The Texas 1968 Savings Bond goal is \$184.5 million. Series E and H and Freedom Share sales during January totaled \$16,342.828 which is an increase of 7.8 percent over January 1967.

Nationwide, during January 1968, total sales of Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares amounted to \$479 million - 2.6 percent below January a year ago.

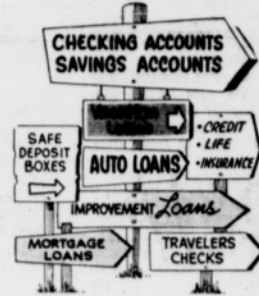

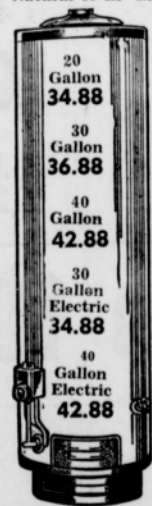

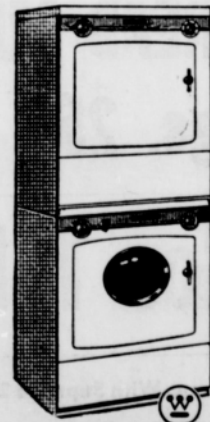
