Wind blows 'excellent' prediction

A 'bumper crop' was the prediction by Chief Frank Runkles Monday morning at the City-County park when the annual Taba'na Yuan'e was held before a crowd of approximately 100.

The event, sponsored by the Post Chamber of Commerce, drew applause from the crowd as the Indian Chief pointed dramatically to the northeast which means a very good crop year.

Runkles, accompanied in his Indian dance by Joe Hays of Kress and his Kawhadi dancers of Amarello, was in full Indian dress and began the ceremony by rubbing two sticks together and within a minute or two

had his wood fire going. Stakes, which correctly represented north, east, south and west, were set on the perimeter of the small ceremony area to provide accurate judging of the wind direction.

He offered a Comanche sunrise chant, and the peace pipe to the east, - land of the rising sun, the south - land of the great heat, the west - land of the setting sun, and the north - land of snow and ice. Then the pipe was offered to Mother Earth and to the "Great Spirit Above." He danced briefly around the fire and then, at the moment of sunrise, whirled and pointed to the northeast.

This was the first such prediction of a bumper crop since its origin in 1973 (See '82 crop, Page 12)

Executive Director of the South Plains Council, Rob-

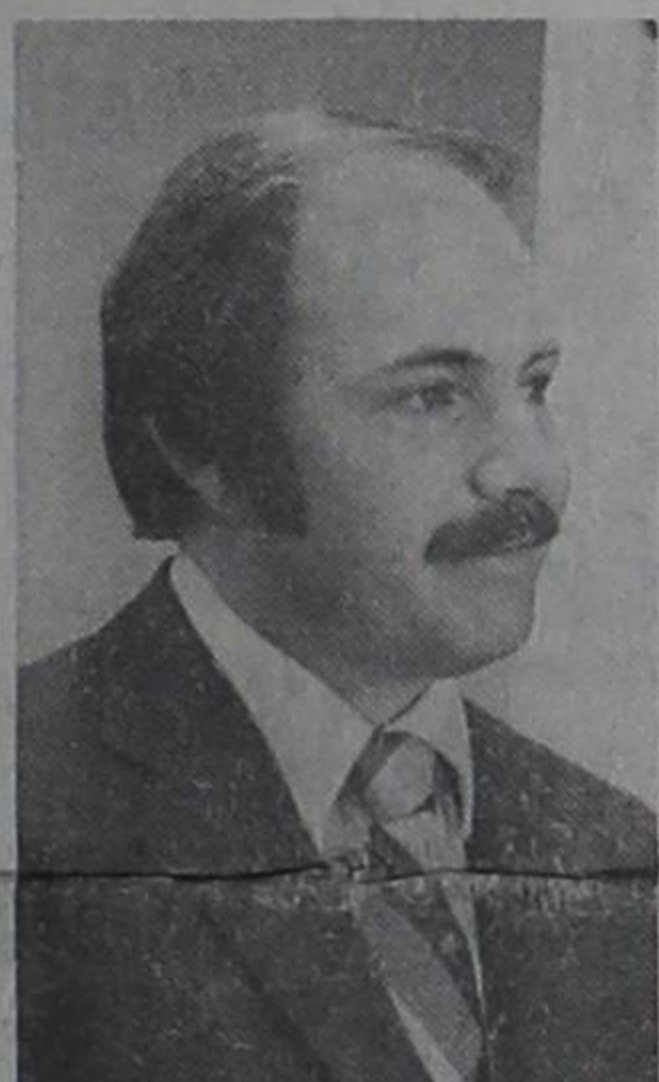

The main storage building and yard, which has received \$99,000 of the allocated money, is nearly complete as is the Ranger's house. The dining hall and headquarters building is 50 percent complete with the plumbing nearing its end also.

An activity building which is planned north of the lake to be used for training sessions and meetings is yet to be started and it along with the \$50,000 renovation of the shower house at the swimming pool will be the last ones to be started.

All work is expected to be completed by the first regular Camp session, which is scheduled to begin June 13.

Jackson's cafeteria and Don Glidwell have started the ball rolling by offering the cafeteria, let's pitch in as a community, and keep it rolling.

