





# **Arrests are few** despite large crowd





Bentsen, in a letter to the President, urged that the Secretaries of Agriculture, Treasury and Commerce be named to the task force and that they report within a month with recommendations to hlep avert a farm

"In my own state of Texas the crisis has been compounded by severe weather damage to crops, particularly in the Lubbock area. In many counties of West Texas half or more of the farmers could go under if nothing is done. The situation would be an emergency in the best of times, but given the depressed state of American agriculture, it could become a full-blown disaster not

"In no way, of course, should this broad-rangiong ÷ Cabinet-Level study delay action on the disaster 周 confronting West Texas. I note that an assistant to Secretary Block is in fact, preparing a report on the extent of this disaster and I would hope the Secretary will act quickly on my request to provide disaster assistance in this area,' Bentsen said. "I would anticipate that the task force will examine the impact of the agricultural crisis throughout the American economy as well as the effect of regional disasters such as the one now occurring in the Lubbock area." "It is essential that farm policy decisions made in Washington be made by people who are fully aware of the situation with a full understanding of the impact their decisions have on the local, regional and national economies," Bentsen said.

"Knowing of your concern for the well-being of the American farmer and the enormous productive potential of our farmers and ranchers, I urge you to help us focus attention and resources on the current problems by convening the task force at the earliest possible date and requiring their findings within one month," Senator Bentsen said.
