

Bids due May 21 on \$425,000 in school projects

School trustees at their May meeting Monday night added parking lot paving and sidewalks around the Post Middle School and a complete overhaul of the four tennis courts to the schools' big summer maintenance and improvement program.

The architects had no immediate estimate of costs of either project, but each will be substantial.

Dwayne McQueen of the firm of Whitaker, McQueen,

Jones and Associates told trustees bids will be taken May 21 on the big program which he estimated to cost \$403,060 not counting the paving, sidewalks and tennis courts which had just been added.

The architects proposed to pave both the small parking lots on the east and west of the middle school and put in 8,500 square feet of sidewalks. He estimated this would cost \$26,200 additional.

Principal Bud Davis had requested additional sidewalks behind the school building the architects had not inserted so trustees told McQueen to add the walks Davis wanted where he wanted them.

Tennis Coach James Easterling told trustees and McQueen that there is now a half inch wide crack across the southwest court and an unevenness to the northeast court. He said only one of the four courts

was in good, playable shape.

Trustees decided to put a concrete base on sand and then add a synthetic surface.

In other actions on the big improvement package, trustees discarded the arm chair seating selected earlier for plain bench seating in the gym. This would be considerably less expensive and permit a larger seating capacity.

Trustees also compromised

on a completion time for the high school gym renovation as Sept. 30.

This would mean the gym could not be used for the first month of school but it would be completed in time for organized basketball practice to begin in October. The architect originally proposed an Oct. 31 completion date.

All other portions of the improvement project are scheduled for completion Aug. 30.

McQueen advised the board that moving up the deadline 30 days possibly would add \$150 a day to the bid price on the gym. The board would have preferred an Aug. 30 completion date, but split the difference.

Another addition to the plans was a storage shed for the athletic department's tractor, mower and other equipment near the fieldhouse. It was requested by Athletic Director David Thompson.

The rest of the school improvement program given the okay for bidding includes:

High School gym renovation, estimated cost \$182,722, to include new bleachers, painting of exterior metal, painting of gymnasium, new flooring in gym and lobby, new ceiling and painting of lobby, new wood basketball floor, relocation of backboards, replacing five unit heaters, new gym lighting, new seating.

High School, estimated cost \$39,241, includes painting of interior and painting of exterior metal.

Elementary school, estimated cost \$32,981, includes working existing doors, new hollow metal work and interior painting.

Primary school, estimated cost \$148,116, includes: exterior painting of metal trim, patching of roof, reworking of exterior expansion joint, reworking (See Bids due, Page 8)

Funds can be allocated to Post this year only if the winners fail to use all of the available money and Lampasas, Jasper and Sweetwater did not choose to participate. These three cities were not funded and ranked above Post.

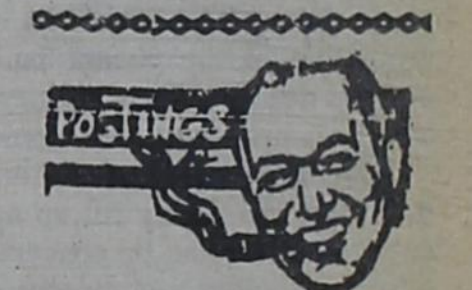
The slide program was on the controversial 55 mile an hour speed limit which can cost Texas badly needed federal highway funds if not observed.

Time for Re-dedication

This is Texas Hospital Week and Garza Memorial Hospital is observing it with several functions including a Saturday afternoon open house from 2 to 4 p.m.

The Dispatch hopes healthy Garza citizens who haven't had need to use our hospital will visit it during the open house and see for themselves what fine health care facilities we have.

Texas Hospital Week is a better time than most to look back over the years and trace the development of the hospital operation into the fine one we have today.

It wasn't easy. From the start in the early 1950s, there were money problems. There also were doctor problems — or rather "the lack of doctor problems."

A time or two there were practically no doctors and no money at the same time. We recall that volunteers stepped in to operate the hospital just to keep the doors open while the local citizenry geared up in an all-out effort to save the hospital.

That fight was won. Building on the base of the determination of the Garza folks to keep their hospital despite all odds, Garza Memorial today has grown into an excellent operation.

The voters by a huge majority voted to triple the tax levy for the hospital to get it finally out of its hospital dilemma.

Then a determined hospital board went overseas to recruit new physicians in Post and have succeeded in establishing a new doctor in Post with an office suite right in the hospital itself.

With the tax money, all the water, heating and air-conditioning problems which had piled up were corrected. There was a battle too to keep abreast of the governmental requirements for nursing staff. That battle too has been won.