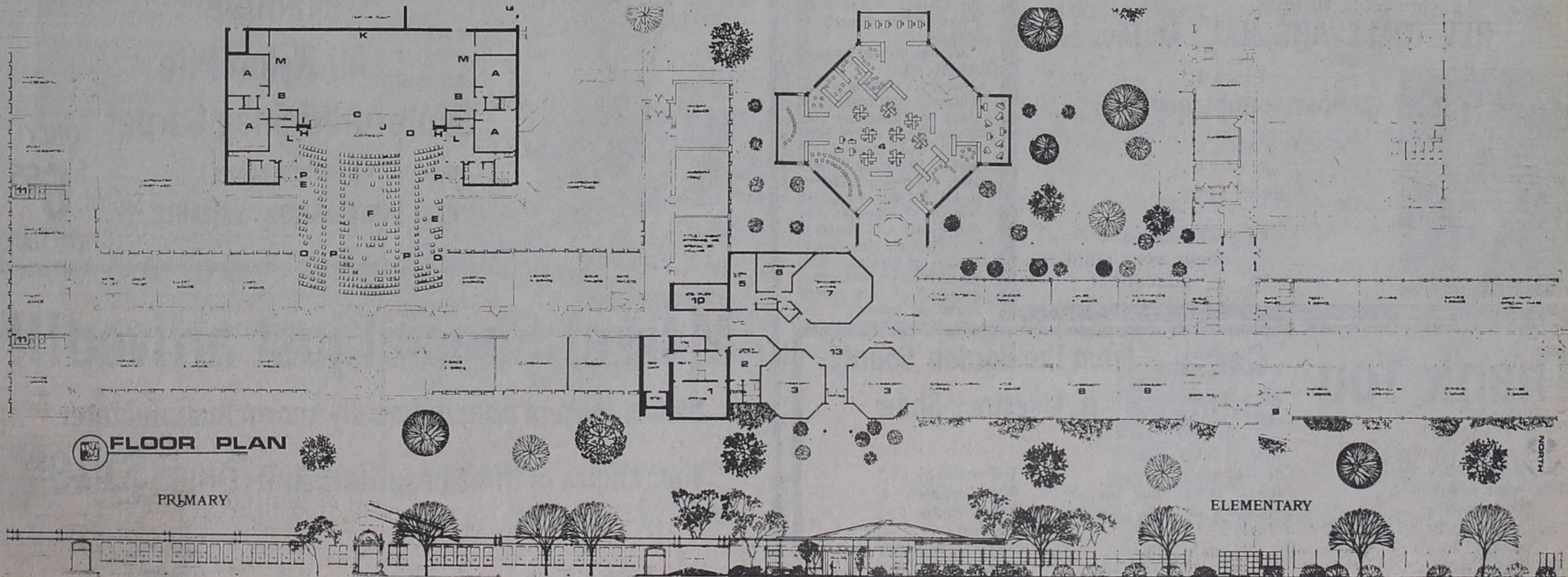

Scanning Social Security

Every person who drew one or more checks from Social Security in 1980 or 1981 and earned more than the allowable amount either or both of those years, must file an Annual Report of Earnings with Social Security. This report is a separate report from the filing of an income tax return and is in addition to filing an income tax return. This report must be made to the Social Security Administration each year before April 15.

If the report is not timely, the penalty for failure to make the report is one monthly benefit check the first time. More severe penalties are applied for those who fail to make reports the second or third times.

The allowable earnings for those age 65 or older in 1980 was \$5,000. For those under age 65 the allowable amount was \$3,720.

The allowables for 1981 were \$5,500 for those age 65 or older and \$4,080 for those under age 65 all year.

