Town meeting planned for citizen input —

## \$1,033,078 estimated cost of school development

\$1,033,078.00 is the estimated cost put on the program for development of administration classrooms and multi-media learning center and for development of the existing auditorium to meet University Interscholastic League requirements for the Post Independent School District.

A town meeting is planned for next Thursday night, March 25, at 7:30 in the school auditorium to receive input into the

proposed additions to the existing auditorium and planned renovation of the Primary and Elementary schools which will be joined together by a multi-media learning center.

Dwayne McQueen, architect, presented the proposed drawing to the school board members during its regular session held last Thursday night in the high school library. The drawing will appear in next week's Dispatch.

Plans for the development of classrooms and learning center for the Primary and Elementary buildings include relocating the principal and his secretary to a central location to serve both buildings. It will also provide a nurses station with restroom and shower, sound proof testing booth and cots for four to six children. The multi-media learning center will combine both existing libraries and audio-visuals into one space that will allow a variety of activities. The center is proposed to have 5,108 square feet that will provide an environment that will allow an increase in the expectation level of teachers and pupils and challenge them to be creative in developing their highest potential as individuals, and will combine an opportunity for indoor and outdoor learning.

The existing libraries will be converted to classrooms with the existing principals office in Primary building to be converted to reading rooms for small class instruction. The new nurses station will be used for supply and records storage.

The administration, classrooms and multi-media learning center, all new construction, will include 9,814 square feet and remodeling of existing space of 5,520 square feet will cost an estimated \$461,810.

The existing auditorium located in the Primary school does not meet University Interscholastic League requirements and in order to meet these requirements, an estimated cost of \$320,204 would be needed to bring it up to standards including dual dressing rooms on both sides of the stage, mirror and make up lighting with bathroom and lavatory. The stage area would have foot lights with a five foot apron in front of curtain and a new sound system. Present capacity of the auditorium is 538 with new plans to bring it to 546, which is only eight more additional seats. Other proposals include wings prior to dressing rooms, stepped choir risers, piano in front of stage, light control, new chairs, loading door and dock, sound system - Balco sound coordinate, rewiring to separate lighting (See Renovation, Page 10)

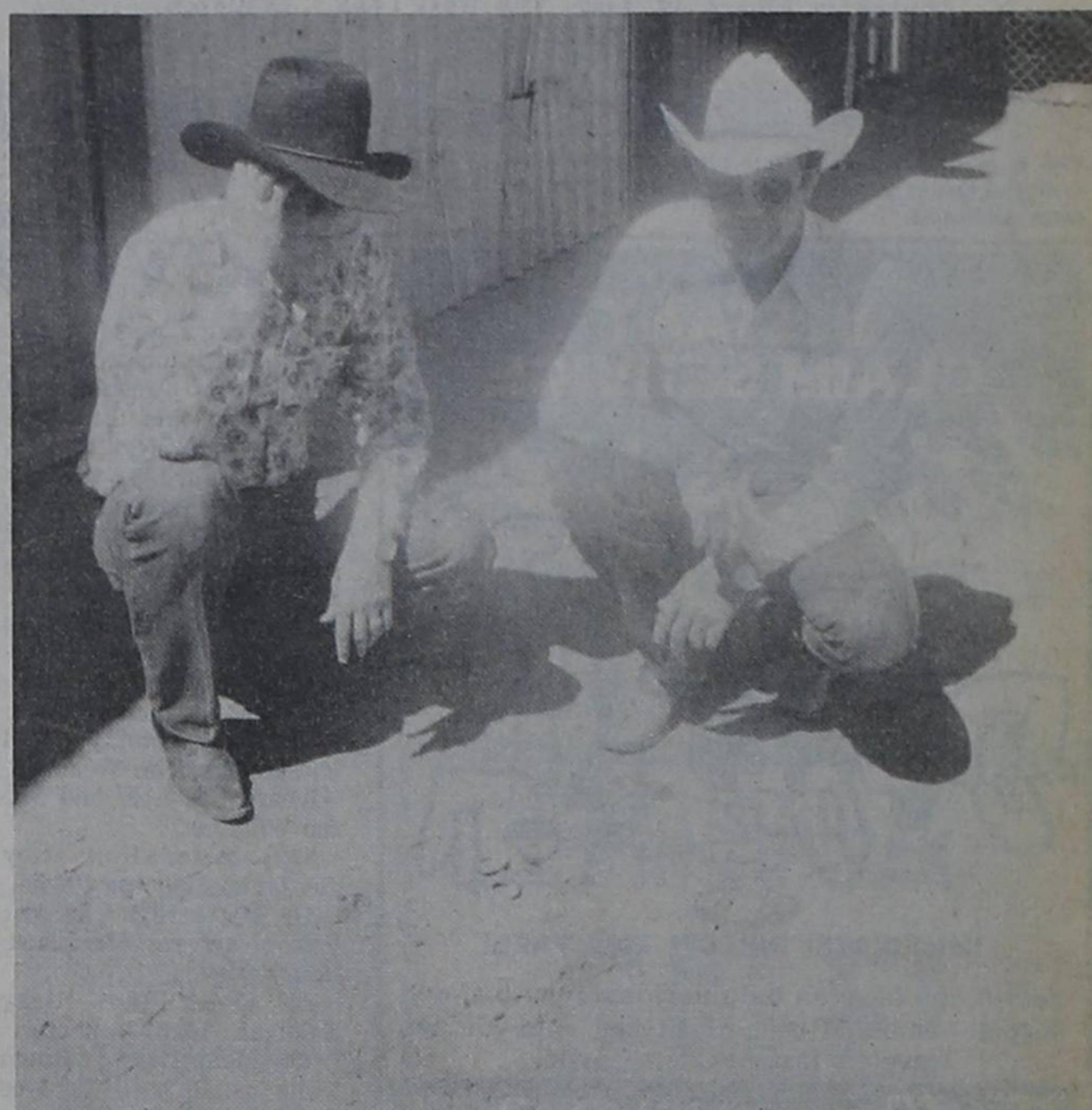
Masonic graveside services and burial were held in Terrace Cemetery under the direction of Hudman Funeral Home.

