School trustees at their May meeting Monday night added parking lot paving and sidewalks around the Post Middle School and a complete overhaul of the four tennis courts to the schools' big summer maintenance and improvement program.

The architects had no immediate estimate of costs of either project, but each will be substantial.

Dwayne McQueen of the firm of Whitaker, McQueen,

Jones and Associates told trustees bids will be taken May 21 on the big program which he estimated to cost \$403,060 not counting the paving, sidewalks and tennis courts which had just been added.

The architects proposed to pave both the small parking lots on the east and west of the middle school and put in 8,500 square feet of sidewalks. He estimated this would cost \$26,200

Teachers will get \$2,500 in across-board boost

By a split 4 to 3 vote, Post school trustees Monday night voted a \$2,500 acrossthe-board pay increase to all local teachers in a major effort to end Post's annual high teacher turnover rate.

It was the biggest boost ever given teachers here and will come atop a hefty teacher salary increase from the state, now en route through the Texas Legisla-ture at Austin. The state pay hike as it passed the Texas house last week calls for a 26 percent pay increase spread over the next two years.

The \$2,500 local pay boost will be added to the current \$1,200 being paid over state here to give local teachers \$3,700 over state teacher pay levels for the 1981-82 school year.

The largest crowd to sit-in on a school trustee meeting in the high school library since the student drug confrontation several years ago was on hand - and they were all teachers, between 20 and 25 of them.

The vote came after a rather heated 45 minute discussion of whether to make the pay raise across-the-board or to couple a cost-of-living increase with an incentive pay boost.

Jack Lott, school board president, argued for the incentive pay. Speaking up strongly for the across-theboard hike were Trustees Charles McCook, Royce Hart and Juanella Hays.

The other three trustees took no real part in the type of pay raise discussion. When it came to the vote,

Hart moved for the \$2,500 pay hike and was seconded by Mrs. Hays.
