Plans in full swing for Jubilee

Plans for Post's Diamond Jubilee are now in full swing, with a variety of committees working round the clock to organize the last details before rehearsals and final plans are brought into being.

Now on the agenda, and slightly urgent, is the gathering of Post people who can play a band instrument, who are members now or former members of the Antelope Band, to form the hoped for "100 member" Post Diamond Jubilee Band. A director has volunteered his services and skill to organize the band. Anyone who would like to join and help make it one of the best bands around, is urged to contact Donna Stelzer at the Chamber office, Margie Pennell or Charles Hardin, at the bank. The band needs to be organized within the next ten days, so rehearsals can be scheduled. It is estimated it will take about two weeks of practice to organize the program for the band.

A community chorus is also planned, with members of the community participating in the Sunday Community Worship service that is planned for Sunday morning, July 4, in the City-county park. Anyone wishing to help sing in the chorus should contact Phil Alford and give him your name.

Tickets for the Diamond Jubilee are now being printed, and the Jubilee committee has come up with a plan for families in the area who want to take the whole family to all events of the Jubilee. A package plan, or book of tickets, can be purchased for \$25 per person, and this book will include passes to all the activities of the Jubilee, which include in part, two dances, two barbecues, two performances of the Fiesta del Llano Estacado, a spaghetti supper, the Cabaret, and also a fish fry and entertainment that has been scheduled for June 22 in the community center. There will be other activities that the book will include, and to buy the same tickets at the gate individually, the cost would be about \$40 per person. This will enable the ticket books to be purchased one at a time by a family member, or purchased one at a time to fit the family budget. Keep this in mind, and don't let even one member of your family miss a single part of the Jubilee celebration.

