# White River Water District Appeal

The White River Municipal Water District board of directors voted unanimously Thursday evening to file an appeal for a rehearing on the recently rejected request for an extension for the permit to build the Post Lake.

The rehearing application is the first step in Texas Water Commission procedures to keep the lake project alive.

Water District board members were briefed on the background of the situation by district manager Al O'Brien, who explained that apparently politics played an influential role in the Texas Water Commission decision to reject the permit extension.

The commission's formal notification of the rejection came Dec. 21 and the water district is allowed 15 days to file a request for rehearing.

O'Brien is personally delivering the request to the Austin offices of the Texas Water Commission.

The commission procedures allow for 10 days to hear opponents to the permit, and then has 45 days in which to act on the request.

Members of the Texas Water Commission are Lee B. M. Biggart, Felix McDonald and John D. Stover.

Biggart and Stover are recent appointees to the commission by Gov. Bill Clements and

### Sales Tax Rebate

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday sent \$42.1 million to 973 Texas cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for December including \$8,806.53 to Post.

Sales were down compared to this time last year when Post received \$12,167.45 but payments to date \$191,124.34 are up over 1981 payments which were \$170,916.70.

Post is second to Slaton in the area for payments in December with Slaton receiving \$10,703.50 for the month but Post is over Slaton for the year to date with Slaton's revenue being \$165,478.76.

Tahoka, to the west, is far behind Post and Slaton with \$2,802.40 received for the month and a total of \$56,999.88 for the year.

The city sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

## GTE Plans Deregulation

The telephone company and its customers will undergo a major change in the way they do business with each other beginning Jan. 1, as a result of the Federal Communications Commission's deregulation of terminal equipment or customer premise equipment (CPE), the industry's terms for telephones and other equipment on the customer's end of the telephone line.

O. D. Hearn, operations manager for General Telephone in Brownfield, outlined the changes.

Existing customers who lease telephones or other terminal equipment from the telephone company and who do not change their service can continue to do so under rates approved by the state regulatory commission. They also will continue to have the option of purchasing their own phones or other terminal equipment from General Telephone or other suppliers, but under a deregulated environment.

### Petro Edition Planned

The 1983 Salute to the Garza County Petroleum Industry will be published by The Post Dispatch as a supplement to the Wednesday, Jan. 26 edition, according to publisher Wesley W. Burnett.

The tabloid publication is designed to provide Dispatch readers with up-to-date information about the petroleum industry and to give petroleum companies an opportunity to tell their story to the public.

Petroleum related businesses are encouraged to provide stories and photos of their individual operations to be included in the special edition.

The deadline for stories and advertising for the 1983 Salute to the Petroleum Industry will be Thursday, Jan. 20.

Extra copies of the special edition will be made available to tabloid advertisers.

The change will affect new customers, and existing customers who add or change their service beginning Jan. 1.

For single-line telephone instruments, similar to those used by most residential customers, new customers and existing customers who change their service or equipment will have the option of leasing instruments and other equipment at the regulated rate as long as the existing regulated supplies of single-line phones last. However, the company has geared its supply of regulated single-line instruments and equipment to deplete as near as possible to Jan. 1 in order to begin operating under the deregulation mandate.

As a result of the limited regulated supply, most new single-line business or residential telephone customers will only have the options after Jan. 1 of (1) renting from the telephone company at competitive rates, as dictated by the market place, or (2) purchasing their phones and other equipment from General Telephone or other suppliers at competitive prices set by the market place. General Telephone will offer a full range of basic, decorator and speciality telephone products for sale in addition to offering miscellaneous accessories such as cords, wiring kits and automatic dialers. It will also place special orders for unique telephone related products such as devices for the handicapped.

For multi-line telephones and systems, used mostly by businesses, including those existing customers who change their service, customers will have the options of either leasing or purchasing their equipment from a third party through the telephone company, or leasing or purchasing their equipment from other suppliers.

