31,000 bales

A 31,000 bale cotton crop for Garza County appears in the offing, according to a Post Dispatch gin check Saturday afternoon with five of the eight gins handling Garza cotton reporting they are about to finish up.

Seven of the eight gins were contacted with no report from the Southland gin which was not reached but for which an estimate was made to reach a county total.

The 31,000 bale estimate is about 2,000 bales below the 33,000 of a month ago when most of it was still in the field and educated guesswork.

Through mid-afternoon Saturday, 24,436 bales of Garza cotton had been ginned, there were 4,570 more bales stacked on gin yards with only an estimated 1,817 bales still in the field.

Gins reported farmers were averaging a half to three quarters of a bale an acre.

Grading was reported generally as "pretty good" and holding up well.

Most farmers apparently are "waiting until next year" to determine what to do with their cotton.

There has been no upturn in cotton prices.

This is the gin by gin report:

Post Gin - 2,400 bales ginned, 1,000 bales on yard and 2,000 area acres still to be harvested.

Storie Gin - 1,812 bales ginned, estimated 60 to 70 bales in area, yard clean. Graham Gin — 5,566 bales ginned, about 2,000 on yard, maybe 500 still in field, farmers getting about threefourths bale to acre.

Close City Gin - 5,500 bales ginned, 25 on yard, estimated 100 still in field, averaging two-thirds to three-fourths bale per acre. Hackbery Gin - 9,255 bales ginned, half of which is counted as Garza cotton, 2,900 on yard, and estimated 200 in field.

Grassland Coop - 5,430 bales ginned, one-third of which is counted as Garza cotton, none on yard, maybe 200 bales still in field. Producers Coop Gin -4,885 bales ginned, one-fourth of which is counted as



State Comptroller Bob Bullock announced over the weekend the mailing of a December check to Post as its tax rebate totaling \$12,167.45.

This brought the total for the 12 checks received by Post this year to the \$170,916.70.

The total is 19,17 percent higher than the \$143,424.06 received in 1980.

Actually, the December check this year was slightly less than the \$12,961 received for the same month last year.

Post's robust economy is reflected in these figures and in the fact that Post's total sales tax "take" this year was well ahead of Slaton's \$167,791.54 in sales tax receipts despite the fact that Slaton has a highway shopping center which is making an organized effort to draw customer support from both Tahoka and Post. Salton's percent increase in sales tax over 1980 was 15.72 percent compared to Post's 19.17 percent.

Early Remembrances of Christmas . . . an editorial

Each and every one of us has a head full of memories of Christmases past, especially those we enjoyed as a child.

We grew up in the Christmas era of white tissue paper for gift wrapping. The greatest thing about it was that it rustled delightfully.

We would lay awake in bed on Christmas eve behind a big curtain that divided our bedroom with the dining room. My parents couldn't "hide" that rustling tissue paper wrapping sound. Long after we had "grown up" to "the myth of Santa Claus", we would lie awake on Christmas eve and listen contentedly to the rustle of tissue paper wrapping of gifts. It was a perfect way to go to sleep - and seldom were we disappointed next morning.

We literally grew up too in the newspaper business. When we were young we had a "paper route" delivering the hometown Kansas daily after school on our bike. In fact we split a route with our older brother, he taking one side of the street and we the other. The route was 13 blocks long. After the papers were folded at the newspaper office so we could throw them with real distance and some accuracy, we would take our "third street route." In good weather, we used to time ourselves. We got so we could "carry the route" in just about seven minutes flat, but always with several papers sailing wildly into the bushes from where our customers would later have to look for them instead of onto their porches (almost every house had a porch in those days). For the month before Christmas we were especially careful and tried not for speed but a 100 percent porch effort. Then when we collected our 15 cents a week (we got a nickel of it) on the Saturday morning before Christmas we would "expect" an extra quarter or so for a "Christmas gift". We usually got them too. The mayor lived in a big corner house on our route and his wife usually gave us a \$1 on that "Christmas Saturday." They had to maintain their position in the town and we were thankful for that

The "most fun" though was for one, two or three families to go together and "adopt" a family of their own. Nothing was said. The family adopted never knew from where all the yule goodies came, but there were clothes for all the youngsters (that fit by size and were good quality hand-me-downs), enough food in the basket for not only the holiday itself but for several days after. Then there were the gifts. Gaily wrapped presents for everyone with at least two toys per child.

We learned very early in life that it was not just better to give than to receive - but that it was actually more fun too.

Talk about Christmas feasting. We always had "three Christmases" when we were growing up. First was the one at home with a hearty breakfast preceeding the gift opening as required by mother's edict. At noon we would drive four blocks to the home of our two maiden aunts and unmarried uncle who lived together throughout their lives, never marrying.