The hospital now provides scholarship

funds to train its own registered nurses and several of our citizens have contributed to the scholarship fund to make it work.

The latest hospital development has been the organization and development of the city-county ambulance service with the generous support of both city and county funds.

While the volunteer ambulance service cannot be listed as a hospital project it certainly was the hospital which provided both the inspiration and leadership for local citizens to donate freely of their time for training as Emergency Medical Technicians and then for duty.

The devotion of the first EMT class to the ambulance service has been an inspiration to all who have followed closely the professional development of that service.

As one EMT explained to us only recently, the desire to make a real community contribution is so strong in the EMTs that their volunteer efforts are truly personally rewarding.

Another remarkable reward for the fight to save the hospital has been the construction of a new 75-bed nursing home right next door to the hospital district sold to the nursing home developer for that purpose.

These are excellent nursing home facilities which will enable many Post senior citizens to live out the final years of their lives in their hometown among relatives and friends.

Yes, Texas Hospital Week should be more than "an observance" here. It is the time for all of us to re-dedicate ourselves to generously support the continuing development of our hospital and local health care facilities.

Stopping the 'Ebbing'

The ebb and flow of small town enterprise today finds Post's Main street with too many empty buildings and a need for much more than an annual spring clean-up campaign.

For several years, the chamber of commerce has wrestled with the problem of how to go about brightening up and improving our business district.

Of course, it isn't progressive merchants who have created the problem. One of the basic difficulties involved is out-of-town ownership of the vacant buildings and no obvious desire to spend money on something that isn't producing an income.

The time will come when the vacant buildings will finally fill up again with new enterprise, or else be converted to storage, offices, or other community uses. (Two in recent years have been converted into churches and another was transformed into an excellent community center.)

But when some of the empties get too run down they don't have much of a future, even in these times of high building costs.

The success of small town as an organic retail community is to offer a full sweep of merchandise and services, including price competition from rival merchants.

Any good merchant will tell you that competition improves not hurts his business

because the competition simply draws more customers.

Post needs to make an all-out effort to improve its business community offerings just as it has successfully made efforts to improve its schools, hospital, and other community services. Such an effort will be a real contribution to the future growth and success of the town.

There is, of course, no easy answer. Some view it as the dilemma of all small towns generally. But communities that work hard at community development usually manage to whip this problem.

And it's time Post got interested and got together in finding a solution.

With our Chamber of Commerce in the hands of a younger generation of business men and community leaders, it is to them we turn for leadership.

If we need a starting point, an immediate effort at downtown beautification and development should be planned and "sold" to the business community.

Pride is that starting point.

Couple pride and a planned cooperative effort and we can put an end to the "ebbing" in short order and start the "flow" toward improved economic development here at the retail level.

(Continued From Page One) staff development, instructional consultants, computerized data processing, computer assisted instruction, school accreditation technical assistance, innovative programs, dissemination, and programs for special education, gifted-talented, bilingual, migrant, career education, driver education, nutrition education, drug education, adult education, bus driver training and the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills (TABS).

The service center at Lubbock, region XVII, serves 20 counties with 64 school districts approximately 80,000 students.

The service center is governed by a seven-member lay board of directors which appoints an executive director as chief administrative officer.

Six advisory committees, composed of school representatives, support operation of the center which has an annual budget of \$3,409,000 that is provided by contracts with local school districts, state appropriations and federal grants.

(Continued From Page One) nowhere near this bad. The new tax rates will come down steeply for the new tax year because valuations have zoomed and a 1980 rate will no longer be needed.

All taxpayers should keep this in mind when peeking at their valuation notices.

The appraisal district board met Tuesday afternoon and everything appears to be right on schedule, Dalby reported. Tax Associates of Irving which is reappraising all Garza property is practically completed with the big job. All that's left is a perimeter of property around the city's edge and some cross checking to be sure nothing has been missed.

Judge Dalby said the appraisal board is considering putting all the appraisals on computer, but are putting off a decision until the current Texas legislative session is over. House Bill 602 still up for consideration could change the new tax appraisal district law in many ways. For right now, the board is sitting on hold.

Speaking of the legislature, the big news this week is the house and senate redistricting plans. We hadn't got the breakdown on the house plan when The Dispatch went to press yesterday afternoon, but it appears Garza County is going to stay exactly where it is in all districts which means Congressman Charles Stenholm, State Senator E.L. Short, and Representative Bill Healy will continue to represent us through the 1980s.

That furious little thunderstorm last Thursday evening was centered right on Post. While we got '86 of an inch here moisture did not total over a quarter of an inch anywhere else in the county and most of it didn't get any, according to County Agent Syd Conner.