## Washer pitching tourney Saturday

Thirty-two teams have entered the West Texas Championship Washer Pitch Tournament which is scheduled to begin here Saturday, March 20 and continue through Sunday, March 21.

## Traditional Indian wind dance at sunrise Monday

The 11th annual Taba'na Yuan'e will be held in the City-County Park Monday morning at approximately 6:45 with Frank (Chief) Runkles telling the onlookers what the crop forecast will be for the coming year.

Moved back to its original site after having been moved to the Garza Jr. Livestock Barn, this offers Runkles a better opportunity to get a more accurate forecast for the sunrise ceremony.

Only in the first year of the Chamber of Commerce sponsored "sunrise wind ceremony" in 1972 has the old Indian legend produced as good a crop forecast. None have been better.

A group of Kawhadi Indian dancers from Amar-

illo are scheduled to appear with Chief Runkles. This group travels all over the nation to perform their Comanche dance.

A breakfast is also planned following the cere-

mony for \$1 per person in the Texas Department of Human Resources building (formerly the 4-H barn) to be catered by Jackson's Cafeteria.

Taba'na Yuan'e is one of

a kind, as no other city has such an event and interested radio and TV stations from across the nation are calling Post each March 22 to find out what the forecast will be.

## Early morning rural fire causes \$25,000 damage

The Post Volunteer Fire Department answered a call to a fire on the T. H. Tipton farm, north of Post about 1:50 a.m. Sunday morning, with the blaze resulting in losses of approximately \$25,000 to Mr. T. H. Tipton of Post, and Mrs. Jean Tipton, who resides on the farm.

The shop building and storage shed was a total loss, and a 44-40 John Deer tractor belonging to Mrs. Tipton was heavily damaged. Treflan stored in the shed and valued at approximately \$4,000 was also lost. Numerous electric tools,

and electrical equipment were also destroyed.

Cause of the blaze had not been determined, although the fire was reported just following the thunderstorm which passed through Post around midnight.

The shop building, along

with its usefulness, held some historic value, since it was once the Gulf Station that was in Post many years. The station building was purchased by Tai Tipton and moved to his farm for the shop building early in the 1950s.

## Saturday night rain measures .67 inch

Post Officially measured .87 of an inch of rain, as measured by Nick Vukad, National Weather observer, during the late Saturday night thunderstorm.

