Fiesta del Llano Estacado in final planning stages

Well folks, the Diamond Jubilee Celebration is virtually just around the corner, with only a little over two weeks for preparations to be completed. And preparations are in full swing at the Riley Miller Ranch in Justiceburg, where all the Pageant, Fiesta Del Llano Estacado, festivities are being planned and put together.

Riley Miller, who says he is being assisted by lots of knowledgeable people, is a great historian himself, and gave *The Dispatch* a rundown of the things one might expect during the pageant.

It could be called "history in the round", with all the different phases of our County history portrayed from the Spaniards right on down to present day time, being seen in the Post Stampede Rodeo arena.

This will be one of the greatest opportunities available to show the "now" generation just how it used to be in days when this country was just being founded. Riley has spent lots of time researching his material, and lots more time and energy in preserving the relics that he will be using in his presentation.

Riley receives a lot of help from his family, wife Mary, son Ben, daughter Jennifer, daughter-in-law, Paula and his four grandsons. They will all have some part in the pageant.

Approximately 60 head of livestock, including buffalo, oxen, longhorns, and horses will be used in some way during the show, and they will also participate in the parade. Riley has preserved a chuck wagon, a covered wagon and a carriage among other relics, and these will be used. Fifteen to twenty Sioux Indians, from the Cheyenne River

Reservation in South Dakota, including dancers, drummers and singers will present their award winning ceremonies, and a professional trick rider and roper will also be here to add his skill to the program. Many

more "surprises" are in store for the program.

The pageant will be narrated by Byron Price, who is a noted historian, and his comments will bring history right before you as you view the spectacular

and colorful show presented by Riley and his crew.

Riley has on his ranch quite an assortment of animals not seen around on just your average ranch. He has oxen, longhorns, and

The Board of Trustees of the School Board met June 10, and expressed its appreciation to over 55 volunteers in Education, citizens who assisted teachers. The Board voted to sell five busses, to accept the

Three Texas cities most popular

AUSTIN — Among out-of-state auto visitors who came to Texas during 1981, Dallas, San Antonio and Houston proved to be the state's most popular destinations according to a profile of auto travelers released today by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. "That may be no surprise," said Tom H. Taylor, director of the department's Travel and Information Division, "because those cities are always among the top visitor destinations in Texas. But where last year's highway travelers came from was a bit of a surprise.

"While it's logical that neighboring Oklahoma was our number-one supplier of auto visitors," said Taylor, "our figures show that distant California and Illinois were right behind. "We thought cross-country auto travel might have faded after the shocks of oil embargoes and dollar-a-gallon gasoline," Taylor explained. "But at least for 1981, the long-distance drivers were back on the highways."

Auto visitors from other states who spent less than 30 days in Texas drove an average of 1,046 miles; those who stayed in the state longer than 30 days drove 2,624 miles. Those short-term visitors stayed an average of 6.92 days; long-term visitors stayed 84.51 days in Texas.

The variation between the long and short term visitors was as wide in average expenditures as in the length of stay. Short term expenditure per person per day was \$26.67; long termers spend \$11.96 per person

per day. Data for the report are from survey cards distributed at the Department's 12 tourist bureaus that served more than two and a half million travelers last year.

To give a clearer picture of the visitor to Texas, the profile also gives data on the accommodations used, the size of the group, purpose of the trip, visitor age groups, income, and how they spend their travel dollars. Although no totals are given

in the report, the percentage figures provide a representative profile of the state's highway visitors.

"The more we know about our visitors," Taylor said, "the better job those who serve tourists can do."

Pickling Pointers"

It is that season of the year when questions concerning pickling are being asked daily. This is probably a good time to review some of the essentials of making good pickles.

1. If you are in an area where the water is particularly hard and or alkaline, it is best to use distilled

water for making pickles.

2. Always water bath pickled products. Many people feel this is what causes pickles to be soft; however, just the opposite is true. The water bath treatment is a mild heat treatment designed to destroy spoilage organisms and inactivate enzymes. Processing beyond recommended time may lead to softness in the product.

3. Calcium chloride can be added to improve texture. Use 1/2 teaspoon per pint or 1/4 teaspoon per

quart. Your local druggist should be able to get this for you.

4. Use only pickling salt. Table salt has anticaking agents which may cause cloudiness of the brine.

5. Pickle your products the same day they are pickled. This is very important.

6. Be sure to use at least 1/2 cup of undiluted vinegar (5 percent acetic acid, 50 grain) per quart of pickles. 100 grain (10 percent acetic acid) vinegar should be reduced to 50 grain by mixing it half and half with water.

7. Be sure you are using a pickling variety cucumber and not a salad type. Avoid using waxed fruits.

8. When fermenting a pickled product, use a crockware pot or a plastic bucket which is intended

FOR FOOD. Never use a garbage or other plastic bucket not intended for food use.

I hope that these tips will answer some of the questions you have about pickling. Call me if you have problems or if you need the free extension publications on pickling. (495-2050)

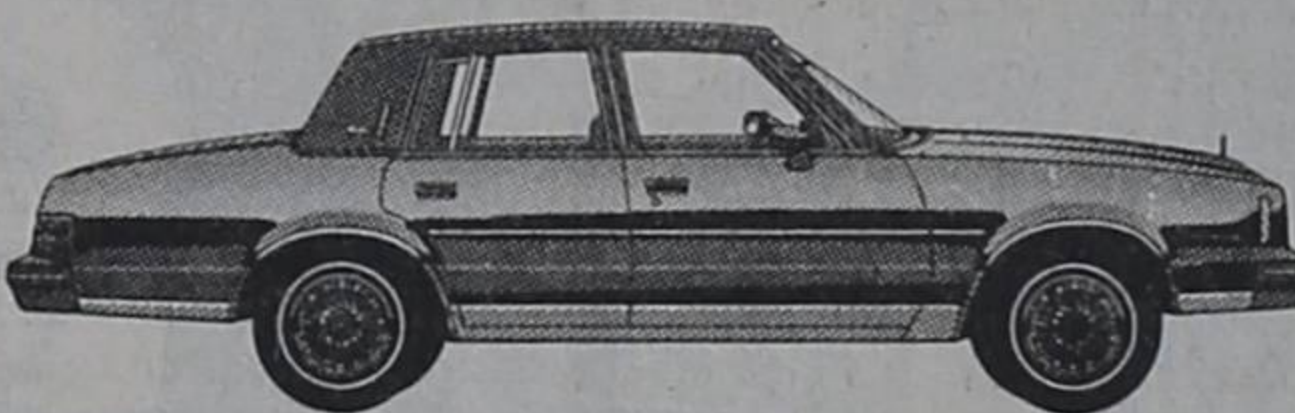