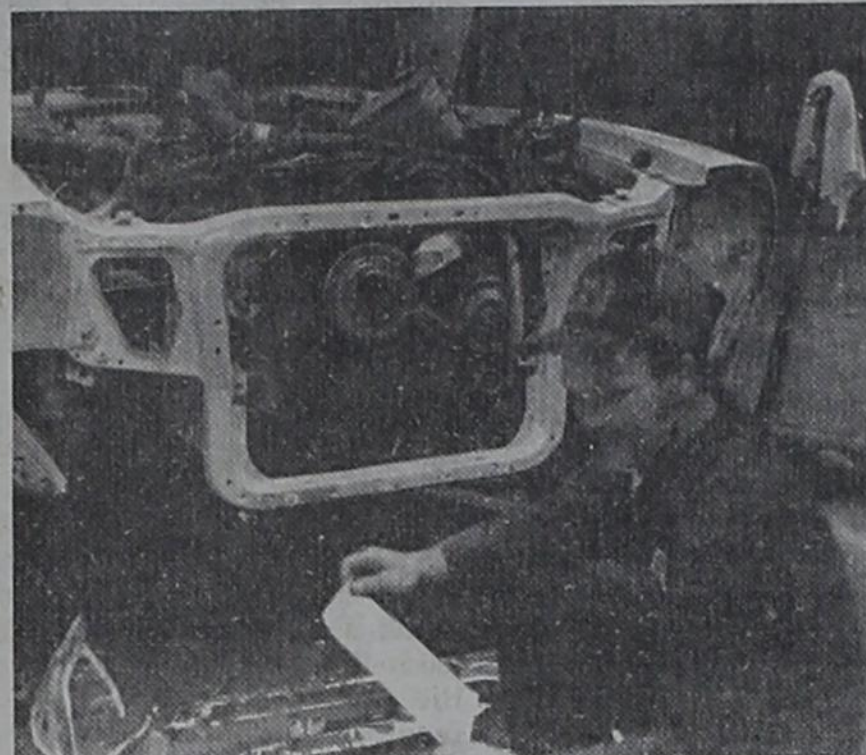

(Continued From Page One) cussion by pointing out that the May session was the time to act on the increase because local teachers soon would be deciding upon their plans for the next school year.

McCook told the board "If we wait to see what the state will do on a teacher pay raise, we won't be doing anything to hold the teachers." He said he thought the teachers should be raised "a bunch." McCook termed last spring's \$800 teacher pay hike "ridiculously low."

The Post board has been studying and arguing about how to cut down on Post's high teacher turnover rate for several years. The arguments for and against incentive pay to reward the best teachers with the most salary have continued throughout this period.

Hart pointed out that the amount of any state pay increase for teachers would not help hold local teachers and that only what Post paid over the state salary base would be a real factor. "Our teachers are worth a lot," he declared.

Mrs. Hays emphasized "there is no fair way" to rate teachers for incentive pay, that it would just be "politics" and that incentive pay would cause a lot of dissention among teachers here.

Lott pointed out that the Lubbock schools are now working up an incentive pay policy. He suggested that

the board ask the administration to come up with an incentive pay proposal by fall and that the board go ahead and vote a \$2,000 incentive pay increase along with an \$800 cost of living increase "tonight."

Most of the discussion centered on how a teacher could be fairly rated in an incentive pay system. Supt. Bill Shiver told the board that an incentive plan would call for the principal and individual teacher to set eight or 10 goals for that teacher for the year the teacher would be paid according to how many of the goals he or she attained.

Trustees favoring an across-the-board hike said this would place tremendous pressure on the principals with no fair way to make such decision.

Teachers generally, here and across the state, oppose incentive or merit pay proposals because they can see no fair method for accurately judging their classroom performance.

Hart during the argument said that a man and wife teaching team here "together don't make as much as a good roustabout who works a good number of hours."

Lott declared that "you will be doing Post's children harm if you don't consider incentive pay." Kirkpatrick toward the end of the argument said he would like more time "to study this a bit more", but the second motion already was on the table and the vote came.

With 72 teachers now on the district's payroll the increase will cost local taxpayers \$180,000 for next year.

There was no discussion of how the pay hike would affect school taxes here.

The assumption was that the district could well afford to give its teachers the record boost.

Some school districts in West Texas pay well above \$3,700 over state salary schedules, going as high as \$5,000 or more above state, but the Post boost will rank this school district over all but a few smaller West Texas school districts in salary scale.

It was brought out by Lott in the discussion that "the average Post teacher" is now getting an annual salary of \$13,323.96. With the anticipated state

pay boost, virtually certain to clear the legislature in the next couple of weeks, local teacher salaries will rise for a first year teacher over 35 percent from the present \$10,630 to \$14,355.90.

