A new and far better refrigerator or stove costs less in 1967 than it did in 1930. The same is true of practically every kind of home appliance.

Advertising is often blamed for inflation. Yet, advertising has merely made the luxury seem routine and raised the expectation of the working man to the level of the very wealthy of a past age.

FIVE CALLAHAN COUNTY OIL WELLS COMPLETED

Five wells have been completed in the Callahan County Regular Field.

Rhodes Drilling Co. of Abilene, completed four the wells. They are seven miles northeast of Baird.

No. 58-C Jackson is 455 feet from the south and 470 feet from the west lines of Section 2, C & M Survey. Daily Potential was 10 barrels of 39.5 gravity oil, plus 10 barrels of water. It is pumping from perforations at 776 to 783 feet, fractured with 2,000 pounds of sand. The 4 1/2-inch casing as set at 818 feet and the hole bottomed at 820 feet.

Location for No. 61 Jackson is 1,258 feet from the north and 330 feet from the east lines of Section 5, T&NO Survey. It had a daily potential of 41 barrels of 39.6 gravity oil, pumping from perforations at 787 to 791 feet. The pay was fractured with 2,000 pounds of sand. The 4 1/2-inch casing is set at 827 feet, and total depth is 830 feet.

No. 63 Jackson is 4,540 feet from the north and 1,120 feet from the east lines of Section 5, T&NO Survey. Daily potential is 12 barrels of 39.9 gravity oil, pumping from perforations at 702-708 feet after being fractured with 2,000 pounds of sand. Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing on bottom at 738 feet.

The firm's No. 2-D Jackson is 990 feet from the south and 330 feet from the east lines of Section 17, ETRR Survey. Daily potential was 12 barrels of 39.9 gravity oil, pumping from an open hole at 798 to 803 feet. It was fractured with 2,000 lbs. of sand. Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 814 feet and the hole is bottomed at 845 feet.

Other well is J. S. Webster of Abilene, No. 4 F. W. Stacy, 150 feet from the south and 750

feet from the east lines of Lot 49, Comal CSL Survey 181. It is four miles southwest of Cross Plains. Daily potential was four barrels of 39 gravity oil, plus three barrels of water. It is pumping from an open hole at 295 to 399 feet, which was fractured with 1,000 pounds of oil and 1,500 pounds of sand.

"WEEKLY MEDITATIONS"

"THE WORD"

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God." (John 1:1).

Why does John apply the term to Jesus? There are several ways that the word "word" may be translated but it is obvious that John does not use it in a common sense.

The possible sense engaged by John is "that by which the inward thought is expressed." Or the "Power behind thought," the expression of the One that no one has ever seen.

It was understood from Jewish Literature that the concept of "Word" also meant the independent, personified 'Word' of God. It is the teaching in John that this divine 'Word' took on human form. The Word is used by John as a name of Christ, the 'Word' of God, the expression or manifestation of His thought to man. It denotes the personal wisdom and power in unison with God -- Jesus as the Revealer of God because He is the 'Word' of God. Not only does Jesus never claim the title 'Word' for Himself, John never applies it to Him in the evangelic narrative, yet this is the theme throughout his gospel. John uses the 'Word' as a personal Divine agent who cooperated in the work of creation.

Paul does not use the term 'Word' but his reference to the work of Christ is the same; "Who is the image of the invisible God, the first-born of every creature: for by him were all things made . . ." (Colossians 1:15-16a). Not only does this passage reflect His power

as the 'Word' in creation but also reveals the fact that He is the image or reflection of His Father. Jesus once was asked the question, "Is it lawful to pay tribute to Caesar?" (Matthew 22:17). In the course of the conversation He asked whose image and inscription is on the coin. Now the people well understood that the coin and Caesar were not the same but only that the coin contained the image of Caesar. Considering Jesus as the 'Word', He was not to be the same personality. Paul referred to the men in Corinth as being the image of God but they were not God. (1 Corinthians 11:7).

John calls the person who became incarnate by a name peculiar to himself in the New Testament, the "Word." In three sentences he declares at the outset His eternal subsistence, His eternal intercommunion with God, and His eternal identity with God. In some sense distinguishable from God, He was in an equally true sense identical with God as the Son of God. John uses "Word" as a personal name of Christ. In Revelation 19:13, no doubt the same Being is referred to when described as the One who is soon with His "vesture dipped in blood; and his name is called The Word of God."

He who has been known to us as the "Word" was in the beginning. The "Word was with God," before He revealed God. The "Word" is viewed as a Personal Being and as the Revelation. John speaks of the "Word" becoming flesh, the basic Christian conviction that through the life, teaching, actions, and death of the man Jesus was a

new revelation of God had been given. The Hebrew writer refers to the Son as "being the effulgence" (or a reflected spender) of God. (Hebrews 1:3). Jesus is the revealer of God because He is the 'Word' of God.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III to be known as Section 52e, reading as follows:

"Section 52e. Each county in the State of Texas is hereby authorized to pay all medical expenses, all doctor bills and all hospital bills for Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing each county in this state to pay the medical bills, doctor bills and hospital bills for all Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed."

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, that a non-elective State officer or employee may hold other non-elective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other offices or positions are of benefit to the State of Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 9, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes; provided further that at the time the Commissioners Court meets to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the four (4) constitutional purposes; namely, general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations and so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year; and the Legislature may also author-

ize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed Fifteen Cents (15¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. Any county may put all tax money collected by the county into one general fund, without regard to the purpose or source of each tax. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws. This Section shall not be construed as a limitation of powers delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other Section or Sections of this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund." "AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

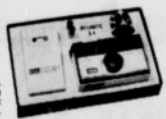