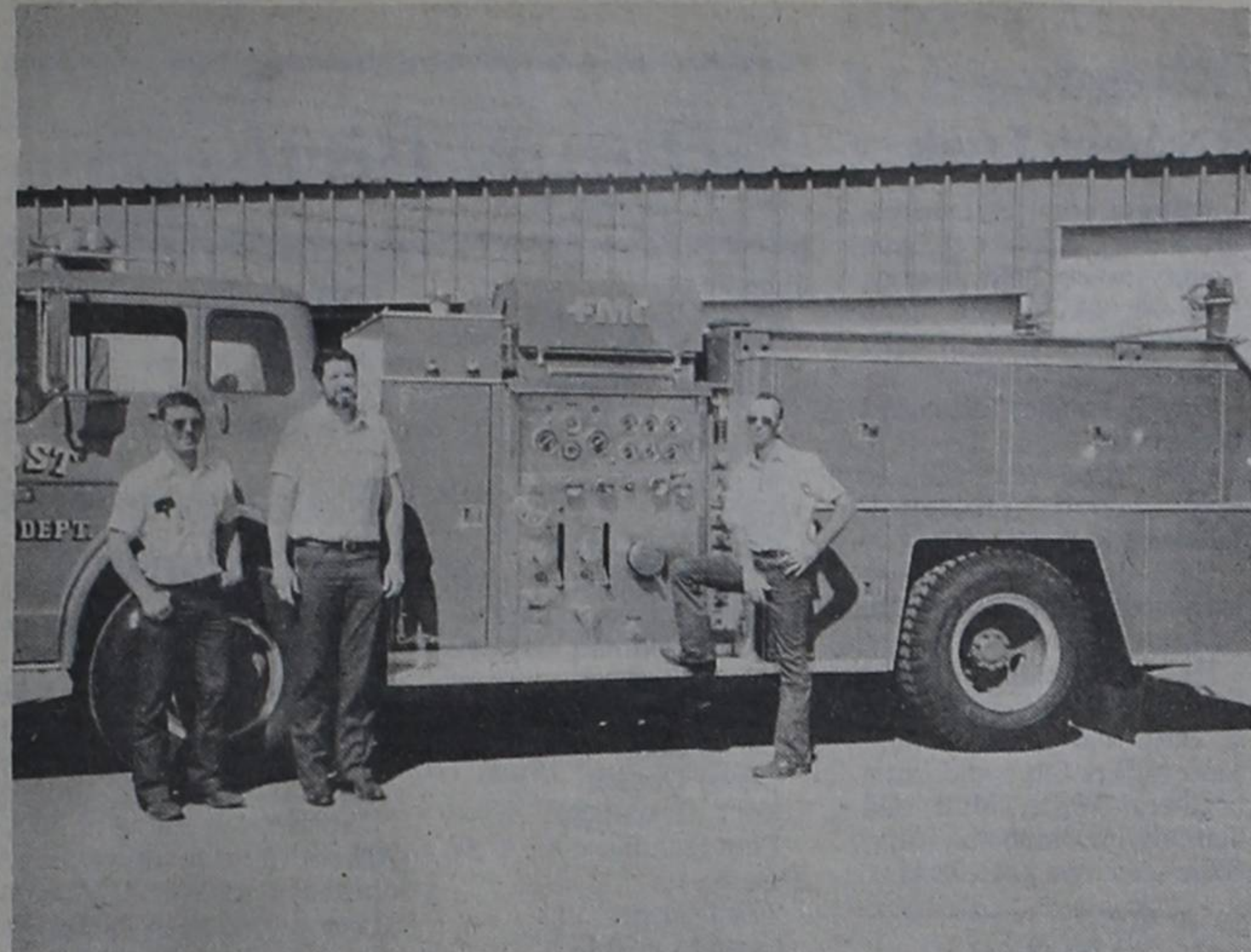

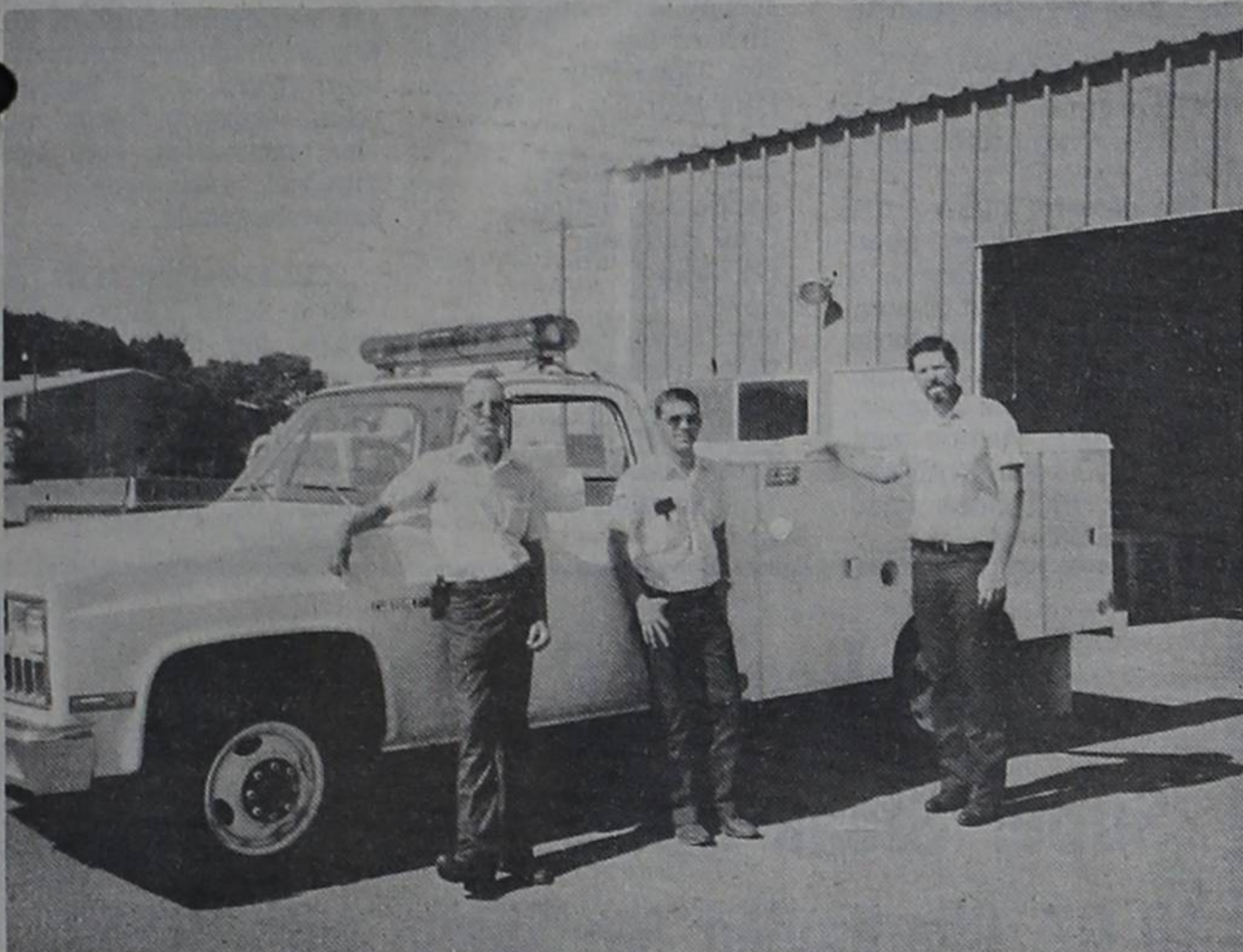

Garza County citizens receive recognition

Judge Giles W. Dalby, K. W. Kirkpatrick, Mayor Giles McCrary, Maritta Reed, hospital administrator, and the Post Dispatch will be among West Texas Citizens and organizations receiving Distinguished Associate certificates from the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center School of Medicine. The awards ceremony will be held Friday during an appreciation banquet held in Lubbock.

The banquet will launch activities for a weekend-long celebration of the medical school's first decade in physician education and will culminate with the graduation convocation June 6.

The first students were admitted to the medical school in Lubbock in 1972. Over the next 10 years, campuses were developed in Amarillo and El Paso and teaching programs begun.

"Starting a medical school on one campus is no easy matter," said J. Ted Hartman, M.D., interim dean of the School of Medicine. "Development of a school on three campuses simultaneously is a real challenge."

"With the encouragement, support and assistance of concerned citizens throughout the state, but particularly in West Texas, we have grown from a school in a converted dormitory to a multi-campus institution serving the region," he said. "It is fitting that we give special thanks and recognition to the individuals who provided invaluable help during this period of growth as we mark a decade of physician education."

