Still practicing after 38 years here-

Carl Webb honored by judges, lawyers

Carlton P. Webb, a practicing attorney here for the past 38 years, was honored by attorneys and judges at a chili luncheon in the basement of the First United Methodist Church Dec. 22.

County Judge Giles Dalby read a "resolution by the citizens of Garza County and the 106th Judicial District court of Texas" as follows:

"Whereas Carlton P. Webb began his career of practicing law in the year 1927, continuing to practice law fairly and justly in cities in Texas and New

Mexico; and "Whereas, Mr. Webb moved to Garza County in 1943, opening a private practice for law that has served the people of Garza County these past 38 years;

"Whereas, Mr. Webb not only maintained a private practice but served in the capacity of county attorney for ten years, completing a two-year term of ofice in 1946, and two four-year

terms ending in 1964; and "Whereas, Mr. Webb also devoted ten years as city attorney to the City of Post, from August 1955 to February 1965, advising and working for the betterment of Post and its citizens; and

"Whereas, during the 54 years and four months, Mr. Webb has practiced law, he has conducted his practice with integrity and fairness to both his clients and business associates, and is known throughout the district for the sanctity of his word and the invoilability of his promise; and

"Whereas, his fellow attorneys and associates, as well as his many friends, know him as a gentlemen and esteem him highly for his honesty, his prudent counsel, his caring in human relationships; and

"Whereas, we enter this

resolution as a tribute to Mr. Webb and request that it be recorded in the permanent minutes of the 106th Judicial District Court, Garza County, Tex-

Truett Smith of Tahoka, former judge of the 106th district, was the featured speaker for the occasion and recalled many interesting and humorous stories of trials in his courtroom.

Of Mr. Webb, he declared: "Since he came to Post in 1943 he has an excellent reputation for doing exactly what he said he would do."

Mr. Webb responded by saying he "didn't remember any difficulty I've ever had with any lawyers in the district. We've been fortunate with judges we've had on the bench since I've been here." He concluded: "I've been very fortunate with my practice."

TWC orders Lubbock to answer

The Texas Water Commission has ordered the City of Lubbock to supply answers to all questions asked by opponents of the Justiceburg Lake project.

The TWC had scheduled a hearing on Lubbock's application for water rights for the project Dec. 3 but postponed it for 60 days to

allow opponents of the lake to obtain more information on the project.

The hearing now is scheduled for Feb. 8 in Austin. A group of Justiceburg

landowners are fighting the project and complained that Lubbock would not provide them with information on

plans or financing. The Texas Water Com-

mission then ordered Lubbock to answer all questions they could put to them by the landowners by Monday, Dec. 28.

The development of the proposed Post Lake by the White River Water district is dependent upon Lubbock obtaining water rights near

Justiceburg. The same water pipeline to Lubbock would carry water from both lakes, but the pipeline would not be financially feasible just for the Post Lake alone.

The White River Water district would build the Post Lake and sell the water to Lubbock.

plant into CO2. Plans also called for a pipeline from the Lubbock plant to the Garza field to deliver the CO2 to injection wells. The new flood should prolong the life and increase the oil recovery from

Optimistic for 1982

The ending of the old year and the start of a new one is a time to look back to identify mistakes and check over problems and accomplishments, and also to look ahead expectantly.

Color 1982 with optimism. As we look into Post's future, there's a growing feeling of confidence.

We won't say this community faces no harsh economic problems on an individual basis, but overall the local economy is far healthier than almost anywhere else.

It's not hard to find jobs here. Finding workers to fill them is the problem.

Garza's oil industry is busier now than it has ever been and all indications are that it is going to stay that way in the immediate future. George R. Brown's CO2 flood plan, once in operation, is going to add life and profits to the Garza field.

The Postex Plant is a solid operation with a payroll any town would give its eye teeth for.

Cotton came back this year just when the farmers were getting into dire financial straits. The price isn't good but should be a bit better in 1982 if Garza fields get the moisture they will need.

Business at the retail level is good - the city's new sales tax record set this year indicates.

The city is about to obtain a professionally trained city manager and with the size of business our municipality is today, this should be a real asset in city government.

The city-county park will get its playground equipment this coming spring and the kids should love that. Contract letting is coming up soon according to a bid notice in today's Dispatch.

While nothing is assured as yet, school trustees are now looking at an auditorium improvement and expansion program which will be a real benefit to the schools and the community as a whole.

If you haven't looked up and down Post's Main street lately, this is to point out that there are more and more young people operating stores here now than at any time in the past 25 years. This should assure the continuing development of our retail

business facilities.

The Emergency Medical Technicians have done a truly tremendous job of volunteerism for this community. They have become literally part-time professionals in the health care field and merit and are receiving solid support from citizens as well as city and county boards.

Our law enforcement is good. If the perennial car problem can be settled - and that should be a 1982 goal - the joint law enforcement effort will become even stronger. Post and Garza County had-little unsolved crime in 1981 after weathering a bunch of deputy resignations earlier in the year during a dispute over salaries.

Right now the community's No. 1 problem appears to be in getting the city-county airport runways back into shape. The problem was kept on hold for too many years. Now the airport aid funds are rapidly drying up and our chances for major financial help are almost nil. But a great start has been made on the problem with the reorganization of the airport board. Chairman Bob Macy and his cohorts are working hard, so The Dispatch remains optimistic.

Before things get too bad out there, The Dispatch for one would favor taking the financial load on our own shoulders if necessary. A community airport is an essential in this day of private flying and major air travel.

On an individual basis, new housing remains the most perplexing need.

But there can be some optimism here too. A new federally-financed housing project at the western edge of town should be in the construction stage by February after literally "years" of plans and paper

There's also a good chance for another government-financed project for senior citizen housing before the end of 1982 providing the city can obtain an acceptable site option in the immediate future. This must be aggressively pursued.

The Dispatch is optimistic about 1982. The community has a lot going for it, including teamwork and momentum.