Services held for aunt

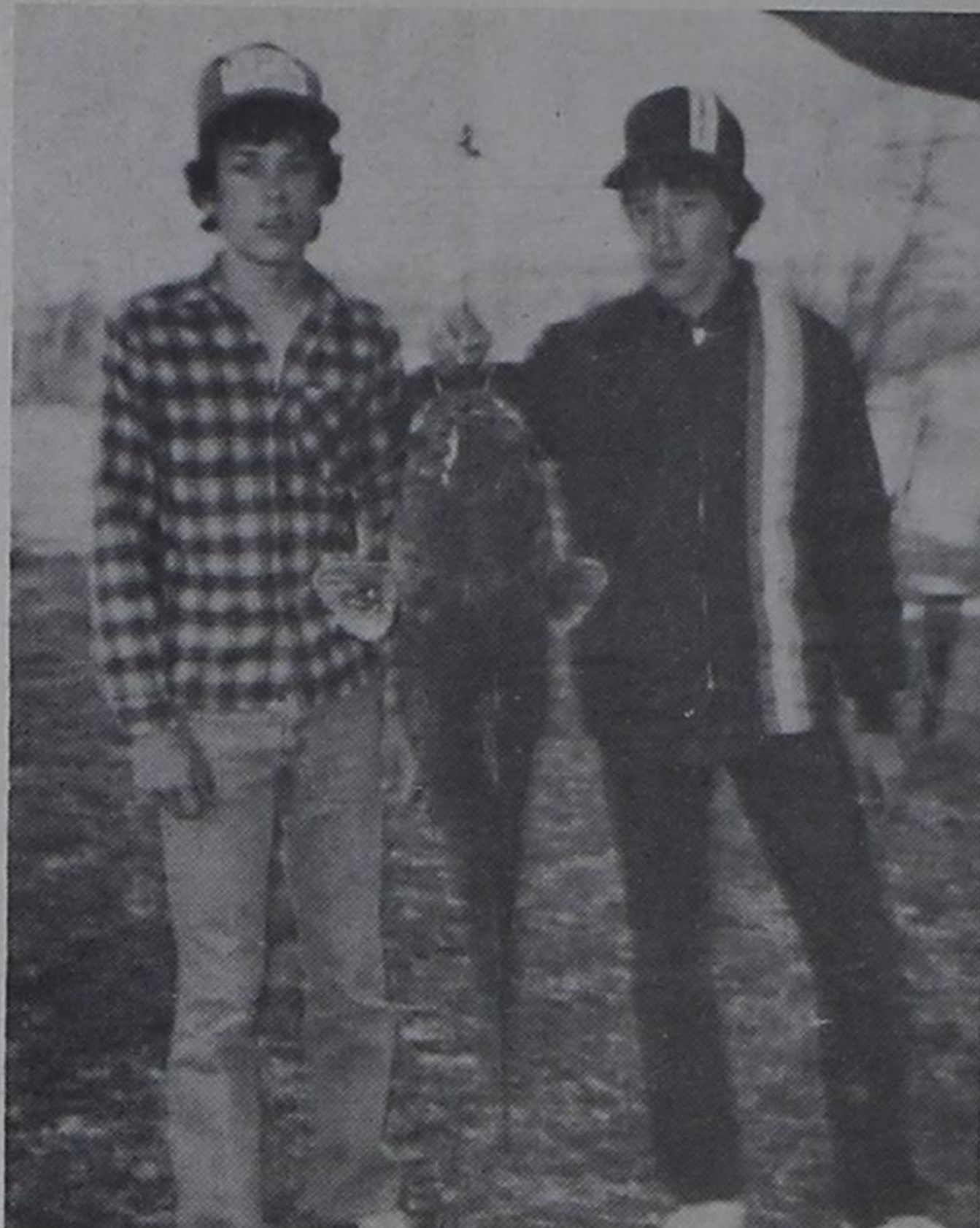

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Dr. Daniel C. Pfannstiel joins ag department

COLLEGE STATION — Dr. Daniel C. Pfannstiel, who has served as director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service since 1976, will leave his administrative post Sept. 1 to join Texas A & M University's Department of Agricultural Education, where he will head a new doctoral program.

TAEX, part of the Texas A & M University System, is headquartered on the Texas A & M University campus, and Dr. Pfannstiel has long had close ties with the university's agricultural education program.

His departure from the TAEX directorship was announced by Dr. Perry Adkisson, deputy chancellor for agriculture for the Texas A & M University System. The Sept. 1 date for Dr. Pfannstiel's new assignment coincides with the start of the system's new fiscal year and approximates the beginning of the new school year.

Dr. Adkisson said Dr. Pfannstiel's TAEX career, dating back to 1949, will place him in an enviable position in providing leadership for the new Ph.D. program planned for the Department of Agricultural

Education. "His experience in extension education will be invaluable in developing the new doctoral program, which we envision as soon being the strongest in the nation," Dr. Adkisson noted. "We are pleased that Dr. Pfannstiel has agreed to accept this important new responsibility."

Dr. Pfannstiel's own doctoral dissertation earned national recognition. Writing on "Criteria for Determining Financial Support of County Agricultural Extension Work in Texas," he developed a formula for measuring the extension workload in a county and for estimating a county's share of the fiscal support for the program, based on tax evaluation. His formula and plan have been adopted by several states, including Texas.

He is a 1949 animal husbandry graduate of Texas A & M. He earned his master's degree, in extension education, at Michigan State University in 1952 and Ph.D., in cooperative extension administration, at the University of Wisconsin, in 1959.

