

# Airport aid request made

A new application for state aid for the city-county airport here has been filed with the Texas Aeronautics Commission (TAC), the city council was told Monday night.

Mayor Giles McCrary reported that no TAC funding remains available for 1982, but the application has been made in the hope of receiving 1983 funding.

He said the application was made after a recent

conference at the local airport involving B. E. Wauer, engineer for Parkhill, Smith & Cooper, Post's engineering firm in Lubbock, and a TAC airport inspector.

Mayor McCrary said Wauer was "very optimistic" that the city-county airport request will be given top priority classification for funding consideration.

Airport funding also will be sought at the federal

level if federal funds become available.

McCrary said the local airport funding application has been divided into four phases so the TAC could consider funding one or more of the phases.

The first phase would call for rebuilding the main runway and widening it to 60 feet.

Other phases would include resurfacing the second or shorter runway,

runway lighting, and resurfacing taxi-ways and ramps.

Due to deterioration of the main runway, the airport is in danger of losing the runway in the near future.

McCrary estimated cost of all needed improvements would total around \$400,000.

McCrary pointed out TAC funding would require a 75-25 percent match in financing with the TAC contributing the 75 percent

and the city and county the remaining 25 percent.

Federal funding is a 90-10 percent match.

The mayor said the TAC request will not prevent the city and county from seeking federal funding from the FFA.

The TAC funding request was prepared by the city's engineering firm and forwarded to Bob Macy, airport board chairman, for filing in Austin last week.

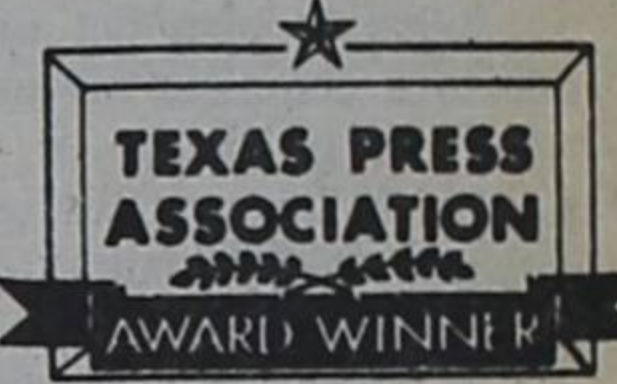

### Cost report due trustees

Post school trustees may make some decisions Thursday night at their February session in the high school library on a proposed auditorium improvement project and other possible upcoming school plant improvements.

The trustees will hear a report on cost estimates to join the primary and elementary buildings from its architectural firm.

Other major items on the agenda include a superintendent's salary survey sought to update Supt. Bill Shiver's salary, and consideration of annual contracts of Post school principals and Athletic Director David Thompson.

Trustees also will be asked to give approval to a 30-day certificate of deposit in the amount of \$1,050,000 in school funds with the local bank at a 13.5 percent interest rate.

## Council okays new sheriff car plan

The city council Monday night approved the recommendations of the joint city-county law enforcement committee which included the city and county jointly

purchasing one new "police special" car every year for the sheriff's department.

Councilman Jack Alexander in reporting on the Jan. 28 law enforcement com-

mittee session, said the committee recommends one new car be made available immediately and a second be purchased Oct. 1 at the start of the next fiscal year.

The county has a new police special available and the committee recommended this be turned over to the sheriff's department or a new car ordered immediately.

Alexander explained that with two police cars with low mileage this would provide the sheriff's department with a fleet of four cars in good operating condition.

In the past, the city and county have been "taking turns" buying police cars.

Other committee recommendations adopted by the council were:

To have the county look into Sheriff Jim Pippin's complaint of poor service provided by a Lubbock firm which contracted to keep the sheriff radio system operating effectively;

Approving Sheriff Pippin's plan to organize a reserve deputy school here to train volunteers for reserve deputy duties;

To have liability insurance coverage checked to see if new deputy Lee Coffman would be covered if he used his own motorcycle for certain duties such as leading funerals, serving papers, etc.

The committee is composed of two city councilmen, two members of the county commissioners court and Sheriff Pippin. Alexander is chairman. Councilman Jim Wells is the other council representative.

