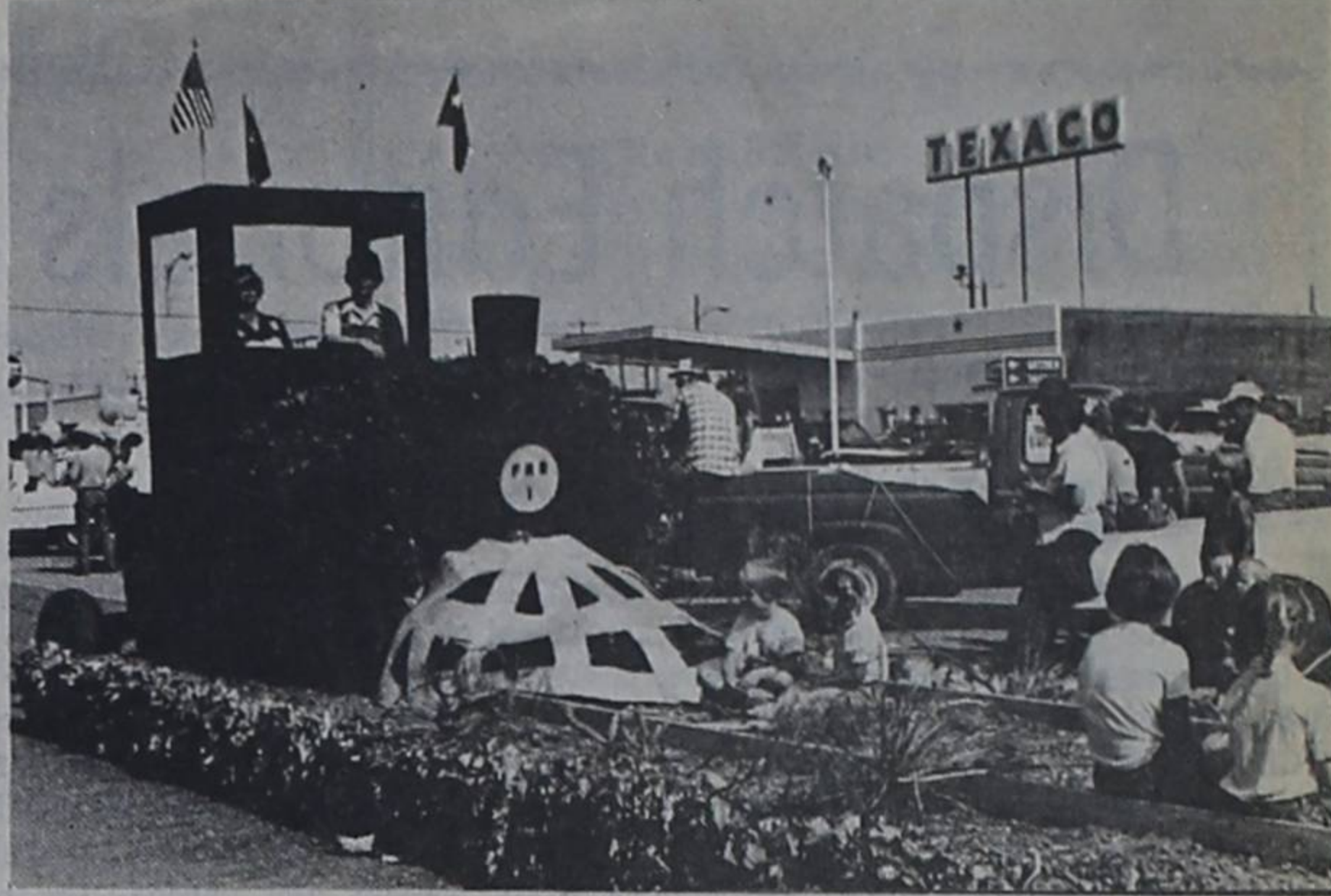

## Garza Museum busy over long weekend

Several hundred people toured the Garza Historical Museum during the three day holiday weekend, to view the new permanent exhibits.

Many took advantage of the special price and purchased copies of the Garza County history book "Wagon Wheels."

Some thirty new members were registered.

Museum members in recent weeks have been working to install some new exhibits which include an exciting and informative "Early Man" display showing how the first inhabitants came to what is now Garza County. Colored maps, pictures, stone artifacts and a mammoth skeleton killed by hunters 12,000 years ago, show their life style.

Another new and delightful exhibit shows a bedroom of 1915 vintage. Antique furniture includes a solid oak bed and dresser, an iron baby bed and a manakin dressed in lavishly embroidered under clothes of that time period.

An interesting display of old quilts and other improvements has helped bring the Museum a bit closer to a fine institution. Members plan to continue with improvements.

The museum is operated entirely on donated funds, and from profits of articles sold in the sales shop.

