Jury awards \$492,243 tavern shooting victim

Roy Don Hodges and wife, Ann, plaintiffs in the 3,535,000 law suit against William M. McLaury III received a jury award of \$492,243.20 in the court proceedings which began Monday, March 1 and concluded Wednesday, March 3.

The suit stemmed from a shooting in the Long Branch Tavern parking lot here on the night of Nov. 19, 1980 in which Hodges lost his sight as a result of the shooting. This was the largest damage suit ever filed in Garza County.

The jury deliberated approximately 8 hours in reaching its decision and

reached its decision in this manner: \$100,000.00 for physical pain and mental anguish suffered in the past; \$100,000.00 for physical pain and mental anguish

which he will suffer in the future; loss of earnings in the past \$13,000; loss of earnings in the future, \$260,000.00; medical care in the past, \$14,243.20 and

medical expenses in the future \$5,000.00 bringing the total to \$492,243.20.

The Kent County rancher was found guilty of aggravated assault here in a

Garza County district court trial for attempted murder in October. McLaury received a sentence of a 10-year probation of a two-year prison term.

Aspermont firm low bidder on city seal coating project

Lipham Construction Co., of Aspermont submitted the low bid for the seal coating project scheduled by the city council with a bid of \$30,740 on the approximately 58,000 square yard project. Five bids were received on the project and were opened during the regular session of the city

council Monday night. Sheriff Jim Pippin also met with the council to discuss hiring a deputy or maybe a reserve deputy to live in the Southland area to help cut down on the recent burglaries and vandalisms. The matter was discussed with no finalization and will also be discussed with the

law enforcement committee. City Attorney, Harvey Morton told the council of his recent trip to Irving to participate in the rate increase battle with General Telephone and told the council that the issue of penalizing the company for its service was 'dead'.

However, the attorney told the council that he recommended that the city continue to join with the Texas Municipal League to fight the rate increase and it would cost the city \$550 or 15 cents per capita. Motion was made and carried to join the league in its fight.

On Justiceburg lake— Reservoir ruling expected

Larry Persky, Texas Department of Water Resources hearing examiner, is expected to make a ruling within a week, whether to grant a continuance in the hearing on Lubbock's application for its Justiceburg reservoir project.

Briefs in the case were due Tuesday, and the ruling on the matter was to be made following the reading of the briefs and the transcript of a hearing conducted on the continuance in February.

Landowners in the Justiceburg area announced some time back that they will fight to keep their land, which involves 3,000 acres of land in the proposed lake site.

The city of Lubbock is seeking a permit to build and maintain the Justiceburg Dam creating a 115,937 acre-foot capacity reservoir on the South Fork, Double Mountain Fork Brazos River, tributary of Brazos River, about eight miles east of Justiceburg and 21 miles southeast of Post in Garza and Kent Counties.

Post suffers power outage

Post suffered along with most of the South Plains Monday morning, when a Southwestern Public Service power outage left the city without electricity for almost 45 minutes.

Post along with Tahoka, Seagraves, Carlsbad and part of Denver City, lost power beginning about 9:30 a.m. Some cities received only short outages. The problem was traced to a transmission line overloading near Abernathy. SPS District Manager Jake Webb said company crews were working on a 230,000-volt line running from Tuco Station north of Abernathy to Jones Station near Lubbock, when an alternate line being used failed to carry the expected load. Restoring electrical service was delayed because company workers had to manually reset some relays tripped during the outage.

Taba'na Yuan'e ceremony set

The annual Taba'na Yuan'e ceremony, which has been sponsored by the Post Chamber of Commerce for the last 10 years, has been set for Monday Morning March 22, in the City-County Park. The location of the ceremony was moved back this year to its beginning site, which proved to be the most convenient place for the setting of the ceremon-

ial fire. Chief Frank Runkles will again be in charge of the program, which is based on Indian tradition of determining crop prospects by wind direction at sunrise on March 22. The wind must be from the east or northeast for very good (bumper) crops.

A breakfast will be held following the ceremony with the public invited. A charge of \$1 will allow you to enjoy a good breakfast, catered by Jackson's Cafeteria.

March 22, 1981, the wind direction predicted a Fair crop with the 30 mile-an-hour wind sweeping in from the north-northwest. Only in the first year of the hamber of Commerce-sponsored ceremony, 1972, has the old Indian legend produced as good a crop forecast.

Welding class scheduled

Library Corner

You loved that new car the day you drove it off the lot. Now, looking back, you appreciate the lower interest rates you paid then, though you thought they were high at the time. Several years have pass-

ed now. And many thousand miles farther down the road, your car has lost some of its shine, and every time you pay a repair bill, you wonder, "Maybe it's time to trade." But who can say?