The council had a busy agenda for its February session which included moving ahead rapidly with plans to seal coat about 30 blocks of city streets this spring at a cost of \$40,000.

## At savings of \$12,500— City will 'build' new mini-pumper

The Post Volunteer Fire Department has been authorized by the city council to "build" its new mini-pumper which will carry the

"jaws of life."

Fire Chief Bobby Terry told the council Monday night that the city could save almost half the cost for the needed "mini-pumper" by buying its truck, body, and equipment and authorizing the work to have it all put together.

He estimated it would cost about \$16,500 to "build" exactly what was wanted whereas a new mini-pumper had been priced to the city a month ago for about \$29,000.

Chief Terry who had priced both a new truck and a truck body was authorized by the council to prepare specifications for bidding on these two items.

"We can probably save a little more by putting these up for bids," Terry told the council.

The bids will be opened at the council's March meeting

Donald Windham, a member of the Post board, will represent Post at the session.

Windham told The Dispatch HUD should call a meeting to finalize approval of the construction contract and releasing federal funds for it within three or four weeks after the Feb. 17 meeting.

## Hardin will head jubilee

Charles Hardin, Post Chamber of Commerce president who will end that term of office with the annual Chamber banquet March 2, has been named general chairman of the Post Diamond Jubilee.

The appointment came Monday night at the February session of the chamber board of directors.

Hardin told The Dispatch Wednesday he hopes to complete naming an overall jubilee board in the very near future.

The board will consist of chairman of committees for

the jubilee dance, the pageant, the parade, barbecue, watermelon feed, concession stand, promotion and advertising, security, entertainment, and financial underwriting.

The jubilee is scheduled for July 24 to commemorate Post's 75th birthday.

The full jubilee program is yet to be formalized.

Hardin said within two weeks he hopes to have an agreement for the writing of the pageant.

Once all committees are organized, a budget will be worked out and then a financial underwriting campaign will be launched to pay any expenses over and (See Jubilee head, Page 16)

### Loader bought for \$52,824

The court also approved Monday the following bonds: Kenneth W. Cook, reserve deputy sheriff for \$5,000, Deputy Sheriff Leland Coffman for \$5,000, and Deputy Treasurer Charla Tatum for \$15,000.

In other actions, the court tabled the request of Justice of the Peace Zora Robinson to increase inquest fees to \$15 and accepted the revenue sharing budget for the next quarter.

## Gas pressure fell Friday— Some in Post got 'chilly'

For the first time in at least the last 25 years, falling gas pressure Friday left dozens of Post homes cold, especially in the southwest part of town.

But no real problems developed.

Energas Manager Rick Maestas attributed the problem to falling pressure due to the intense cold weather over the entire area and a

possible dispatcher error in thinking Post was on another line.

He said the trouble developed between 8:30 and 9 a.m. when the thermometer was below 10 degrees. Pressure was not fully restored until about 2 p.m.

