Plans for the development of classrooms and learning center for the Primary and Elementary buildings include relocating the principal and his secretary to a central location to serve both buildings. It will also provide a nurses station with restroom and shower, sound proof testing booth and cots for four to six childrn. The multi-media learning center will combine both existing libraries and audio-visuals into one space that will allow a variety of activities. The center is proposed to have 5,108 square feet that will provide an environment that will allow an increase in the expectation level of teachers and pupils and challenge them to be creative in developing their highest potential as individuals, and will combine an opportunity for indoor and outdoor learning.

The existing libraries will be converted to classrooms with the existing principals office in Primary building to be converted to reading rooms for small class instruction. The now nurses station will be used for supply and records storage.

The administration, classrooms and multi-media learning center, all new construction, will include 9,814 square feet and remodeling of existing space of 5,520 square feet will cost an estimated \$461,810.

The existing aditorium located in the Primary school does not meet University Interscholastic League requirements and in order to meet these requirements, an estimated cost of \$320,204 would be needed to bring it up to standards including dual dressing rooms on both sides of the stage, mirror and make up lighting with bathroom and lavatory. The stage area would have foot lights with a five foot apron in front of curtain and a new sound system. Present capacity of the auditorium is 538 with new plans to bring it to 546, which is only eight more additional seats. Other proposals include wings prior to dressing rooms, stepped choir risers, piano in front of stage, light control, new chairs, loading door and dock, sound system - Balco sound coordinate, rework wiring to separate lighting (See Renovation, Page 10)


Masonic graveside services and burial were held in Terrace Cemetery under the direction of Hudman Funeral Home.