David Ernesto Mendez from El Salvador was arrested on a Dallas County warrant for unlawful carrying of a weapon, and theft by checks.

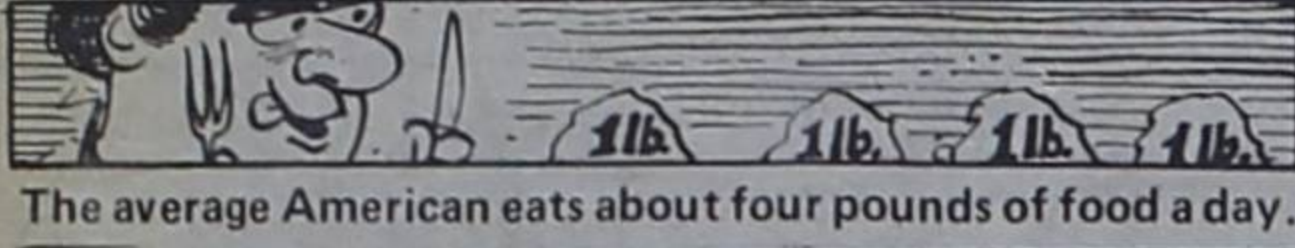

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1982 class history given

We, the Senior class of 1982, would like to share with you our class history and some of our most memorable moments.

Jennifer Ellis, Gina Ainsworth, and Byron Roberson joined our class in 1978. Chris Beggs and Gary Baker didn't show up for a district track meet and as a result the team lost. Sounds like they had to run quite a bit when they got back. I wonder who was always popping fire crackers in the choir class. I think Greg Williams would probably know. Junior varsity cheerleaders were Deann, Vicki Teaff, Gail Scott, and Karen Davis. Karen Davis had a little trouble at Meet the Antelopes Night. She fell on the football field in front of everyone. Since then Karen has the nick name "Flip-Flop." Karen and Mario Luna were our class favorites. Cindy Basquez had a real problem when her desk fell on her as she bent down to get a pencil in Mr. Pierce's Physical Science class. Jerri Baumann alias "Oz", was given a party in Mrs. Thompson's class and received an Ostrich short. Jana Terry locked her keys in her pickup while it was still running.