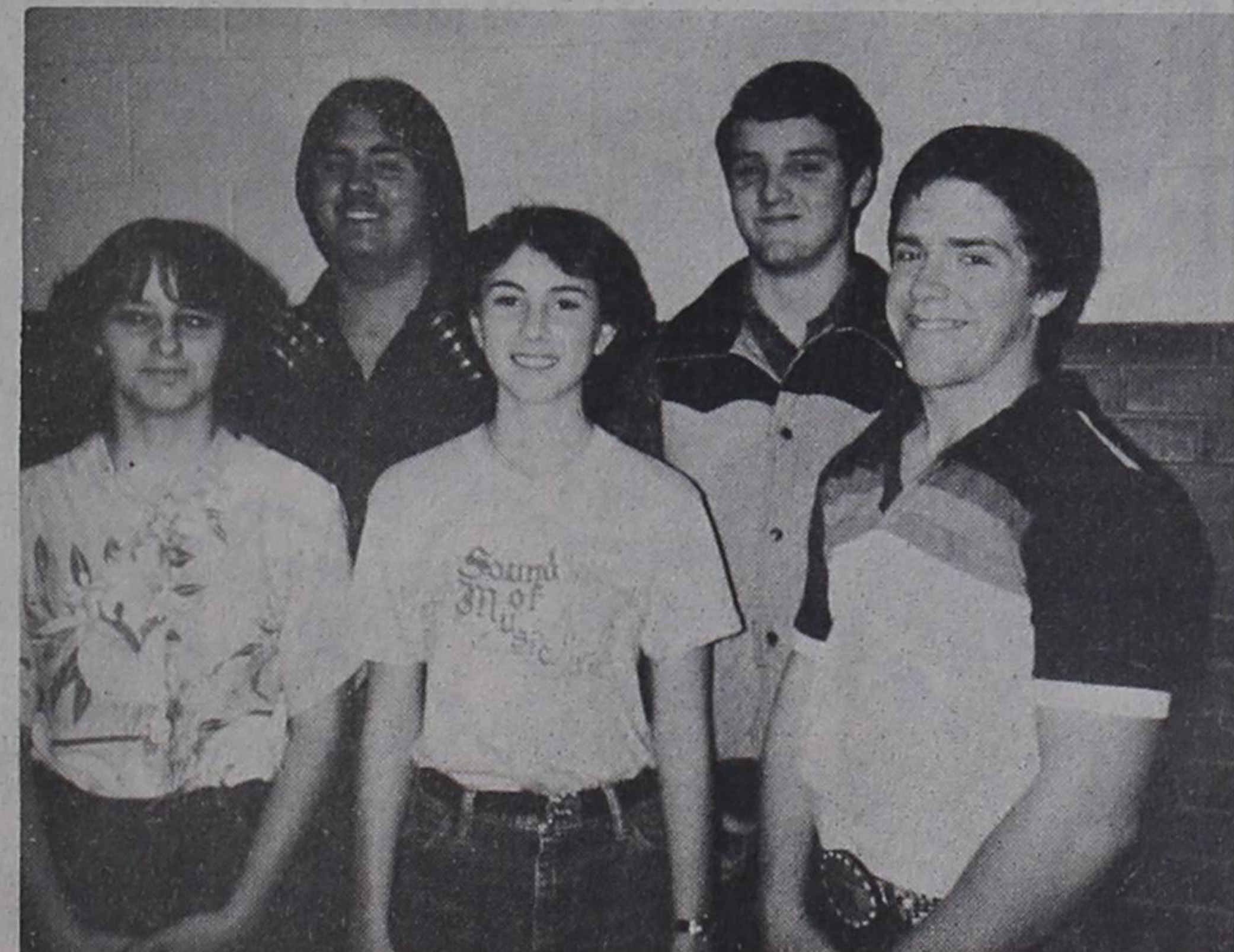

## Let's do our part

Now that an organization to plan and execute Post's 75th birthday celebration is beginning to take shape, it's time to take a good look at what's needed ahead to make the party a real success.

Valuable planning time has been lost due to a complete misunderstanding as to who was in charge of what. Just about everybody became confused last year into thinking a city committee named to look into this community's participation in Texas' 200th birthday celebration in 1986 was the committee which would take charge of Post's Diamond Jubilee.

It wasn't, but many months were thereby lost in the planning process and but five remain in which to get everything accomplished.

Two basic decisions came last week. The Post Chamber of Commerce agreed to accept the responsibility for the overall promotion of the Diamond Jubilee, and the Fourth of July weekend was selected as the best time for the big birthday party.

Three more essential steps must be faced next. They include (1) forming a Diamond Jubilee organization, (2) agreeing upon a jubilee program, and (3) obtaining necessary financing and underwriting.

In 1957 when the Golden Jubilee was held, a production company was contracted to oversee the entire jubilee project. That company sent in a coordinator months ahead to guide the project, used their own proven celebration ideas, and even wrote the script for the pageant. That cost a bunch

of money. Post won't take that route this time. The planning, execution, and enthusiasm will all be home-grown. That decision has been made too and is now behind us.

What the Post Chamber of Commerce needs as it enters into jubilee planning is the cooperation, enthusiasm, and the creativeness of the entire community.

Volunteerism is vitally important in every community. Post has shown through the years it has volunteers who can handle just about everything needed to make our community a great place in which to live and raise a family.