Maintenance of telephones and telephone systems will not change to any major degree. Existing company-owned telephones and telephone systems leased under regulated rates will continue to be maintained without charge as long as parts are available. Once the equipment cannot be repaired, and the supply of useable regulated equipment is exhausted, the customer must obtain the replacement under the deregulated procedures.

For telephones and other equipment purchased by customers, the warranties are with the company manufacturing the phones or phone systems. As with other products, the company selling or leasing the equipment may serve as the local repair center or warranty exchange, or the customer may have to deal directly with the manufacturer. General Telephone Phone Marts and local service facilities will serve as repair centers for products sold by the company to meet both company and manufacturers warranties, as well as offer on-site repairs for most products being sold. In most cases there will be charges for repair work done after the warranty has expired.

Business system customers will have the option of obtaining maintenance agreements for equipment leased or purchased with a third party through General Telephone.

Single-line phones will be of the plug-in type, such as those now using GTE Phone Mart jacks. Customers with the old style wall wiring block will be able to purchase do-it-yourself kits that allow phones to be plugged in the new jack, or pay the appropriate charges to have the telephone company or other party make the change for them.

Because of ringing requirements for party-line service and current regulations, party-line customers should contact the telephone company prior to purchasing any phone.

Customers will be advised of the options available to them when they contact the telephone company to establish or change service.

## Microfilming Records Okayed

Reed Roach, with Business Copy Products, met with the County Commissioners Court in their regular session Monday, Dec. 27 to present a cost estimate for the microfilming of the county records and monthly fees for the ongoing filming of the records for the county clerks office.

Upon recommendation of County Clerk, Carl Cederholm, the commissioners voted unanimously to approve the filming and reproduction of the volumes.

The swearing in ceremony for newly elected Justices of the Peace, Constables and

commissioners was set for New Year's Day, Jan. 1 at 10 a.m. in the Garza County Courthouse.

A discussion was held by the commissioners on the TAC seminar on the class certification on jail standards.

The commissioners also met jointly with the city council concerning the Post Reservoir with no action taken but support was offered to the White River Authority Board. McDonald is a former-Gov. Dolph Briscoe appointee.

Opponents to the permit are land owners of the Justiceburg proposed lake site.

The Post Lake, to be built by the White River Water District, would be used to supply future water needs for all district users, including cities not now offered service.

The permit to build the dam allows for the water district to plan its long-range improvements.

The proposed dam site is located approximately four miles east of Post just north of Hwy 380 in the North Fork of the Brazos River.

### Why the Permit Extension was Rejected

At the hearing for a permit extension last month, Texas Water Commissioners accepted the application for an extension of two years from the water district, and also received a field examiner's report, which recommended the extension be for four years.

Sandra M. Fitzpatrick, water commission hearings examiner, commented in her report to the commission, "the executive director recommends approval of a four-year extension. The Examiner is in agreement."

The examiner also explained to the commission that the opponents to the permit admit that they hold no land or livestock on the North Fork watershed.

"They contend that they have a justiciable interest in this project since the Post Reservoir and the Justiceburg Reservoir are joint projects," the Examiner explained.

The examiner continued, "it is the position of the Examiner that even if the projects are joint, landowners have no justiciable interest in the Post Reservoir, since, standing alone, the Post Reservoir will not adversely impact their property and water rights. It is in view of the foregoing, landowners were not admitted as parties to this proceeding."

The Texas Water Commission, in denying the permit extension, claimed that the water district had not been diligent in its plans for building the dam.

The water commission examiner disagrees...

"It is the position of the executive director that the applicant has been diligent in pursuing commencement of construction of this project. The executive director recommends approval of the applicant's extension request."

It appears that the Texas Water Commission members did not believe their own examiner's report...or perhaps didn't study the report closely enough...or they ignored the recommendations.

White River Water District board members at the meeting Thursday evening included president Arles Graham of Crosbyton, secretary-treasurer Harold Priddy of Ralls, Compton Cornelius and Dr. Dale Rhoades of Crosbyton, Everett Windham and Jim Brown of Post, Gene McLaughlin and Charles Gray of Ralls and Spur members Alvin Jones, Dr. Bob Alexander and Mrs. Lillie Gregory.

