Scanning Social Security

Today's column is not just about Social Security, but is written to make it easier for everyone who has business with the Federal Government to conduct that business.

In your dealings with any government agency of the federal government, keep in mind that laws and regulations govern the agency from which you need help or services. Each agency is mandated by congress to provide specific services to the people.

For instance, if you receive a Veteran's Administration loan, a check because of military service, or some other service, you would want to contact the V.A. if you had questions about their programs. In this area, you can receive assistance with problems by calling 747-5256, and you will be in direct touch with the Regional Office of the Veterans Administration at Waco, Texas.

If you have a question about income tax or any of the programs administered by the Internal Revenue Service, you can obtain answers by calling a toll free number. The IRS toll free number is 1-800-492--4830, for Texas.

Almost any question about Social Security can be handled by telephone. If you have problems or questions about your Social Security,

earlier. For raw cotton exports, the largest weekly sales in six months - 137,700 running bales - were recorded the week of Dec. 11. Exports of 193,700 bales for the week brought the season's total to 1,578,800.

Money Bill Signed The President has signed the 1981 appropriations bill

for the Department of Agriculture and related agencies. The measure includes \$975,000 for cotton dust research, as well as a provision eliminating the Normal Crop creage (NCA) restriction on crop production.

Thus cotton producers who exceed their NCA in 1981 will remain eligible for program benefits on all crops.





Industrial revenue bonds big success

AUSTIN - Texas Industrial Commission Executive Director Gerald Brown today announced the results of the state's industrial revenue bond (IRB) program for the first full year of operation.

The Texas Industrial Commission (TIC) is the state agency responsible for establishing IRB guidelines and administering the program. To date, IRB's have financed more than \$334,-700,000 in projects creating an estimated 6,300 new jobs. These direct employment positions will, in turn, generate nearly 11,000 jobs indirectly.

According to Gerald Brown, it is almost impossible to put a dollar value on what the IRB program has done for Texas. "When you consider the new technologies, the diversified economic base, and the incomes that will be affected by these new projects, the economic impact will be in the billions," Brown said.

When the 66th Legislature passed the Development Corporation Act of 1979, their intent was to stimulate capital investment and create productive jobs. At that time, 48 other states,

in-state operations." Approximately one-third of the applications approved by TIC were for expansion projects.

Projects approved range from heavy manufacturing operations to warehouse-distribution centers. The smallest issue was for \$700,000 to finance a new chemical manufacturing company in Freeport, and the largest was a \$54,125,000 port facility in Texas City.

The Development Corporation Act of 1979, sponsored by Sen. Ed Howard of Texarkana and Rep. Tim Von Dohlen of Goliad, made IRB financing in Texas a reality. Under this act, more than 200 Texas cities and municipalities have set up their own industrial development corporation.

These local non-profit corporations grant initial approval of IRB applications; however, final approval must come from the Texas Industrial Commission.

"Industrial revenue bonds are much more restricted and well regulated in Texas than in most other states," Brown said. "Because we (TIC) have the responsibility of giving final approval on all bond applications in

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Bond buyers also benefit since interest earned on the bonds is tax exempt. The credit of the state and-or the political subdivision is not committed since the bonds are backed solely by the management capability and financial strength of the user.

"In the past many Texas communities, especially those in rural areas, had a difficult time providing industrial projects to the surrounding states offering IRB financing."