Two of the most recent examples are the development of the "OS weekend" into the biggest and most exciting fund-raiser in West Texas, and the creation of the highly successful city-county ambulance service through the Emergency Medical Technician program. Our fire department through the years stands out for its long-term excellence as a volunteer organization filling a community need. The Post Public Library was created and first operated entirely by volunteers.

The Diamond Jubilee now offers us the chance to put Post volunteerism to work on a new project. There are jobs needing doing for everyone who will step forward. Ideas as well as minds and bodies are needed too.

Let's make Post's Diamond Jubilee a fun party we can all enjoy by individually contributing everything we can to its success.

## 3 new Garza producers

Three new well completions and one new wildcat location were announced for Garza County last weekend.

The completions are: Starkey Oilfield Service Inc. No. 1-A Bird in the Post field, 11 miles east of Post, producing eight barrels of oil and one of water from an interval of 2,619 to 2,643 feet.

Three Oaks Corp.'s No. 1 Beulah K. Bird, 15 miles east of Post, producing 70 barrels of oil and 65 of water from an interval of 2,566 to 2,628 feet.

Kerr-McGee Corp.'s No. 10-B Swenson in the Swenson-Barron field, 25 miles northeast of Post, which produced 179 barrels of oil daily from an interval of 7,805 to 7,825 feet.

The new location: A wildcat, John H. Hendrix Corp.'s No. 1-A J. H. Herd, eight miles southeast of Post which will be drilled to 8,500 feet.

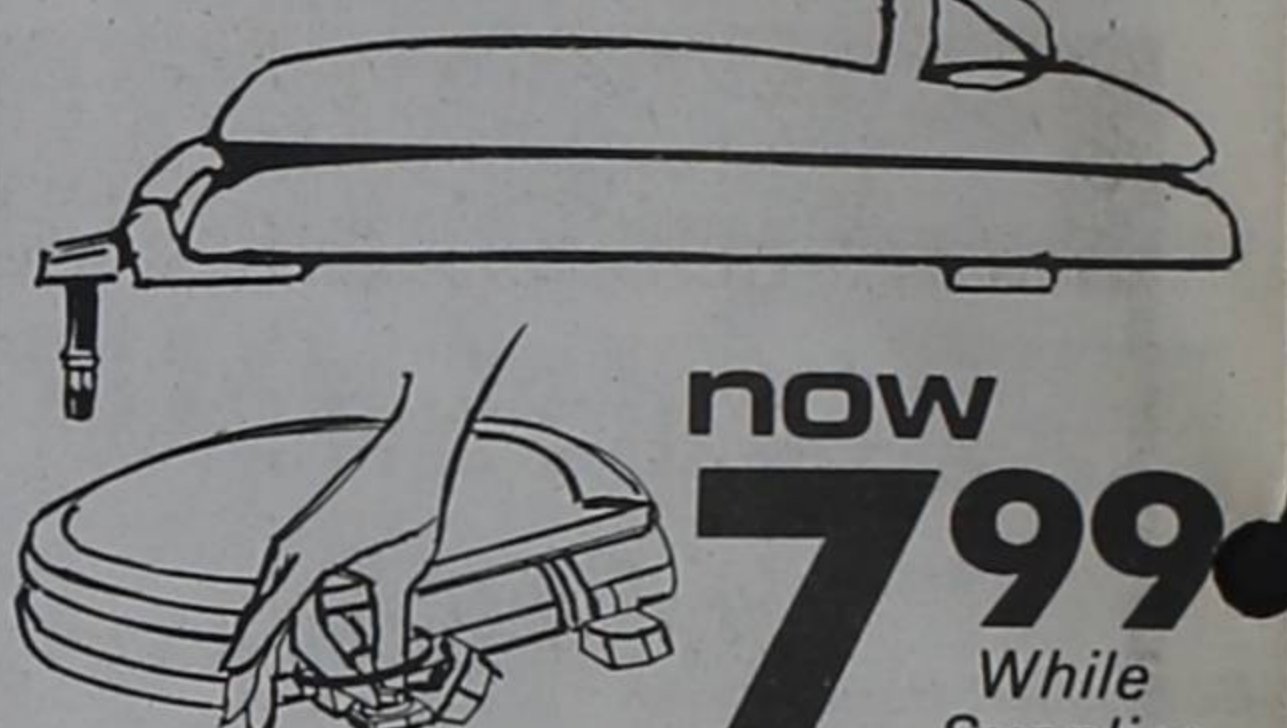
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## New producer in Post field

Garza County has another new oil well completion this week, but had another drilling test plugged and abandoned.

