## Jury awards \$492,243 tavern shooting victim

Roy Don Hodges and wife, Ann, plaintiffs in the William M. McLaury III received a jury award of \$492,243.20 in the court proceedings which began Monday, March 1 and Wednesday, concluded March 3.

The suit stemmed from a shooting in the Long Branch Tavern parking lot here on the night of Nov. 19, 1980 in which Hodges lost his sight as a result of the shooting. This was the largest damage suit ever filed in Garza County.

filed Feb. 3 in City Judge Louise Greens court which involved a juvenile.