Bo Jackson of Post is also a member of the water district.

The casual atmosphere, relief from cooking and cleaning up and the low cost of most fast food dinners, can help a family find a good deal of togeth-

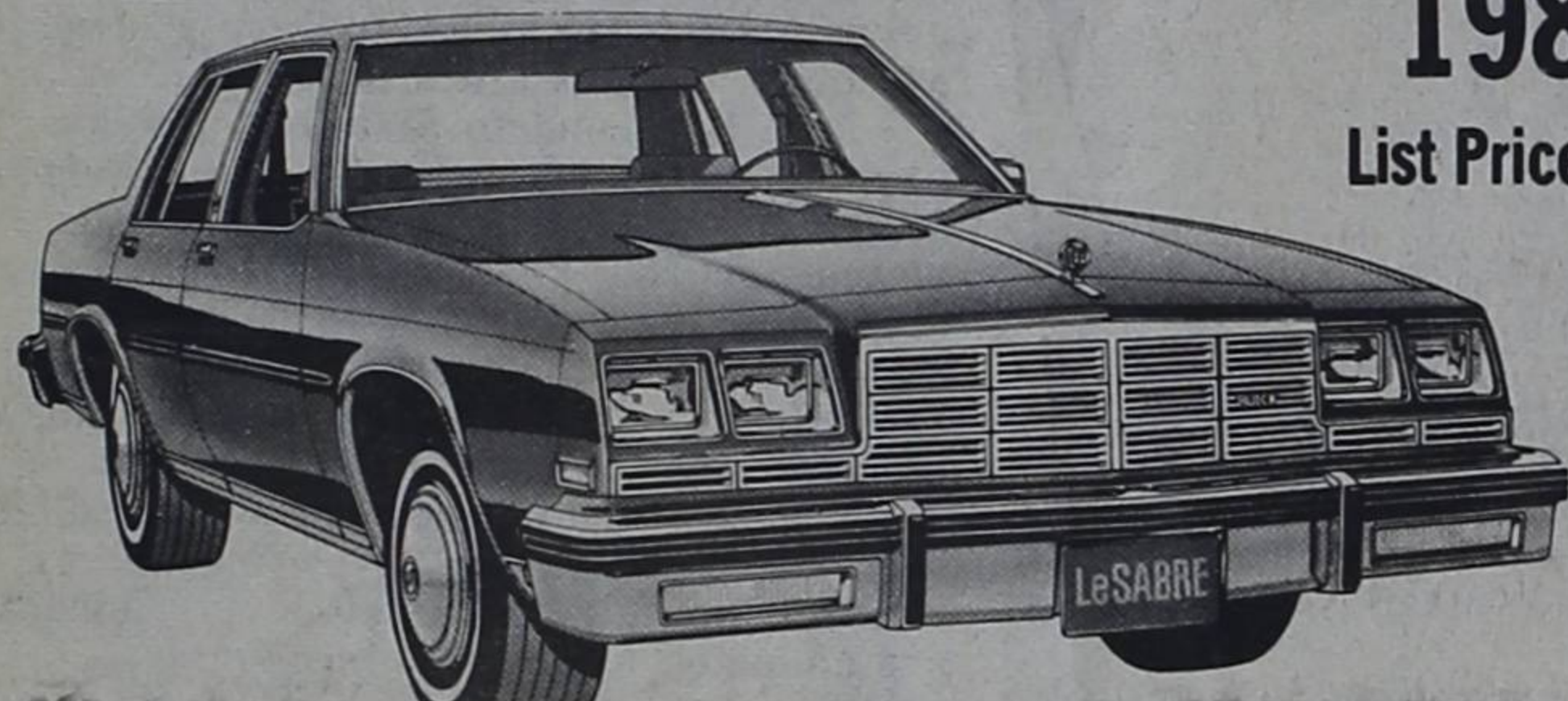

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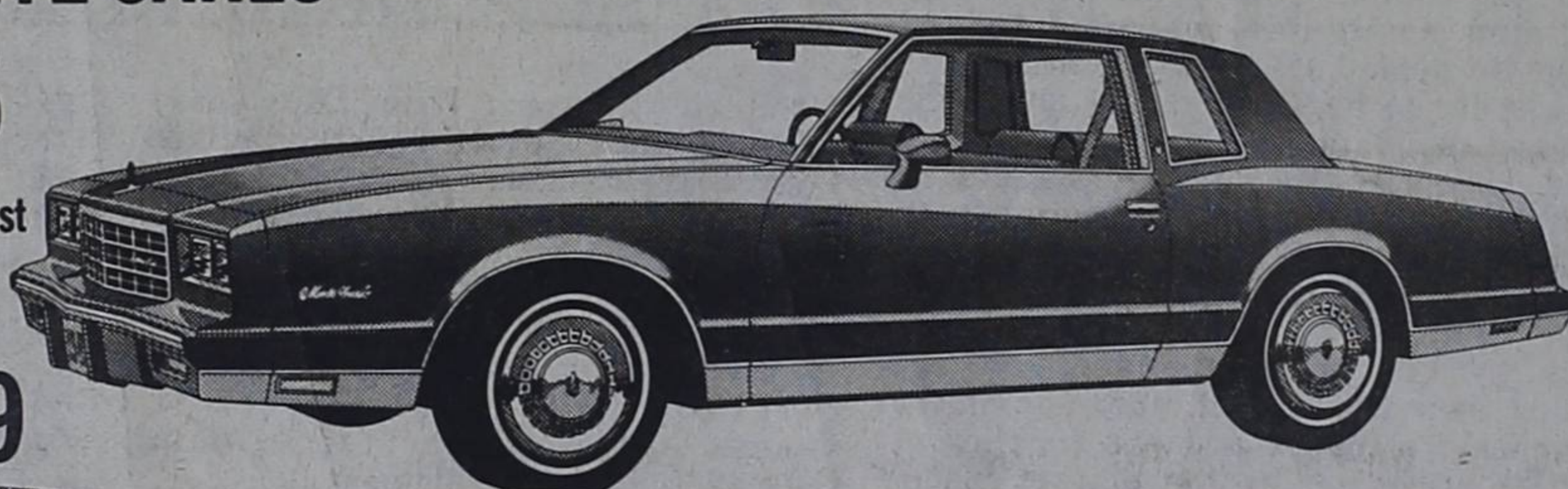

# Nephew Retires

Mrs. Carl Webb received word recently that Carl Webb's nephew, Major General William Loyd Webb Jr., was retired from military service in ceremonies held in D.C. at the Pentagon.

General Webb was born in Mineral Wells, Tex., Sept. 30, 1925, attended Texas A—M College for two years before being appointed to the United States Military Academy.

Married to Muriel Hinson in Dec. 1947, the couple have two sons, both Army captains and two daughters.

He moved to Japan in 1948, joining the 7th Cavalry Regiment and at the outbreak of hostilities, moved with the Garry Owens to Korea in July 1950. Upon promotion to Captain, he took command of Company F, 7th Cavalry Regiment,

1st Cavalry Division, where he received a Bronze Star Medal for Valor and the Purple Heart.

In 1951 he was assigned to Fort Riley, Kansas as a company commander of the Officer Candidate School, followed by the Advanced Armor Officers' Course.

General Webb next began his first of three tours of Germany as a company

commander, and battalion executive officer and S3, 29th Tank Battalion; then as G3 training officer, 2nd Armored Division, prior to becoming the Assistance Secretary of the General Staff, USAREUR in 1955-56.

In 1968, General Webb served in Vietnam in J3, US Military Assistance Command, then as commander of the Support Command of the 1st Infantry Division.

In September, 1974, he was promoted to the rank of major general.

## IRS Gives Warning

Persons posing as employees of the Internal Revenue Service occasionally attempt to harass taxpayers or to collect money for what the imposter claims are unpaid taxes, the IRS says.