The new oiler is Texaco Inc.'s No. 2-NCT 1 I.N. McCrary, in the Post field, 14 miles east of Post, which produced 77 barrels of oil and 52 barrels of water on test from an interval of 2,662 to 2,850 feet.

Abandoned as a "duster" was Tulhill and Barbee's No. 1 Bird, 17 miles northeast of Post in the Jaybird field. It had been drilled to a total depth of 7,120 feet.

One new drilling location also has been recorded. It's Exxon Corp.'s No. 24 Birdie R. Alexander, seven miles southeast of Justiceburg which will be drilled to 7,600 feet.

# SCS releases three new plants for pasture use

Three new plant selections have been released by the USDA Soil Conservation Service and cooperating agencies.

Dwaine Binford, district conservationist for SCS at Post said the new releases are 'T-587' old world bluestem, 'Rainbow' wild plum, and 'Yellow Puff' littleleaf leadtree.

"The old world bluestem release is actually a mixture of 80 similar grasses collected several years ago in the Near East," Binford said. "After 140 field evaluations in more than 100 counties, the mixture has been released to seed growers by SCS in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station."

Binford said the old world bluestem release appears to

be adapted south of a line from Cochran County to Bowie County where rainfall averages 14 inches to 40 inches annually.

Old world bluestem is palatable, a high forage producer, and very persistent under heavy grazing pressure.

'Rainbow' wild plum is a composite of four collections that were selected and composited at the SCS plant materials center at Knox City.

"The Rainbow release is a perennial fruit-bearing shrub, or small tree, selected for use in wildlife or ornamental plantings," Binford said. "The composite of four collections was made because each produces excellent fruit crops at different months — from June through October."

Binford said the long maturing dates allow fruit to be available for wildlife for about five months. Propagation is attained by seed or root sprouts. In addition to its value in wildlife and beautification plantings, the selection appears to be useful in erosion control work on mine spoil on reclaimed areas. It is adapted throughout Texas and southern Oklahoma on well-drained clayey to sandy loam soils.

Rainbow was released by SCS in cooperation with TAES and the Texas Forest Service. TFS will provide a limited number of seedlings to interested persons. Nurserymen interested in establishing seed production blocks should request seed from the SCS plant materials center at Knox City after 1983.

'Yellow Puff' littleleaf leadtree was selected and released for use in range, wildlife, and ornamental plantings. It is a composite of five native collections from Junction, Sonora, and Leakey. The leguminous shrub, or small tree, has beautiful golden flowers and

is readily browsed by wildlife and livestock.

Binford said Yellow Puff is adapted to well-drained soils in the Trans-Pecos and Edwards Plateau Major Land Resource Areas. It was released by SCS in cooperation with TAES and the Abilene State School of the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation.

"Students at the Abilene State School have helped SCS grow, evaluate, and collect seed from littleleaf leadtree and several other hard-to-harvest plants for several years," Binford said. "Seed from littleleaf leadtree are usually hand-harvested. Officials of the state school let students grow and harvest the seed as a worthwhile project."

A limited amount of seed will be distributed by the Abilene State School as well as the SCS plant materials center at Knox City to commercial nurserymen and to other federal agencies for seed production purposes.

#### Quick Breads

Try quick breads for an easy, delicious winter warmup. There's no kneading, no waiting and very little clean-up and preparation time involved. In addition, the variety of refrigerated, frozen and packaged quick breads on the market makes serving quick breads even quicker. For busy households, these convenience products may prove very economical. Compare the cost of ingredients for a favorite recipe with the price of equal amounts of similar convenience bakery products. If time is more important than money, the added cost of convenience products may not amount to much. Generally, products to which the consumer adds milk or eggs are less expensive than heat-and-serve or frozen products. Prices and quality do vary, so check prices of various brands and select ones the family enjoys. Once you've served a product don't let leftover quick breads go to waste. They reheat well in the conventional or microwave oven. Reheat in foil in the conventional oven or taster oven at about 350

degrees F. until hot, about 10-15 minutes. For best results, sprinkle lightly with water before wrapping in foil. Check oven instructions when reheating in the microwave and follow exactly. In addition, I have a free extension publication on Quick Breads in my office. Call or come by for a

## 1981 was disastrous —

# Cattle industry future uncertain

COLLEGE STATION — Most cattlemen agree that 1981 was disastrous for the cattle industry, but many disagree about what lies ahead in 1982.