They had one of those "fireless cookers" now extinct. Heavy round stones were heated and the food was placed on the heated stones and cooked slowly over several hours much as the crock pots work today. Chicken literally fell off the bone when cooked in one ot those "fireless cookers" and you should taste a turkey so prepared. There was a second tree after noon dinner. Of course there was plenty of new things to play with so the afternoon passed quickly and before we knew it the time had come to go to Grandpa and Grandma Cornishes' for Christmas supper. Ah, what a feast. Grandma was a specialist with chicken dumplings and one of the greatest disasters of the modern age is that old-fashioned chicken dumplings have literally disappeared from the scene. We ate her dumplings for years on Sunday nights (we followed the same feasting procedures on Sundays each week as we did on Christmas.) but she would never disclose her recipe to anyone. It was a "secret" she kept as far as we knew throughout her long and happy life. You had to have a well operating stomach in nurses to come to Post to to eat your way through the Christmases of my childhood.

White Christmases were best. There were more of them in Kansas than there are here in West Texas, but they were still a real holiday occasion for a kid living there.

The only skiing done in those days, at least as far as we knew, was done by rich Europeans in the Swiss Alps. But everybody had a sled, and you could have some wild and dangerous rides when hooked onto the back of a car, with or without the driver's knowledge.

Ford's black "tin lizzies" was the No. 1 car in those days because you could buy one for about \$350. Our neighbor across the street to the north was a local carriage maker. He "retired" and closed up his shop when Henry introduced mass production of automobiles to America.

When you rode sleds behind them you had to use a muffler - they were "big stuff" then - to wrap around your mouth and nose to keep out the exhaust fumes.

Christmas in our earliest memories was the greatest day of the year in so many ways. Thanksgiving and the Fourth of July were No. 2 and 3 but didn't even come close to Christmas. Christmas stands out so much in those memories as a family day, and as a religious day. Churches always held Christmas morning services in those days and everybody dressed up in their new shirts, ties, suits and dresses and after church saw friends from near and far who had "come home for Christmas."

"Coming home for Christmas" throughout our life always has been so important. It brought back all the old sounds, faces, and memorie ... It was important to drive hundreds of miles to get back home when we grew older. Vacations were nice, but "going home for christmas" was the most important event of the year.

What we started to say was that the churches have gradually been pushed back in their Christmas observances, mostly to the Sunday before christmas as occurred here in Post yesterday. When this pressure to forego Christmas day services began, it was scornfully referred to as "taking Christ out of Christmas." Now you don't even hear that phrase anymore.

One last Christmas thought has been called up from our memory. It was how folks without families were always invited somewhere to enjoy "a family Christmas."

Seldom did we sit down to a Christmas dinner but at least one place at the table was taken by somebody who had no place to go at Christmas time because he or she had no family left, or sort of grew up alone and didn't marry. There was always a gift for him or her under our Christmas trees. To them, maybe it wasn't the Christmas we enjoyed so thoroughly, but it prevented a day of bleak loneliness on a day when no one should be alone because it is the birthday we celebrate of the man who came to save us from loneliness and hopelesness forevermore. - J.C.

One of our happiest memories of Christmas as a boy were the church programs and plays we participated in at Sunday School. The story of Christ's birth is never quite so pure and beautiful as it is when learned as a child.

The church services, of course, were a "little different". We didn't understand really what the preacher was talking about, but we loved church anyway at Christmas time because of all the Christmas hymns many of which we knew by heart.

A good choir can make a tremendous impression upon a youngster. We never had a voice for singing but we learned to love it anyway as a boy and still "hide" in the back row and enjoy flaying away with our vocal chords when the occasion presents itself.

Another part of Christmas which is mostly missing today is the many efforts to help the poor - and there were as many poor people then, if not





The major exception is the absence of a disaster program in the new law. That program, put into the 1973 farm act through the efforts of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, for eight years has provided sorely-needed crop loss insurance to farmers. "But unless it can be reinstated at some future date," laments PCG President Gary Ivey of Ralls, "That program is a thing of the past." The Commodity Credit Corporation loan rate will be figured on the same formula as before - the lower of (1) 85 percent of the average of the median three of the preceding five years U. S. spot market prices or (2) 90 percent of the preceding 15 weeks adjusted average prices in Northern Europe, except that when Northern Europe prices average below the U. S. spot average, the loan can be set anywhere between the two. The only "improvement" in the loansetting procedure is an increase in the 1981 law's statutory minimum, to 55 cents a pound, up from this year's 48-cent minimum. The loan formula for 1982 is expected to set the loan just above 57 cents, up from this year's 52.46 cents. PCG, along with efforts to get the disaster program extended, worked for a minimum loan of 65 percent of parity. But both causes fell before the Administration's scattergun attack on government expenditures.



als. First it says premiums and discounts are to be set at a simple average of the prior year's loan differences and the previous nine-month spot market differences. Then it directs the Secretary to establish a 10-member committee to study procedures and criteria used to set differentials and gives his authority to conduct his own review of the process, including the committee's recommendations.

Target prices under the new law will be the higher of (1) 120 percent of the base loan rate or (2) 71 cents in 1982, 76 cents in 1983, 81 cents in 1984 and 86 cents in 1985. The old law called for basing target prices on cost of production changes.

United Fund nears \$13,000