The IRS advised that taxpayers should request to see the credentials of any individual claiming to represent the IRS. Any IRS employee who makes contact with the public is required to carry distinctive identification and must show this when conducting official business. Also, usually taxpayers who owe money to the IRS will receive written notification before being contacted in person.

Taxpayers who doubt the validity of the credentials offered can verify the person's employment by contacting the nearest IRS office.

## Moving Expenses

Individuals who have changed their job locations may be able to deduct their moving expenses the Internal Revenue Service says. They may qualify for this moving expense deduction whether they are self-employed or an employee. However, the expenses must be connected with starting work at the new job location, and there are certain tests of distances and time to be met.

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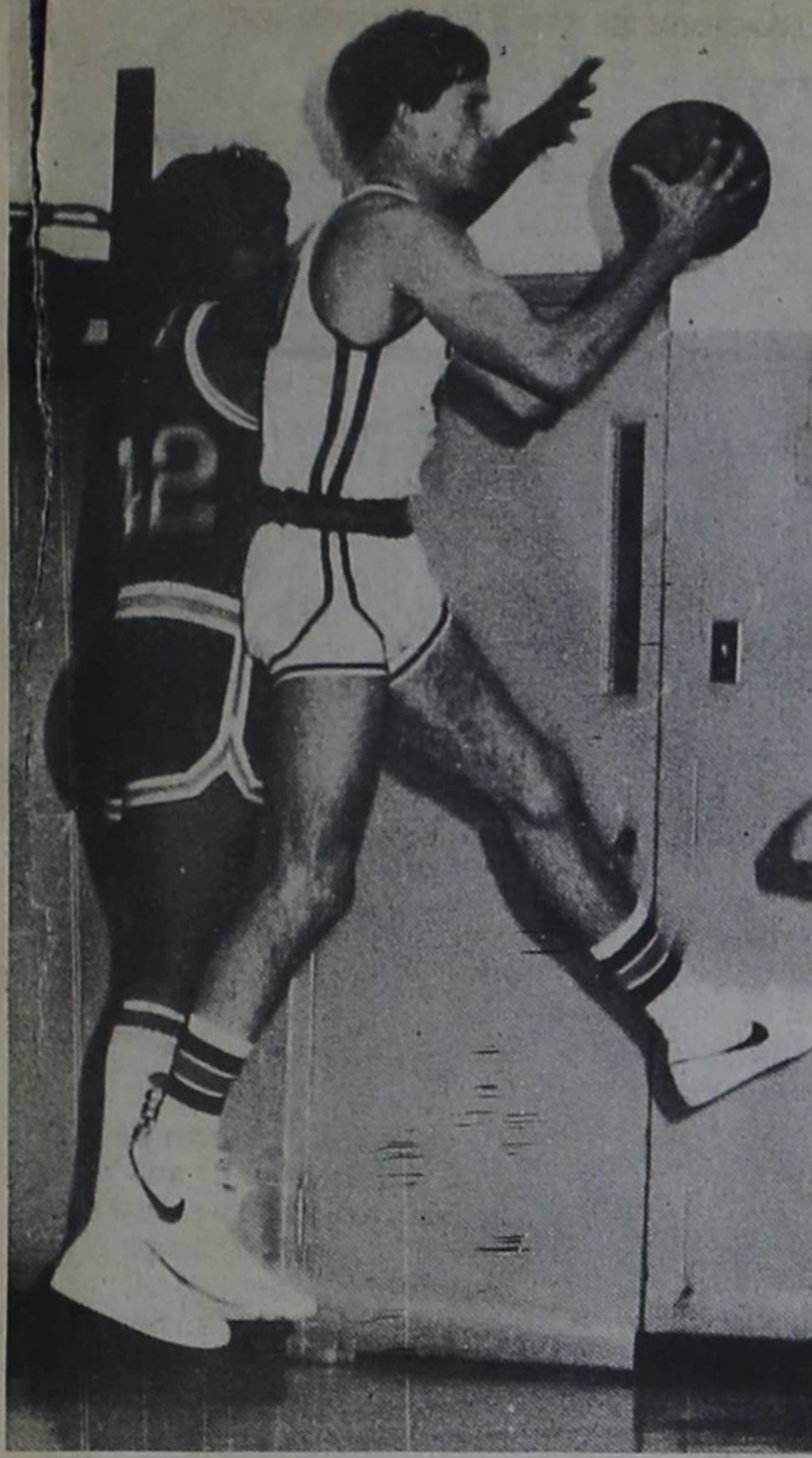