Solution: Spend ten minutes sitting at the computer in the Post Public Library. If you can take with you just a few items of basic information, the computer will tell you, fast enough to surprise you, whether trading now makes dollar sense. (You'll have to deal with "new car fever" on your own).

What information do you need? How much money do you still owe on the car you have? What is the interest rate you are paying on your current loan? How much is that car worth — in dollars — as a trade-in: How much does that new car cost, the one you imagine in your driveway? What interest rate would you pay on a new car loan? How many months would you take to repay that loan? How about insurance costs? How much are you spending for repairs?

Even if you had to make guess-timates of the dollar amounts to fill in those blanks, the program entitled "Home Financial Decisions", would step-by-step give you a down-to-the-dollar suggestion about trading the clunker in, or holding on to it as an old, money-saving friend.

Wouldn't it be nice to know? Then, at least, you would know that the new car you want makes no economic sense, but when "new car fever" catches you, who cares about mere dollars anyway?

Go by the Post Public Library. Ask for the program called "Home Financial Decisions," sit down at the new Texas Instruments computer, and simply follow the directions on the screen.

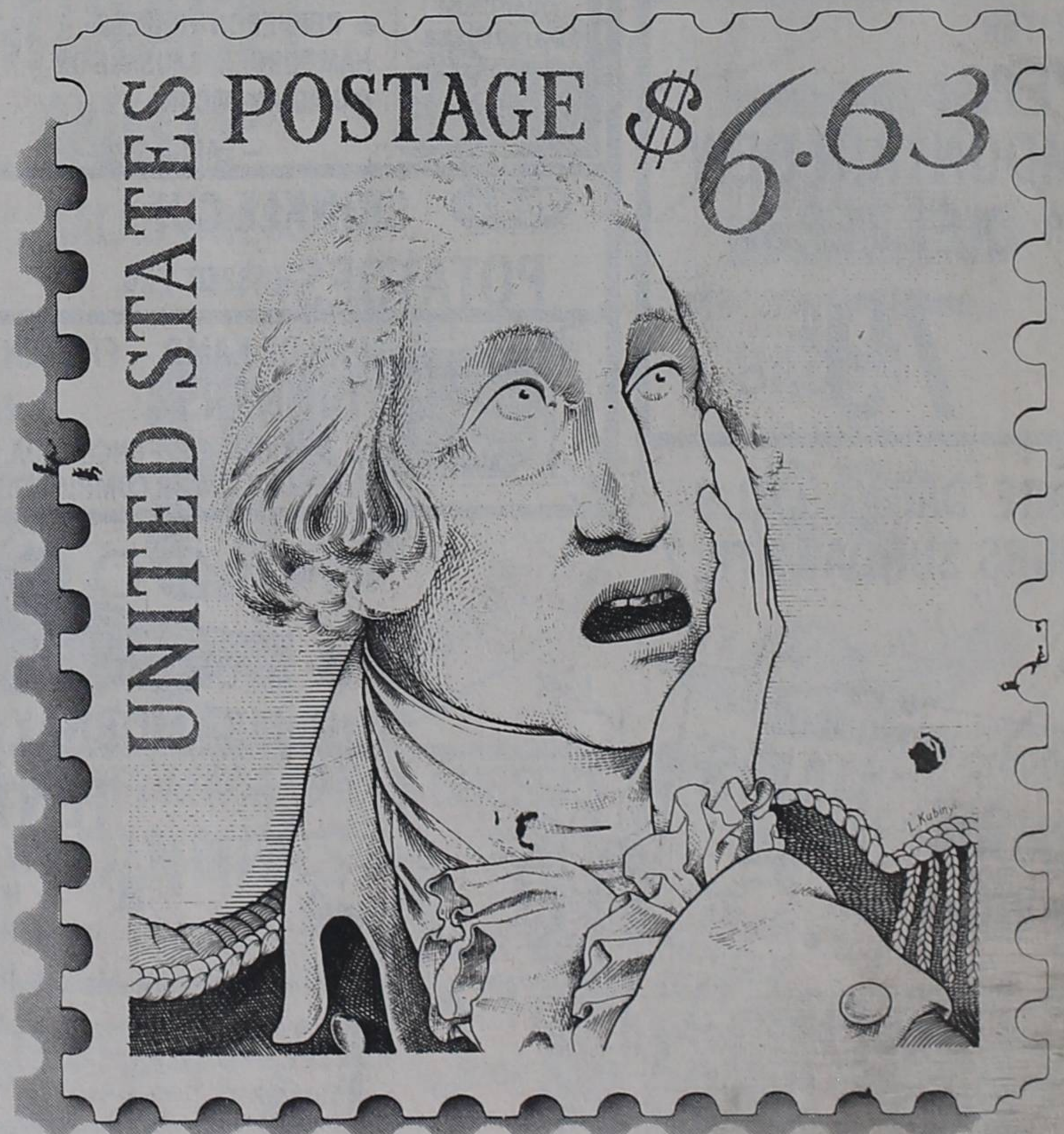

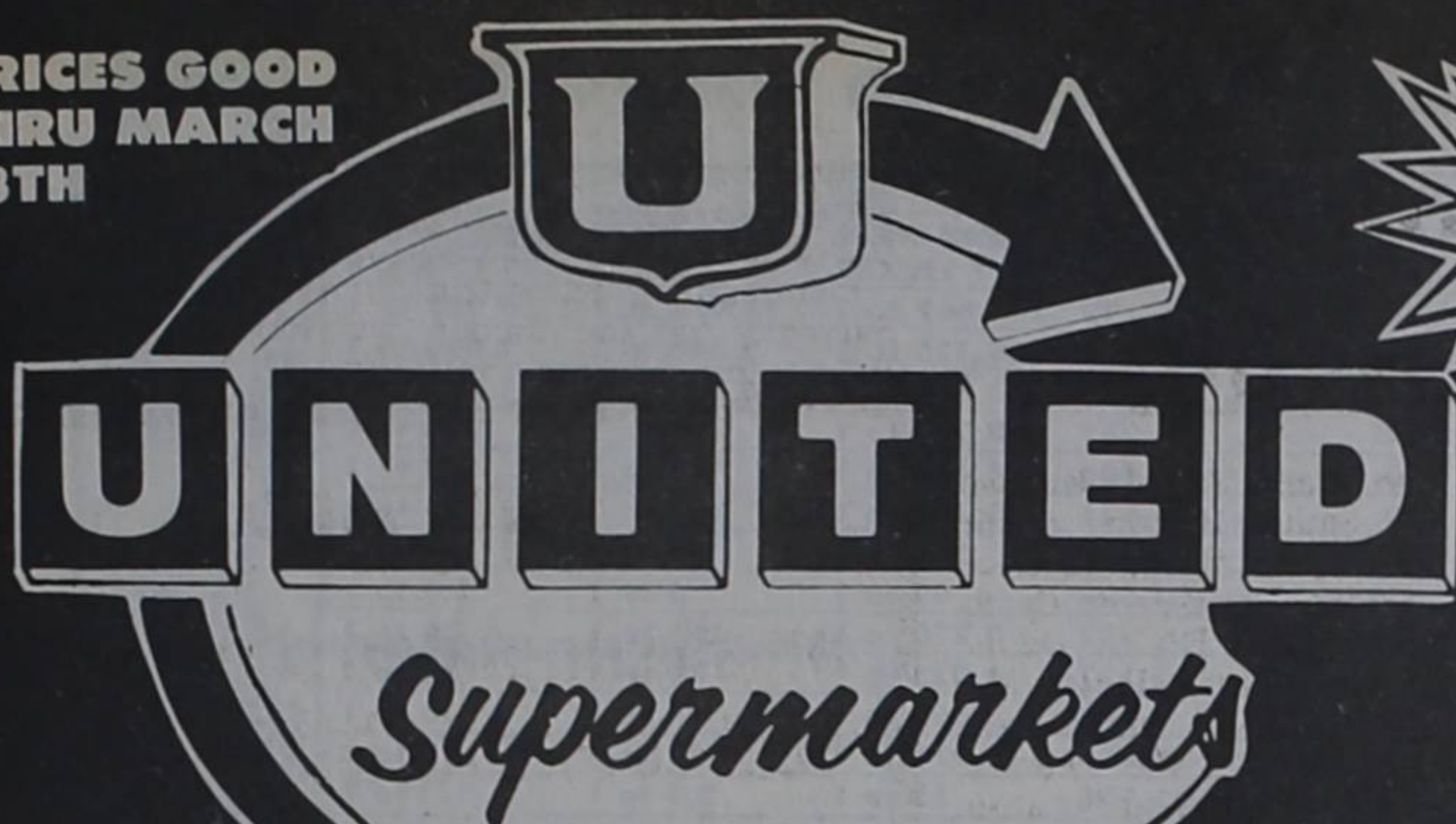

FARM TOPICS

Proposed changes in the official U.S. standards for grades of carcass beef and for slaughter cattle are getting a lot of attention from both consumers and cattlemen.

Changes are proposed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture are as follows:

That minimum marbling requirements for Prime, Choice and Good grades in A maturity (cattle up to about 30 months of age) would be reduced to "minimum moderate," "typical slight" and "minimum traces", respectively.

That all young beef not meeting minimum marbling requirements for the Good grade would be graded Utility.

That the Standard grade would be eliminated.

That the rate of increase in marbling requirements in B maturity (cattle from about 30 to 42 months of age) would be doubled and that the marbling to maturity relationship be increased from 1:1 to 2:1.

That quality grade requirements for bullock beef also would be changed so they would still be the same as those for steer, heifer and cow beef in A maturity; bullock beef would still be identified for class.