"The outlook for the cattle business in 1982 is probably the most diverse it has ever been," says Dr. Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A & M University System.

Some economists project continued poor profitability and an aborted cattle cycle while other suggest a reduction in the total cattle inventory has already occurred. On the other hand, some livestock analysts expect some improvement in cattle prices and a continued herd buildup until around 1984-85.

"Most estimates for the next two years still point toward continued expansion of the beef herd although profits may be scarce," Uvacek says.

He adds that some aspects of the business serve as underlying incentives to a further herd buildup. These include such things as the difficulty ranchers have in altering plans after they decide to expand their herds, the sometimes substantial additional income sources coming from oil and mineral leasing of some ranchland, and the historic bullishness of cattlemen.

"The overall balance sheet for the cattle industry in 1982 is somewhat encouraging," believes Uvacek. Fewer fed cattle will be available in the first six

months of 1982 along with reduced pork and veal production. Only a small increase in broiler and turkey numbers is expected, so total red meat and poultry supplies during the first half of 1982 may be below the first six months of last year.

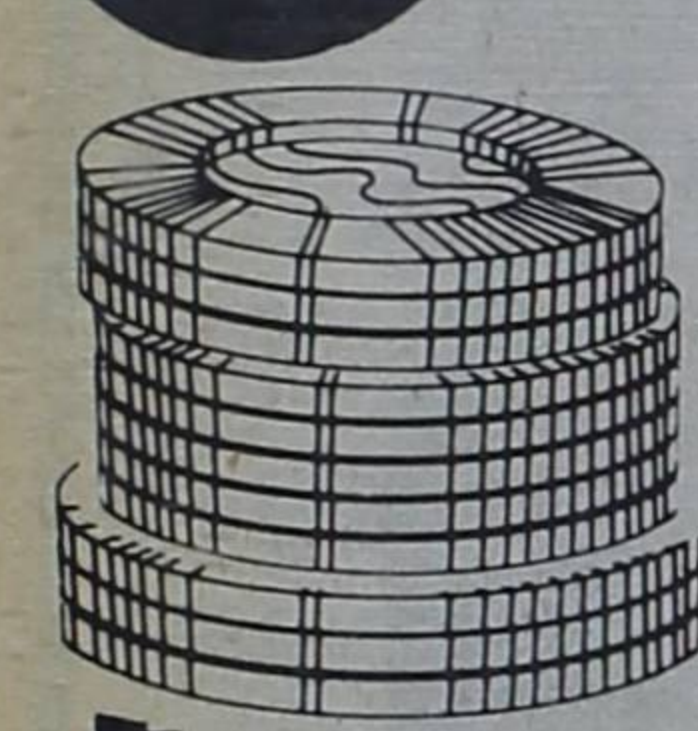

## Heatly confirms he'll run again

State Representative William S. (Bill) Heatly pointed out this week that the boundaries of his House district might well be changed again by the Dallas federal court after the Department of Justice had disapproved the Legislative Redistricting Board's plan.

"We are back to Square One," Heatly said.

The veteran Democrat legislator from Paducah has represented District 101 which consists of Cottle, Hardeman, Foard, Wilbarger, Crosby, Dickens, King, Knox, Baylor, Garza, Kent, Stonewall, Haskell, Throckmorton, and Shackelford counties.

But the Redistricting Board last fall changed him to a new District 78 consisting of Cottle, Knox, King, Kent, Stonewall, Garza, Jones, Fisher, Scurry and all of Taylor County except the city limits of Abilene.

Heatly noted that in throwing out the Board's

plan, the three-judge federal court specifically said there were problems with districts as drawn by the Board in the Lubbock area and the Del Rio area.

