are unpaid taxes, the IRS says.

The IRS advised that taxpayers should request to see the credentials of any individual claiming to represent the IRS. Any IRS employee who makes contact with the public is required to carry distinctive identification and must show this when conducting official business. Also, ususally taxpayers who owe money to the IRS will receive written notification before being contacted in person.

Taxpayers who doubt the validity of the credentials offered can verify the person's employment by contacting the nearest IRS office.

Moving Expenses

Individuals who have changed their job locations may be able to deduce their moving expenses the Internal Revenue Service says. They may qualify for this moving expense deduction whether they are selfemployed or an employee. However, the expenses must be connected with starting work at the new job location, and there are certain tests of distances and time to be met.
