The council's plan proposes to spend \$1,044,000 of the money to rehabilitate or replace 164 privately owned housing units within the target area which is the eastern portion of the community.

The city council Monday

night authorized the filing of

a pre-application for a

three-year \$1,712,000 com-

munity development block

grant with the U.S. Depart-

ment of Housing and Urban

Development.

The plan also calls for \$428,000 in street paving in the target area, \$150,000 for city-county park improvements, \$15,000 for planning, and \$75,000 for administering the program over the three-year period.

In housing rehabilitation, the plan calls for rehabilitating 91 owner-occupied substandard houses at \$6,000 a house for a total cost of \$546,000; rehabilitation of 52 renter-occupied substandard houses at \$2,400 per house at a total cost of \$125,000.

The plan provides for \$30,000 for demolition of housing which cannot be rehabilitated and for \$298,-000 worth of replacement housing.

In the replacement portion of the program, the plan provides for replacement housing for 13 ownerfamilies at a cost of \$18,000 per family for a total cost of \$234,000; and replacement housing for eight renter families at \$8,000 per family for a cost of \$64,000.

Another \$45,000 would be provided for code enforcement of the housing program.

Mrs. Barbara Ellis of Lubbock, the city's consultant in the filing of the pre-application grant, explained the council had the choice of using the housing money either under a loan or outright grant program but that most smaller communities found that the housing grants to eligible persons, determined on an income scale, worked best because people with low income were hestitant to become involved in housing

The street improvement portion of the program would provide for the paving, curb and guttering of approximately 9,500 linear feet of streets (about 30 blocks).

The \$150,000 in park improvement would include up to \$100,000 for the repairing of the city-county swimming pool which needs a complete plumbing overhaul before its further use.

Federal funds would pay the complete cost of the three-year program without city participation and this includes the administration of the program.

The only cost to the city are legal and consultant costs in the filing of the pre-application for the grant.

The council passed the resolution authorizing filing the pre-application grant without a dissenting vote, although Councilman Bill Pool abstanied from voting.

Post will enter quite a competitive situation in seeking such a block grant for community develop-

Only \$6,400,000 is availab-

le in federal funds for such block grants to smaller cities in the northern half of Texas in 1981. This would provide for granting only seven to 13 such grants,

depending upon their size.

Audit report received-

City's last fiscal year 'profitable'

This city had an "unusual and very profitable" year ending last Sept. 30 according to the audit report submitted to the city council Monday night by the Lubbock accounting firm of

Davis and Harding.

On total operating revenue of \$753,686.06 last year, the city wound up with a net increase in cash of \$253,343.74 for the year. With the nation's biggest

cities and thousands of smaller ones almost unable to make ends meet, the City of Post's financial position after the last fiscal year is remarkable.

City council members cautioned, however, that much of this 1979 cash increase is budgeted for necessary spending in the current 1980 fiscal year.

Auditor Bud Davis of Lubbock pointed out that in these days of high interest rates, the city's ability to buy what it needs with cash has greatly reduced the city's cost of doing business.

The audit showed that at the end of the last fiscal year the city had \$382,400.18 in the bank with fixed community assets \$1,422,671.46.

The total operating revenue included \$185,379.95 in property taxes (about only on fourth the total), \$137,521.91 in the one percent city sales tax, \$198,076.12 in the utilities and occupation tax (which brings in more than property taxes); \$58,436 in mostly oil royalties and an oil lease, \$46,375.37 in sanitation charges, \$29,246.36 in interest on time deposits, \$49,741 in federal revenue sharing, and \$26,453.08 in city court fines.

The audit showed the street department at \$103,856.65 was the most costly to operate for the year with the law enforcement department next with \$91,899.01.

The city's half of the county law enforcement cost was \$77,438.23 with the cost of operating the city court and the dog catcher (See City audit, Page 12)

539 library books read in November

A total of 539 books were checked out of the Post Public Library in November, Librarian Pee Wee Pierce reports in her monthly report of library activities.

This brings total library circulation for the first 11 months of 1980 to 8,406

Seventeen new books were put on library shelves during the month to bring 1980 acquisitions to date to 369 volumes. The library now contains 13,755 books.

Seventeen reference questions were answered during the month to bring this 1980 total to 205.

Five interlibrary loan books were obtained from other Texas libraries for local use to bring such loans to 43 for the year to date.

A total of 106 persons saw movies shown on the library's projector, mostly in nursing homes, during November to bring the total for 1980 to 1,224.

Fines, book sales, and donations for the month totaled \$18.45 to bring this miscellaneous income total for 1980 to \$322.02.

MARBLED ANGEL FOOD CAKE

Korren Payton 1 cup sifted cake flour; 1 cup sifted confectioners sugar; 1 and two-thirds cup egg whites (about 12) 11/2 teaspoons cream of tartar; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 1 cup sugar, granulated; 1 teaspoon vanilla and 2 or 3 drops red food coloring.

Sift together cake flour and confectioners sugar 4 times using double-screen sifter, 8 times using single-

screen sifter; set aside. Beat egg whites, cream of tartar and salt in large mixing bowl until stiff, not dry, using electric mixer at medium-high speed. Gradually add granulated sugar and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Put egg white mixture into larger bowl, gradually fold in cake flour and sugar mixture, then add 2 or 3 drops of food coloring. Fold through mixture to obtain marble effect of pink and white. (Any color food coloring can be used). Place mixture in 10-inch tube pan. Bake in 350 degree oven 40 -50 minutes, or until top springs back when lightly touched with finger. Invert tube pan on funnel or bottle to cool. When completely cooled, remove from pan.

The Plainview farmer had many harsh words for the Carter Administration and said 418,000 farmers had gone out of business during Jimmy Carter's four years in the White House.

Meek said the consumers would need to be "groomed" to paying high prices for food in the future, as he claimed increased prices of agricultural commodities along with increased exports would put the country back on its feet again.

Meek said the national convention of the American Agriculture Movement will be held in Pueblo, Colo., Dec. 13-14, and the AAM is trying to get Ronald Reagan to appear before the farm group to announce his secretary of agriculture at that time.

The provision is included in the Budget Reconciliation bill which has now been forwarded to the White House for the President's signature. The Senate late Wednesday gave final approval to the measure by a vote of 83 to 4. Secretary of Energy Charles Duncan tion's support for the "windfall" tax credit in Houston earlier this fall, at a joint press conference with Senator Bentsen.

"I am pleased that Congress has acted to provide relief to small royalty owners and hopeful that the President will sign it quickly into law," said Bentsen, who last summer presided over a hearing in Austin attended by 3,500 Texas royalty owners pro-