"Whatever they do to solve the problems in the Lubbock area and the Del Rio area will probably have a domino effect on our area," Heatly said.

In throwing out the Board's plan, the federal

court reset the filing deadline for the primary elections to March 19 and said it hopes to announce the new district boundaries by March 1.

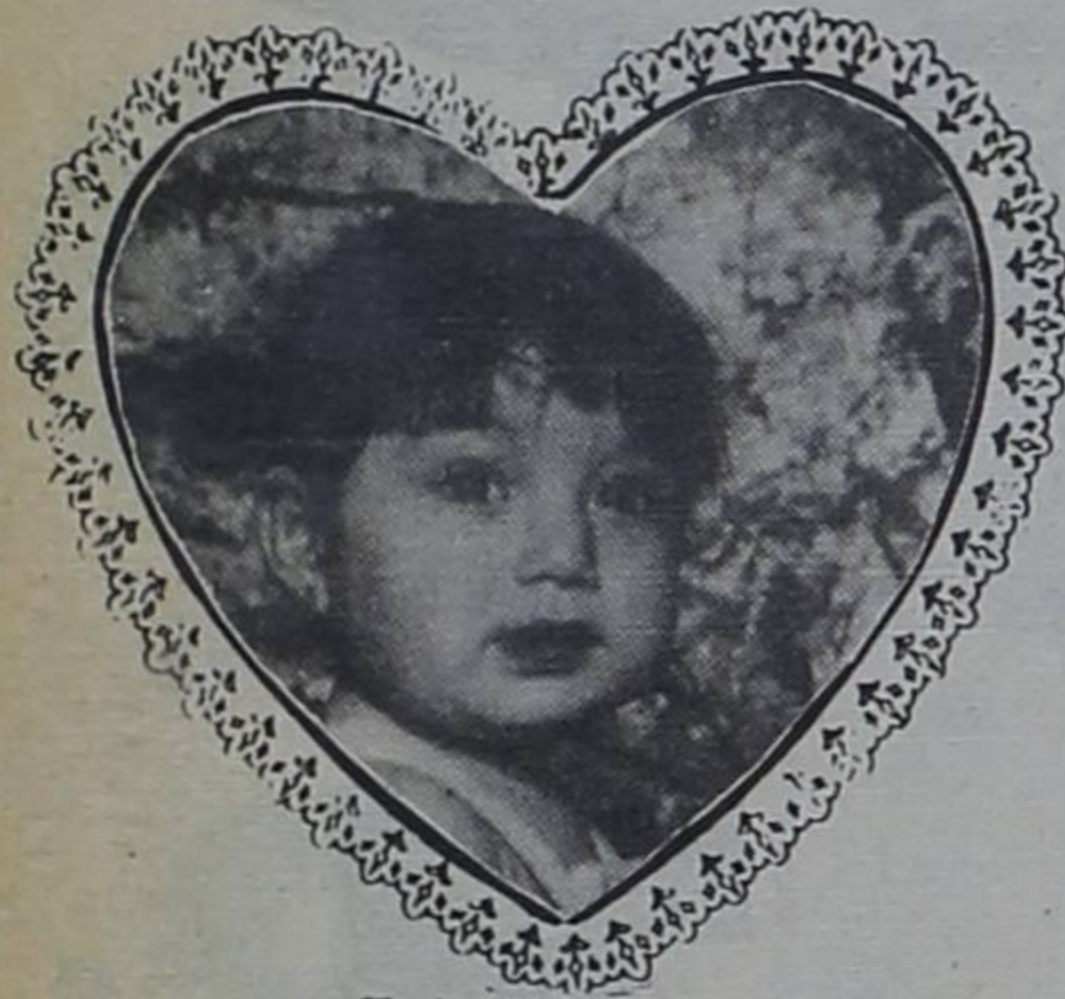
Heatly has indicated that he will run for reelection in whatever district is finally adopted.

# Proposed bill to expand market of Jackson Bros.

Jim and Bo Jackson's meat products are "equal to" those produced anywhere in the United States in terms of wholesomeness and sanitation, but it is illegal for their Post firm to sell them across the state line. This is particularly grating to the operators of Jackson Bros. Food Locker because products from meat plants outside the United States can be sold and marketed anywhere.