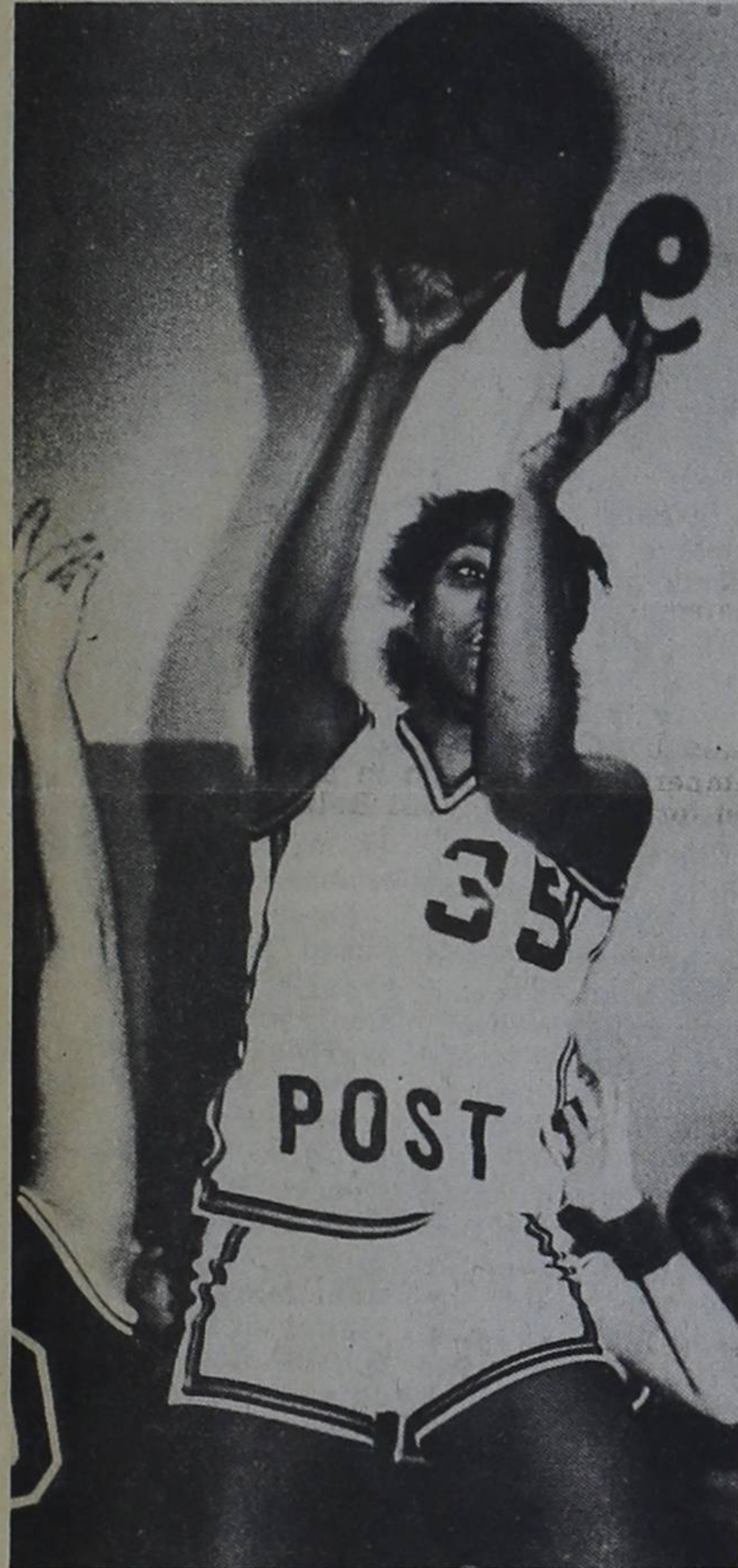