1980 brought three new students, Jack Rylant, Beth Camacho, and Nathan Stark. Gina Ainsworth had to get some new keys for her car since Vicki Teaff flushed the first one down the commode. Our class won the spirit stick that year at our homecoming pep rally. Joann Harper left us in the 10th grade and moved to Hawaii. She didn't stay long though, she came back in the 11th.

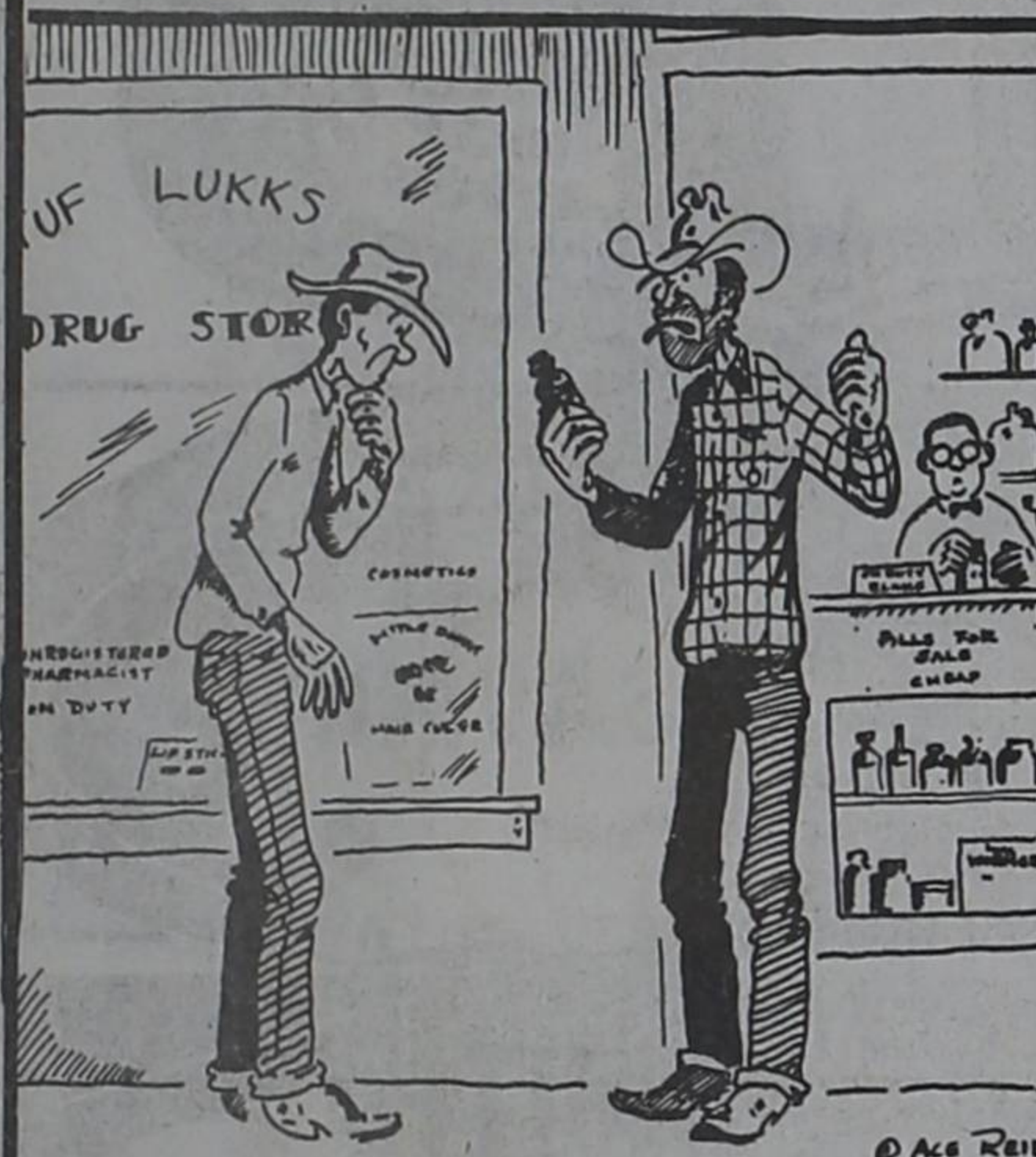

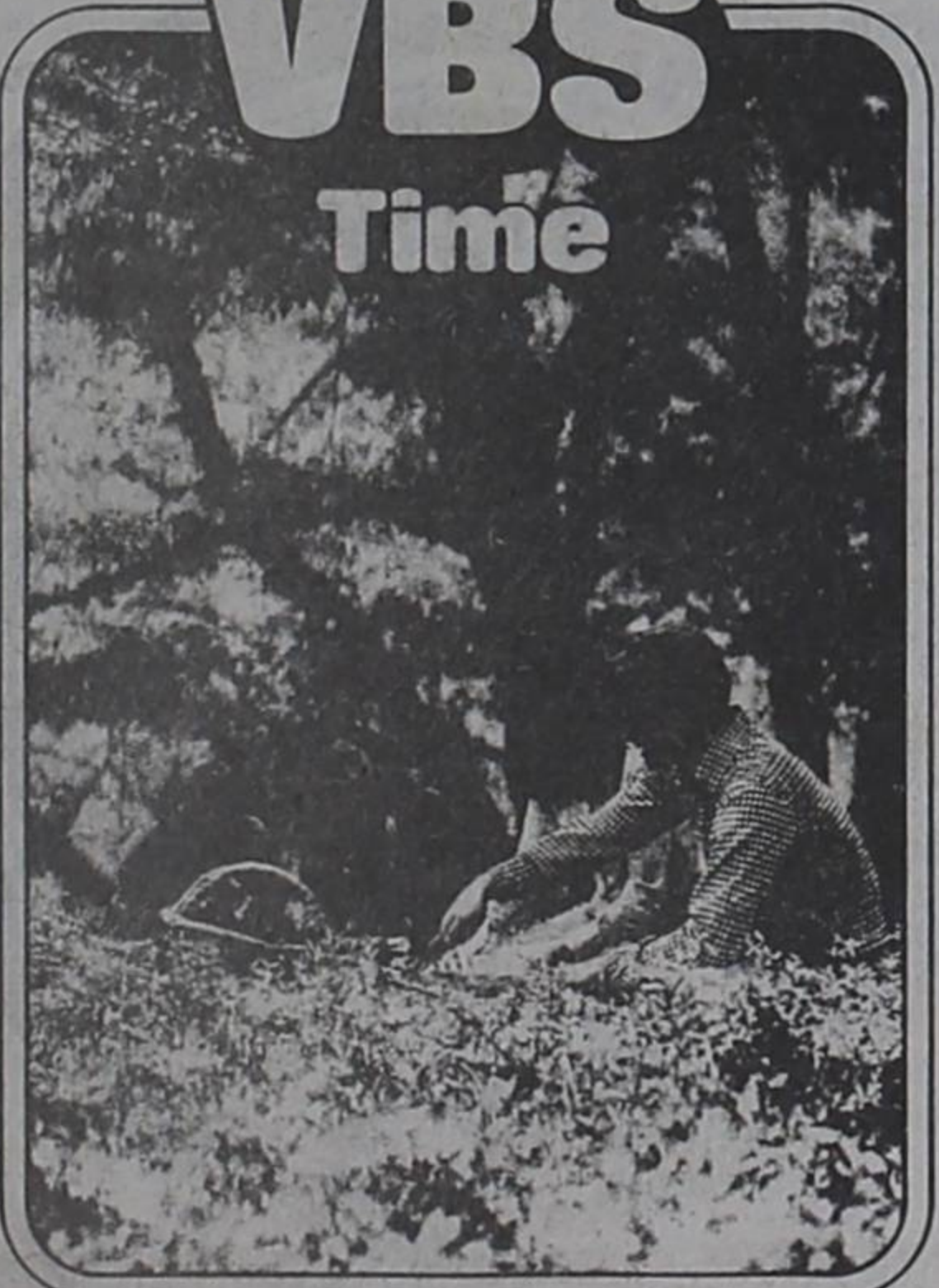