(This would be counting the 26 percent state boost as only a 13 percent increase for the 1981-82 school year with the remaining 13 percent coming in 1982-83.)

Top teacher salaries here, with teachers receiving experience pay increments for each year of teaching experience, will go from \$18,200 currently to over \$22,000.

The \$2,500 salary boost applies only to local teachers, including Athletic Director David Thompson.

It does not apply to either Supt. Shiver or the three school principals.

The principals are to be granted an incentive pay increase as voted at the board's February meeting. It will be based on an incentive proposal to be submitted to the board by the principals before the budget is adopted for the new school year.

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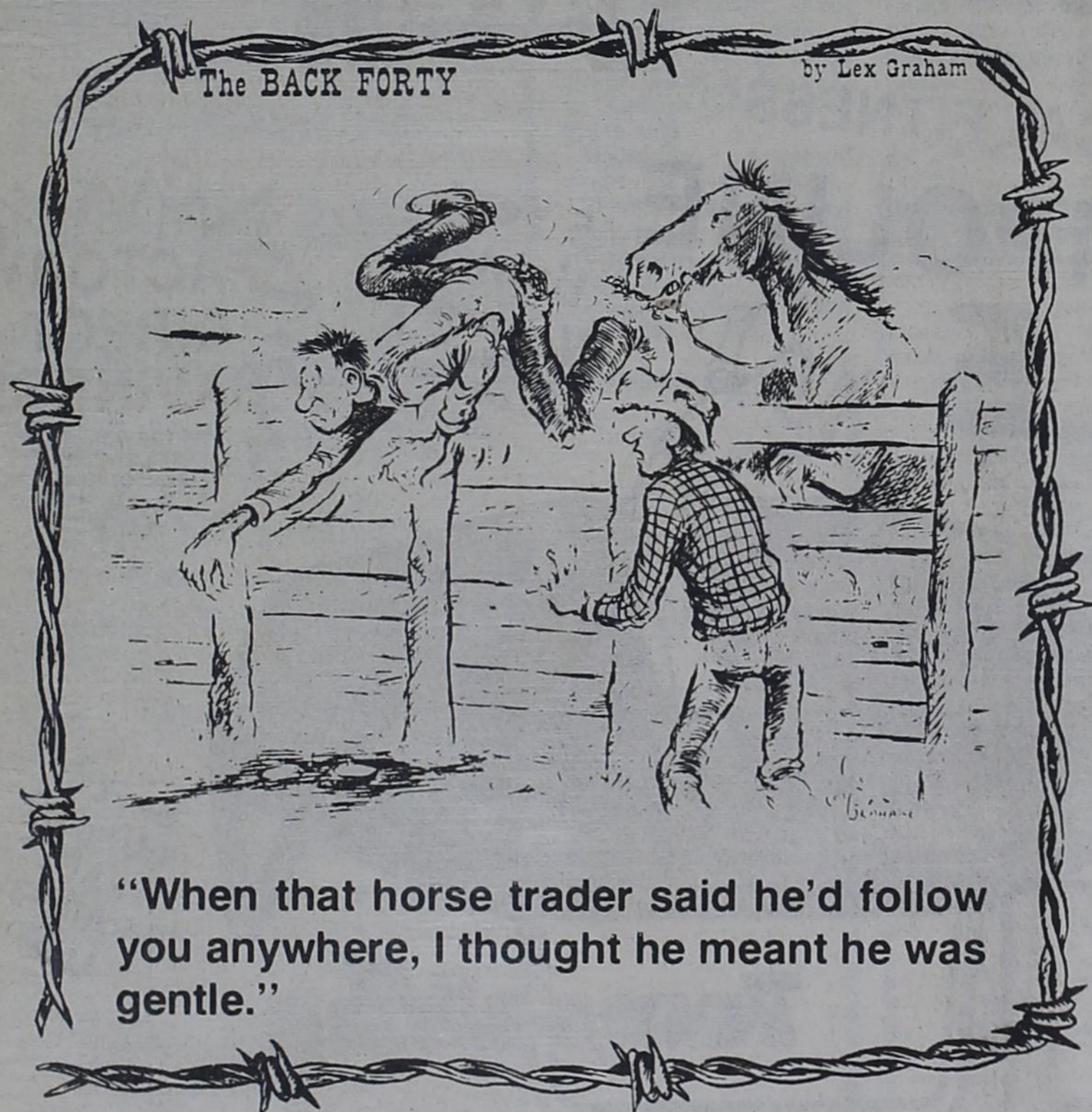
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