Jackson's company is one of 5,000 meat businesses, primarily small, family operated firms, throughout the country that fall victim to a quirk in the 15-year-old Federal Meat Inspection Act. The firms, which comprise 42 percent of the country's meat plants, operate under state meat inspection programs. They are subject to an inspection surveillance that the U. S. Department of Agriculture verifies is "equal to" the

degree and quality of inspection offered under the federal meat inspection program.

But corrective help may soon be on the way, thanks to legislation introduced by Congressman William Wampler of Virginia that would amend the Federal Meat Inspection Act to allow interstate marketing, sales and shipment for these state-inspected products. The bill has the full support of USDA, the National Association of State Departments of Agriculture and the American Association of Meat Processors.

The Jacksons have already contacted Senator Lloyd Bentsen and Charles Stenholm urging support for this bill, noting that without its passage, small meat plants like theirs will be required to continue to ignore the demand for their products in other areas and the local

economy will suffer the consequences.

"Foreign meat products come into this country and sail through interstate commerce as though they were USDA inspected," the plant operators said. "But many of those foreign source plants have never seen a USDA inspector and get a visit from their own government's inspector once or twice a year. Yet they have

unrestricted shipping rights in this country while 5,000 of our own U.S. plants work under this marketing handicap."

"You could produce an award-winning national championship bacon, ham or sausage in many states and couldn't sell it to consumers in a bordering state or even ship it through the mails because of the present law. Keeping meat and poultry items from

consumers who want them is the kind of thing that we discourage in other countries and we certainly should do what we can to stop that practice here."

The plant operators called the present marketing restrictions against state-inspected plants "artificial" and "a gross injustice." "Many American plants can't even sell products 10 miles away because of the present discrimination," they said. They pointed out that by allowing state-inspected plants to serve their natural marketing areas, competition would be en-

hanced, helping producers of livestock by offering greater local demand for their animals and lower transportation costs.

The Federal Meat Inspection Act prohibited state-inspected plants from moving products into interstate commerce because in 1967 there was no uniformity in state programs, Jackson said. "Now they are not only uniform but also 'equal to' federal inspection as verified by USDA and that eliminated the reason for the marketing restriction more than a decade ago," he added.

Requested a letter be written to Teresa Williams, 610 West 10th, who has requested a beauty shop business permit on her residential property. The letter will point out that by ordinance a public hearing will have to be held on the

request with all property owners within 300 feet notified of the permit hearing.

Received a petition from 20 residents of a three-block area on Pine Street requesting the city to assist them in securing cable TV service. The petition said service to them had been denied by High Plains Cablevision. The council turned the letter over to its attorney, Harvey Morton, to contact the cable firm concerning the petition.

Adopted a change in the city's personnel policy which will provide for 30 days termination pay when a city employe becomes permanently disabled and no longer able to work.

Approved reappointment to the city-county park board of Jack Alexander, Sue Shytle, Zoe Kirkpatrick, Lonnie Peel, Julian Smith, Danny Shaw and Ted Aten, and appointed David Newby to the one vacancy.

Sanchez reported the 1969 GMC dump truck purchased 18 months ago to haul the city's bulldozer was to be replaced. He was asked to check on a lease or lease-purchase agreement for a replacement.

**Law stricter on SS cheaters**

Stricter laws regarding the misuse of Social Security numbers and cards are now in effect, according to Laura Peacock, manager of the Lubbock social security district office.

A law signed by President Reagan in late December, 1981, provides criminal penalties for: 1. using a Social Security Card obtained with false information, 2. using someone else's Social Security number, 3. buying, selling, or counterfeiting Social Security Cards, or, 4. possessing a regular or counterfeit card with intent to sell or alter it. "An unlawful act affecting the Social Security Card or number is now considered a felony, rather than a misdemeanor," Peacock added.

Penalties for conviction can be a fine of up to \$5,000 or a prison term of up to 5 years - or both. According to Peacock, individuals wishing to report misuse of Social Security cards or numbers should call the Social Security office listed in the directory or the HHS hot line in Washington, D.C. at 202-472-4222.