That related standards for grades of slaughter cattle would be changed to reflect changes made for grades of carcass beef.

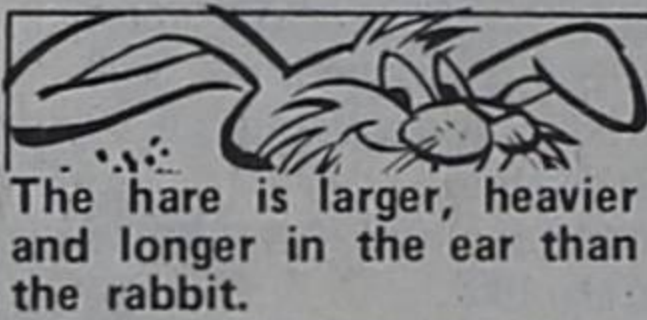

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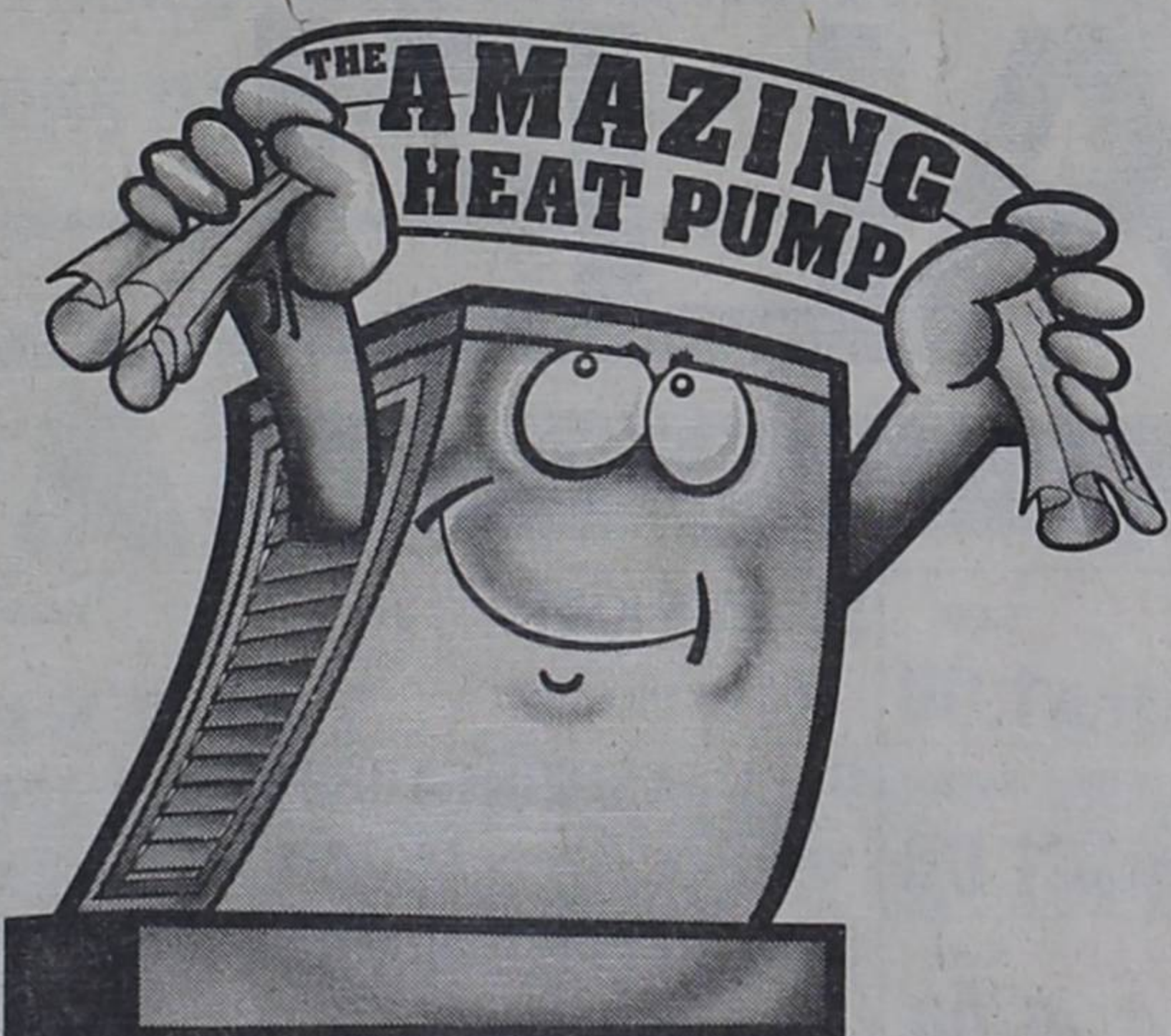