Dr. Pfannstiel, a native of Bexar County, began his

agricultural career as an assistant county agent in Wharton County in 1949 and rose through the TAEX ranks. He also served for a period as a visiting professor, at the University of Wisconsin.

ACCENT ON HEALTH

Seeing that high blood pressure patients follow their doctor's instructions will be the number one priority of future Texas Department of Health hypertension programs.

That's the opinion of Dr. Cliff Price, TDH Associate Commissioner for Personal Health Services.

"We estimate two and one quarter million Texans have elevated blood pressure," Dr. Price said. "For every new case we find through our programs, we find nine known hypertensives who are not complying with their treatment."

Dr. Price explained that high blood pressure is the blood pressing with too much force against the artery walls. He said if left untreated, high blood pressure increases the risk of heart attack, stroke, or kidney failure. High blood pressure cannot be cured, but it can be controlled by a treatment regimen prescribed by a physician.

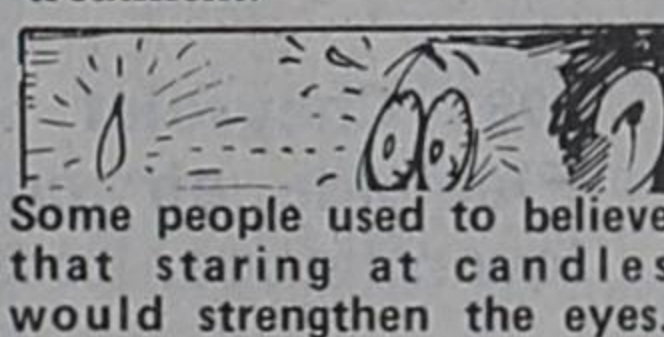
"Doctors may tell patients to cut down on the use of salt, to stop smoking, to exercise more, or to lose weight," he said. "If your doctor prescribes medication, take it as directed, not just when you remember or feel like it. If there are uncomfortable side effects, notify your doctor, and in most cases these side effects can be eliminated."

Dr. Price said that unlike many other health problems, high blood pressure often doesn't cause symptoms. Because patients feel good, they frequently stop taking their medicine or fail to follow their doctor's instructions.

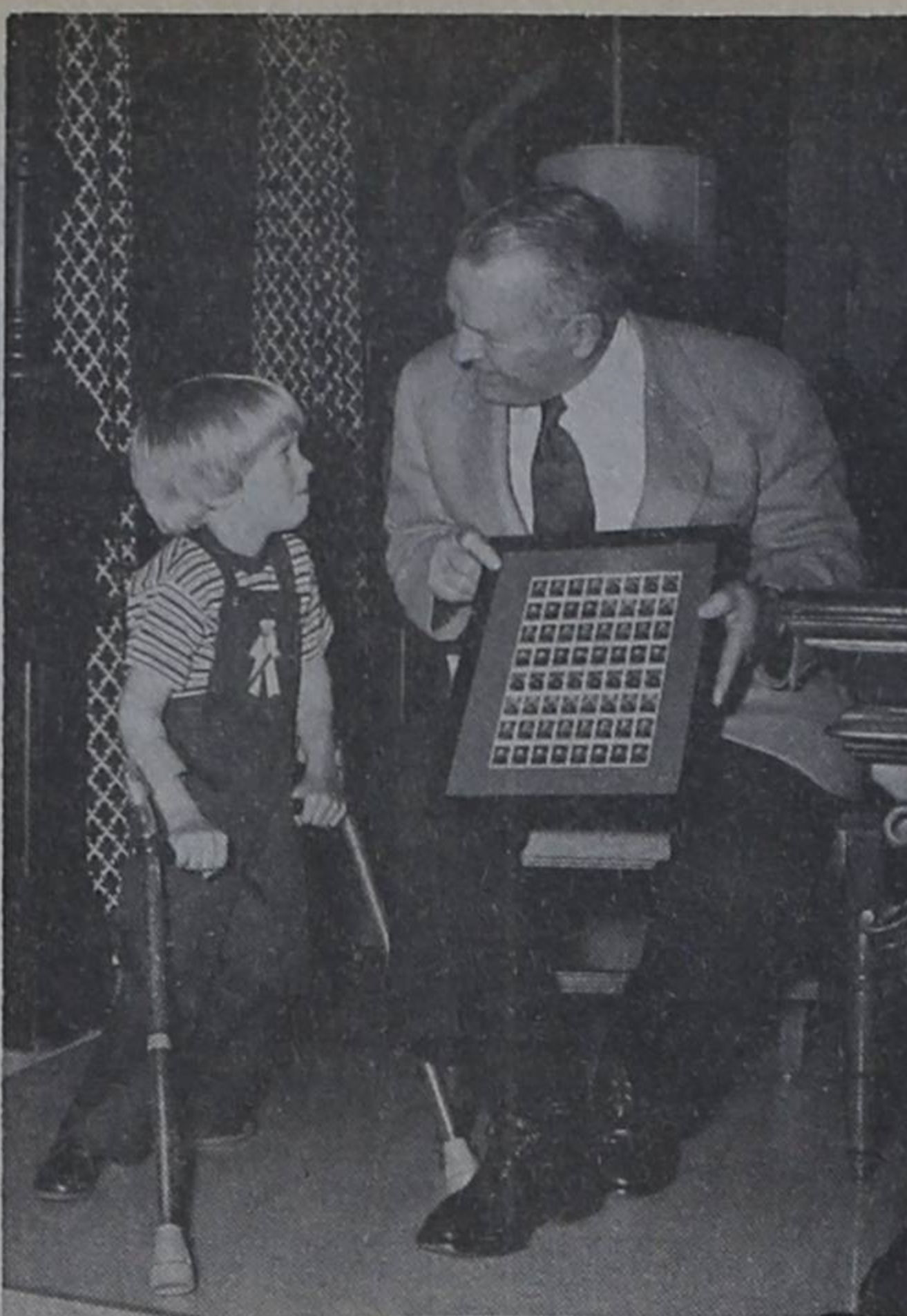
High blood pressure is usually detected in a physician's office. For those persons using public health clinics, blood pressure measurements are provided by nurses. In 1981, 110,000 people were screened by TDH nurses for hypertension.