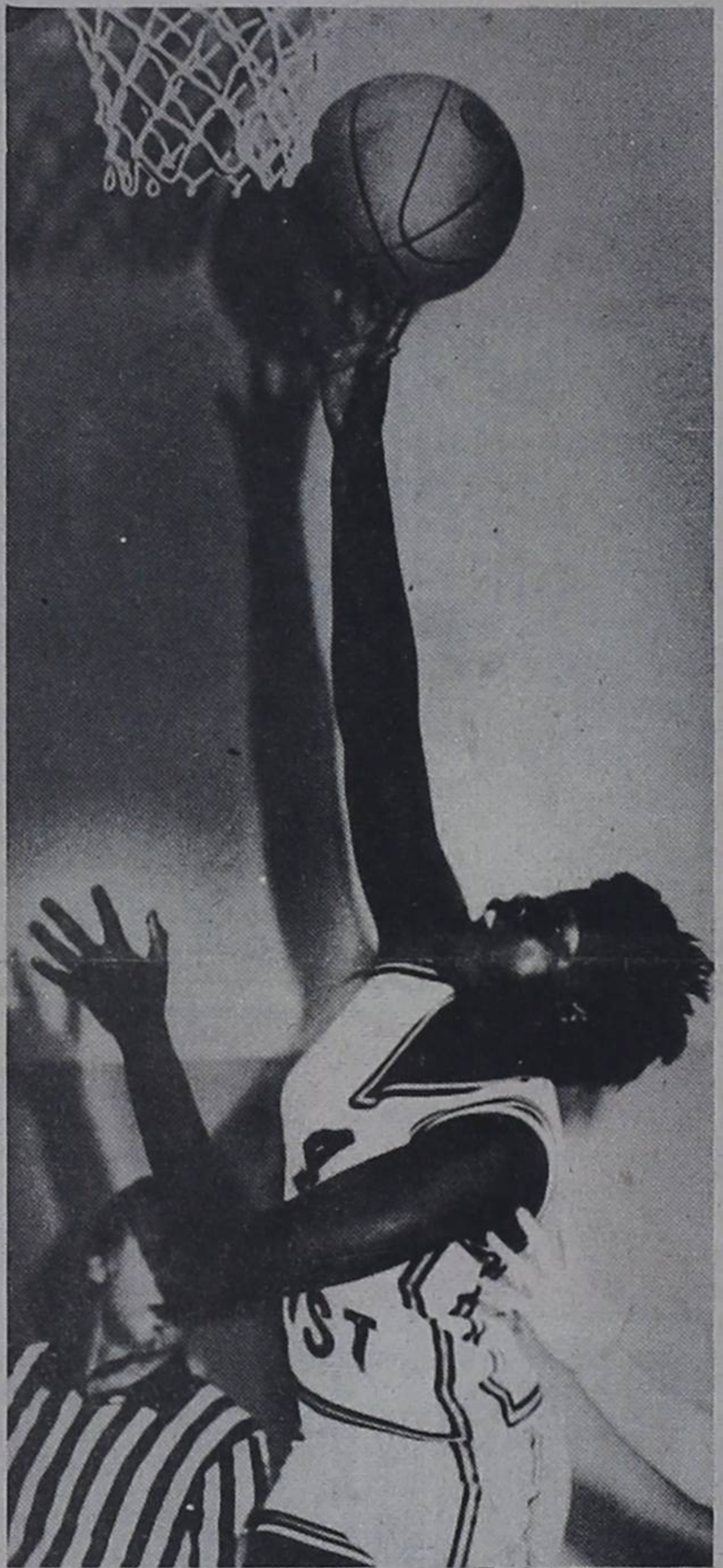