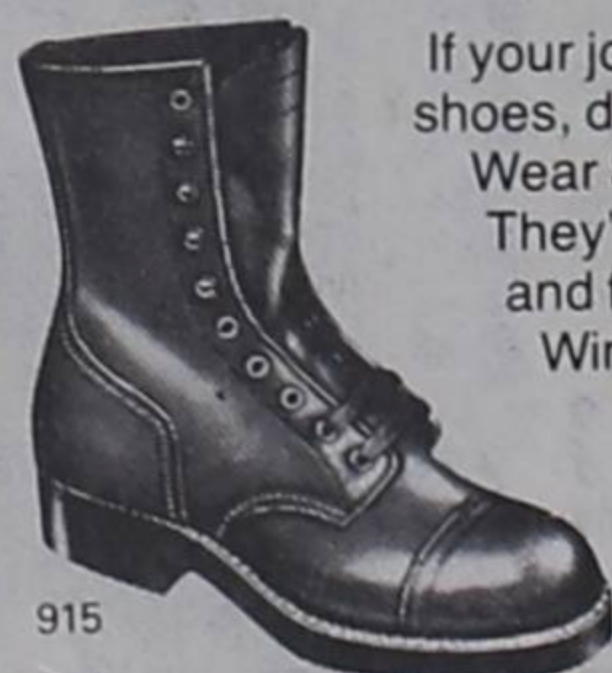

# Bentsen asks for Cabinet Level Task Force on ag

Senator Lloyd Bentsen, saying that people in Washington don't understand the serious problems confronting American agriculture, called Wednesday to Washington to President Reagan, asking the formation of a Cabinet-Level Task Force on Agriculture.

Bentsen, in a letter to the President, urged that the Secretaries of Agriculture, Treasury and Commerce be named to the task force and that they report within a month with recommendations to help avert a farm catastrophe.

"The American farmer today is in worse shape than at any time since the Great Depression, yet few people in Washington seem aware of the problem," the Senator said.

"High interest rates and low commodity prices have combined to put the economic squeeze on our amazingly efficient and productive farmers and ranchers, forcing thousands of them off

their land and into bankruptcy."

"In my own state of Texas the crisis has been compounded by severe weather damage to crops, particularly in the Lubbock area. In many counties of West Texas half or more of the farmers could go under if nothing is done. The situation would be an emergency in the best of times, but given the depressed state of American agriculture, it could become a full-blown disaster not only for these farmers but for all Americans who depend on them for their food and clothing."

"In no way, of course, should this broad-ranging Cabinet-Level study delay action on the disaster confronting West Texas. I note that an assistant to Secretary Block is in fact, preparing a report on the extent of this disaster and I would hope the Secretary will act quickly on my request to provide disaster assistance in this area," Bentsen said.

"I would anticipate that the task force will examine the impact of the agricultural crisis throughout the American economy as well as the effect of regional disasters such as the one now occurring in the Lubbock area."

"It is essential that farm policy decisions made in Washington be made by people who are fully aware of the situation with a full understanding of the impact their decisions have on the local, regional and national economies," Bentsen said.

Funeral services for Riley Albert Taylor, 85, of Tahoka were held Thursday, July 1 at 2 p.m. in the First Baptist Church of Tahoka with the Rev. Ray Cunningham of Fluvanna Baptist Church officiating.

Taylor died Monday at Lubbock's Methodist Hospital following a brief illness. He was a native of Bowie and attended Bowie schools. He married Lula Brandon Feb. 14, 1929 in Tahoka and moved to Lynn County in 1937 from Post. He was a retired farmer and a member of the VFW.

Survivors include his wife, two daughters, Lana Jo Craig of Peoria, Ill., and Robin Gay of Lubbock; four sisters, Eva Gray of Midland, Gracie Anglin of Cleveland, Tex., Trudy Greggs of Fort Smith, Ark., and Georgie Lewis of Kilgore and two brothers, Raymond of Austin.

## COTTON TALKS

FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS, INC.

Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, learned July 1 that the 1982 base cotton loan rate at High Plains warehouse locations would be 57.20 cents per pound, basic Strict Low Middling one and one-sixteenth (41-34), 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire.

That's 12 points (.12 cents) above the national average 1982 loan rate of 57.08 cents announced earlier. When applicable discounts are applied the High Plains rate translates into loan value of 47.40 cents per pound on the mid-range High Plains quality of Strict Low Middling Light Spot 31-32nds, inch (42-31), 3.4 micronaire.

The loan rate at various U.S. warehouse locations is adjusted each year to reflect differences in freight costs from different areas to mill sites and ports. Last year's High Plains rate of 52.50 cents was only four points above the U.S. average.

Premiums and discounts that will apply to cottons above and below the base quality all were announced by USDA in May and reported in this space May 28.

Almost all qualities of cotton stapling an inch or less and grading Low Middling Light Spot, Strict Low Middling Spot, Middling Spot or above will be

discounted less this year than last.

However almost all cotton stapling one and one-thirty-seconds inch or longer and grading below the Strict

Low Middling base will show greater discounts, and qualities above the base grade will receive smaller premiums than in 1981.

Micronaire discounts in all groupings above and below 3.5 to 4.9 show an increase over last year, from 35 points on 3.3 and 3.4 to 65 points on 2.6 and below.