When it has been determined that a person has an elevated blood pressure, a referral is made to a local physician so that a diagnosis and proper treatment can be begun.

Upon the recommendations of the private physician, a public health nurse follows up on the patient to see if he or she is following the doctor's prescribed treatment.

Michael receives therapy at the Dallas Society for Crippled Children, one of eleven Easter Seal Centers in Texas. He has made considerable progress in physical therapy to strengthen his muscles and enable him to live more independently. Though shy with strangers, Michael is an outgoing child once he gets to know people. He has a bright future because of his eagerness to learn and his high intelligence.

Before they moved to Forney, the Morrills lived in Denison, where Michael

received treatment at the Grayson County Easter Seal Society.

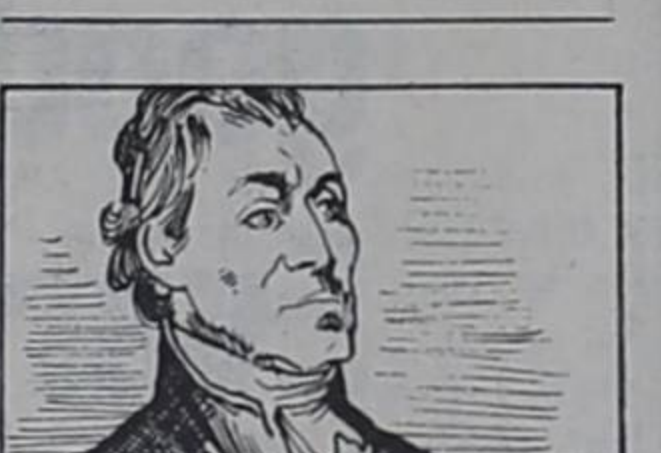

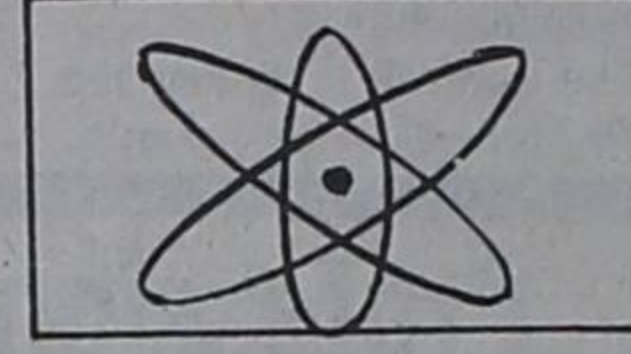

Neal Francis is president of Minor League.