Rain measurements were fairly general all over the County, with heavier measurements in the western portion. Elmer Cowdrey, who resides west of Graham community reported one

and one-half inches, while the Close City community and Pleasant Valley communities also reported around one inch of moisture. Farmers welcomed the rains with planting season so near. This was the first measurable rainfall recorded for the year with 1.24 inches of moisture was recorded from snowfall and light showers through January and February.

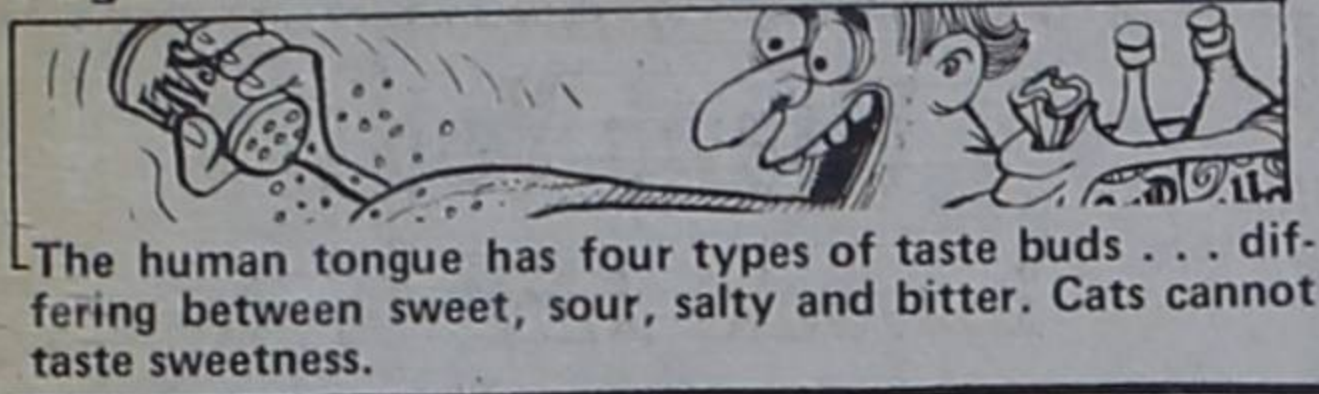

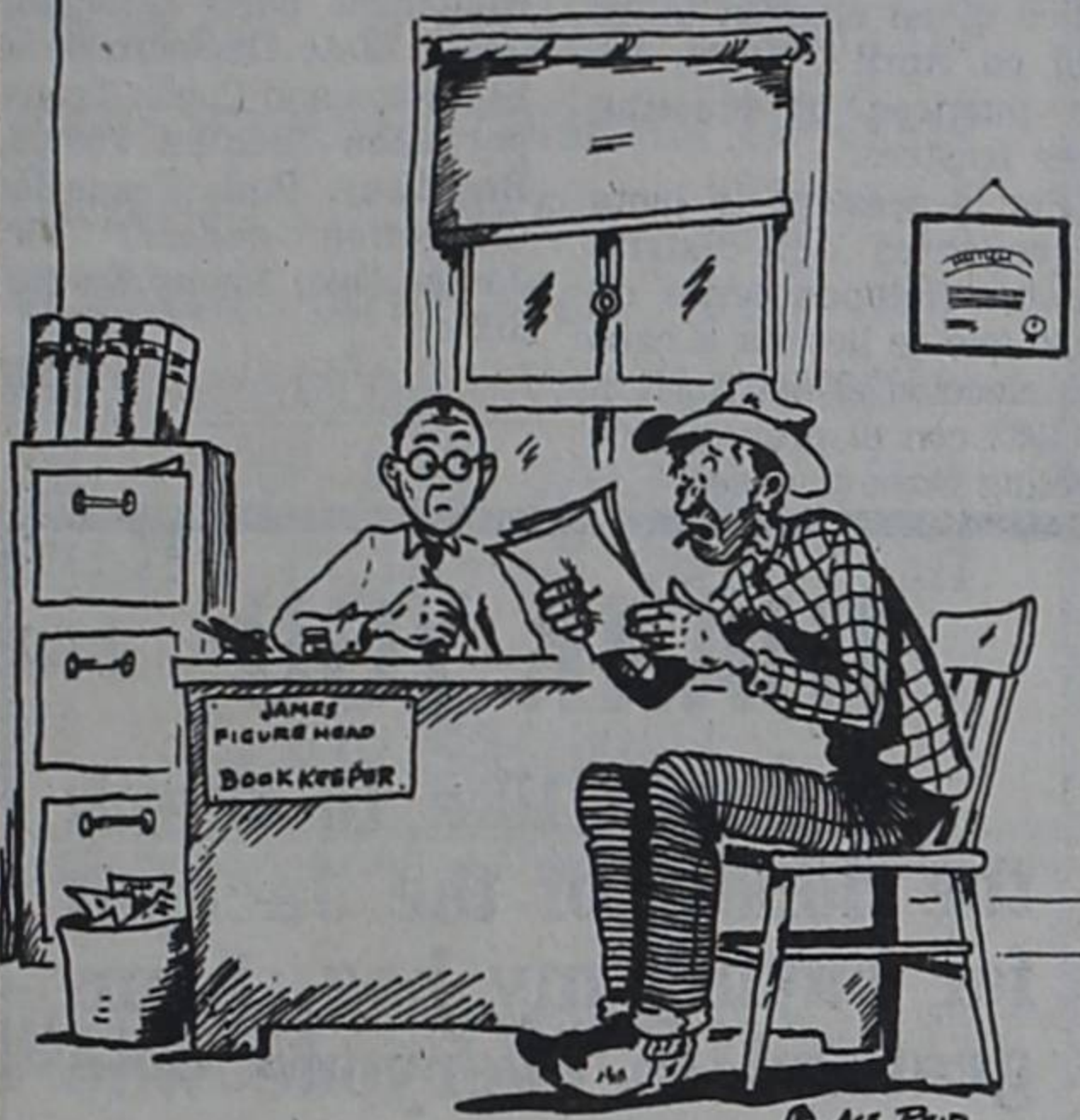

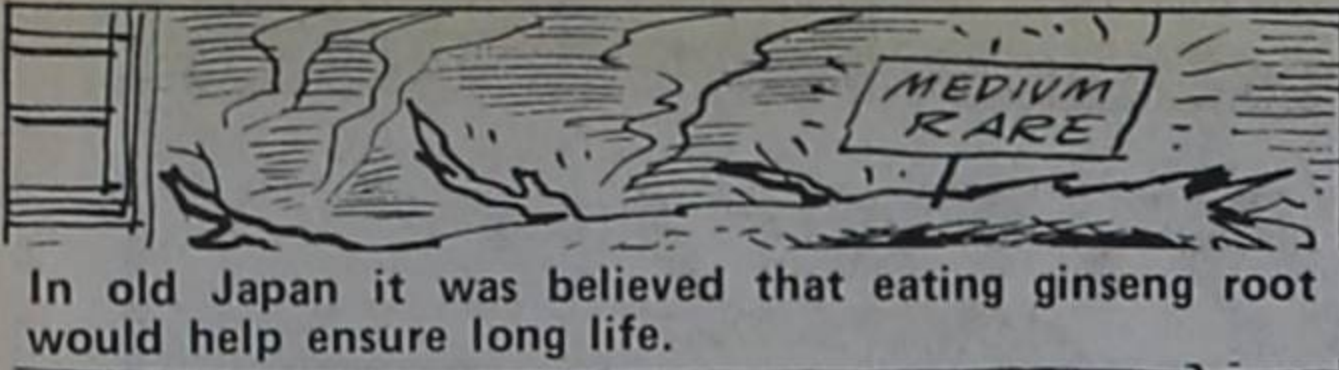

The term 20-20 refers to the size letters which the average eye can read twenty feet away. In most standard vision testing, you read the familiar Snellen eye chart at a distance of 20 feet. The upper number of the fraction expresses this distance. The lower number identifies the size letters you were able to read at this distance. Thus 20-70 vision means that you are able to read at 20 feet the line which a normal eye can read at 70 feet.

Often, this test is given by having you look into a machine which creates the same conditions optically. The results are roughly similar to those of the Snellen chart.

However, parents should not be lulled into the impression that their child has perfect vision because he scores a 20-20 on this vision test. All it measures is how well or poorly the child sees at that distance. And that's all. Problems with near vision, eye coordination and focusing ability are among the many problems NOT discovered in this test. Only a professional eye examination will protect the priceless miracle of sight.