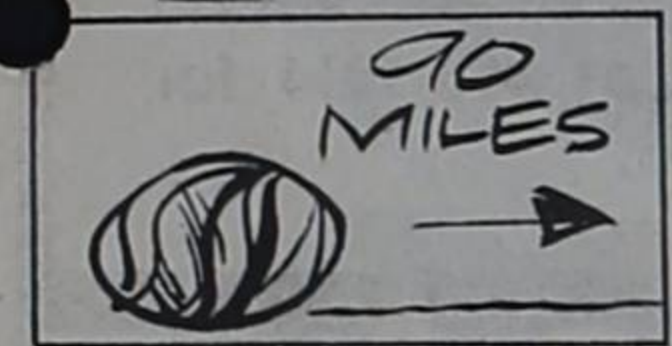

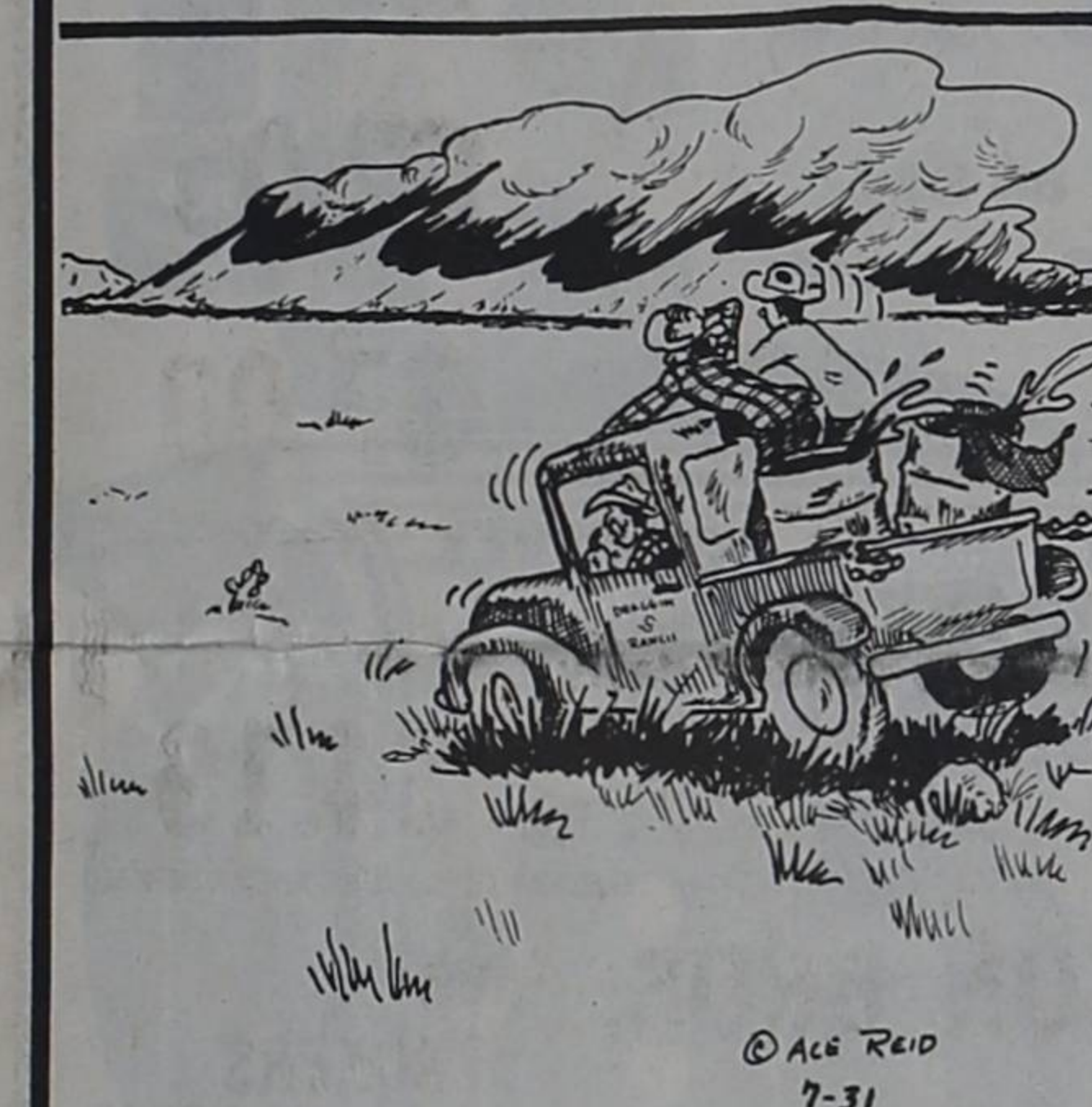