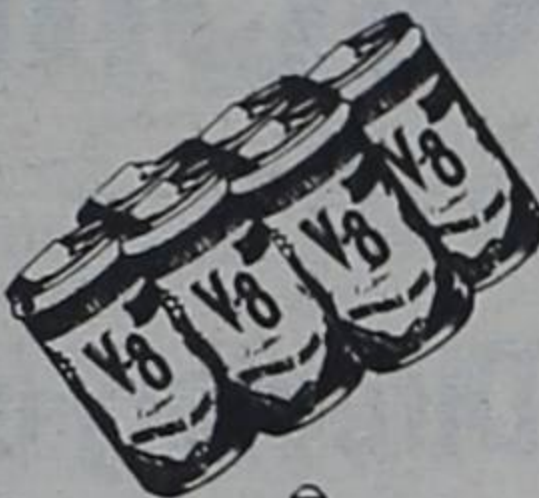

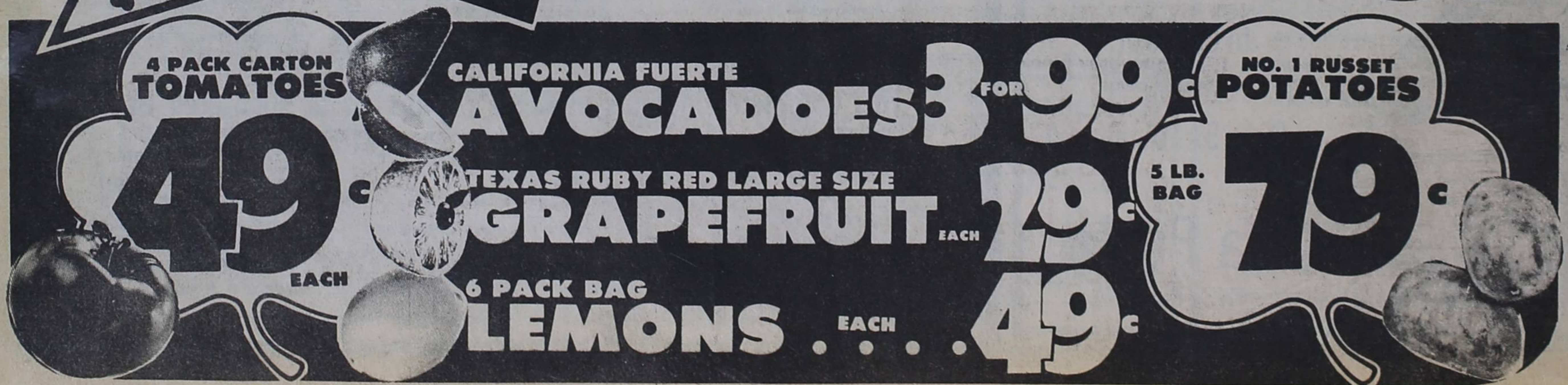

Novels "The Faraway Drums", by Jon Cleary, with adventure and romance set in British India, "The Long Masquerade," by Madeleine Brent, in which Emma loves a man in 19th century London, a man she must pretend not to love, until one day, when all her secrets are revealed. Sellers described himself as a Goon - "someone with a one-cell brain who thinks in the fourth dimension." A second new biography in the library this week tells the story of Mae West. The authors, George Eels, and

Stanley Musgrove, call her "maybe the most quoted woman in history." Before she died in November, 1980, she left words like these: "When I'm good, I'm very good, but when I'm bad I'm better." Or, "Too much of a good thing can be better." Or, "I'm no angel, but I've spread my wings a bit," and "Between two evils, I always pick the one I never tried before." There's more, but you'll have to read it for yourself.

You will be interested to know that about \$600 has been contributed to the Post Public Library in memory of Jim Cornish, late editor of the Post Dispatch, and chairman of the Library Board at the time of his death. The board would be interested in your suggestions on ways this money could be invested wisely in the library.

Even if you don't have an idea on using that money, go by the library and invest some time in reading, or using the computer there. Just the few books listed above would cost you over \$100 if you could find them in a bookstore. They are available right now, free, at the Post Public Library.


